Seeking

Designer Tamarisk McNalty Stephens shares her ideas.

THE ARRIVAL OF SUMMER IN ONTARIO BRINGS A COLLECTIVE DESIRE TO EXTEND OUR LIVING QUARTERS OUTDOORS. AFTER MONTHS OF COLD, SNOWY AND GREY WEATHER, WE DON'T WANT TO START COMPLAINING ABOUT THE HEAT! HERE ARE SOME SOLUTIONS — AT VARIOUS PRICE POINTS AND LEVELS OF PERMANENCY - THAT OFFER A REPRIEVE FROM THE HOT SUMMER SUN SO YOU CAN BE MORE COMFORTABLE ENJOYING LIFE OUTDOORS.

Hats

A good old-fashioned, wide-brimmed hat will provide instant shade from the sun. Choose an option that is lightweight and breathable (such as cotton or straw). A four-inch brim generally provides the protection you need on your face, ears and neck.

Umbrellas

An umbrella is an economical solution that can provide shelter from the glaring summer sun – and it can be moved to where you need it around your property. Umbrellas can tilt as the sun shifts during the day and raised or lowered depending upon the strength/heat of the sun. You need a sturdy base and remember to take it down during high winds! Choose high-quality fabrics that are colourfast and provide UV protection.

Shade Sails

Shade sails offer protection from the sun (and light rain/drizzle) and are more affordable than a more permanent roofed structure. However, you need to ensure appropriate supports as shade sails are aptly named and can catch the wind. Available in a wide array of colours and different shapes, they are a great way to provide UV protection for children's play spaces in open areas.



Retractable Awnings

Retractable awnings can be secured to your home or building. The benefits are that you retract an awning when you want the sun (perhaps spring and fall or early morning/evening in the summer) and extend it during the hottest times of the day when protection from the sun is most desirable.







Pergolas

Pergolas are identifiable structures with columns that support cross beams and open rafters (no solid roof). Pergolas diffuse the harshness of direct sunlight but do not protect from rain. They allow the breeze to circulate freely. They can be freestanding or attached to your home and can be designed to be contemporary or traditional, depending upon your design aesthetic. Pergolas can also offer a structure to support climbing vines and blooms, providing visual interest and additional shade. Consult a landscape professional when considering which plants will thrive in your zone (as well as the soil, exposure to wind and sun, drainage, maintenance, the possibility of invasiveness, etc.). There are also retractable canopies and canvas shades that can be incorporated into pergola designs.

Gazebos

Gazebos are roofed structures often constructed in a hexagonal or octagonal shape and open on all sides (although sometimes screened in) and traditionally have a railing between the posts. They often act as ornamental structures to complement gardens, courtyards, parks, etc. They can enhance the aesthetic value of your property.

Covered Porch

Attached to a dwelling or building, a covered porch is a permanent structure that offers protection from the sun and rain. As a porch generally has a wood or concrete floor, it is easy to clean and provides a



sturdy base for outdoor furniture. A covered porch is also a natural extension of your home in the warmer months while being accessible to the amenities, such as the kitchen and bathroom, when entertaining. Although a larger investment than some other options, you will probably recuperate the cost as a covered porch is a desirable feature for prospective homebuyers as it adds a particular charm and can increase curb appeal. OH

Fill a wine glass with ice.

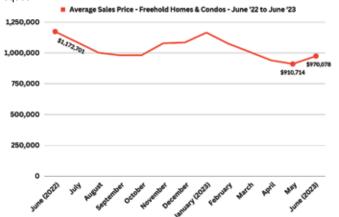
Mix together rose simple syrup (adjust sweetness to taste), elderflower liquor and rosé wine.

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REAL ESTATE MARKET SNAPSHOT - Q2 2023 IN REVIEW

In the interest of brevity, our focus for this report will be the three key trading areas and home types with which we have the most expertise: sales of residential condominiums and detached homes in The Blue Mountains. Collingwood and Clearview. We also serve Wasaga Beach and Meaford and would be pleased to provide an analysis for those areas for you upon



At the end of Q1 2023, we had about 5 months of inventory (at the current pace of sales, how long to sell out all listings) and in both April & May, that dropped to 4 months but, with inventory increases, reverted back to 5 months in June. The difference between the two quarters is an average of listings selling at 3% under their asking price, an improvement from the 4% under ask of Q1 and probably a result of Sellers lowering their asking prices, a 30% decrease in average days on market (DOM), a 69% increase in the number of property sales, and a 7% increase in average sale price. So, while far below the number of buyers for our area in 2021-22, some buyers did return in Q2 and increased the median sale value from \$743,000 to \$811,250, and the only category to continue at a loss is detached homes in The Blue Mountains.

HIGHS, LOWS & SPECIFICS (brackets show Q1 2023 values)

COLLINGWOOD:

Many more sales than Q1, a faster sales cycle, detached home & condo values both up.

- The high sale was a 3,300 SF Shipyards waterfront townhome for \$2,700,000.
- The low sale was a 407 SF studio apartment-condo near The Legion for \$265,000.

- 60 (23) condo sales; avg of 49 (50) DOM; avg sale-to-list price ratio of 96.4% (96.9%); avg sale price of \$766,287 (\$735,187), up 4%
- 94 (56) single-family home sales; avg DOM of 24 (48); avg sale-to-list price ratio of 97.2% (95.1%); avg sale price of \$942,818 (\$847,130), up 11%.

THE BLUE MOUNTAINS:

A few more sales than Q1, slightly faster sale times, condo values way up, detached home values way down.

- The high sale was a 5,500 SF 7-year-old custom home in Lora Bay for \$2,925,000.
- The low sale was a 467 SF studio hotel-condo in Seasons at Blue for
- 40 (31) condo sales; avg of 40 (50) DOM; avg sale-to-list price ratio of 98.1% (95.3%); avg sale price of \$722,990 (\$518,161), up 39%.
- 43 (31) single-family home sales; avg DOM of 40 (51); avg sale-to-list price ratio of 96.1% (95.2%); avg sale price of \$1,338,163 (\$1,725,419), down 22%.

CLEARVIEW:

Many more sales than Q1, faster sale time, home values up.

- The high sale was a new home over 8,800 SF on 12+ acres just east of Nottawa for \$5,250,000.
- The low sale was a small 2 bed, 1 bath bungalow in Stayner for \$350,000.
- 61 (27) single-family home sales; avg of 36 (45) DOM; avg sale-to-list price ratio of 98% (98.5%); avg sale price of \$970,098 (\$906,596), up 7%.

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These are a few plants I like to use in gardens. Some are native and some are not, but all are growing in zones 5 and lower. They are low maintenance, drought tolerant and will resist some of the diseases common with overused plants. Some are good pollinators as well.



Instead of prickly horizontal junipers, try soft-needled Microbiota decussata or Siberian Carpet Cypress. Grows 30 cm tall and 175 cm wide. This evergreen can be grown in dry shade or full sun. The operative word here is dry. A bonus is that their foliage turns a copper penny colour in the late fall and winter.



Hypericum kalmianum or Pot O' Gold St. John's Wort can work very well instead of lower growing Spireas. This St. John's Wort has four seasons of interest starting with profuse golden yellow flowers on a two-foot-high shrub with bluish green narrow leaves. Persistent brown seed capsules and exfoliating bark add winter interest.

Seven-Son Flower is a large (four-by-two-metre) uncommon shrub with white blooms later in the season. The highlight of this shrub is the pink to red calyxes left on after the flowers fade. The exfoliating bark is great for winter interest. Use this plant when you need a focal point in your garden.



Amelanchier canadensis or Serviceberry is a well-used native in our landscapes for its beautiful white flowers, edible fruit and great red fall colour. I would use this native large shrub/small tree as a replacement for Burning Bushes (Euonymus alatus) which is now considered an alien invasive as it is a prolific self-seeder. 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Caryopteris x clandonensis or Bluebeard could be used as an alternative to Lavender in the garden when you still want purple flowers, but later in the season. Caryopteris is drought tolerant, a great pollinator and has fragrant foliage. Grows 80-by-80 centimetres.



Clethra alnifolia or Summersweet is a summer fragrant flowering shrub with white or pink bottlebrush type flowers, ranging in height from 100-to-200 centimetres. It attracts the pollinators, too.



Geranium macrorrhizum or **Bigroot Geranium** and **Asarum** canadense or Wild Ginger are great ground covers for full-shade areas in the garden. Periwinkle is considered an aggressive alien and should not be planted anymore. Geranium has pink or white flowers with fragrant foliage. Wild Ginger has interesting flowers half hidden under the leaves.



TIRED OF CEDARS? HERE ARE A COUPLE OF EXCELLENT ALTERNATIVES:

Picea abies 'Cupressina' or Columnar Norway Spruce is a great choice when space is limited. It grows to eight-metres tall and 200-centimetres wide and has dense branching to the ground with dark green, stiff, short needles.

Thuja x 'Green Giant' or Western Cedar (a cross between Thuja plicata and Thuja Standishii). Although this is a cedar, it is not on the menu for deer, which is why I have included it here. It can grow to 13-metres tall and four-metres wide. It can be used for hedges and tolerates trimming too.



By using some of these less common selections, you are supporting sustainable

The next time you are at the nursery, look for these plants. If they don't have them, ask for them. We need more diversity in our gardens and if we ask the garden centres for these not-so-common plants, we create a demand, and they will start bringing them in. on

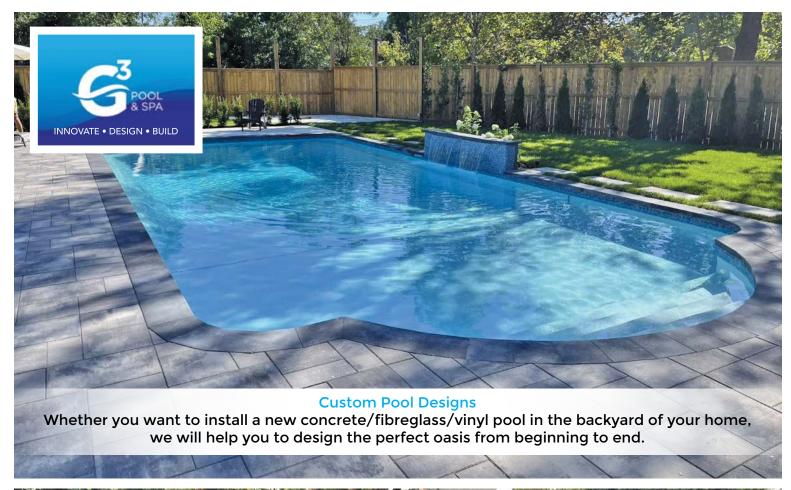

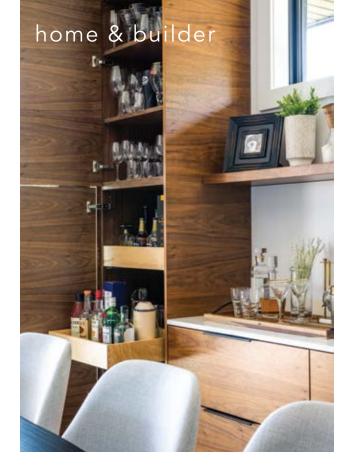
Tim is a second-generation builder with more than 20 years of experience. His company is a family-owned business founded in 1988. He enjoyed collaborating with the Czarniks, residential designer **Greg Williamson** and the decorating team. "Dave and Kira's level of organization quickly became evident, which a builder always appreciates," says Tim. "For example, we ordered all the windows and doors six months before construction even began." This foresight prevented delays during the height of the pandemic.

Tim skillfully incorporated the couple's taste for modern finishes and clean lines. An interior glass railing has a hidden support structure. A dropped front-porch ceiling hides supporting beams. The standing seam steel roof was supplied by **Agway Metals Inc.**, the Timberline shingles were supplied by **Miller Home Building Centre** and the garage door by

Peninsula Overhead Doors. Other unique touches include minimalistic Aria vents in the hardwood and tile flooring, matching drywall vents, custom-routered cold air returns, a built-in sauna in the basement and a herringbone tile floor with a hardwood border in the foyer.

Kira wanted a modern, minimalistic look with clean lines and easy-care furniture and fabrics. She hired decorator **Kiera Spielmacher** of **House Rules Design Shop** to help execute her vision. "House Rules was so helpful, always there if I had any questions," Kira recalls. The couple have two Portuguese water dogs, Cooper and Cosmo, so furniture and area rugs have to be dog friendly and easy to clean. They also wanted landscaping that was easily maintained. "We don't want a lot of yard work so we have a small lawn, decorative shrubs and a sunken fire pit area that overlooks the golf course," says David.

In the great room, a distinctive Urbana fireplace, from **Chantico Fireplace Gallery**, clad in a Dekko concrete panel surround towers floor-to-ceiling but slightly off centre to create an interesting visual. "It's unique and looks like concrete," says David. "We wanted something different instead of stone." Floating walnut shelves hold family pictures and decorative accents while linear built-ins flank the fireplace. Three huge Lepage Lift and Slide patio doors, supplied by Cedarport Window & Door Centre Inc., filter natural light throughout the open-concept main level. White oak hardwood flooring provides an attractive contrast to the neutral colour palette.

David and Kira wanted a modern, spacious kitchen where family and friends could visit comfortably around the island. "Everyone gathers here so I wanted plenty of room to move around," she says.

A built-in convection and steam oven, an induction cooktop, glossy HanStone quartz countertops, under-counter lighting and a pantry to store extras ensure functionality with a minimalist look.

Although Kira envisioned the dining area as part of the kitchen, she wanted it to maintain a distinctive identity. Contrasting black and walnut cabinetry and an area rug create a striking definition between the two spaces. Continued on page 56

Kira's favourite room is the primary bedroom, a masterpiece of simplicity and comfort. A three-sided Urbana gas fireplace, installed by Chantico Fireplace Gallery, warms an inviting sitting area. Two armchairs nestle near the fireplace on a grey area rug from Stevens Omni. Large patio doors flood the room with natural light and a pastoral view of the golf course.

The en suite exudes a spa-like ambience. A spacious walk-in shower features ceramic accent tile that resembles wood. Airy Concrete Caesarstone quartz counters are beautifully offset by sleek dark vanities supplied by **Exquisite Wood Designs.** "Exquisite did a really great job but all the trades were fantastic," says David. Contemporary pendant lighting from Kuzco Lighting softly illuminates a luxurious soaker tub. An adjoining walk-in closet provides plenty of storage and eliminates the need for dressers and shelves.

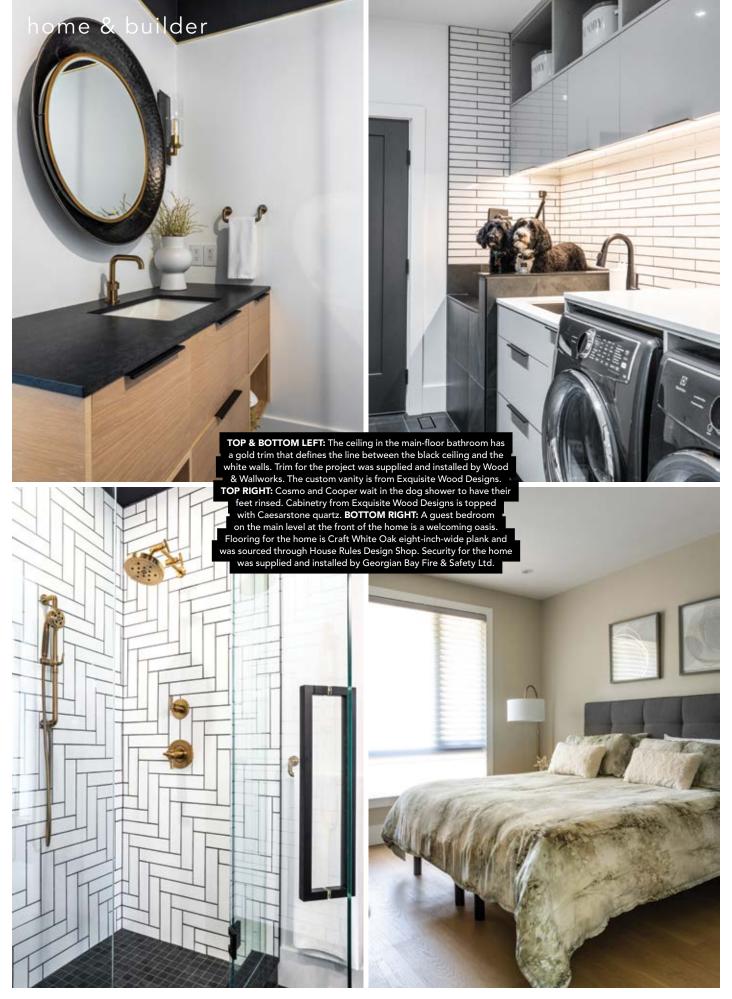

You probably spend more time in your laundry room than you'd like. What if you actually wanted to spend time there? A space that's well-equipped and aesthetically pleasing can make laundry feel less like a chore. Finding that balance can be challenging, especially when considering a household's diverse needs. These are the top five laundry room essentials.

Location, Location, Location!

Laundry rooms were historically unsightly, utilitarian rooms, usually tucked away deep in the basement where the machines could whirr, hum and buzz all day or night. This placement had its practical purpose, shielding living areas from noise and potential water leaks. But thanks to advances in machine technology and aesthetic design, many modern homes are now putting the laundry room in more convenient locations, near upper-level bedrooms, or adjacent to the kitchen or entryway mudrooms.



Storage Space

Smart storage is essential to an effective, efficient laundry room design. Customizing under-counter cabinets and uppers are a great option to maximize every inch of space. And while having everything behind closed doors leaves the space neat and tidy, it lacks visual interest. Consider incorporating a combination of open and closed shelving, which allows you to have a few frequently used items on hand and some decorative pieces on display. Ultimately, your storage system should match your needs and personality. If you're naturally messy, closed storage may be better suited to you. If you are neat and highly visual, you may benefit more from open shelving.

FUNCTIONAL ESSENTIALS: Bonus elements within the cabinetry design include an ironing board, a shelf for storing baskets and everyday cleaning products, and rods mounted high enough to hang shirts and longer items like dresses. Don't forget to factor electrical outlets and adequate lighting into your design plan.

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Counter Space

As a designer, I love a long spacious countertop like the butcher block countertop we used in this design pictured below. As a doer of laundry, I can also attest that ample counter space is great for folding, ironing and organizing, too.

SPACE-SAVERS: If your laundry room is tight, there are many alternatives to a traditional countertop that can do the trick. Fold-down counters or tables on casters can create more space and can be moved in and out of the way when not in use. A retracting shelf or rack is another great addition to compact spaces. Installed beside the washer and dryer, or tucked between a stacked washer/dryer unit, this pull-out surface is a convenient and unobtrusive place to rest your laundry basket as you load and unload your machines.









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While still available on the market, the oversize utility sink has gone by the wayside, making way for more modern options in various materials that match durability with style. For example, look for under-counter mounted sinks in stainless steel or acrylic porcelain or other hardwearing materials that are made to last. Regardless of the specifics, make sure the sink is large and deep enough to handwash your delicates, soak your dirty shoes or give Fido a good scrub.



Some Style!

A laundry room is a great place to try out the latest design trends you've been coveting. Since this is typically a smaller room that isn't open to the living areas, it's a great place to be bold and introduce some colour. Try a patterned wallpaper or tile, or test out a trending hardware style, such as matte black or one of the brightly texturized, coloured hardware options.

Ultimately, it's important to take stock of what you're trying to achieve in your laundry room and ensure that you have a solution to simplify each task. And don't forget to have a little fun with it. Separating the whites from the darks is boring enough without a dull beige wall staring at you! он

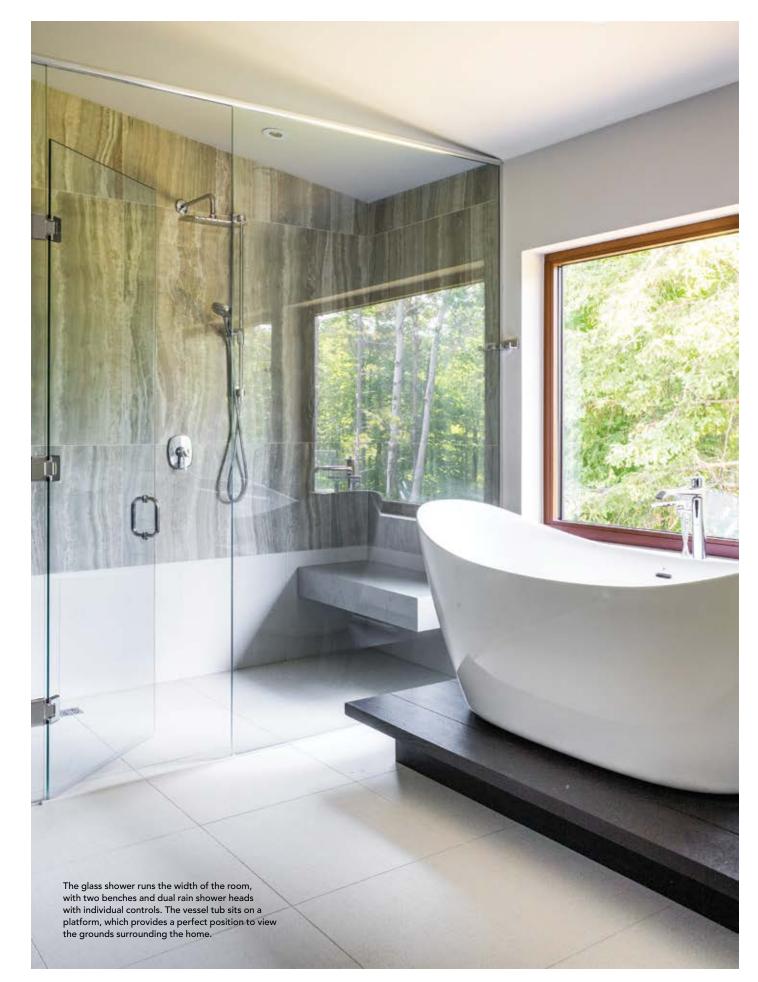

STRATEGIES FOR First-Time HOME BUYERS

"Will Lever own a home?" These days, more than ever, this is a question that keeps many Canadians up at night. For would-be home buyers weary of pounding the pavement, and for young people (and concerned parents) looking ahead, Canada's housing market is daunting.

THE LAST FEW YEARS, fuelled by inflation, interest rate hikes and lack of supply, an affordability crisis extends well beyond hotspots like Toronto and Vancouver.

Is there any recourse? We looked at some government initiatives

and contacted Gary Taitt, a broker with RE/MAX Hallmark Realty Ltd. in Toronto. While there's no magic solution, creative longerterm strategies can be very helpful for many first-time buyers. Here's a closer look: Continued on page 84

DOWN PAYMENT REALITIES

Understanding Canada Mortgage & Housing Corporation requirements is a crucial first step. (Hint: you may need more of a down payment than you think.) Talking with a lender can help buyers get clear on how much they need to save.

For example, the Financial Consumer Agency of Canada states, "If your down payment is less than 20 per cent of the price of your home, you must buy mortgage loan insurance." At the same time, "Mortgage loan insurance isn't available if the purchase price of the home is one million dollars or more." It means many first-time buyers are constrained to stick under that million-dollar price.

Gary says due to lofty requirements, even dual-income buyers with healthy salaries can struggle with a "down payment problem."

GOVERNMENT INITIATIVES

As for financial assistance, Gary says, "The government's come up with new incentives to help first-time buyers."

This April, among several initiatives, Canada introduced a First-Time Home Buyers' Tax Credit (HBTC), plus a registered First Home Savings Account (FHSA). The FHSA allows first-timers to save up to \$40,000 tax-free towards down payments - and unlike RRSP Home Buyers' Plans, funds don't have to be repaid.

Provincially, Ontario first-time home buyers may qualify for a land transfer tax rebate.

FAMILY HELP

Where possible, asking for family help is an increasingly common strategy for younger buyers. According to a recent CIBC report, almost one-third of first-time buyers get financial help from family for down payments.

On the ground, Gary says, "I see that way more now, where people get money from the bank of mom and dad."

CREATIVE STRATEGIES

Finally, by necessity, today's first-time buyers can apply other can-do strategies:

Smaller centres – Choosing to buy outside of Canada's priciest centres can boost affordability. As Gary says, "If you're living in Toronto, it may seem daunting, but if you're living in Calgary or Ottawa, you just need a really good plan."

Fixer uppers - While many buyers gravitate towards magazine-perfect "showpiece" homes, Gary says the "junky houses, the fixer uppers" are where buyers can find lower prices and add value.

Condos - In this niche, Gary says, "Now it's kind of flipped where buying a new condo costs more." Currently Gary sees more resale condos available and says for first-timers, these can be more affordable and easier to upgrade. "They only really have to do flooring, kitchen and bathroom."



Co-ownership – Slowly gaining traction in Canada, Gary feels this strategy works for some, citing three buyers he worked with who bought a large house together in Toronto. "They held it for four years and by the end of it, they sold and each made enough for their down payments and moved on to their own houses."

Finding tenants - Becoming a landlord during the early stages is another route Gary is seeing. "I would live in a basement and rent out the upstairs until my principal came down."

MINDSET

In Canada, Gary has seen affordability concerns rising for 10 years or so. "I started hearing it when my kids were around eight or nine. 'Oh, they'll never be able to afford a house' and parents say these words."

Challenges aside though, Gary believes in a solutions mindset, and in the lasting value of home ownership. "Real estate values double every 10 years, give or take," he says, and encourages buyers to have a vision not just of today's challenges but of where they could be five or 10 years down the road. OH

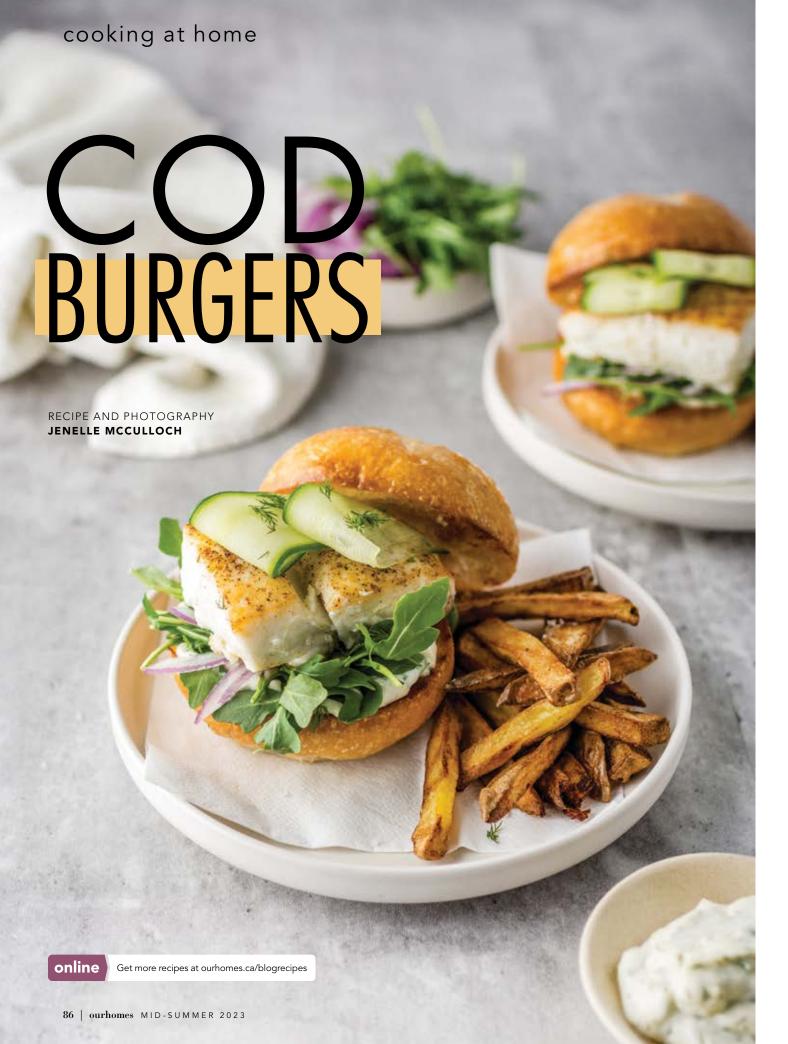

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BIRDS BEHAVING CUTELY

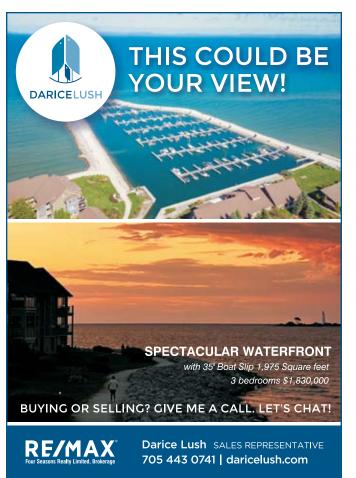
Bird behaviour has always been a favourite part of birdwatching for me. Courtship displays, foraging techniques, a territory being vigorously defended by a feisty wee ball of feathers, and a wide range of other avian action adds interest to your observations and provides insight into the secret life of birds.

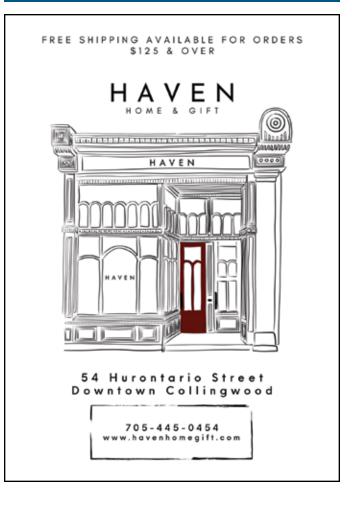
Behaviour watching can also provide some of the most rewarding sightings and photo ops. Picture this: A mother duck swims into view. Following close behind are a string of downy ducklings. Your interest level rises; baby birds are always appealing. Click, click, you get a picture with your camera – or in your mind's eye. You're about to carry on with your birding day when you notice the row of ducklings is shorter. Where did the others go? Then you see them. A few have scrambled up onto the mother's back! The cuteness scale just shot up! Witnessing a moment such as this is one of the highlights of the summer nesting season.

ALTRICIAL OR PRECOCIAL

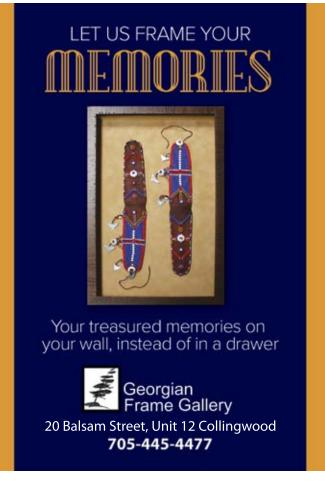
Summertime is a busy time for birds. Songbirds have nests full of baby birds that hatch out featherless, helpless and completely incapable of surviving on their own. These nestlings are classified as altricial young, meaning they require much feeding and nurturing to maturity. They are also, let's face it, not cute, with their naked featherless bodies, their big bulging eyes and their oversize gapey beaks.

But not all young birds hatch out that way. Some species crack out of the egg ready to hit the ground running, or swimming. They are the epitome of cuteness with their fluffy feathers and the way they can motor about and feed themselves. These species include the waterfowl family, which are in the precocial class of birds. Precocial comes from the Latin word for precocious and is an apt term for a chick who can swim circles around its parents and practically fend for itself from day one. However independent, these wee birds still require some level of parental protection and guidance to learn strategies for staying warm and conserving their limited energy supplies as they make their way in their big watery world. PIGGYBACK RIDES

The poster bird for cottage country, and everyone's favourite, the Common Loon, is beloved for its iconic wails, vodels and tremolo calls throughout the summer. But equally endearing is its habit of carrying the young on their backs for the first few weeks of their little lives. The young loonlets instinctively know they will be safe and warm when up on their piggyback perch. Adult loons are strong, fast paddlers; baby loons not so much yet, so they climb up and snuggle down when they tire or when they catch a chill from paddling about in the cold waters of their natal lake.



PREDATOR PROOF

Another bonus of catching a ride is the protection it provides from underwater predators. Adult birds can move their young away from danger very quickly by carrying them on their backs. A loonlet's little legs just can't paddle fast enough. And by remaining in the water, the chicks' feet are dangling down rather enticingly in front of a lurking fish, snapping turtle or even a mink. Better to jump on the fast-moving mama's back and get outta there in a hurry!





GETTING YOUR DUCK(LINGS) IN A ROW

Hitching a ride isn't the only energy-saving strategy in the baby duck repertoire. They soon learn that swimming all in a row behind their mama is easier than swimming in a bunch behind her. There's physics at work here. The V-shaped wake the mother duck makes as she swims along forms a tiny wave the ducklings can surf down the sides and into the trough below. This wave energy gives them a wee push forward and the ability to keep up with their fast-moving mother. Each duckling down the line seems to know where to precisely position itself to get the benefit of the next ripple in the wake. That's why the ducklings are so evenly spaced out in their row and this perfect symmetry makes for such an appealing scene.



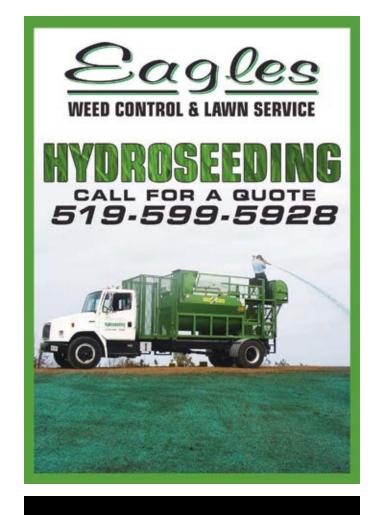
Even fully-feathered precocial baby birds aren't totally able to regulate their body temperature at first. For the first few days after hatching from their warmly incubated egg, the chicks of some species will simply scramble onto the patient parent's back and snuggle down into its thicker, warmer feathers. They'll even do this on the nest, perhaps getting ready for the parent's launch into the lake. This back-brooding is common with the Pied-billed Grebe and again provides such appeal to birders' eyes and camera lenses alike.

BIG BIRD

Nature is full of surprises. It turns out piggyback rides are not limited to just the waterfowl family. The Sandhill Crane is a big bird; more than one-metre tall, with long legs that raise it over the tall vegetation of its marsh-and-meadow habitat. Their young on the other hand - known as colts - are but centimetres tall at hatching and somewhat unequipped to keep up with their longlegged parents. The short wee colt (so named because of its ability to run around right after hatching like a young member of the horse family) is not averse to taking it easy when it can. So why not hitch a ride and get a bird's-eye view of its domain.



As a bird behaviour buff, I highly recommend an early morning paddle or stroll along the beach, camera or binoculars at the ready, for a chance glimpse into the life of a baby loon, grebe, or merganser, or any other gift nature may present you with. It's time well spent. on

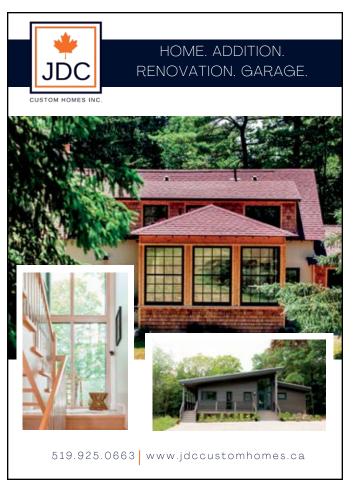

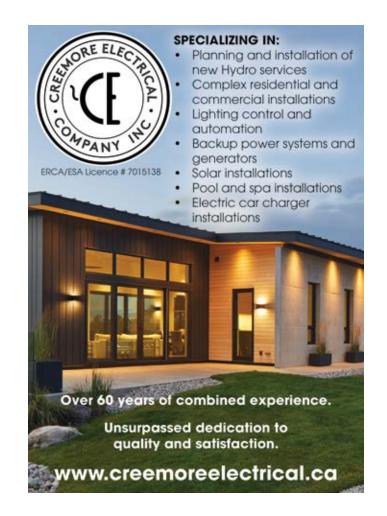

For other millennials, activities outside the house are a more meaningful pathway to sustainability.

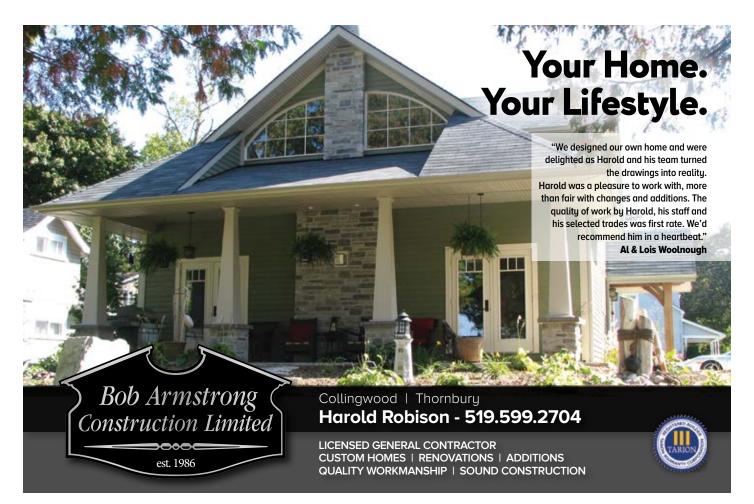
"I group my errands together so I can drive less," says Meadow

Does the prospect of switching to a green lifestyle sound complicated? You might be shocked to discover how simple sustainability can be.

Anna Culver, now 34, was in her late 20s and in between jobs when she started to seriously prioritize green living. Anna refills her soap, lotion and household products at zero-waste stores like Keep Refillery (locations in Toronto, Kingston, Creemore and Meaford). Reducing the clutter and waste of disposable products is not only good for the planet but it "greatly simplifies my life," she says.

The pessimists among you may be thinking, 'Sure, these changes are nice to read about but they won't actually change anything.' But millennials have actually hit upon a powerful insight.

Green living is not about changing the

world, it's about changing yourself.

Yes, we need systemic change. Yes, we must advocate for better policies and invest in climate-friendly infrastructure. But, what do we do in the interim?

Millennials do not have David Suzuki's hope, nor do they have Greta Thunberg's rage. However, this generation is doing something far more radical than hoping or raging: they're taking action.

"I know that my little contribution isn't the same as large-scale, systemic change," says Natalie, "but it helps me psychologically to have some agency so I don't feel hopeless."

Quietly and conscientiously, millennials are driving the green revolution by aligning their personal habits with sustainable lifestyle choices. Millennials are showing us that we can live like there's hope for the future.

Identify one area of your life that creates a lot of mental anxiety for you around climate change. Example: "I feel incredibly guilty about takeout containers. I just don't have the time to wash them or cook a meal at home right now."

Figure out how your current habit is meeting some of your nonsustainability values. Example: "I love being able to spend more time with my kids instead of cooking or cleaning. I want to feed my family a balanced meal even if I'm really busy."

Brainstorm creative ways you could live your other values while making a slight improvement on sustainability. Example: Set up a meal swap with a friend. Sign up for a meal kit subscription and cook as a family. Pay your kid to wash the takeout containers. Research local restaurants to find out who offers sustainable packaging.

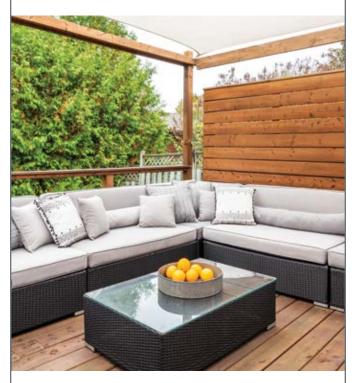
Commit to one small change that balances your personal values with environmental impact. Example: "I value convenience and time with my family, so takeout is still the right option for me right now. But because I value sustainability, I will make a list and try to only order from local restaurants that use compostable and recyclable packaging for takeout containers."

Nurture your new green living habit until you start to notice a difference in your mental health.

Repeat again, aligning another area of climate anxiety with your values by changing a small personal habit. он

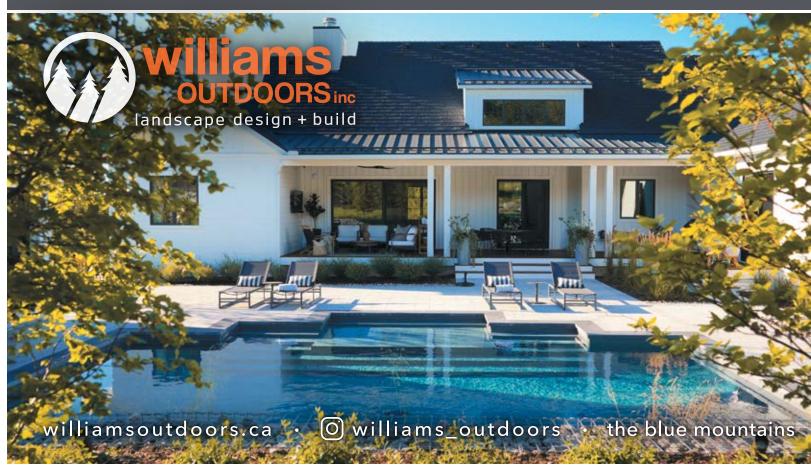
If you want to start eating a plant-based diet, as a plant-based Registered Dietitian, I recommend stocking these 10 pantry and fridge staples.

BEANS & LEGUMES

Think black beans, brown or red lentils, cannellini beans, chickpeas and kidney beans. A great source of protein and fibre.

HEMP HEARTS

Hulled hemp seeds have a mild, nutty flavour and can be added to anything from salads to oatmeal to boost the protein content.



NUTS & SEEDS

Common staples in most
pantries, however, their uses
are more versatile in plantbased cooking. After soaking,
they can be blended to add
creaminess and texture to
dressings and sauces, while
boosting the protein and
healthy fat content.



TVP (TEXTURED VEGETABLE PROTEIN)

A soy-based meat alternative. Great for replacing meat in chilis, tacos or pasta sauce.



CHIA SEEDS

Available whole or ground and a great source of fibre and Omega 3 fatty acids. Can be used to make a "chia seed egg" to replace eggs in baking. Once opened, store in the fridge.



FLAXSEED

High in fibre and Omega 3s, it can be added to almost anything. Choose milled/ground flaxseed, as it's more versatile and nutritious than whole flaxseed. Commonly used to make a "flax egg," which can also replace eggs in baked goods.





NUTRITIONAL YEAST

Lovingly referred to as "nooch"
by plant-based eaters, it's an
inactive form of yeast with a
cheesy flavour profile, and
packs a nutrient punch. High in
protein and B vitamins, sprinkle
it on pasta or make a vegan mac
and "cheese" sauce. Store in a cool
dark place or in your fridge.



VEGETABLE BROTH

Easily replaces animal-based broths, and is used the same way. If you open a container and don't use it all, freeze in ice cube trays for later use.

You can get most of these items at Bulk Barn, Costco or your local grocery store. No need for specialty stores.

A pantry takes time to stock, don't feel like you have to buy everything at once. Grab a few items every time you shop, and you'll have a well stocked plant-based pantry in no time. **OH**

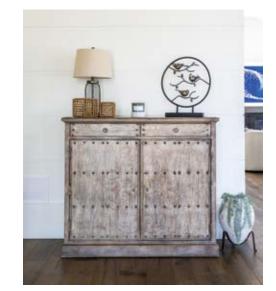
"We were squeezing each other's hand going through the entire house. We just loved it," says Rose.

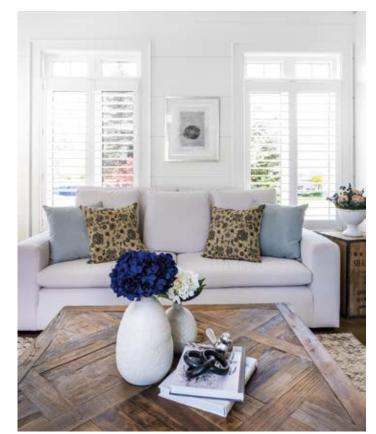

Coastal, minimal, Mid-century modern, farmhouse, Bohemian – these are just a few design styles popular today. Type any one of these in a search engine and multiple photos pop up displaying rooms for each look.

But what is a "design aesthetic?" Isn't it the same as picking a style? In today's world, it seems like they should be interchangeable terms and "design aesthetic" is simply another way to describe your style, right? In fact, a design aesthetic is a more in-depth understanding of a style. It relates to all elements included in the lifestyle represented by that style, not just the things we see in beautiful photos, like pillows or furniture. It digs deeper than the surface elements. To simplify, a design aesthetic includes not only the décor elements but also how you interact and behave in your space.

LOOK AT YOUR SPACE

Do you like open spaces, high ceilings and light walls, avoiding the feeling of being closed in? If the answer is yes, look for design aesthetics that incorporate this feel, such as modern, Mid-century modern, farmhouse modern or architectural. These principles offer simple examples of how to reverse engineer the style question to become "what are things that make me happy and that I want to experience every day in my space?" Once you know this answer, look at photos to see where your preferences fit within the millions of images of spaces available today.

Upon choosing a design aesthetic that captures how you want to live and feel, start building your style from there. And, of course, make it your own. All of these aesthetics can mesh into your own style, which is entirely the point! OH

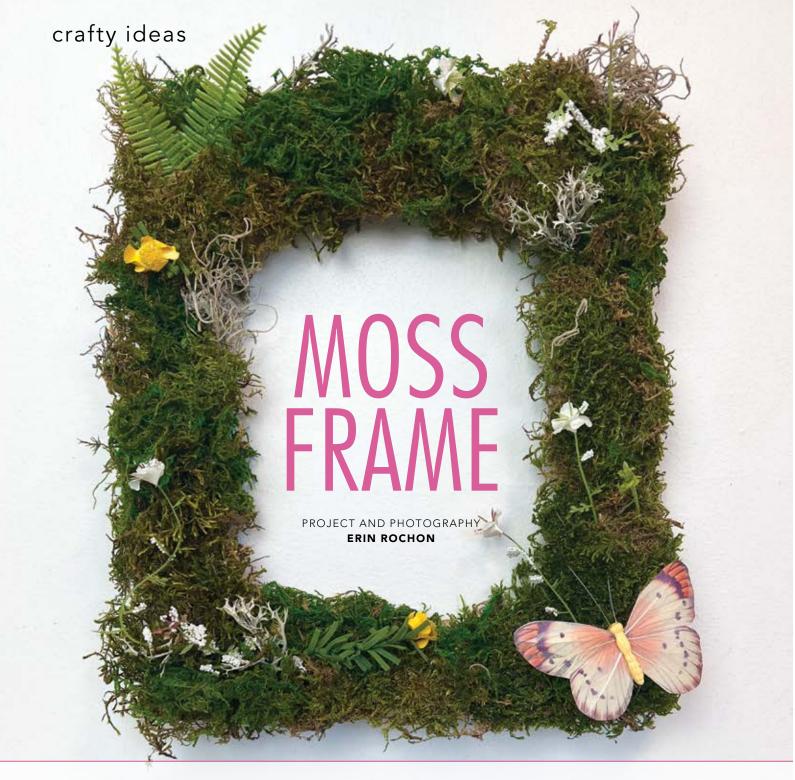

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How to Create a FEATURE WALL

Feature walls come in all shapes and sizes and they all serve a very important purpose – to create a focal point, attract attention and deliver that essential wow factor that no room is complete without.

FEATURED FUNCTIONS

The purpose of a feature wall is to catch your eye. Will your feature wall be the focus, or will you use it as a way to highlight another focal point in the room?

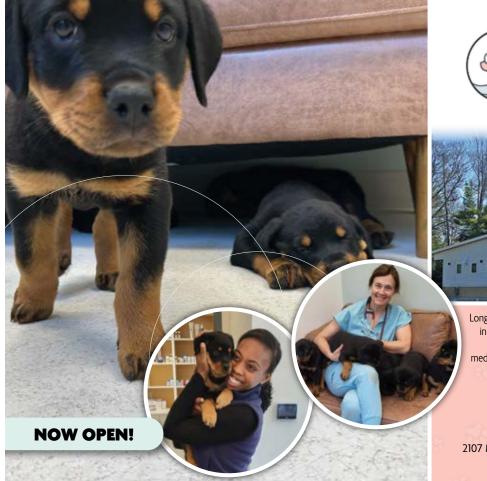
A feature wall is a great way to invite attention to existing elements, such as a unique architectural feature or as a dramatic backdrop to a sophisticated fireplace, a fabulous staircase, a powder-room vanity or a prized piece of furniture. You can see how a bold colour or wallpaper selection can complement and underscore the high points throughout the home.

In the absence of an existing focal point, a feature wall can serve as the highlight every room needs. It is an eye-catching yet costeffective way to make a visual impact.

When choosing your feature wall, consider your view when you enter a room, or in the case of an open-concept area, the view from various points in the space. Which wall is your eye naturally drawn to? What's the first thing you see when you walk in? That's likely to be your target area. Avoid walls with windows and doorways, which can diminish the artistic integrity of the wall itself. Plus, a large blank wall is practically begging for some flair.

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MATERIAL MATTERS

A little paint can go a long way. When choosing a colour for your feature wall, create contrast. If the room is light and neutral, consider a vibrant or dark colour. If colour graces your walls, look opposite the colour wheel for some options that pop.

This opposite approach works for materials, too. Think glossy meets matte, rustic meets refined, classic meets minimalist - you get the idea. Create an element of surprise with unexpected additions such as metal inlays, upholstered wall panels, eccentric wallpapers and unusual tile patterns. From sleek to rustic, wood is another neutral material for an accent wall that is high impact and goes with everything.







TRENDING: Use three-dimensional tiles and marble slabs to create a feature wall that elevates a space by adding texture, colour and movement. There are some truly stunning paintable 3D tiles on the market, which use shadow and light to create an ever-changing effect - from subtle to dramatic, depending on the time of day.



THE OPEN-CONCEPT CONUNDRUM

Open-concept homes have risen in popularity in recent decades, but their proliferation has also brought to light some distinct design challenges. One of these is defining various functional areas within these vast, wall-less floor plans. Adding a feature wall is an effective way to visually differentiate a specific area without closing it off or straying from the overall style of the space. Adding a feature wall behind the dining table creates just enough drama - especially if you've taken my advice to leverage contrast! Similarly, a feature wall can also be applied in a front entrance area, in the office or reading nook and in the kitchen, to help visually separate these distinct areas from the others. If you're planning to create multiple feature walls, don't finish them with the same treatment. Remember, the goal is to make them stand out. Just be sure to give each one enough breathing room, so they don't clash or compete for your attention.



Perhaps the best part about adding a feature wall is that sometimes it can be relatively easy to do and requires no structural changes. All it takes is some design creativity and a little bravery on the homeowner's part. But trust me, it'll truly transform and make for stylish and impactful interior spaces. OH

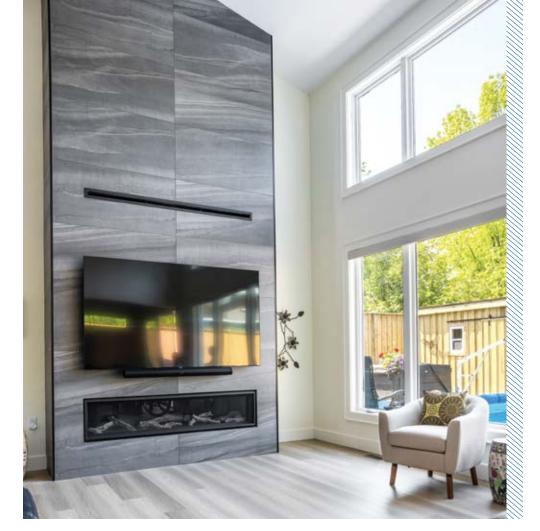

Their connection to the area began as cottagers, but they became full-time residents 20 years ago. "We lived on the water, about two kilometres south of town for a good number of years," says Bruce. "We absolutely loved our time there, but it was a constant battle with mother nature, from rebuilding sea walls to tending to all the other ongoing maintenance that waterfront living required. We decided it was either renovate, rebuild or move on."

They chose to move on.

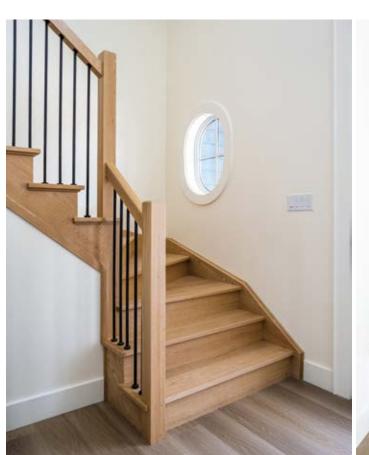
Bruce and Joan determined they wanted to live in the heart of downtown Thornbury, close to restaurants, shops and all amenities. "Thornbury remains a quaint and inviting town and we wanted to take advantage of it," says Bruce. They contacted realtor **Karen** Willison of Royal Lepage Locations North and offered her the mandate. "We gave her a five-block radius and Karen actually went out and knocked on doors to find us just the right location," Bruce says. "To our delight, she found it." They made an offer, purchased the property and then leased the home back to the existing owners for a year or so, which gave Bruce and Joan time to finalize their plans for the property and get organized.

Bruce uses a wheelchair, the result of a spinal cord injury suffered while body surfing in Barbados 30 years ago. They had specific requirements for the design and construction of their new home and needed to find the right contractor.

Enter Mark Brown of A.M Contracting. Mark was easy going, respected their design ideas and was able to accommodate mobility and access requirements. "I just loved his can-do attitude," says Bruce. "Whatever was required, he was willing to find the solution."

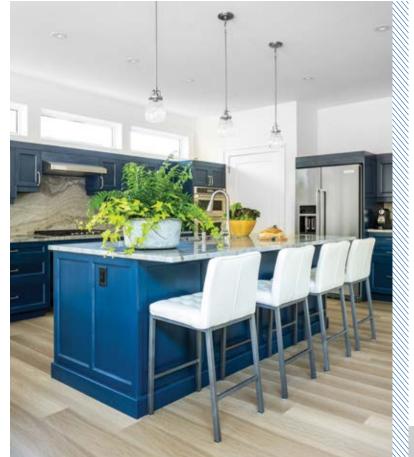












Mark says it's all about giving his clients what they want and need. "Bruce did his due diligence regarding specifications in every respect, including wheelchair access and any modifications he felt were a must," Mark says. "He knew what he wanted and how he wanted it. He was totally hands-on and it was a great help."

Examples of this are found throughout the home. For starters, the grading of the property is remarkable. It is level from the street to the back of the house, allowing a seamless transition for Bruce's chair, from one end of the property to the other. No ramps or traditional wheelchair access adaptations were necessary. The front door is 42- inches wide and the interior doors are 36-inches, making entry and exit an effortless proposition. In the kitchen, quartz counters from **The Old Barn** are lower than standard by two inches, cupboards by four. There are cutaways under the sink and the range to allow wheelchair access. The bathrooms also have cutaways in the cabinetry to allow the same easy approach. The threshold for the oversize glass panels that lead to the exquisite pool and backyard retreat has been countersunk into the floor to offer yet another obstacle-free transition. *Continued on page 146*



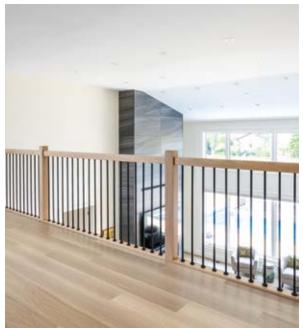

They wanted it to be fully functional for Bruce's purposes, but not aesthetically compromised in any way. The modifications are subtle and visually pleasing. The upper floor is generous and offers three bedrooms to house their son and his family from Toronto and their daughter, who resides in Owen Sound. They planned the home to accommodate their extended family. The home totals about 3,700 square feet and feels relaxed and comfortable.

Bruce and Joan, along with Mark and Jo Redman of Redman Watson Inc., an interior and residential design firm, created a modern take on the American farmhouse. It looks like a classic country home from the outside, replete with Cape Cod siding.

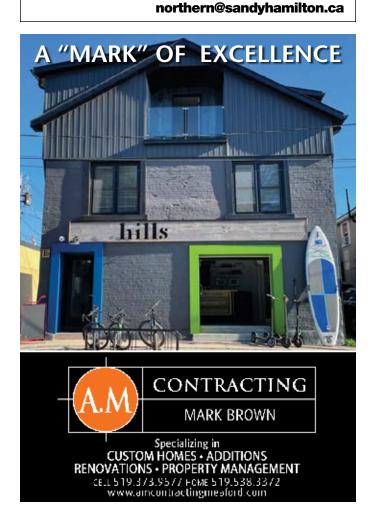
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The interior is modern and open. It expresses clean lines and an airiness created by the many windows, wider dimensions and light-coloured flooring throughout. The fireplace is the focal point of the living space with its two-by-fourfoot porcelain tiles. The rooms are generous, as are the hallways.

Joan, who has a master gardener certification from Dalhousie University, is adding the final touches to the landscape. OH

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Materials

Two 14-inch wood hoops 4-inch wood disk at least ½-inch thick (we used a coaster)

4-inch wood hoop (we used the inside of a small embroidery hoop)

Strong adhesive

72 small screw eyepins, around 10-by-5mm in size

Six screw eyepins 17mm in size Hanging planter chain that includes a hook and connector. Three pieces 6 1/2-inches long. Three pieces 11-inches long. One piece 13 inches, or longer if needed, with a hook at one end and a connector piece at the other (you can cut or piece together sections of chain to obtain the length needed)



Gold spray paint suitable for outdoors Strong fishing line

Wood beads in various sizes (we've used 360 6mm, 360 8mm, 144 10mm, 144 12mm, 144 14mm, 144 16mm and 144 20mm)

Flameless outdoor candle

100/5

Pencil

Tape measure

Small handsaw

Four to six clamps

Small piece of cardstock or paper Drill with bits to match the eyepins (if you don't have a drill bit small enough for the 5mm eyepins you can use a dremel rotary tool)

Bench vise

Pliers

Scissors

How-To

1. Start by cutting a small section from one of your 14-inch hoops, so that it fits inside the other hoop. Apply adhesive around the inside of your larger hoop. Place your cut hoop inside, then clamp the hoops together in multiple spots and allow to dry completely. You will have a thicker, sturdier hoop to work with.

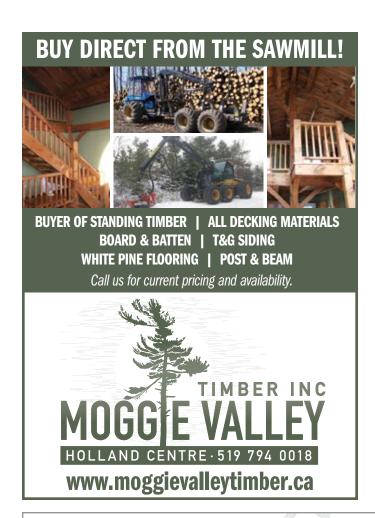


2. Measure the outer circumference of your hoop and divide that number by 36 to determine how far apart each 5mm eyepin will be. Make yourself a small paper template with a few premeasured sections drawn on it. Use the template to make little marks with a pencil on the surface around your hoop where you'll be attaching the eyepins. You should have 36 equally-spaced pencil marks.





3. Drill small pilot holes at all the pencil marks on the hoop and use pliers to screw in 36 5mm eyepins. These will be for hanging one end of the bead strands. Continued on page 152





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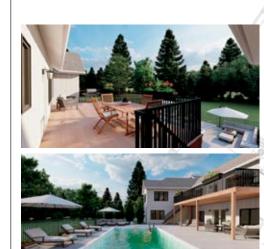
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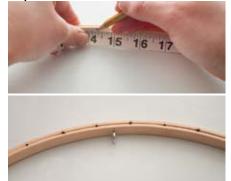
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- 4. Measure the inside circumference of your hoop and divide that number by three. Mark three equally-spaced spots with your pencil on the inside of the hoop. Place the hoop in a bench vise and drill pilot holes for the larger eyepins at each mark. Screw in three 17mm eyepins. These will be used to attach some chain.
- 5. Now you're going to repeat this process with the wood disk (coaster). Measure the outer circumference of the wood disk and divide that number by 36. Make another paper template with a few pre-measured sections drawn on it and use it to make 36 pencil marks around the edge of the bottom flat surface of the wood disk.
- 6. Drill small pilot holes at all the pencil marks on the surface of the wood disk and use pliers to screw in 36 5mm eyepins. These will be for attaching the other end of the bead strands.
- 7. Using the outer circumference of the wood disk again, divide that number by three and make pencil marks at three equally-spaced spots around the outside of the disk. Place the wood disk in a bench vise and drill pilot holes for the larger eyepins at each mark. Screw in three 17mm eyepins. These will be used to attach some chain that will connect this wood disk to the 14-inch wood hoop.







- 8. With the adhesive, glue the small 4-inch wood hoop to the top surface of the wood disk, clamp them and allow to dry completely. This will be the holder for your flameless candle.
- 9. Coat your completed wood pieces, chain, hook and connecter piece with gold spray paint and allow to dry. Once all the pieces are dry you can assemble the frame of your chandelier.
- 10. Hang the longest piece of chain by the hook from something such as a garment rack, shower or curtain rod. This will make it easier to work on your chandelier. Attach the three 11-inch pieces of chain to the connector piece that is at the bottom of your long piece of chain. Using your pliers, attach the other ends of the three 11-inch chains to the larger eyepins on the inside of the wood hoop, making sure that the side with the 36 smaller eyepins is facing down.



- 11. Using your pliers again, attach the three 6 1/2-inch pieces of chain to the three larger eyepins on the inside of the wood hoop. Then, attach the other end of each chain to the three larger eyepins on the outside of the wood disk, making sure that the side with the 36 smaller eyepins is facing down. Your chandelier frame is complete!
- **12.** Now you're ready to start stringing some beads. You'll need 36 strands of beads, approximately 14 ¾ inches in length, with the larger beads starting at one end and gradually transitioning through the varying sizes to the smallest beads on the other end. Each strand consists of four 20mm, four 16mm, four 14mm, four 12mm, four 10mm, 10 8mm and 10 6mm beads.



- 13. To make a beaded strand, cut two pieces of fishing line 25-inches long (we're doubling up on the fishing line to make the strands stronger). Put the two pieces of line together and tie a double knot about five inches from the ends. This will leave enough extra line to tie the strand to the chandelier frame once the beads are on. Working from the open ends, separate your pieces of line and string one piece through one of your largest beads and push it all the way down to your knot. Bring the two pieces of line back together and string the remaining beads over both pieces of line until you reach the second-last bead. Separate the line pieces again and string one piece through the last bead and then bring the line pieces back together and tie tightly with another double knot. Stringing them this way prevents the beads from sliding off the line at the ends. Repeat this process until you have 36 beaded strands.
- 14. Tie a beaded strand, beginning at the end with the larger beads, to one of the small eyepins around the bottom of the large wood hoop. Take the other end of the strand, with the smaller beads, and tie it to a small eyepin on the bottom of the wood disk. Repeat this process until all the beaded strands are attached to the frame.



Hang your chandelier in a covered outdoor space and add your flameless candle to the centre. Grab a cold drink, sit and enjoy your beautiful creation! **OH**







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Ingredients

SERVES 4

3 cups mango juice

2 packets gelatin or 4 Tbsp of agar-agar*

½ cup mango purée**

1 cup coconut water

1-3 Tbsp honey or sweetener of choice

Whipped cream for garnish

*Use agar-agar for a vegan-friendly version of this recipe. Agar-agar does not need to be bloomed and can be added right into the heated juice. Cook for 5-10 minutes.

**Make your own mango purée by blending the fruit of one mango.

Instructions

Bloom the gelatin by placing ½ cup of mango juice in a bowl and sprinkling gelatin on top. Wait five minutes until the gelatin activates.

In a saucepan over medium heat, heat the rest of the mango juice, mango purée, coconut water and honey. Adjust amount of sweetener to taste.

Add bloomed gelatin and whisk until dissolved.

Pour into four serving glasses and let cool in the fridge until firm.

When ready to serve top with a dollop of whipped cream. **OH**

When Irma and Marius Botden moved to The Blue Mountains from the Netherlands in 2001, they visit the family at Irma and Marius's home not far from their orchards.

OUR HOMES: You were orchard owners in the Netherlands. Why did you pick Southern Georgian Bay to continue your orchard journey? Irma Botden: In the Netherlands we were in the apple tree nursery business, growing trees for fruit

growers. Marius's dad was a nursery man as well and I grew up on a dairy farm. Being around nature and caring for it runs deep in our veins. Southern Georgian Bay was our pick because it has a microclimate that is great for growing apples and is the most concentrated area for the apple industry. We were also able to grow our own trees in this area. Besides this, it's absolutely beautiful here and the schools were good and offered plenty of outdoor activities for our children We still have to pinch ourselves that we can do what we love in such a gorgeous area.

OH: What were the major milestones in your business's success?

IB: We started with one block of 100 acres of older trees, which we replaced soon after with new varieties. Since then, we have purchased more land and expanded our varieties. In 2017 we bought Blue Water for storing our apples. We built a new apple packing facility beside the old one in 2020, rebranded and called it Blue Mountain Fruit Company. In the meantime, we continue to expand our orchards to make sure we have the majority of our own apples to pack ourselves as well as pack for other Ontario apple growers. Southern Georgian Bay gives us all the opportunities to do so. We are not the biggest apple packing company but for sure the most advanced in technology.

> OH: What's special about the Red

Prince apple: proud to be their parents. We are

IB:The Red Prince apple is special to us because we have the rights and own the royalties to sell them to the Canadian market. We designed the logo and did all the marketing for Canada. This apple is special because you are still able to buy a great crunchy local apple from early winter until summer.

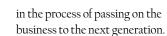
OH: Tell us about your

sustainable growing practices. IB: Our orchards operate using the most up-to-date management practices in order to minimize resource usage per apple produced. With high-efficiency crop protection equipment and drip fertigation systems, our inputs are used as efficiently as possible to produce sustainablyproduced, high-quality apples for our customers. We also have a new biodegradable recyclable bag for the Red Prince apples and were the first to launch this technology in Canada. We also expanded our growing operations in Quebec and the Maritime provinces. This provides locallygrown and packed Red Prince apples in these regions.



OH: This is a true familyowned business. How are your children involved?

IB: We have four children, three are involved in the family business. Our son Gerbe is the orchard manager, daughter Sacha is the production manager at the packing plant and our youngest daughter Gitty is the plant manager. Ferdie, our second son, is a senior agricultural relationship manager at TD Bank. Each child made their own decisions on their career path and we feel very privileged and



OH: How did you meet Marius?

IB: I'm a Dutch girl who loves to party and go out. When we were younger, the bar would be the place to hang out on the weekends. After chatting for a few weekends in a row at the bar, our attraction towards each other grew. We are now happily married for 37 years. With a lot of love and respect for each other you can build anything vou want out of life.

OH: How do you spend your leisure time?

IB: I recently bought an E-bike

and now I can bike to the packing plant to take care of the gardens, or bike around this beautiful area. Spending time with our grandchildren is high on our list and so much fun! Canoeing, hiking the Bruce Trail and spending time with all of my kids together for a few relaxing days is always fun.
