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SPORTING GEAR STORACE

Designer Tamarisk McNalty Stephens shares her ideas.

Storage for your sports gear isn't given much consideration when planning and designing a new home or renovating an existing one. However, if an average family stays relatively active and participates in organized sports or recreational activities, a significant amount of equipment can accumulate, which requires substantial square footage.

Gear varies based on individual and family interests but can include:

- camping tents and cookware
- \checkmark fishing poles and tackle boxes
- ✓ golf clubs
- ✓ bicycles
- ✓ rollerblades, skateboards and scooters
- ✓ helmets
- ✓ lacrosse sticks
- ✓ soccer balls
- ✓ footballs and cleats
- ✓ baseball gloves
- ✓ balls and bats
- ✓ curling brooms
- ✓ skates and hockey equipment
- ✓ skis, snowboards, boots and poles
- ✓ tennis racquets and balls
- ✓ canoes, SUPs, kayaks, paddles and life jackets
- ✓ motocross and snowmobile gear

Proper storage solutions make it easier to keep a tidy home and an organized system allows family schedules to operate more smoothly during busy seasons when you need to get out the door to the big game. Here are some tips for planning functional sports equipment storage in the home.

TAKE INVENTORY

To determine what storage solutions you need, you must first evaluate what you have. Go through everything and donate, sell or pitch gear that is outgrown, worn out or irrelevant. Once you have purged, determine which items can be stored in a garage, outbuilding or shed without air conditioning or heat, and which items will need to find room in the home (so mould doesn't grow and rodents don't chew).

SPACE/LOCATION

Think about what gear you need to access in each season. Depending on space, you may need to design a system that can rotate between summer/winter sports. Take a look around your home to determine if there is space not being utilized to its potential. Whether it's a closet, a corner in the basement, a spare room upstairs, space under the stairs, or some wall space in the garage that can be transformed into gear storage – claim it as such. Locating storage in an area accessible to children can encourage them to take responsibility for putting away their gear. They'll know where to find it when they need it and proper storage can also prolong the life of equipment.

NCORPORATE TARGETED SOLUTIONS

Some equipment should be aired out after each use, so specialized hanging racks should be considered essential (and good ventilation is key!). In-floor heat in a mudroom also helps dry items quickly in the winter.

Make use of overhead space in a garage for hanging bikes, canoes, kayaks, etc. In addition to typical hooks, baskets and shelves, a slatwall system offers flexibility you can tailor to your needs with specialized attachments. You can install mesh baskets for balls, wire shelves/ baskets for boots and cleats, stands that keep golf bags off the floor, shelves and hooks for skis and boards, racquets and various helmets, and utility hooks for paddles and fishing rods. Wall-mounted clips can keep hockey sticks, curling brooms and lacrosse sticks organized.



Deep customized wood shelving is handy for storing large totes and clear bins for camping equipment, off-season gear and hockey bags.

Locker room-style storage with a designated space for each person keeps their belongings organized. There are also bags designed to accommodate specific equipment, which keeps required items together for easy access when heading out.

MATERIALS

Use appropriate materials and finishes that can stand up to wear and tear. Consider solid wood for doorjambs, casings, millwork and wall treatments (it stands up better than MDF to heavy use). Drywall corners with a radius are generally less susceptible to damage and chipping from being bumped. Durable floor surfaces such as porcelain tile and concrete can be swept and mopped easily. **OH**

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
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2 ounces gin 1 ounce pomegranate juice 1 ounce orange juice ½ ounce thyme honey syrup*

*To make thyme honey syrup, heat equal parts honey and water in a pan with a sprig of thyme. Bring to a simmer and let thyme infuse until cool.

INSTRUCTIONS

Combine all ingredients into a cocktail shaker with ice. Shake until cool and strain over ice.

Garnish with a thyme sprig and thick zest of orange peel.

Optional: With a butane torch, heat the thyme sprig until smoking. **OH**

The couple had met online and shared common threads; both were widowers and parents of children currently aged 16 to 27. When it was time, they sold their separate homes to purchase a 12-year-old Beamsville abode they could envision as the hub for the entire family to come together "But to make it work, the house needed a complete overhaul," says Barbara.

The couple talked to neighbours who had tackled a similar major home renovation. They'd worked with **Laurie Sprague** of **Sprague** Interiors and Brad Robinson of BMR Group Construction Ltd. and provided positive feedback about the process of their renovation. "We called them immediately," says Stephen.

The interior renovation focused on the family's long-term goals. The couple wanted the main floor designed for retirement – including a stairless primary bedroom and en suite, a laundry room, an open-

concept kitchen, living room and dining room with ample space for large gatherings and tons of storage space. "The main level is our oasis, our personal space," says Stephen. "The en suite is spa-like, and the bedroom has wall-to-wall built-ins (built by **Dave Inglis**)." The basement level was reorganized to accommodate four bedrooms, two bathrooms and a lounge area for all ages. Even the mudroom was designed for seven. "We like to have everyone together for dinners or weekend breakfasts," says Stephen.

A substantial part of the design project involved the kitchen and how the family uses the space. The kitchen was swapped with the living room to create flow and allow for a user-friendly layout. The change accommodated a large, beachy, white oak island topped with a solid quartz from **Rockstella Stonery Inc.** – the perfect complement to the soaring shiplap





ceiling. "The gorgeous ceiling treatment was a splurge that we had to push for due to the high level of detail and time required to execute," says Laurie. The cathedral ceiling was a big project to cut, align and install using a specific technique to ensure no sagging or movement in the future. Choices were made to balance costs with homeowner needs and wants without sacrificing quality workmanship. For example, some bedroom furniture was professionally refurbished instead of replaced and additional bedroom designs were pared back. "Laurie and Brad showed us how to stretch our vision," says Stephen. "They gave us options and samples, taking us on a journey to how our choices would lead to further changes and contribute to the end result." Continued on page 37



The end result: a timeless home built with attention to detail; illustrating how homeowners truly benefit when their design and build teams work together. **OH**



The search for the ideal shade of white can be a daunting task. White paint may seem simple, but variations in undertones and finishes can leave your head spinning. Join me as I share my foolproof process for choosing the perfect white paint hues for your home.

1. Consider Natural Lighting

Before diving into the myriad of white shades, evaluate the natural lighting in your space. North-facing rooms tend to have cooler light, while south-facing rooms are warmer. East-facing rooms receive bright morning light, while west-facing rooms are illuminated by afternoon and evening sun. Understanding your room's lighting will help you choose the right white with the ideal undertones.


2. Determine The Atmosphere

The ambience you want to create plays a crucial role in selecting white paint. If you desire a clean, crisp feel, opt for a pure white shade like Benjamin Moore Chantilly Lace, a designer favourite. For a warmer and cosier atmosphere, consider whites with yellow or beige undertones like Benjamin Moore Simply White. If you seek a modern and sophisticated look, cooler whites with grey or blue undertones may be more suitable, such as Benjamin Moore Designer White.

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3. Consider Undertones

White paints can have undertones that subtly influence the overall look of a room. Common undertones include blue, grey, green, beige and yellow. To prevent a clash with other elements in your space, consider the undertones of your furniture, flooring and fixtures. Warm undertones pair well with warm colours, while cooler undertones complement cool colours.

4. Test Before Committing

Always test paint samples before committing to a particular shade. Apply large swatches of white paint on different walls in your room and observe how they appear in various lighting conditions. One product I love to use is from Hello Paint, where you can order peel and stick paint swatches that can easily move from room to room. Assess the samples at different times of the day to see how they respond to changing natural light. This process will help you choose a shade that harmonizes with your space.



5. Evaluate Contrast

White paint doesn't exist in isolation. Consider how your chosen white will interact with other elements in the room. If you have vibrant or dark-coloured furniture, a pure white may create a striking contrast. Alternatively, if you prefer a more harmonious look, consider selecting a white shade that is like the colour of your furniture or other design elements.

6. Consider The Finish

The finish of the paint can significantly impact the final appearance of your walls. Matte or flat finishes create a soft, smooth look but are more prone to marks and smudges. Satin or eggshell finishes offer a slight sheen and are more durable, making them suitable for high-traffic areas. Glossy finishes provide a dramatic shine but are best reserved for trim or accent areas.


7. Seek **Professional Advice**

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




"We were very blessed to have a very good designer in Richard," says Sona. "He was amazing and very familiar with Mississauga and the houses. We wanted a house from the outside that worked

with the neighbourhood and landscape, but inside, we wanted to completely change that style."

The kitchen was built for practical use. Sona chose black Dekton countertops and a coordinating veined backsplash from **Apex Custom Fabrication** to surround the cook space. The expansive island was topped with quartz for additional prep space.


"We chose black Dekton because we use a lot of spices in Indian cooking," Sona says. "We use a lot of turmeric and it can stain. So it was in our minds that we have to be careful."

The living room is the heart of the home and the family's favourite space with soaring

20-foot ceilings and a gas fireplace by **The Fireplace Company** at the centre, rising the full height of the room. Windows and patio doors sweep the full length of the back wall, giving access and views to the private backyard, covered patio and pool to anyone enjoying the family room.



"I give 100 per cent credit to Ornella Homes, they were amazing to work with," says Sona. "They understood what we wanted. I liked that the designing was done by us, but Peter guided us along the way."

The open-riser, glass-and-iron staircase by **mrail** winds its way through the home and acts as functional art. Each step was constructed using black Dekton – similar to the kitchen.


"If someone is wearing heels, you cannot slip on these stairs," says Sona. "We were so blessed to work with such great tradespeople who guided us when picking materials."

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

The lower level was designed for entertainment and fun. A beautiful bar is at the centre, designed around a backlit onyx crystal stone from Apex Custom Fabrication and a warm walnut finish. A gym, equipped with a sauna and jet tub bookends one side of the space while a prayer room and additional bedrooms flank the other.

"Everyone lives in their home, but we really wanted to enjoy it," says Sonali. "Everything was thoughtfully curated for current and future comfort.

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

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AS CANADA'S HOUSING CRISIS GRINDS

on, governments have begun to pay much more attention to "gentle densification" – the concept of getting our existing properties to do more. In Ontario for example, the provincial government's "More Homes Built Faster" legislation loosens up rules pertaining to accessory dwelling units such as garden suites.

So what does that change mean on the ground? Well, if you've been toying with adding a separate in-law suite, a rental suite or even some cool studio space on your property, today you potentially have less red tape to contend with.

While many of us might be intrigued, garden suites are also a fairly new format that not everyone is familiar with. And many homeowners may legitimately wonder: "Is a garden suite the answer to my family's needs?" "Is this cost-effective?" And: "Can my property even accommodate a garden suite?"

We looked at the legislative changes and contacted a couple of industry experts about potential benefits and key considerations with garden and laneway suites.

Here's a closer look: THE LEGISLATIVE CHANGES

Setting the stage, Ontario's Bill 23 (which passed in November 2022) stated: "One of the ways we propose to increase gentle density is by expanding what's allowed to be built without further planning approvals. Our plan would permit up to three residential units on most residential lots 'as of right' – that is to say, without needing a by-law amendment. For example: a main residence, a basement apartment, a garden house."

In Toronto, where the housing crisis has hit especially hard, city council permitted laneway dwellings in 2019. Then in February of 2022, the city adopted a "Garden Suites Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment" allowing garden suites in most GTA residential zones.

Samantha Chan is marketing and sales director of Toronto-based Elevate Realty Inc., a real estate sales brokerage that focuses on investing in houses and multi-family homes. In a nutshell, the new garden suite legislation translates into way more opportunities, she says. Realistically, Samantha explains, only about 47,000 or so properties in Toronto meet laneway suite requirements (i.e., they have laneway access and meet fire requirements). Yet, thanks to by-law amendments, now, Samantha says, "You don't need a laneway. As long as you have a big enough backyard, you can build a garden suite. If a homeowner wants to do it, it becomes a lot easier and more feasible for them."



WHAT ARE GARDEN SUITES BEING USED FOR?

Bianca Acqua is director of sales and marketing for Woodbridgebased City Modular Buildings Inc., a company that specializes in modular homes, laneway and garden suites. From where she sits, Bianca is seeing various motivations in terms of why homeowners are building garden suites: "It really just depends on the needs of the individual or family," she says. "So some people are using garden suites as rental units to generate additional income, while others are using them as separate office or studio spaces to work from home. We see that these garden suites are a great way of providing additional living quarters for multi-generational families or to serve as a guest suite for visitors."

WHAT ARE SOME KEY FACTORS TO CONSIDER?

For homeowners exploring whether this option is workable, here are some key considerations:

- Lot size Samantha notes a difference between garden suites and laneway suites. While a "laneway house can span the whole distance of your backyard," she says a garden suite requires a setback on each side.
- **Compliance** Garden suites must comply with relevant Ontario Building Code regulations and zoning by-laws.
- Building permit These must be obtained.
- **Emergency access** A compliance review is required.
- **Existing trees** In Toronto, a garden suite "should not result in the removal of a healthy by-law protected tree."



- **Design** Bianca says some homeowners match the architecture of their garden suite and main structure, whereas others prefer a juxtaposition. "We have architects and engineers that work alongside the client to create and bring to life their vision."
- **Construction** Decisions include whether to hire a project manager and/or specialized builders and contractors, etc.
- **Pricing** This can range upwards from \$350 per square foot in Toronto (which is substantially lower than condo prices). Samantha notes that there are considerable fixed costs with garden suites and therefore building a two-storey suite can deliver both more living space and better cost per square foot as well.

Has there been an uptick in interest? In a word, yes. Already in the short time since new legislation rolled out, Bianca says she's seen homeowner interest rise: "More and more people are looking for creative ways to maximize their living space and a garden suite provides a unique opportunity to do this." **OH**



When the homeowners decided to build this new home, they planned a modest yet modern home with connectivity to the outdoors. Sprawling windows, lots of natural light and a smaller footprint that encouraged togetherness while maintaining an organic integration with the existing mature trees on the property were all vital to the family of four. The family partnered with **Joel Tanner**, owner of the full-service planning and design studio **smpl Design** Studio. To match the requirements of the family's vision, Joel designed a Scandinavian home for Canadian living, utilizing clean lines, a minimalist motif and a light-filled interior using materials that emphasize functionality.

"All of the work we do in our studio is 100 per cent custom to our client's wishlist and the property we're developing for them," says Joel. "We review sunlight angles, privacy, views and any defining characteristics on the property on all our launches before we design. The goal with this project was a new home with modern Scandinavian vibes and very low maintenance. We really wanted to keep the defining trees in the front and rear yards in order to retain the property's mature feel."

No space would be wasted. smpl partnered with builders Andrew Wood and Craig Spivey, owners of **Ecnomus Construction Group** to ensure every inch of its 2,400 square feet was thoughtfully constructed for use, packing in every desired amenity. The home has three bedrooms, four bathrooms, a main-floor office and plenty



of living space for current use and future growth.

Several indentations and extrusions were added to the open-concept layout, creating pockets of space. A courtyard bridges indoor and outdoor living, allowing the parents, when working in the home office, to watch over the kids at the back while filling the home in natural light. Wide-plank white oak flooring from NADURRA Wood Corp., floorto-ceiling windows by Inline Fiberglass Windows & **Doors** and a neutral palette of whites and organic materials complement the surrounding greenspace. Elmira Door + Trim supplied all trim, doors and hardware for this project.

"The design process was the easiest and most fun," says the homeowner. "We spend a lot of time exploring online and we were really drawn to the Scandinavian look - metal exteriors and light wood interiors. smpl pulled it all together for us."

A switch on the standard home layout, the primary living area – a cosy sunken living room with 11-foot ceilings and a custom sectional sofa by **Gus Modern** – was tucked away at the back of the home. The homeowner says this quiet retreat is a favourite of both the family and the design team. Continued on page 68

"This is the first sunken family room we've done and the feel you get when you are in the space with both views of the outside space of the backyard and the outside space of the courtyard is by far my favourite space in the home," says Joel.

A galley-style kitchen with full-height cabinetry from Kattlus **Cabinetry and Millwork** bridges the rear living room and dining space and overlooks the large covered patio and outdoor dining area complete with firepit and furnishings from Casualife Outdoor Living.

A white quartz-topped island creates extra seating and complements the striking dark veined quartz counter and backsplash (all from **Aussie Stone**) along the perimeter. A concealed pantry tucks away unwanted mess - elevating


the usability of the main floor.


"We like that the kitchen is central and connected to the living room," says the homeowner. "When the kids are playing in the other room or we are entertaining, you are all in the same place."

An open-riser staircase by Premier Stairs and Floors leads to the upper level, where smpl's design team continued the aesthetic, honouring clean-lines and utilizing bright whites to maximize natural light. The style shies away from colour, but statement walls – one in green and another in pink - are welcome in the kids' bedrooms.

The lower level was utilized for more living space – a rec room, additional bedroom, bathroom and den were added for the kids to have space to grow into. Continued on page 70

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For the exterior, smpl chose to clad the home in a mixture of brick from **Thames** Valley Brick and Tile, corten steel and grey metal roofing, which will stand the test of time and Canadian winters. **Sean McNally** of McNally Landscape Construction landscaped the front and back to blend with its surroundings and added a green roof over the single car garage and the rear covered patio.

"The aesthetic of the green roof and the contrast against the metal we really love," says the homeowner. "Our primary bedroom and our daughter's room overlooks these spaces. Putting that green space on top gives us a much more pleasant view than looking at a flat, plain rooftop."

The family highlights that every member of the design and build teams worked cohesively - allowing them to enjoy the process.





If it's a multi-purpose zone such as a main-floor great room or a gaming area with a pool table and bar, there will be ambient light and sound issues, so it's better to stick with a large flat-screen television and strategically placed speakers. If you're a film enthusiast looking to faithfully recreate a movie theatre atmosphere, a dedicated room that can be effectively darkened, with a ceiling-mounted projector, screen and more complex sound system will be a better fit.

ADVANCED SCREEN TIME

"Really cool projection technology is readily available," says Jason Rodrigues, general manager at London Audio, an audio/visual company specializing in home entertainment and automation. "For a multi-purpose media room, the current standard is a 75- to 98-inch high-definition 4K TV. Those with bigger budgets could opt for an 8K ultra-high-definition TV or the 114- to 140-inch micro-LED walls that are now available for residential use."










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INTEGRATION

Integrating state-of-the-art wiring, sound and internet features when building a new house is a no-brainer, but if you're living in an older home, there are still ways to retrofit your rooms to hide unsightly wires, bulky components and speaker towers. Station Earth recommends using stealth speakers that can be installed behind drywall, wallpaper or wood veneer. An art-frame TV can camouflage a large black screen or hide it completely with a lift mechanism that allows a mirror or art piece to glide in and out of view.



SOUND ADVICE

According to Jason, "You can't have a good home theatre without good audio. Clear, quality sound elevates the viewing experience, so it's important to invest in highperformance speakers. Entry-level packages include five speakers and one sub-woofer and go up from there."

John recommends installing Dolby Atmos overhead channels, which typically include 11 speakers and four subwoofers. "We can directly place the sound within the room, providing an enhanced experience. You feel like you're in the middle of the action - inside the car during a high-speed chase, in front of the tanks rolling towards you or directly beneath the plane flying overhead." But he adds, "don't forget the soundproofing."

STRATEGIC LIGHTING

Light spill will dramatically diminish picture quality in a home theatre, so it's critical to install automated blackout curtains or blinds. For safety, add LED floor lighting and for fun consider adding a dimmable fibre-optic ceiling to recreate the constellations.

AUTOMATE

A single universal device eliminates the need for multiple controls. Local audiovisual companies can help set you up with a dedicated system that will not only automate all your media, but also lighting, sound, home security, heating/cooling and shading.

Make a leaf template with some card stock. Fold the card stock in half and draw half a leaf on one side of the fold and cut out with your scissors. When unfolded you'll have a full leaf template.

Place your leaf template on top of a piece of felt and cut around the outside with scissors or a rotary cutter. Repeat until you have enough felt leaves for the length of garland you'd like.

TIP: We found the rotary cutter a little guicker and easier to cut multiple pieces of felt at one time. You'll need to make sure to protect your worktop with a cutting mat.

Start stringing your leaves onto a strand of yarn. Leave the yarn attached to the spool at one end until you have all your leaves strung, that way you'll be sure that you have a strand that is long enough. Thread the other end through the eye of the yarn needle. Fold one of your leaves from tip-to-tip accordion-style (this helps to keep your stiches even) and work the needle through all the folded layers and then gently pull the leaf over the needle and down the strand of yarn. Repeat this process until you have the length of garland you desire. Cut the yarn from the spool and knot the ends.

Now you're ready to decorate and enjoy! OH


The revamp has been an ongoing process, and one that Alexa and Lisa have worked on together. 

Perhaps the biggest change, though, took place in the kitchen. Removing a cabinet from over the peninsula immediately opened the space, as did painting the walls in Benjamin Moore Simply White. They replaced the cabinet hardware and the faucet. And that green countertop? Gone. In its place, **CMC Cut Stone Inc.** installed a contemporary quartz waterfall-style countertop. "It made the biggest difference," says Lisa. "Although the house is bigger elsewhere, this is the hub."

> Lisa doesn't have a formal background in design. By the time she recognized her passion for it she was well into her career in the car industry. But she has welcomed the opportunity to explore her creativity while helping her daughter. "I've enjoyed pretty much every aspect of it," she says. "It's surprising what a little bit of paint and elbow grease can do!"

"I trust my Mom's vision," says Alexa. "Envisioning the full picture is a challenge for me, whereas that is one of my Mom's strengths. But I give input on individual pieces."

Lisa completely redesigned the upstairs bath, banishing a dark enclosed shower stall that leaked, along with more dated cabinetry (and an aqua countertop). TASK General **Contractors Inc.** did the heavy lifting but Lisa chose all the components herself, including the glass shower stall from French Glass Co. His-and-hers undermount sinks topped with tall, striking mirrors render the room almost unrecognizable and create a sense of grand height on the ceiliing. Craig Wigley of Professional Electrical Services completed the electrical work and Aitken Plumbing and Mechanical did the plumbing work. The bathroom, now modern and stylish, has become one of Alexa's favourite places in the house. Continued on page 102

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ABCs AND 5 Ds of PRUNING

Why Prune?

Every shrub should have a purpose in the overall garden design and that purpose will dictate how the shrub should be pruned.

The goal of pruning is to enhance and emphasize the natural shape and to maintain the health of shrubs and small trees. A well-pruned shrub can live for 100 years!

Afraid or reluctant to prune for fear of not doing it right or hurting the shrub? Follow these few steps and you'll be a pro.

A is for assessment. First and foremost, identify the shrub you are pruning. Questions to ask are:

1) When does it flower? Spring or summer? If it flowers in spring, it often means it is blooming on last year's wood and shouldn't be pruned until after it has flowered and before it sets new buds for next year. Forsythia, Bridalwreath spirea and lilacs are in this category. Roses, Hydrangeas and Rose of Sharon can be pruned early in the spring as they bloom on the new wood.

2) What is its natural shape? Prune to accentuate the natural shape of the shrub and please put the hedge shears away! No balls or squares here unless you are into topiary and that's a topic for another article.

3) What is the purpose of this shrub? Is it for flowers, fruit, for the birds or for privacy?

B is for take a breath. Relax and give yourself time to know the shrub and look at it from all angles so you have the full picture of what you will be pruning.

C is for confidence. With time, trial and error (plants are very forgiving), you will gain confidence in your pruning abilities.



Now the **5 DS**. The Ds help you figure out what to prune.

Dead or dying branches. Remove the dead and dying branches for aesthetics but also for health. Dead branches can be an entry point for various pathogens. Always remove the dead branch to a healthy, green node.

Diseased refers to anything that has a disease or pest problem that could potentially harm the plant if left unchecked. Cleaning your tools after each cut of a diseased branch is important.

Damaged is just that! Any branch that has been broken from winter snows or spring storms needs to be removed. These are weak points and again could be an entry point for pathogens.

Doubling branches. Sometimes the shrub will have two branches in close proximity growing in the same direction. Pruning one of the branches out will open the shrub, giving it better air circulation and strengthening the remaining branch. Also, remove any branches that are going from the outside to the inside of the shrub.

Desirable. This is what we want the plant to be. Do we want lots of flowers or is it the fruit or both? Do we want the shrub for privacy or is it a focal point in the garden?







Tools For Pruning

Invest in a good pair of secateurs or bypass pruners and a good hand saw. Loppers will help to remove the stems larger than three-quarters-of-an-inch. Always wear your personal protective equipment, such as gloves and safety glasses.

How To Prune

Cut branches/stems at a 45-degree angle, one-quarter-inch above an outward facing bud or branch. Be careful not to leave a stub as this could be an entry point for pathogens.

I hope you feel confident now to get out and prune your shrubs. Doing is the best way to learn! он

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

APPLE **Dumplings**

RECIPE AND PHOTOGRAPHY JENELLE MCCULLOCH

These apple dumplings follow the traditional approach. Whole apples are wrapped in pastry and baked in a brown sugar sauce. They are perfect served with a scoop of ice cream.

INGREDIENTS (Makes 4)

Brown Sugar Sauce

2 Tbsp butter ³/₄ cup brown sugar ³⁄₄ cup water

Apple Dumplings

4 medium-sized baking apples, peeled and cored

1/2 cup sugar

1 Tbsp cinnamon Pastry dough

Egg wash (1 egg whisked with 1 tsp of water)

Butter

INSTRUCTIONS

Brown Sugar Sauce

In a pot over medium-low heat, combine the ingredients for the brown sugar sauce. Bring to a boil and let simmer for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside.

Apple Dumplings

Preheat the oven to 375°F.

Combine sugar and cinnamon in a bowl.

Roll out pastry dough and divide into four equal squares. Place an apple in the middle of each square. Place one spoonful of cinnamon sugar into the middle of each apple and top with a dollop of butter. Fold the dough around each apple, matching all corners and seal the sides with egg wash as needed.

Place the dumplings in a baking dish and pour the brown sugar sauce on top of the dumplings. Bake for 35-45 minutes, or until the apples are tender. This will vary with the variety and size of the apples you choose.

TIP: If the tops start to brown but the apples are not cooked through, place a piece of aluminium foil or parchment paper on top of the dumplings.

Serve each dumpling with a scoop of vanilla ice cream. OH













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
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
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
