
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
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












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editor's note

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
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

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


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THIS NEW YEAR BEGINS WITH HOPE and anticipation for health and better things to come, and they will!





building BIOLOGY

Designer Tamarisk McNalty Stephens explores the principles of Building Biology.

The discipline of Building Biology focuses on the relationship between the natural and built environments with the goal of creating greater harmony between the two. With nature as the guiding principle, building biologists integrate a holistic approach to the design, build and/or renovation of residential dwellings to provide as little disruption to the surrounding environment as possible — while creating healthy homes. The principles of Building Biology can be grouped into five main topics:

SITE AND COMMUNITY DESIGN

The site and the placement of the dwelling should be free of health hazards (naturally occurring or human-made) and ensure occupants are not disturbed by pollution from air, soil, water, noise and electrical. The goal is to position dwellings in communities and developments that provide ample access to nature, sunshine and fresh air for families and individuals of all ages.

ELECTROMAGNETIC RADIATION HEALTH



This is a topic that we've heard more and more about since the widespread introduction of wireless technologies. Many sources of electromagnetic radiation (EMR) exist, some human-made and others naturally occurring.

Examples of sources include: electrical service, power lines, appliances, cell phone technology, synthetic carpeting, drapery and textiles, components in building materials, steel in furnishings and currents in the earth. Building Biology attempts to integrate ₹ strategies to minimize exposure generated from inside or outside a building.



Here are some simple and easy things you can do at home to lower exposure: Use a landline and minimize cell phone usage; turn off WiFi when not in use and keep electrical devices away from your bed. Some people put their bedrooms on circuits that can easily be turned off at night.

INDOOR AIR AND WATER QUALITY

A ventilation strategy is especially important in new construction. Although airtight homes are prized for their energy efficiency, the circulation of fresh air is crucial for a healthy indoor climate. This is achieved through the design and placement of windows and doors for ample natural ventilation as well as by installing a properly sized mechanical ventilation system.

The Building Biology process also aims to ensure moisture content remains low in dwellings. Building Biology strongly



recommends a historically derived masswall construction method such as earth, clay or straw for their natural ability to allow the flow of vapour molecules through the wall assembly. These natural materials have the innate ability to buffer large amounts of moisture, and the flow-through process is very slow, so accumulation from condensation is insignificant and does not deteriorate the building envelope. Known as "breathable walls," they can provide stable temperature and humidity levels,

producing a comfortable living environment. The walls themselves, finished directly with plaster or with wood over furring strips, provide insulation and eliminate the need for many synthetic materials, which can reduce exposure to volatile organic compounds (VOCs).

OCCUPANT WELL-BEING

To improve indoor air quality, consider selecting low-toxin natural materials and finishes. Providing stable and welcoming air and surfaces can be accomplished through radiant heating methods such as passive solar techniques and the use of thermal mass (such as stone surrounding a fireplace that holds heat long after the fire has burned out). Ergonomics of the human body are also important when considering furniture selections, natural light, a colour palette inspired by the surrounding natural environment and acoustics to mitigate unwanted noise.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION, SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY AND ENERGY EFFICIENCY

The final tenet of Building Biology is the selection of materials and construction methods that promote health and well-being from the beginning of the process to the end. Care is taken to avoid materials that deplete natural resources or permit unsustainable harvesting practices along with life cycle costs of materials from an environmental and energy perspective. Buildings are designed in an energy-efficient manner to minimize energy consumption, provide water-saving features and power with renewable energy sources when viable. OH



REAL ESTATE MARKET SNAPSHOT – 2021 IN REVIEW



Our focus for this snapshot, as usual, will be the three key trading areas and home types with which we have the most expertise: sales of residential condominiums and detached homes in The Blue Mts., Collingwood and Clearview.

Overall, 2021 was a very strong year, with The Blue Mts., Collingwood and Clearview enjoying record volume sales of \$510,216,268, \$487,097,378 and \$264,882,516 respectively. That's up 17%, 30% and 46% from 2020's previous highs. Those gains were largely due to rising prices owing to relatively strong demand: Collingwood had a 79% sales-to-listings ratio and an average sale time 20 days; Clearview had a 74% ratio and averaged 23 days-onmarket; and The Blue Mts. had a 73% ratio and averaged 25 days on market. Additionally, Collingwood had only one month of inventory for every month but January, while The Blue Mts. and Clearview both averaged about seven weeks for the year. It will be interesting to see whether that demand carries forward into 2022.

THE BLUE MOUNTAINS:

Fewer sales overall, shorter sale times - both detached home and condo sales up very nicely.

- The high sale was a 7,780 SF home in Craigleith for \$4,850,000.
- The low sale was a 1 bdrm, 1 bath, 466 SF condo on Jozo Weider Blvd. for \$185,000.
- 187 condo sales (up 34% from 2020's 140); avg of 32 DOM (Days On Market), down 14 days from 2020; avg sale-to-list price ratio of 99.2%, up from 98.3; avg sale price of \$553,160, up 26% from \$437.751.

• 263 single-family home sales (down 18% from 2020's 319); avg DOM of 23, down 31 days; avg sale-to-list-price ratio of 100%, up from 98.3%; and an avg sale price of \$1.546.674, up 32% from \$1.174.436.

COLLINGWOOD:

More sales overall, shorter sale times, both detached home and condo values up very nicely.

- The high sale was a 4,287 SF waterfront home for \$3,200,000.
- The low sale was a 1 bdrm, 1 bath, 481 SF condo on Eighth St. for
- 192 condo sales (up 34% from 2020's 143); avg of 28 (DOM), down 4 days from 2020; avg sale-to-list- price ratio of 100%, up from 99%; avg sale price of \$588,002, up 17% from \$502,511.
- 383 single-family home sales (down 3% from 2020's 402); avg DOM of 16, down 23 days; avg sale-to-list-price ratio of 101%, up from 98.7%; and an avg sale price of \$977,026, up 29% from \$756.422.

CLEARVIEW:

More sales, shorter sale times, detached home values up very nicely.

- The high sale was a 10,418 SF home in Creemore for \$6,040,000.
- The low sale was a 1 bdrm, 1 bath, 466 SF home on Elm St. in Stavner for \$210,000.
- 278 single-family home sales (up 15% from 2020's 242); avg of 23 DOM, down 36 days from 2020; avg sale-to-list-price ratio of 100%, up from 98.7%; and an avg sale price of \$952,815, up 27% from \$749.829.

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Dogs

Dogs are probably the most common pets in homes, because really, what's not to love? What other member of your family will greet you with the same level of vigour and excitement after simply checking the mail? However, from a design perspective, dogs come with plenty of challenges. Consider paw prints, drool, general stains, shedding of hair and furniture chewing. When selecting fabrics with a dog in mind, focus on performance, colour and pattern to visually camouflage as much as you can. Consider using a medium-to-darker-toned fabric (greys, earth tones or navy), a print or a subtle heathered texturing as these have natural camouflaging properties for your heavy-use pieces.

Homeowners face the challenge of finding ways to live in a space they want with the realities they face.

Yes, most of the beautiful homes we see online and in magazines are art-directed and styled. They're meant to be aspirational, but the realities of day-to-day living are not always captured makeshift work-from-home stations, designing for toddlers, teenagers and of course, living with pets. Good design always stems from function. A home's design direction needs to be sustainable and stand up to how it's used. When designing a home with pets, work with their needs, not against them. Here are some tips and tactics to keep your space looking its best while still housing your favourite friends.









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Cats

Compared to dogs, cats don't usually make as much of an obvious mess, as they tend to be a little more agile and are more likely to be inside. But what they lack in brute strength and chaos, they more than make up for in the sheer carnage they can cause by tearing into your furniture with their claws. When designing for cats, focus on the texture and weave of the fabric as opposed to the hue (granted, darker colours tend to hide stains better). Cats love any type of fabric they can literally sink their claws into. Broader weaves, rattan or macrame are not your friends. Instead, opt for tighter and more condensed fabrics like velvet, suede, microfiber or other synthetics like acrylic, polyester or nylon. They will be harder to scratch without ample grip. Keep your cats away from the furniture by having a spray bottle handy - this will help to teach them their limits.

Birds, Lizards and Fish

For other pets like birds, lizards, fish or any type of creature that requires a cage or tank, don't try to work around them, work with them. Treat this as an opportunity to get creative and design with intent and purpose. A client's daughter wanted her songbird in the living room next to the piano, so we looked for a beautiful antique cage and painted it white to match the overall tone of the space. Having it hung with a custom chain next to the grand piano created a beautiful vignette. Fish tanks or aquariums can be beautiful as well, especially when integrated into millwork. If you are able to customize in any way, it's well worth the money.



When it comes to designing any space, it's easier to go with the flow and embrace the challenges, using them as a gateway to spark innovation and creativity. This is especially true when designing a home with pets. You can have a beautiful home with pets, it just takes a little planning, strategizing and thoughtful material selection. Pets are an integral part of our families because they often add the most important ingredient to designing a truly welcoming home - love. on



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

Unobtrusive from the outside, the blue, barn-like building sits at the end of a long driveway hidden by trees. "Right from day one, the long meandering driveway was the source of many aspects of our inspiration," says Steve. "We felt it told a story."

Stone has long been a popular element in home design, valued throughout history for its durability and visual appeal. Widely used for exteriors, Steve loves clients who want to turn back time and use stone throughout the inside as well.

Much of Steve's inspiration comes from the Cotswold region in England, where Cotswold houses are known for their simple use of stone inside and out, which, when done properly, creates a cosy atmosphere.

"Over the years I have suggested using stone on the interior of many of our projects," he says. "However, I was often met with feedback that it would create a cold atmosphere, but nothing could be further from the truth."

"I hope I am having an influence on the mentality that stone isn't for inside as I welcome many architects, designers and clients through our home," says Steve.


Light radiates through the 1,000 sq. ft. great room that includes the kitchen, living and dining rooms. The warmth emanating from the large 42-inch masonry Rumford fireplace centring the front wall is a metaphor for the atmosphere Steve, Sarah and their son set out to create.

Every aspect of the interior has been hand-built or sourced from local suppliers, including the pantry, which Sarah and her father built with ash from the trees on the farm her father grew up on. The kitchen showcases a 1,500-pound stone island sourced from **Owen Sound Ledgerock**, open upper shelves and a 10-foot dining table made of wood Steve rescued at a job site. Old timber from the existing hunting cabin on the property was also salvaged and used as lintels over the windows and painters' drop cloths have been crafted into curtains. Continued on page 60

Natural elements continue upstairs where scorched-wood doorways and stone accent walls give the three bedroom, three-and-a-half bath home a cosy, homestead feel.


The other half of the building is a combination of workshop, gym and man-cave living space, with more stonework and reclaimed wood throughout.


"The thought that kept recurring all the way through was that we didn't want anything treated – just raw materials, with nothing on it," says Steve.

Outside, the drystone walls crafted by Steve and Tristin were built from stone found in the fence rows left by farmers decades ago. Steve also utilized stone found on the property on the walls inside.

"When people come in, they often don't notice things like the light fixtures or furniture right away, which is a nice compliment because this style of house does not need to be dressed up with extras," says Steve. "It's the house itself and the emotions this space evokes that draw people in. When people visit they immediately feel at ease, they feel like they have come home "Continued on page 62"

Sarah agrees. "That's what everybody seems to comment on, that it feels like home, like somewhere they have been long ago."

For anyone who is after an old-world style of home, Steve says he would consider taking on the entire build. "The key to achieving the truly authentic period-piece home is taking it all the way when it comes to the design," he says. "Too often I have seen this style fail because it didn't get carried through to the end." Continued on page 64

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



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
Mark and Marjorie Fisher experience this awe-inspiring panorama and sense of relaxation every winter morning in their home. After spending several summers at their condo in Collingwood, the Fishers decided to retire from city living and build their forever home in Southern Georgian Bay.

They went for drives searching for inspiration – checking out local properties and residential architecture. When they saw a "Scandinavian Home" sign and called the number, they reached **Modern Homes by Timo** (**Modern HBT**) and Timo Hotari invited them to tour his own home.

Modern HBT is a family-run business with Scandinavian roots that define their unique design style and approach to home building. Continued on page 75

"Traditional Scandinavian homes incorporate wood and organic finishes and utilize windows for natural lighting," explains Timo. "This style of home works well in Southern Georgian Bay as they are very efficient and designed beautifully to handle harsh winter environments."

Marjorie and Mark fell in love with the contemporary Scandinavian architecture and characteristics of Timo's house. Also, working with Modern HBT allowed them to be involved from design through to completion.

"Having spent many hours designing the home and drawing every aspect of it, I love the familiarity of each part; I know the reasons behind why everything is where it is," says Mark proudly. "The house is a living, breathing element of my daily life."

With the desire to live near the water, Timo advised which locations would work with the specific architecture of the house the Fishers had in mind. They chose a spot situated by the Niagara Escarpment, with views of Georgian Peaks Club and within walking distance to







Georgian Bay. A structural engineer reviewed the roof plans to make sure heavy snowfalls wouldn't be an issue.

The land was cleared in August 2019 and construction started the following October. After months working directly with Timo, choosing furnishings and fixtures during the pandemic and finessing the interior design, Marjorie and Mark moved into their home in December 2020.

The interior walls are painted **Benjamin Moore** Chantilly Lace with decorating accents in caramel with walnut furnishings, creating a dramatic contrast to the Wrought-Iron coloured cedar siding on the exterior.

Cathedral ceilings made from Douglas fir and Ontario white cedar are a defining feature of the open-concept main room comprising the family room, dining area and kitchen. During cooler months, the Regency Horizon HZ54 fireplace from **The Fyre Place & Patio Shop** is a high-efficiency source of heat and a stunning focal point for the living room, with reflective panels and black crystal increasing its visual impact.

Working with **Aeon Kitchens & Design**, Marjorie was able to customize her kitchen with walnut cabinetry and stunning **Cambria** Annicca white granite countertops. The cupboards and drawers have no handles or decorative panels, giving a contemporary streamlined look that also makes cleaning easier.

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
"We love how we were able to be our own designers and change any non-structural aspect of the home as we went," adds Marjorie.

During construction, Marjorie asked Timo about creative ways to use the large wall space outside the guest bedroom on the ground floor. The result is a unique facility for guests, with counter space and cupboards for all the essentials to make a morning drink or late-night snack without having to go to the kitchen.

The home has five bedrooms, including a primary bedroom with en suite and one bedroom currently being used as an office. Each bedroom was designed with two big windows: one with a view of Georgian Peaks and another looking out towards Georgian Bay.

Each of the three bathrooms provides a contemporary spa-like atmosphere. Marjorie chose the marble patterned tiles and backsplash in the showers, inspired by colours of shale found at nearby Delphi Beach.

The homeowners and the builder chose not to have a basement so the recreational room on the upper level provides an additional lounge and entertainment area complete with a bar and pool table.

In the heart of winter, the home remains warm and cosy. It is fully insulated with added spray foam between the beams and the roof and heated flooring on the ground floor radiates heat to the upper level.








SELLING? YOU CAN'T AFFORD NOT TO

STAGE YOUR HOME

When Allison Ross of Across Ottawa Home Staging started her business a decade ago, staging for resale was a hard sell.

"CLIENTS COULDN'T UNDERSTAND why they would possibly spend money when they were selling, not staying," she says. "Now, everyone clearly sees the value in home staging and we have been busier than ever."

It's no secret that most buyers want a move-in-ready home – a home that looks like reveal day after a major renovation on an HGTV show. Homebuyers are smart. They have a list of must-haves and if a seller hasn't bothered to clean, declutter and paint the walls the latest colour, they will move on to the next listing on realtor.ca.

Leasa Wright, staging course instructor at Sheridan College, agrees. "Buyers want to purchase a home turnkey and do as little work as possible to move in," she says. "If they see a home that looks like it needs any type of work, all they see is money, effort and time spent getting the home the way they want it."

There's more in it for sellers than just making their homes look good. Home staging also helps to increase the final sale price of a property and reduces the length of time on the market.

Nicole Schenk is the Ottawa chapter president of the Real Estate Staging Association (RESA). She says statistics prove staged homes sell faster and sell over asking price. "In a 2020 study completed by RESA, they found 85 per cent of homes staged sold between five and 23 per cent over list," says Nicole. "On an average investment of one per cent, 75 per cent of sellers saw a return on investment of between five and 15 per cent over ask."

Staging today is big business and Leasa has seen an increase in the number of people interested in learning the trade. "Student numbers have substantially increased over this past year," she says. "The market for buying and selling has been booming and home staging plays a big part of that. There is a much higher emphasis on design and function of space trending in the home market. The fact remains, only a small percentage of us can envision the potential of a home, leaving most unable to imagine what a home could look like if it was cleaned and decluttered."

The pandemic has changed the way buyers look at homes for sale. Buyers cruise the internet looking for homes that tick all their boxes. First impressions matter and if a home isn't beautiful inside and out, it's not worth an on-site visit.

"COVID has affected the market in unprecedented ways," says Nicole. "While it has been a sellers' market with homes selling just as soon as they hit the market, staging has had a remarkable effect on the price. Earlier this year a home I staged sold for \$130,000 more than a comparable unstaged listing. Both homes were in the same area, with similar features and same asking price."

So what exactly does a stager do? Leasa teaches six essential principles of home staging:

- Depersonalize so people can envision themselves in the space
- Highlight the home's features and architectural details
- Enhance curb appeal to get people in the door
- Complete home improvements and repairs, update fixtures
- Declutter to create space
- Neutralize colour palettes and generalize décor to appeal to more viewers

"We cover so much in our curriculum from what an ideal floor plan would look like, to what colour palettes work best, how to partner with a trusted team (including trades and real estate agents) and how to budget and build your staging inventory from the ground up," Leasa explains. OH

Does your family have a stack of old sweaters no one wears? Upcycle those sweaters into a cosy blanket.



TOOLS & MATERIALS (Makes a 40 by 70-inch blanket)

6-8 sweaters (amount depends on sweater sizes)

Soft backing fabric at least 42 by 72-inches (fleece, minky or chenille)

10 ½ by 10 ½-inch and 5 ½ by 5½-inch pieces of card stock or cardboard for cutting templates

Sewing machine

Fabric scissors

Polyester sew-all thread

Sewing pins

Sewing clips (optional but helpful)

Yarn (optional for decorative edging)

Yarn needle (optional for decorative edging)

HOW-TO

Wash and dry sweaters and backing fabric so your finished blanket won't shrink.

We're making a 40 by 70-inch blanket, made of four 10-inch squares (wide) by seven 10-inch squares (long) – a total of 28 10-inch squares for your blanket. Smaller five-inch squares are sewn together in sets of four to create larger 10-inch squares. You can adjust your blanket to any size you like depending on the number of squares you're able to cut from sweaters, as well as the width of the backing fabric you have available. Our templates are ½-inch larger than the final 10-inch and five-inch sewn squares to accommodate for a 14-inch seam allowance.





Cut along sweater seams to separate pieces, then flatten to make cutting small squares easier. Place your templates on a sweater piece and begin cutting squares until you have enough to fill the entire blanket. You can cut squares that include loose waistbands, but remove and avoid fitted, tight waistbands. You can cut smaller squares from sleeves once they've been cut open and laid flat.

When you have enough large and small squares combined to make up 28 10-inch squares, lay them out on the floor until you have a design you like. Take a picture of your final design to use as a reference when sewing. Continued on page 106

Number some paper squares 1 through 7. Begin stacking your cut sweater squares for each row on top of each other from left to right and top with the corresponding row number. Then stack the rows together, with row 7 on the bottom and transfer the stack to your sewing table.

Beginning with row one, start sewing smaller squares together to create larger squares and place them back in the correct order (this is where your reference photo comes in very handy!) Then, place the first two larger squares together, right sides facing in, pin (or clip) and sew along the inside edge. Continue sewing together the remaining squares until the row is complete. Repeat this process until all squares are sewn together into 7 separate rows of four 10-inch squares each.





Once all rows are complete, begin pinning and sewing the rows together with right sides facing in, starting with rows one and two. When all rows are sewn together you will have a complete top layer for your blanket. Helpful hint: When pinning (or clipping) the rows together, start by matching the seams and then pin along the rest, stretching and scrunching a little as needed. Knit sweaters vary in thickness and elasticity, so don't worry if things don't line up perfectly.





Lay your backing fabric on the floor right side facing up. Lay your completed sweater layer face down on top of the backing fabric. You'll want to pin together the layers in a few places around the blanket to hold things in place while trimming your backing fabric to match your top layer. Begin cutting your backing fabric along the edge of your top layer and pin (or clip) along the edges as you go.



Begin sewing the two layers together along the edge of the blanket, leaving a little less than a full square open. Using the opening, turn your blanket right side out.



To finish your blanket you have two choices: You can top-stich around the entire blanket with your sewing machine, about 1/4 to 3/8 inch in from the edge, closing the opening as you go. Or, (if you have some hours to kill while bingewatching a TV series) you can choose to do a decorative blanket stich by hand with some varn and varn needle. The blanket stitch option is very time consuming but creates a very nice decorative edge on your blanket. There are many blanket stitch tutorial videos online if you've never done this stitch before.



Et voila! You're ready to snuggle up with your new blanket and a good book. OH



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





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
We aren't saying our home is green," says Jim. "That would be greenwashing. It is about giving the environment its due by way of responsible approaches." Jim and Sheryl were determined to lower greenhouse gas emissions through a host of considerations, ranging from material selection and end-of-life examination to energy efficiency, the size and orientation of the building and choosing locally-sourced goods whenever feasible. "They were never just paying lip service to the notion of being environmentally concerned," says **Chris Skelton**, head designer and partner at builder **Porter Skelton & Associates Ltd.** "They walk the walk," he says. "The Phillips put into action the kind of choices that really do make a difference."

"The first step was to have energy modelling executed to optimize the efficiency of the home," explains **Colin Grant**, project manager and also a partner with Porter Skelton. The analysis showed they could avoid having to install air conditioning and it pre-determined the effectiveness of the proposed radiant heating system for the cold season. To take advantage of passive solar heat, the 2,100 sq. ft. house faces south with large picture windows to maximize the sun's effect. "Chris highly recommended this positioning rather than being concerned with curb appeal," adds Jim. "Our natural inclination was to offer a more aesthetically desirable front, facing the road and the valley. We are very grateful for Porter Skelton's advice, as the result has delivered obvious benefits." Continued on page 114





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"I really love that the house faces south," says Colin. "As you approach it from the north it blends so comfortably into the landscape. They positioned it for efficiency and environmental concerns, but the home also delivers a wonderful aesthetic."

"Colin, Chris and the whole crew were so amazing," says Sheryl. "They were knowledgeable, patient, organized and open to all the alternative approaches."

Blown cellulose was the chosen insulation throughout the home, as well as recycled blue-jean batts in certain areas. Eco-board, made from 100 per cent recycled wood fibres, was installed as the continuous outside insulating layer. A hydronic in-floor heating system, based on an electric boiler, was chosen as opposed to propane or natural gas. The main-floor surface is a polished, dyed concrete made with higher slag content for decreased CO2 that would otherwise be released in conventional concrete production. Continued on page 116


The windows throughout the structure are triple pane to improve energy effectiveness and are framed with wood and aluminum, both highly recyclable. Even the two-by-fours and two-by-sixes used for framing are Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) certified.


Countertops in the bathrooms, upper-level flooring, windowsills and cladding on the kitchen island are made from reclaimed wood. The list of thoughtful choices extends to every facet of the build. "Jim made a point of setting up crates

for recycling," adds Colin. "He ended up reducing the number of dumpsters we required by 75 per cent and the waste to landfill by 60 per cent. The Phillips knew what they wanted from an ecological perspective and we were there to basically navigate."

One of the most significant points is that Jim and Sheryl did the research and knew what they didn't want. Both the Phillips and the entire Porter Skelton crew made the effort to exercise the correct decisions from beginning to end.






"We've planned a vegetable garden adjacent to the house and we are also planting native grasses and wildflowers along with thousands of seedlings to regenerate the natural landscape around the property," Sheryl says. The aim is to create an open meadow effect so that birds like Bobolinks, an endangered species, might return and butterflies and bees might find their way to safe harbour. Jim built a small wooden platform on the side of the outbuilding for barn swallows to nest - another small, but not incidental consideration. Continued on page 120

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

This is a home as comfortable and pleasing to the eye as it is functional and responsible. Jim's list also included ensuring that when the primary bedroom windows are open, you can hear the murmur of the creek in the valley below. Sheryl made an inspiring choice by putting larger windows in the kitchen to appreciate the panoramic view to the north while preparing meals and enjoying the gathering place that the kitchen naturally becomes.

Jim took some field stones from an old barn foundation on their farm in Arthur to add to their fireplace surround. "The barn would have been from the late 1800s," says Jim. "Just trying to add some old soul to the new house."

The design of this house is alluring and sympathetic to the rural context of the neighborhood. There is no pretention with this lovely home. It is exactly what it was intended to be - thoughtfully planned, honestly designed and genuinely built. он

Looking for something to do on a cold winter day? Go birding! Wait, what? Birding in winter? Will you see anything interesting? Well, yes! You'll be surprised by what is out there in our seemingly barren backyards and snow-covered countrysides.



Feeder watch

Once winter sets in with a vengeance, you may not necessarily want to venture out. No problem! From the comfort of home, we can do a good bit of birding through our windows. Watching birds at your feeder is a great way to brighten a dreary winter's day. Set up a feeding station in your yard, fill it with quality seed (black-oil sunflower seed, peanuts, nyjer or suet) and cosy up by the window.

lop ten

So, what will you see? Project FeederWatch - a citizen science project that records birds at feeders throughout the winter – has the answer. That friendly little ball of feathered fluff, the chickadee, is the number-one bird, followed by downy and hairy woodpeckers,

the always gorgeous cardinal, the upside-down nuthatch, the

dopey mourning dove, the bossy blue jay, the jaunty junco, and last but not least, the goldfinch, somewhat incognito without its summer golden cloak. Once you've identified these species, your winter bird list is off to a good start.

Getting to know these common, top-10 visitors will also make it easier for you to recognize a new species should one appear at your feeders. That's when it gets exciting What could it be? Get that field guide off your shelf and crack it open. Flip through, discovering the possibilities and narrow it down by the distinctive identification points - size, shape, colour and markings. Give it your best shot!

Expect the unexpected

Knowing what unexpected birds to expect, or at least hope for, in the dead of winter also helps. Some years we are treated to an invasion of what ornithologists refer to as winter finches. When the pine and spruce cone crops are low in the north, this family of boreal-forest birds comes south to central and southern Ontario in search of food. They travel in gangs and descend upon our feeders with much enthusiasm. Last year was an irruption year (a sudden surge of birds), and often there is a rebound irruption year of visits, so keep your eyes to the skies and on your feeders for big, beautiful evening and pine grosbeaks, frosty redpolls, squabbling pine siskins, and maybe even colourful, parrot-like red-winged and white-winged crossbills.

Winter wonder land

There will be days in the midst of winter when the sun is sparkling on the snowbound land, the air is crisp and clear, and you'll feel the call of the great outdoors. Such a day is perfect for a drive, on the lookout for open-country winter birds. If you're lucky you may come across snow buntings flying across fields flashing their white feathers, sprinkling the sky like snowflakes.

You might also notice the bouncing flight pattern of a bunch of beautiful bohemian waxwings flying across the landscape or in your neighbourhood, searching for berrybearing trees. Living up to their name, they are true nomads and never stay long in one place, so consider yourself lucky if you catch a flock in action.

Or your winter drive may be rewarded with a sighting of one of the big arctic raptors. The rough-legged hawk occasionally comes south in search of small rodents when their arctic supply dwindles. Look for this big bird perched on a branch of a leafless tree out in the open or hovering like a giant hummingbird, surveying the snow for mice.

This same tundra-like habitat just might yield that most coveted of arctic visitors - the snowy owl. A sighting of this bird alone makes the outing worthwhile.

As always, relish the discovery of each new bird, keep your distance and take photos without disturbing their never-ending fight for survival in the depths of winter. $\mathbf{o}\mathbf{h}$

Formerly known as the culturally offensive European gypsy moth, the Lymantria dispar dispar (LDD) moth caterpillars devastated forests, backyard trees and even outdoor enjoyment for many this past year. So many times, at a client's outdoor space, we'd be picking fallen caterpillars off each other with caterpillar feces raining down on us from the tree canopy above. Some people even avoided their outdoor spaces completely for fear of an encounter! Next summer may shape up to be another heavy LDD caterpillar year. Read on for facts, history and support.

WHAT ARE LDD MOTHS?

LDD moths are an invasive species from Europe and Asia introduced to the U.S. near Boston in the 1860s and reaching southern Canada by 1969. Outbreaks hit every decade or so, lasting one to three years. Our current record-breaking eruption began in 2019.

LDD moths need specific weather conditions to thrive and this makes sense considering our present outbreak. They cannot survive below -20 degrees Celsius for long, and they're susceptible to certain fungal infections during wet weather. In recent years we've had warmer winters



followed by dry springs, creating the ideal natural conditions for them to flourish – and flourish they have! The continuing warmer temperature trends are favourable for future LDD moth populations.

Most other moth and butterfly caterpillar species are picky eaters and can only use one or two plants as hosts for their larva, but not LDD moth caterpillars. They have voracious appetites and can eat a wide variety of tree leaves including oak, maple, birch, poplar, willow and more.

WHAT DO THEY LOOK LIKE?

LDD caterpillars are hairy, about six centimetres long with five pairs of blue dots and six pairs of red dots on their backs. The adult male moths are brown and fly around erratically in summer, whereas the females are larger, white and flightless. Their light-brown egg masses resemble the skin of a tennis ball and can be found on tree trunks, under branches and in tree crevices.

WILL MY TREES DIE?

Many people think that once a tree has been defoliated it's dead. Luckily this isn't true. Trees often have latent buds as a defence mechanism, allowing them to regrow their leaves. But it does take a lot of energy to do this and some trees, like oaks, take longer to regenerate, leaving them weak and more susceptible to pathogens. Add the extra stresses of drought and being defoliated by LDD caterpillars in successive years and this will be too much for some trees to handle. Unfortunately we will see more tree death in upcoming years as a result of this epidemic.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP?

Some municipalities are spraying Bacillus thuringiensis kurstaki (Btk) to control LDD outbreaks, target-spraying "high-value" trees, but many others are just letting nature take its course. Btk has the potential to kill many of our beneficial native caterpillars, so it's not a responsible long-term option. Unfortunately, LDD moths and caterpillars are likely here to stay.

Here's what you can do to mitigate their damage at home.

In fall, inspect all your trees and vertical surfaces around your home as best you can for their light-brown egg masses. Remove them with a paint scraper or butter knife and put them into a bucket of soapy water. This last step must be done or the eggs will still hatch into caterpillars.

In spring, tie a band of burlap at chest height around your trees so that it folds over in half. The LDD caterpillars will be present until the middle of July and they often hide in the shade of the burlap fold. Check the burlap daily and dump any found LDD caterpillars into a bucket of soapy water. They can also be squished, but it's pretty ghastly and the soapy water solution often ensures a quicker, more sanitary and more guaranteed death.

Some birds and other wildlife will eat LDD caterpillars and moths, but not enough to make much of a dent in their population.

Native species balance overpopulation together – if one is doing particularly well, its predators will also do well taking care of the issue. This is why invasive species are so problematic! **OH**

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

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

TOOLS AND MATERIALS

13-1/2 by 13-1/2-inch piece of 3/4-inch thick wood

24 wood 1-1/8-inch checker pieces (ours are from Lee Valley)

Pencil

Ruler

1.41-inch painter's tape

Paintbrushes

Paint in three different shades (we've chosen Country Chic chalk-based paint in Crinoline, Lazy Linen and Pebble Beach)

Chalk paint wax (we've used Annie Sloan)

Drill

2 cabinet door handles with hardware

HOW-TO

Paint a 13-1/2 by 13-1/2-inch piece of wood with your lightest colour and let dry.


Paint half of the checker pieces in your lightest colour and the other half in your darkest colour and let dry. Tip: Paint the top first and let dry, then the bottom and let dry before finishing around the sides.






Measure and find the centre of the wood board and draw a light line using a ruler and pencil. Run a strip of painter's tape along the right edge of the pencil line. Using two small pieces of painter's tape as spacers, run another strip of tape parallel to the first strip. Repeat one more time on the right side of the board and then two more times on the left side of the board until you have five parallel strips of tape on the board. Remove spacers. Rotate the board counterclockwise and repeat with five more strips of tape. Remove spacers. Now you have a grid.


Using your medium shade of paint, paint inside the squares you've created. Allow to dry and paint a second coat before removing the tape. Allow to dry completely before moving along to the next step.



Cover your painted squares with more strips of painter's tape, turn the board and repeat until you have another grid pattern with five strips of tape running in both directions. Using your medium shade of paint again, paint two coats inside your taped squares. Remove tape and allow to dry completely. Tip: Chalk-based paint works well for this project because it dries fast and allows you to move along with the taping process quickly.



To create a thin border around your game area, run a strip of tape down the right and left sides of the board, measure 1/8 inch from there and run a parallel strip of tape on each side. Put a small piece of tape at the top and bottom of the parallel strips of tape to ensure the painted lines will not exceed the play area. Paint inside the taped areas with your darkest colour and allow to dry. Remove the tape, turn the board and repeat with the remaining two sides.




Once your board and checker pieces are completely dry, you can coat with chalk paint wax.

Attach your handles along the side, making sure to countersink the screws on the underside so that the board sits flat.

Now you're ready to play! OH



Ingredients

MACARONI

454 g elbow macaroni noodles

3 Tbsp butter

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

2 cups milk

1 cup heavy cream

2 cups shredded cheese (a mix of cheddar and Gruyère is recommended)

Salt and pepper, to taste

PANKO TOPPING

1 cup panko breadcrumbs

2 Tbsp melted butter

1/4 cup parmesan cheese, finely shredded

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°F.

In a large pot of boiling water, cook macaroni noodles according to package directions.

In a medium-size pot over medium-high heat, melt butter, then whisk in flour. Cook for 1 minute, whisking constantly.

Slowly add milk and cream while continuing to whisk. You'll want to add the liquid gradually so it doesn't begin to clump. Continue to whisk until mixture begins to thicken.

Remove from heat and add shredded cheese. Stir until cheese is melted.

Prepare the panko crumble topping by mixing all ingredients together.

In a 9 by 11-inch oven-safe dish (or several smaller dishes), combine the sauce with the noodles.

Cover with panko crumble and bake for 15-20 minutes until golden and bubbly. OH



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
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















When the pandemic hit, Natalie and Ben expanded and improved the outside, adding a new fibreglass pool and guest house last summer.

OUR HOMES: What brought you to Thornbury?

Chef David Lee: Skiing at The Peaks brought us to the area many years ago. Devon was skiing at the time and we had a farm in Feversham. When Devon stopped skiing we sold the farm and stopped coming to the area until our younger daughter Indya started to ski. We fell in love with Thornbury and bought this house in 2019 just before the lockdown. I was working in Florida, travelling back and forth to my Planta restaurants but also watching my family struggle. We made a big decision to move out of the city and enjoy a better quality of life.

OH: How has living here changed your lives?

CDL: Living here is like therapy for me. I get to decompress. I love cooking outside any time of day regardless of the weather. If I'm lighting a fire or cooking pizzas for the kids, the neighbours will come and we'll share. We're into boating up here too and it's so beautiful. As much as I love Toronto there's something so unique to be in a small community near the ski hills and five minutes away from Georgian Bay. The people are great; it's like everyone around you is family.

OH: The pandemic brought you to Thornbury but you still have a successful business to run. How's that going?

CDL: We've learned to pivot. We've become more efficient

as a business and we're lucky that we're still growing as a plant-based company. It's a little tough right now but people want this to be over, they want to go to restaurants, they want to celebrate and eat plant-based food. Planta also offers nation-wide shipping in Canada and the U.S.

OH: What are your local favourites?

CDL: We support as many local restaurants in and around Thornbury as we can. I start my day off at Good Grief Coffee; it's a daily ritual. We love Bruce Wine Bar, Fabbrica, Venti Venti, and Bread & Butter in downtown Thornbury. Blackbird Pie Co. in Heathcote and Hearts in Kimberley are other favourites.

OH: What inspires your cooking?

CDL: I get inspired by many things around me: Travel, my Planta team, the seasons and the availability of produce.

CDL: Soup, sautéed rapini and my mother's cooking.
