


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
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
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# editor's note

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



# Dear Stephanie,

I really liked your spring column on paint trends. My problem is picking colour combinations, specifically picking a wall colour that matches furniture and accessories. Could you give me some great combinations that will help in my décor decision making?

### Stephanie Redmond replies:

Don't just look at the colour of the furniture when choosing wall colours; consider the weight of the fabric as well. A sofa with a heavy fabric such as leather or chenille can take a deeper tone on the walls. A sofa upholstered in cotton or linen will look nice on a much softer wall. For that red wine leather sofa (heavy!), choose something with a little more depth. Same thing applies for your furniture. If you have traditional dark wood pieces, they may appear heavy against a white wall. Your furniture needs a stage that suits its style and feel.

Here are a few combination ideas:

- 1. **EARTHY**: Chocolate brown sofa + sage green pillows and throw + toffee colour leather chair + crisp white pillar candles
- Paint solution: Pick up on the toffee colour and use a mid-tone burnt butter colour on the walls
- 2. SOPHISTICATED: Light earth-toned sofa + navy blue pillows + chunky woven baskets + cream cashmere throw
  - Paint solution: Mirror the sofa and pick a light neutral with a brown base
- 3. CALM: Cream linen curtains + light grey upholstery + metal side tables
  Paint solution: Introduce a bit of color and choose a butter yellow or a light French blue on the walls

**HINT:** Take any element with colour into a space to see how it looks – a piece of clothing, a dish towel, a picture frame. This is an ideal way to test drive a colour without the long term commitment!

# Dear Stephanie,

We just installed new hardwood flooring throughout the main floor of our home. I would like to purchase some area rugs for the living room/dining room but I have no idea how to determine what size I need. Is there a set standard? Should I buy two rugs for the same room or one big one? I also don't want to spend a fortune.

### Stephanie Redmond replies:

The biggest mistake that people make with area rugs is going too small. A guideline to follow is that your furniture should sit comfortably on your area rug. You can inset the rug under the back of the sofa, but leave at least eight inches so that it doesn't look like an error. If you have ample space, allow chairs to sit comfortably on the area rug. Don't skimp. As far as one or two rugs go – if your space is very large or walls indent to decipher one room from another, then use

two carpets in the same style. This gives the illusion of a larger space. If your space is quite small, use one large one to lengthen the room. Area rugs are not inexpensive and they are long term purchases. Make sure you inform your carpet dealer of what your needs are, whether you have children or pets, and your budget. Ask about stain resistance and edging details.



**HINT:** Use green painter's tape to tape out the size of the rug you think is right and then measure it!

# Dear Stephanie,

How can I use framed mirrors to make a room look larger? *Charlene W.* 

### Stephanie Redmond replies:

The options are endless, but I have one guideline: Place your mirror on a side wall, not on a wall facing an entry. You shouldn't feel as though you are walking towards yourself every time you enter a room.

A mirror will act as a window reflecting light into a space. Try a starburst above a fireplace or a slim framed mirror on a side wall. Line up two or three of the same mirror (horizontally or vertically) for an even more compelling reflection. Cluster small mirrors to add a fun

sparkle, just as you would group a selection of your favourite family photos. Be bold! Don't be afraid to use a large piece in a small space. This will add some much needed scale. Can't find the right mirror? Visit a frame store and have one made that suits your décor.

HINT: Have a friend hold up your pieces to see what the mirror will reflect once it's hung. You don't want to make holes in a wall only to discover that you can see your toilet from your living room sofa! OH

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
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

For many couples whose children have reached the age of majority, it's time to embrace the concept of downsizing.

But Wayne and Tracy Ezekiel have no intention of succumbing to empty-nest syndrome quite yet.

Instead, they worked with daughter Aaryn, 19, and son Norm, 18, to create a beautiful, functional and inviting setting that would encourage both university students to return to the roost as often as possible.

"We wanted to provide them with some space of their own, while staying together as a family," Wayne recalls. "They're not ready to move out permanently yet, so we created an environment that works well for

the family at this time in its evolution."

Last year the family vacated a Barrie house less than half the size of their new 6,000-sq. ft. custom home. The stone and stucco residence is nestled amid four acres of mature maple and hemlock forest. The Innisfil property lays claim to 285 feet of waterfront along Kempenfelt Bay's rugged south shore.


Moving in before the construction was complete didn't faze the Ezekiels, who are no strangers to drywall dust. Wayne has spent the past decade building **A.N.T. Construction** (named after his family), a Tarion-registered and Energy Star-approved custom-home builder in the region.

This project would not only shelter his family, but also house and showcase his business.

Tracy teamed up with **Guy Dumas** of **The Design House** to develop the drawings. She wanted to combine elegance with the casual comfort of a cottage to provide a warm welcome for friends and family.

"We're very social people," Wayne smiles.

The contemporary style of the home is flavoured with European touches in the front foyer. It incorporates columns, stained glass and ribbons of stylized plaster mouldings by **EFP Designs**. Separated from this entranceway by an iron-trimmed catwalk and a circular stairway is a colonial country living room featuring massive windows cradled under a 30-foot arched dormer. With no need for drapes, the window frames the ever-moving artwork that is the view of the bay.

In fact, thanks to 40 large windows throughout the house (supplied by **Casa Bella Windows**), glorious natural vistas abound in every direction.

The soaring space is balanced by the cultured stone fireplace by Minty Carter Masonry, offset by a hand-crafted maple mantel by E.R. Woodworking's Ermes Ricetto. Far above, two chimneys add palatial interest to a complicated roofline. The combination cross-hipped roof is further embellished by a collection of gables and dormers.

"It's a very intricate design that took a lot of on-site measuring," says Wayne. "It wasn't a simple truss package that was shipped in. **Tarpin Lumber** was a great help with this."

It would have been simpler to raise the roof to incorporate a full second storey, but the beauty and intrigue would have been lost. Instead, Norm's bedroom and Aaryn's en suite bathroom are built into the corners of the roof and benefit from the character of sloped ceilings, and the charm of surprise nooks and crannies. Another nod to the splendour of castles can be found in the curved partitions and rounded corners incorporated by interior designer **Yvonne**Nielan of Innovative Designs. The flowing curvature in the mahoganytinted walls in the guest powder room is complemented by stone accents to generate the old-world romance of a turret garret.

Mod-cons abound, however, in the **Astro Kitchens** showpiece next door that boasts a tumbled-marble backsplash, textured-glass cabinet inserts, and an oversized granite-topped island, by **Yanish Gruszka** of **Stontario**. Here, and throughout the house, **C.R.M. Mechanical** sourced plumbing fixtures to heighten aesthetics while adding luxurious comfort and fingertip convenience.

Adjoining the kitchen space are the dining room and a sitting area that are lit by 34 pot lights embedded in a unique coffered ceiling accented with recessed panels of tongue-in-groove hardwood. **Monarch Electric** added to the mood with an integrated computer system that includes pre-set lighting levels for any occasion.

This open-concept great room opens to patio gardens that transition

from carefully cultured plantings close to the house, to the ordered chaos that is the natural surrounding.

"Tracy and I love to walk around here," Wayne says. "We've seen deer, foxes and lots of wild turkeys."

The front gardens are highlighted by a unique four-waterfall pond system. The massive stone sculpture was designed and built by <code>Harry JansmaLandscaping</code> (with materials from <code>Atlas Block</code> and <code>Brayford Sod Farms</code>) to incorporate several of the lofty maple trees that started life as seedlings in the 1800s. Planting by <code>Landmark Environmental Group Ltd</code>.

Another opportunity to turn a challenge into a positive was managing the steep downgrade from the road. The teams from **Eplett & Worobec Land Surveyors** and **Rumball Excavating** helped to create the long, winding and visually appealing driveway.

But it's the non-artistic additions that make this home a success. In Aaryn's quiet room, her beloved snowboard awaits the attention another winter will bring. In an unfinished corner of the basement, Norm's hockey net sits with a collection of pucks in its depths ready for the next practice session.

Meanwhile, Wayne continues to build custom homes, and registered nurse Tracy attends patients in the emergency room of Barrie's Royal Victoria Hospital.

But soon they will all return, as planned, to their cosy cottage castle to rekindle the family home fires together. **OH** 













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

A top-to-bottom, inside-and-out renovation began 10 months ago on the home they purchased together following their wedding in the fall of 2007.

"We thought it would be nice to choose a new home together and make it our own," Mosher explains, adding a major makeover wasn't part of their original plan.


"Initially, when we looked at the house, we anticipated only minor changes," Mosher remembers. "However, after we moved in, we decided to add a modern touch to the traditional design."

The couple contacted design expert **Terri Clark** of **Terri Clark Interiors** to help transform the 4,800 sq. ft. home's interior and help finish what the previous owners started. The large kitchen was new and the couple loved the chocolate brown cabinetry, complementary granite counters and tumbled marble, subway-tiled backsplash. However, the modern kitchen was a contrast to the rest of the layout.

General Contractor **Dan Morris** of **D.P. Morris Construction**, integral to the team, was brought in to work on much-need structural changes.



**Hot & Cool Air Services** provided two new furnaces, air conditioning and a hot water tank. **SGO Designer Glass** added a new design to the Pella windows in the living room, dining room, den, at the front door and the garage.

"We pulled the home out of 1989 and brought it into 2010," says Morris as he marvels at the total transformation.

**Electronic Lifesyles** reconnected an automated audio system throughout the home and installed new 46-inch and 50-inch flat screen TVs and two smaller screens for the kitchen and office.

Situated on a cul-de-sac, the white brick ranch stands out on this desirable lane with its newly stained, stamped-concrete circular driveway and a natural stone porch in Stoneworx by **Darlinghurst Construction**. New gardens, designed and planted by **Lexi Dearborn of Dearborn Designs**, frame the home's gracious exterior. To the left of the entrance, two large metal Canadian geese in flight (Northern Iron) greet visitors.

A princess staircase takes you to the double-entry doors and into the foyer, where a marble facade is the immediate focal point. Original to the house, the expansive wall runs from the ceiling to the floor in the basement. A winding oak staircase takes you to the lower level.

Both stunning and functional, the facade is double-sided and flows into the calm, relaxing main floor den. Two plush custom mocha sofas, separated by a glass-top cherry coffee table, face each other in the centre of the room. Red is the accent colour here, found in floral-print throw pillows, and glass accessories, which sit atop an HDTV stand set up against a warm, wood-paneled wall that anchors a flat screen TV. A new gas fireplace from <code>Napoleon Home Comfort</code> is the focus on the other side of the marble wall.

The den leads into the previously renovated kitchen. Mosher says the kitchen received a fresh coat of paint and a custom valance for the window over the sink, which faces the lake.

The kitchen leads into the dining room. A warm glow fills the space.


Here, **Sandy Ward** of **Drift Design** helped select the blue and rose fabric on the chairs around the Arts-and-Crafts-style dining set and buffet. She also helped pick the bright blue and red floral antique Persian area rugs that cover the floors in the dining room and adjacent living room.

A modern chandelier, a shade wrapped in gold and wall sconces on dimmers set the mood in the room. The adjoining living room is irresistible with its sleek custom sofa and arm chairs. A large electric blue ottoman sits comfortably in the front bay window. The earth-toned walls are the perfect backdrop for vibrant, eclectic paintings by José Valverde, of Chester, N.S. Valverde is featured throughout the home.

Fresh, contemporary seasonal and silk flower arrangements (**Street's Flower Shop**) are breathtakingly beautiful and are strategically placed throughout the main living areas.

The soft turquoise and sand tones complement each other, with luxurious bedding to match. A functional, walk-in closet by Kwik Kloset keeps the couple's clothes organized and out of sight.

Across the room, a built-in oak shelf was modernized with a coat of charcoal paint to match the bulkhead, making it a focal point while emphasizing the marble facade that extends into the basement.

Warm coral and pink tones were introduced into the expansive family room, through newly-covered, down-filled seat cushions. "Betty wanted to move away from the house being too formal," Clark says. "She wanted a warm, cosy house," and fun, inviting fabrics do the trick.



It's been humbling to discover that one of the most expensive items in the neverending project of improving our old home has been human error - not the architect's, not the contractor's, not the electrician's or the plumber's, but my own. I could probably place a dollar value on how much I've cost myself, but it would be too depressing. Just thinking about it makes me cringe.

When we bought the building – a mid-19th century commercial structure – the previous owner had already begun the saga of turning it into a modern dwelling. Then he'd run out of money. Or maybe the sheer magnitude of the work had ground him down and he'd given up in despair. There were even rumours that marital strife had led him to sell - a not unknown consequence of renovations that go on for too long. Whatever it was, we showed up, and his last straw became our call to arms. Continued on page 52

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
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We discovered, among other things, that he'd roughed in two separate waste water collection systems, one for the toilets and one for all the rest – from the sinks, the showers, the washing machines, the dishwasher, the bathtubs. Though I didn't know it at the time, he'd actually created the infrastructure for what we would now call a "grey water system." The "black water" from the toilets would go into

the holding tank, and all the rest – contaminated by little more than hair, grease, and soapy residue - would go its separate way, in this case, through a pipe and straight into the river at the bottom of the garden. It would clearly have been both illegal and harmful and, feeling very righteous, we ripped out the secondary system and rerouted all the plumbing to the holding tank.

Twelve years and thousands of dollars later, it pains me to admit that the former owner was, perhaps without knowing it, a visionary. Today, a growing number of householders and cottagers in water-rich Ontario are discovering what hundreds of thousands in arid regions like the American southwest or Australia or in places like Japan, already know: that separating grey water from black water is one of the best things you can do to conserve water, take pressure off overloaded sewage treatment systems and save yourself money while helping the environment.

There are several ways, all of them legal, to benefit from grey water. The most straightforward is to redirect your domestic grey water to an indoor tank that will filter out impurities, chlorinate it and then pump it back to the toilets for flushing. This way you get double mileage out of your grey water, which in most households accounts for about 70 per cent of the total water usage. There's a Canadian-designed system

called the Brac that will do just this. Chris Thompson, who sells it through his company. The Install Team (www.theinstallteam.com). has retrofitted his Barrie home with a Brac, and he reports that in the past 12 months, his five-member household saved about 100,000 litres of water. If the pattern holds, it will net him \$300 in savings next year, and if the cost of water continues to rise at the current rate, his Brac system will have paid for itself in five years.

Denis Orendt, executive director of the Ontario Onsite Wastewater Association, confirms that interest in grey water systems is surging in Ontario. Orendt's company, eco-work (www.eco-work.ca), is involved in both residential and larger projects. The CNE, the Royal Botanical Gardens in Hamilton, Trent University and some summer camps, like Camp Kawartha, are installing grey water reuse systems, some of them in conjunction with new rainwater collecting systems that lessen the demand for municipal water even further. And some homebuilders in Oshawa, Newmarket and Owen Sound are preinstalling the Brac, or similar systems, in their new housing.

David Brezer, director of Building and Development with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, told me that the Ontario Building Code, revised in 2006, is the first in Canada to provide specific guidelines for grey water recovery systems. Brezer says the changes have been driven, in part, by a heightened interest in such systems, but also by hopes that the new Code will drive innovation in the field.

Section 8, for instance, lays down the minimum legal requirements for another type of dispersal system, officially called a Class 2 Sewage System, but more commonly known as a "leaching pit." For those like myself, with an older home on an appropriately sized piece of property, this system may be the best choice. If the flow of grey water from your home does not exceed 1,000 litres a day, you can run it outside into a specially constructed pit. From there, the water will leach into the topsoil and be purified by the action of microbes and plants in the soil. The system is both legal and safe, as long as setback and construction guidelines are followed. (Further information at www.ontario.ca/ buildingcode or 416-585-6666.)

Although it's hard to find anything seriously flawed about modern grey water systems, the battle to gain them acceptance is just beginning. Many inspectors are nervous about requests for permits and some municipal officials are even hostile to the idea, apparently believing that a boom in grey water systems would mean reduced water revenue for them. It's a short-sighted view, especially given the increasing pressure on our water and sewage treatment plants. Some cities, like Guelph, have been quicker to recognize the benefits and are offering rebates to residents who install approved systems, something Denis Orendt believes the province and the federal government should take up as well.


Grey water systems aren't the sexiest fare on the eco-menu but they may well be the next big thing. From now on, my mantra is: Grey is the new Green. I will be repeating it often as I continue to shell out to rectify the stupid mistake I made so many years ago. OH

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
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








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# Cherished Memories




"I use whatever helps tell the story," says Adams. In celebrating





# INVEST IN REAL ESTATE?

You may have already considered real estate investment as an option to help secure your financial future or provide extra cash flow for your desired lifestyle. But in times of global economic uncertainty, many Ontarians tend to want to tuck their excess cash under their mattresses until all of the doom and gloom headlines in the mainstream media come to pass.

When it comes to purchasing multiple properties, real estate investors essentially face two major obstacles, says Beverley Brandl, a mortgage broker and owner of the Dominion Lending Centres Integrity Plus Inc. franchise headquartered in Wasaga Beach. "The first obstacle is qualifying for multiple mortgages at the bank and the second is being able to come up with enough money for multiple down payments," says Brandl, who helps real estate investors obtain mortgages. "These two obstacles have a cause and effect impact on each other."

In order to overcome these obstacles and ensure you can continue purchasing real estate, a 'portfolio' approach to financing must be taken, she says.

"The difference between a 'transactional' approach to lending and a 'portfolio' approach is the difference between playing a game of chess at eye level versus looking at the board from above," explains Brandl. "When you're looking at the board at eye level, you can make a move, but you have no idea how your move may impact the other players on the board. If, however, you take a bird's-eye point of view, you will be able to anticipate the cause and effect of your move before you make it," she adds.

Brandl advises real estate investors to work with mortgage professionals or bankers who understand the portfolio approach, which considers investors' goals and long-term plans, to ensure they do not inadvertently handcuff themselves from obtaining future mortgages.

But even when real estate investments are made based on goals and long-term plans, Gonneau suggests investors continue to conduct their own research in order to make educated investment decisions.

"Talk to other real estate investors and join organizations that will offer further insight into your real estate investment needs," Gonneau says, adding that he is a member of the Real Estate Investment Network (REIN).

While REIN can provide market insight and investing tips through years of experience, a local Rental Owners and Managers Society can help with credit checks for potential tenants, and keep investors abreast of changes to the Residential Tenancy Act and other topics/concerns faced by landlords.

Gonneau has chosen to invest in Barrie and Orillia because he knows the areas and is comfortable investing in what he knows.

While Carol Garrett, a Toronto-based real estate investor, owns multiple properties in Ontario – including Hamilton, Orillia, Oshawa and Windsor – she also owns several properties in Edmonton. As a REIN member, she decided to venture into the Edmonton market because it was identified as a REIN 'hot spot.'

Over the past five years, Garrett has become a full-time real estate investor. She currently owns more than 40 properties and prefers to purchase townhome condos because the maintenance – including snow removal, lawn care and window and roof replacement – is taken care of by monthly maintenance fees.

Garrett has created a formula for her real estate investment business that has systems worked out for each aspect within the process – everything from making an offer to securing financing to selecting and managing tenants. She advises that real estate investment must be run like a well-managed business in order to succeed. **OH**



# GRILLED FLANK STEAK WITH ROASTED PEPPER AND ASPARAGUS SALAD

A two-pound flank steak will feed four to six people. Increase the amount of steak and marinade as needed to fit your crowd.

### **FLANK STEAK:**

1 tbsp peppercorns

1 tbsp coriander seeds

2 bay leaves

1/2 cup red wine

2 tbsp olive oil

2 tbsp red wine vinegar

1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce

3 cloves garlic, halved

3 green onions, chopped

3 sprigs each fresh thyme and parsley

2 lb flank steak

1 tsp salt

### **SALAD**

3 sweet peppers

(red, orange, yellow or mixed)

12 spears asparagus

8 cups mixed baby salad greens

Extra-virgin olive oil

White balsamic or white wine vinegar

Sea salt

Fresh ground pepper

Flank steak is a long lean muscle from the belly side of the cow and has some really good things going for it. As far as steaks go, they are relatively inexpensive, so you can impress guests with a fancy steak dinner without breaking the bank. Because it's a somewhat tougher cut of meat than tenderloin or rib cuts, it stands up well to marinades. This makes it great for entertaining because you can marinate the steak earlier in the day or the night before, freeing up time to cut flowers, mow the lawn or catch up on summer reading in the hammock before guests arrive.

Flank steak is also fast cooking, taking only about six minutes to grill to medium-rare. With flank steak, rarer is better. A well-done flank steak tends to be on the chewy side.

And finally, the flank steak is an incredibly versatile cut. Sliced flank steak makes a mean sandwich filler or salad topper. And the raw meat, thinly sliced across the grain, makes great beginnings for a beef stir-fry. Like any cut of beef, flank steak takes well to many flavours, so feel free to experiment. A French-inspired marinade with red wine and lots of herbs is great for entertaining (see recipe below), but an Asian-inspired marinade with soy sauce, chiles and rice vinegar or a Mexican-inspired marinade with the fresh flavours of lime, chiles and coriander will be great too!

Any way you slice it, flank steak is the ultimate summer entertaining steak. So, call your friends and fire up the grill. Summer's here and it's time to celebrate.

### **FLANK STEAK:**

- In small skillet, toast peppercorns, coriander seeds and bay leaves over high heat, shaking pan often, until toasted and fragrant, about 2 minutes. Transfer toasted ingredients to cutting board; lightly crush with bottom of heavy saucepan. Transfer to 13 by 9-inch glass baking dish. Whisk in wine, oil, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce, garlic, green onions, thyme and parsley.
- Poke steak all over with fork and place in marinade. Turn steak to coat both sides; cover and refrigerate for at least four hours or up to 24 hours. Remove steak and marinade from fridge one hour before grilling to come to room temperature.
- Transfer marinade to small saucepan. Bring to boil, boil for one minute; set aside.
- Preheat grill to medium-high. Sprinkle steak all over with salt. Grill steak, turning once and basting with reserved marinade, for six to eight minutes for medium-rare.
- Slice steak thinly across the grain to serve.

### SALAD:

- Grill peppers until skins are blistered and blackened. Transfer to bowl; cover and let stand for 10 minutes. Peel off skins; remove seeds and slice.
- Grill asparagus on piece of foil paper or using grill basket until tender-crisp, about three mintues. Cut into thirds.
- In salad bowl, toss together peppers, asparagus and salad greens. Toss with oil, vinegar, salt and pepper to taste. Serve with steak.

OUR HOMES took a tired, weather-beaten, wooden patio table and gave it new life with old plates, bowls and tiles.

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### WHAT YOU'LL NEED

We found almost everything at the local re-use store

- Old plates, ceramic bowls and tiles
- Safety glasses and gloves
- Hammer
- Ceramic tile glue
- ullet Grout
- Floater
- Sponges
- Sealant (a must for an outdoor table)

**HINT:** Select a colour scheme and a basic design. Make sure you have enough of one mosaic colour to fill in the desired area.

### **GETTING STARTED**

Wrap plates and tiles in an old tea-towel or cloth bag. Place them in a shallow plastic vessel or cardboard box. Put on your safety glasses and smash the plates and tiles with a hammer.

Separate the mosaïc pieces by colour. Make sure you have enough pieces to complete your design.

**HINT:** We used the lips of the plates along the edges of the entire table.

### TIME TO GLUE

Cover your starting point with an ample amount of ceramic tile glue and start placing your mosaïc pieces. You may have to apply glue directly to each piece. The thickness of each piece may vary, which adds interest to your table. Place pieces relatively close together. You can fill in the gaps with smaller pieces later. Continue to work in segments until the surface is filled and your design is complete.

Allow 24 hours for the glue to dry.

### TIME TO GROUT

This is a two-person job. One person applies the grout with a grout floater while the other cleans each tile as you go along. Clean the tiles as best you can, otherwise the grout will dry and you will spend hours scrubbing and digging them out.


Allow 24 hours for the grout to dry.

### **CLEAN AND SEAL**

Once the grout is dry and the tiles are clean, it's time to apply a sealant. We used Circa  $1850 \, \text{Nu-Lustre} \, 55 - a$  thick, high gloss clear epoxy finish. One coat of this product equals up to  $55 \, \text{coats}$  of varnish. Follow the directions carefully. You can find this product and others at the hardware store.

**HINT:** We used a brush to apply the epoxy sealant. Once dry, it looks incredible. **OH**


