"The best part was that we had a client who had a vision of what they wanted and we had the ability to do it," says **Gary Singh**, owner of **Singhko Design Build Remodel**.

Before the renovation, this home was your typical "80s chalk home." The spaces were clearly defined with a hallway, living room, dining room and kitchen; it was structured. This style of home is rarely built. "People don't really have defined spaces now," says Gary.

With three grandchildren ranging from five-to-nine years old, the homeowner was keen to have a space that the family could enjoy. "The staircase was a full wall and the kitchen was small and boxed in. Taking the walls out made such a difference," says the homeowner.

Gary tackled the project head-on and made one big open space, knocking down walls and facing the challenges of moving what's behind those walls, including electrical and plumbing, all while creating a brand-new living space.

The homeowner and builder worked well together. They smile as they discuss their easy collaboration. Gary cites the homeowner as co-designer.

The fireplace, for example, was removed from the centre of the room when the homeowner expressed her desire to reintroduce a fireplace to the family room area. The decision gave them a chance to have some fun and source stunning reclaimed wood for the mantel, stack stone for the surround, and ultimately be creative with the design. 

"We could grow with the process," says Gary. "The quality of the materials the client selected meant we could do some really great things." "Gary gave lots of good suggestions," says the homeowner.

The entire space is open, full of light, texture and warmth. The main floor has a functional flow with clean lines and a traditional, yet modern, feel. The open-concept provides the homeowner with a view of the whole space when entertaining family and friends.

The staircase was opened up using railings from **Ottawa Valley Handrailing Company Ltd.**, replacing the previously existing wall, making the area seem bigger. Light cascades through the front window into the living room, dining area, kitchen and to the back, where it bounces off the beautiful hardwood floors from **Alexanian Carpet and Flooring**.

Into the kitchen, designed by **Kitchen Interiors**, the homeowner chose varying colours. Not all cabinets are the same colour; the dark contrasts with the light and the built-in elements complement this perfectly.

There are all kinds of little touches, including a mix of handles on the kitchen cabinets, and the dining room cabinets, which separate the areas, yet tie them together in a stylish way. "It's neutral and modern at the same time," says Gary.

The countertop boasts brownish tones, allowing browns or greys to complement the stylish island and other surfaces.

The kitchen, situated at the corner of the L-shaped main-floor looks in to the family room and the dining/living area at the front of the house. "I've had big groups of people here and it's nice to see everyone," says the homeowner. "I love the island, it's ideal for entertaining."

Up the newly renovated stairs, Singhko worked on the bathrooms and sourced materials from **Tego Bathroom Solutions**. The master en suite has double sinks on the left-hand side and a unique shower. Gary created a barrier-free shower, a favourite piece for the homeowner.
