


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
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FABRICS 101

Interior Designer **Dolores Pian** shares her idea



We interact with fabrics more in our day-to-day lives than any other material in our homes. They must wear well, look fantastic and be reasonably priced.

Although fabrics may appear on walls, seating, carpets and household textiles such as bedding and towels, it's upholstery and window coverings that we put the most demand on in the home. Knowing the basics about textiles will help you invest in your fabrics wisely.

LABELLING

Always read the label and ask questions. All textile products should have a label that commonly contains the following information:

Fibre Content - listed in order of the highest fibre content first

Country of Origin Product Details - type, size and style

Retailer's Logo and **Product Number** Barcodes

Care Labels – how to look after your product to keep it looking good

Abrasion Resistance - the ability of a fabric to resist surface wear caused by rubbing

Other Information - ratings for safety, flammability. classifications of finishes

Finishes – aesthetic and performance functions

FINISHES

A finish may not be apparent to the naked eye but it is there. And they vary with the end use. Fabric finishes are used to improve the fabric in some way. This could be to:

Improve the appearance Change the texture Improve the feel Improve how it drapes (hangs) Improve functional qualities and durability such as water-, stain- and soil-repellence, carefree finishing, wrinkle resistance and shrinkage control.

The average interior design fabric is treated with six finishes in order to be saleable.

HEALTH & WELL-BEING

Another important consideration for fabric selection is your sensitivity to materials and finishes. Manufacturers understand this environmental concern and will tell you what their IAQ (indoor air quality) rating is.

Most materials off-gas. After installing furniture, drapes and carpeting, it's important to open your home to fresh air to dissipate possible fumes. This allows the volatile organic compounds (VOCs) to dissipate.

UPHOLSTERY (AKA SEATING)

The fabrics that we sit on are subjected to a great deal of stress.







Kids, pets and couch potatoes seem to be the most demanding creatures on these fabrics.

Homeowners are now asking for commercial abrasion and durability ratings such as 30,000 double rubs to 50,000 double rubs, or more, for their sofas. The Wysenbeek method, a standard of rubbing fabric back and forth on itself, is used to evaluate a fabric's strength.

If your label doesn't contain durability information, then use other tried and true methods such as the "key test" or the "diamond ring test." On a sample fabric, rub a key or ring back and forth across the fabric to see if it starts to wear, makes a mark, shifts or if its threads pull easily. If so, then it is not suitable for upholstery applications.

Luckily, Robert Allen Design and other reputable textile suppliers have beautiful

performance fabrics that are stylish. They are easy to clean, highly repellant to stains and spills, and reduce or eliminate the need for chemical cleaners. You'll find them as standard fabric offerings for various seating manufacturers.



Sunbrella, used for outdoor seating, wears like iron. Manufacturers of beds for pets use Sunbrella for its virtually indestructible, yet pleasing, properties.

WINDOW COVERINGS (AKA DRAPERY)



Draperies enhance the appearance of windows or architecture, provide privacy, control light and sound and can provide a pleasing view.

Although not subject to as much stress as a sofa, they still have performance standards to consider.

Remember that fabrics, as well as other materials, can fade in direct sunlight - even synthetics.

Natural fabrics will fade the fastest. If you have direct southern or western exposure on the top floor of a penthouse with air conditioning – yes, your drapes will still fade. This is the law of nature and physics.



FABRIC'S FUTURE

What's in store for fabric? Drapes that contain solar cells, or perhaps seating fabric that can monitor your health or allow you to communicate with your "intelligent" devices? The possibilities are endless with textiles. Embrace the fabrics that surround you. Choose wisely. Choose well. on

Contemporary style courses naturally through my Scandinavian veins; its purity of form makes my heart sing. I never tire of clean lines and elegance.

But applying a modern home's style to its landscape may seem a step taken too far. The words "nature in a straightjacket" come to mind. But Mother Nature need not be pummeled into submission to be considered modern. I assure you, gardens can be contemporary and at the same time connected to the natural world.


Boiled down to its most basic beginnings, the term "modern design" originates from the modern arts movement's influence on design in general, but it also encompasses many ambiguous representations, making it difficult to define. Contemporary, mid-century and Scandistyle, just to name a few, all seem to fall under the modernist umbrella. Fortunately, most of what applies to interior design also applies to exterior design and for simplicity's sake, I will focus on the central themes common to these style terms rather than their finer points.


MATERIAL

A modern garden design, you might think, would run contrary to centuries-old landscape design basics, yet the same rudimentary



elements hold true. The patio, shade structure and fencing are all still part of the modern backyard plan, but the materials have been refreshed. Instead of flagstone, the patio is simple concrete, and the arbour is made of metal. Terracotta pots are replaced by large, geometric, fibreglass planters. Horizontal fencing is used in place of the popsicle-stick standard and free form pools are swapped for rectangular shapes. Continued on page 24

SOFTENING

With its strong visual lines, grids and graphic elements, a modern backyard can read cold and lifeless without the necessary softening provided by plants. It is through the vegetation that the modern landscape becomes a relaxing and calming retreat, by providing a vital connection with nature at home.

IUXTAPOSITION

Visually, plant life delivers a natural juxtaposition to boxy shapes and smooth textures. No matter how well designed a contemporary space is, all those rectangles can come across as too sterile. Through strategic block plantings (meaning groupings of perhaps fives, nines, and 15s and not an assembly of 105 hosta plants), the garden space can still relate to the geometric planes of the house and hardscape. Yet, it is the randomness of vegetation that breaks up those same linear lines and makes all the difference. These plantings need not be restricted to ground covers and clump-forming grasses. From large,

airy perennials to architectural shrubbery, any plant material can be executed in a modern way to break up the sparseness.

COMPOSITION

Even trees have a home here and serve a critical design purpose where they act as essential living and growing focal points. Eye-catching colour schemes fit in effortlessly as part of contemporary compositions, thus there is no need to shy away from flamboyant foliage or blossoms. Think back to the groovy 60s. Yes, modern yards can even be lush! By contrast, plush gardens only enhance beautifully straight lines and scales, striking the perfect balance.

CONNECTION

A frequent criticism of modern homes and landscapes is their disconnection from the traditional neighbourhoods they're so often found in today. By incorporating natural elements indigenous to the area, such as plants, stone and wood, the modern space feels warm, interconnected even, when placed


within a traditional locale. I call this style classic modern and believe these natural materials contribute a timeless appeal. Even traditional homes can be moved toward the modern scale and become transitional where flair from the past fuses with style-forward colours and design.

ESTABLISHING

Modern or not, sadly landscaping is often at the very bottom of the home improvements wish list and many lonely backyards never realize their full potential. Me? When I move into a new home I take care of the outdoor overhaul first and afterwards get to work on the interior. It takes years for trees to gain heft and a garden to come into its own, so while I plug away at the interior, the outdoor space just keeps getting better.















THYME HONEY **SYRUP**

Using honey in cocktails is a fantastic way to add sweetness and depth of flavour. But first, we need to make it into a dissolvable syrup.

The amount of honey you use will depend on the ratio you prefer. A 1:1 ratio is perfect for a mild syrup, but I prefer a ratio of 2:1 - two parts honey to one part water - for a sweeter result.

INGREDIENTS

½ cup honey 1/4 cup water

1 sprig of thyme

DIRECTIONS

- In a small saucepan combine ½ cup honey, ¼ cup water and a sprig of thyme.
- Bring to a simmer until honey dissolves.
- Take off heat and let cool. The thyme will begin to infuse into the syrup.
- Once cooled, strain thyme out of syrup.
- The syrup will keep for two weeks in the fridge.

THYME HONEY **GRAPEFRUIT COCKTAIL**

INGREDIENTS

Juice of 1 fresh grapefruit

½ ounce thyme-honey syrup 1 ounce gin

1 thyme sprig for garnish

DIRECTIONS

- Place ice in a cocktail shaker and combine all ingredients.
- Shake and strain over ice.
- Garnish with fresh thyme and



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THE NEW MUST-HAVE: MUTED COLOURS

These days, many people crave a little colour in their interiors,

a desire that traditional neutrals like white, beige and grey just don't satisfy.

Muted colours stood idly by for years, but lately they've been taking their place on centre stage, as the new must-have for designers and homeowners alike. Their subtle depth deserves a little attention, so in this issue, I'm answering some questions about what makes a true muted colour, how to use them, and why they might be your new favourite too. All paint colours by Benjamin Moore.

OWHAT IS A MUTED COLOUR?

When you add white, black or grey to a pure hue, you get a softer version of the colour. Although people use the word "shade" in other ways, a shade is technically a hue with black added, creating a darker and moodier version. Adding white makes a "tint," and adding grey produces a "tone." Perfectly muted "tones" are usually the most subtle and liveable, as they aren't too dark, too light, or too saturated.

OWHY CHOOSE MUTED COLOURS?

They're smart semi-neutrals.


Toned-down colours carry neutral grey in them, making them truly "semi-neutral," and for this reason they can still coordinate easily with many other accent colours. Muted options like dusky blues, oceanic greens, blush pinks, and rosé purples enrich your colour palette without overloading the senses. They make great paint selections for a quick update, because they can easily coordinate with existing accent hues in upholstery or art that you won't be replacing.

TRY: For a sophisticated green-grey, Knoxville Gray (HC-160). For an easy-to-work-with red, Dinner Party (AF-300). For a soft sky blue, Sea Star (2123-30).

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They look modern in a matte paint finish. Muted colours are often associated with traditional design, being especially prevalent in historical homes. However, this doesn't mean they can't be put to beautiful use in a contemporary space: choosing a matte paint finish (instead of the common eggshell or semi-gloss) gives muted wall colours a perfect modern twist. Use muted matte walls with traditional furnishings, modern ones, or even better - both, to tie the whole room together.

TRY: For a charming yellow, Amulet (AF-365). For a commanding navy, Gentleman's Gray (2062-20).

They work well together. Bold colours are made to make a statement. Neutrals are total wallflowers, letting the bold accents be the star. Muted hues, however, are made to work together, sharing the spotlight without fighting, and even making each other better. Because the undertones in muted colours are subtle or even a little hidden, they shine the most when they are offset by a contrasting hue. This means you can pair very different muted colours, even complete opposites, and watch them come alive without risking a total overload.

TRY: Pair the murky and mysterious Salamander (2050-10) or the velvety Dark Burgundy (2075-10) with a go-anywhere blush pink, Porcelain (2113-60).



WHERE CAN I ADD MUTED COLOURS?

Walls are a great home for a muted colour, but there are many other ways to use them to stunning effect.

Wphofstery: Be bold and try a complex, muted hue for a sofa or dining chair, rather than a typical pure neutral. Grey may be safe, but a sumptuous cabernet red is inspirational, like the Viansa Velvet Sofa by Safavieh Couture.





Pillows: Mix-matched pillows, like these from Eastern Accents, add tons of personality. Pile up toss cushions in various subtle-but-contrasting hues and you can add lots of life to your colour palette.

Rugs: Traditional rugs in worldly patterns (like the Kashan Rug by Weavers Art) usually contain a range of inky shades. Layer such a carpet into a modern space to add immediate depth, or use one to pull colours for other pieces.



Cabinets: Who says cabinetry has to be either white or wood? Have cabinets sprayed an interesting shade, giving new life to your kitchen. I used Gentleman's Gray (2062-20) for my own kitchen cabinets, and it makes my brass accents and steel appliances sing. on







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
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

Serve piping hot with fresh fruit, or frozen yogurt for dessert, or add a dollop of ricotta cheese with slices of banana and drizzle with maple syrup for a hearty breakfast. For lunch or dinner, smear them with hummus or bean spread and top with thinly sliced carrot, cucumber, cabbage and red onion. Offer them alongside a salad for dinner. For a totally leftover lunch, place a spoonful of leftover chicken or fish in the centre, roll up and eat like a burrito.

No skillet or frying pan is large enough to grill pancakes for everyone at the same time, so for easy serving, cook pancakes up to 2 hours ahead of time and stack in fours on a baking sheet with a square of parchment paper between each pancake. Warm in an oven set to 350°F for 5 minutes or until warm.

INGREDIENTS

(Makes 6 to 8 pancakes)

½ cup drained ricotta or cottage cheese

1 apple, shredded

2 large eggs, lightly beaten

2 Tbsp maple syrup or honey

1 tsp vanilla extract

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup whole wheat or all-purpose flour

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp salt

1 to 2 Tbsp extra-virgin olive or coconut oil

1 cup blackberries or blueberries

DIRECTIONS

- In a medium bowl, combine cheese, apple, eggs, maple syrup and vanilla.
 Whisk with a fork until well mixed.
- In a separate, large bowl, combine flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt.
 Pour cheese mixture into flour mixture and whisk with a fork just until mixed.
 Do not over mix.
- Lightly oil a griddle or large skillet and heat over medium-high heat. Scoop the batter using a ¼ cup measure (for
- small cakes) or a ½ cup measure (for medium cakes) and scrape onto the hot griddle, spreading each pancake to about ½-inch thickness. Cook for 2 minutes or until the uncooked side is golden and large bubbles form. Flip and cook on the remaining side for 2 minutes or until lightly browned.
- Serve on heated plates and garnish with a spoonful of blackberries or blueberries **oh**



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
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
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And somehow, that picture gets forgotten a little over time. Life, financial responsibilities, styles... everything can change if you're not careful.

Stepping in the front door of their newly constructed home feels like walking into a spa getaway. The soothing, calm grey walls and floor-to-ceiling stone fireplace (House Rules Design Shop) give the impression of artless ease and welcome; as though the Holland family is always waiting for family to drop in with a smile, a hug and a cup of tea. Which is exactly what Julie had in mind when she and Jeff chose to build on the river where she grew up, a hometown girl from Durham.

The two met in Jeff's hometown of Ottawa in their 20s, living there for the first six years of their relationship. Once they decided to settle down and have a family, their thoughts turned to the Grey-Bruce area, where, as Jeff notes, "everyone is always nice, always genuinely happy to see you. A quick trip to the bank feels like a social outing."

The couple built their first home in Hanover, and discovered they loved the process of working with a builder to individualize their space. But that first home didn't feel like a perfect fit. Jeff lovingly called their first experience with building a home themselves a "guinea pig" project, and admits, "we had no idea what we were doing, but we learned a lot."

When the Hollands, who have three children under six, decided to buy a piece of property along the winding Saugeen River in 2015, their first experience building provided a lot of information about what they wanted in a forever home. Continued on page 40

They bought the land from **Don Tremble**, owner of Candue Homes. As they moved towards beginning construction the following spring, the couple worked closely with Don and the design firm he recommended to the couple, Darryl Regimbal of DR Designs, to customize their bungalow. Jeff says they must have revised their plans at least 13 times with Darryl and Don, but the end result was worth it. Both Julie and Jeff had their own vision of what was important to them. 






When Jeff and Julie were working on their plans for their home, really considering what they wanted, it all came down to this: they wanted a place where their children would be comfortable for years to come. Where family and friends would always feel welcome to come sit and watch the river any season of the year.

They both got the home they wanted as kids. What more can you ask for? on

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
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Are millennials doomed to live in their parents' basements? The forecast for affordable housing for the cohort isn't great. In fact, real estate agents suggest millennials looking for a first-time property should keep driving out of the city until they qualify for a mortgage.

"From 10 years ago, prices have doubled," says Keith Marshall, a Kitchener-Waterloo sales representative for TheRedPin Brokerage. "Average home prices (freehold townhouses) today in tech-hub Waterloo are about \$370,000 - 10 years ago they were probably selling for about \$200,000."

The situation is pretty much the same across the country, where first-time buyers between the ages of 18 to 35 are expected to spend an average of \$350,000, according to a BMO Millennial Home-Buyer Report released in 2016. Almost one third (29 per cent) of those surveyed by BMO don't think they'll ever be able to afford a home.

House prices in British Columbia, the Prairies, Quebec and Ontario are out of most millennials' reach, while prices in Atlantic Canada remain below the national average at \$253,990, says a housing survey for the first quarter of 2016 by Royal LePage.

Yet, according to the latest RBC Home Ownership Poll, 43 per cent of 18 to 24 year olds expressed that they intended to purchase a home in the next two years, up from 34 per cent in 2015.

So what are some fallback options? Marshall suggests downtown condos, housing developments in the suburbs, or collaborative buying.

FAMILY FINANCIAL SUPPORT

RBC found young buyers can consider purchasing a home with a family member or with a friend. "Parents of children in their 20s to 30s have a lot of equity built up in their homes, and they can take some finances from there and put it towards their children's properties," says Marshall.

Parents of Canadian millennials have benefited from skyrocketing home prices over the last decade and can pass down the wealth to children.

"We did 40 transactions this year, and with the exception of two, everyone under the age of 40 had help from mom and dad or grandparents for a down payment," says Duncan Harvey, partner in Harvey & McCreery RE/MAX Aboutowne Realty Corp. brokerage in Oakville.

Millennial couple Frank Flitton and Alice

Tsay are in that boat.

"The rate at which the housing market is growing in price is not something that reflects a millennial's salary," says Tsay.

Ottawa public opinion firm Abacus Data says only about 50 per cent of those aged 25 and older have found full-time jobs in their field, and that's led to a delay in major life events, including buying a home.

Alternatively, Tsay would have waited, too, if her parents hadn't offered to lend a hand. To Flitton, it made sense to take help, instead of waiting to be priced out of the market.

And they believe in starting small with a bungalow priced between \$350,000 and \$400,000; there's room to grow if you have kids, says Tsay.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING SHORTAGE

In Ontario, rising housing prices can be attributed to improper land-use development policies, says Frank Clayton, senior research fellow at the Centre for Urban Research and Land Development at Ryerson University.

"There's a shortage of service land, therefore, we're not building, so supply can't grow to accommodate demand. But that also protects people's house prices from going down," he says.

The province's environmentalist policy directs building fewer single houses and more apartments, Clayton says. But a crucial element is missing: a strong transit structure.

Until that shortcoming is met, the deficiency is leading all buyers to bid higher for preferred housing.

It's a trend realtor Harvey has witnessed among his Oakville clients.

"Every house we sold in 2016 was over asked," he says. "Depending on the market you're buying in, the over-ask could be anywhere from five per cent to 30 per cent above the listed price."

Clayton's research at Ryerson shows there's little sign preference is shifting from houses to apartments, and he recommends a way out of the conundrum: encouraging municipalities to re-designate old or underused industrial lands in built-up areas to create residences, be it smaller lots or townhouses.

And that, he says, is the only way to keep prices from blowing up further and to make houses more affordable for the upcoming generation. on

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

This home was designed and built by Bryan to grasp in-demand concepts and showcase structure and style that is so often seen in his architectural designs and floor plans.

Bryan's 3,010 sq. ft. walkout was built true to form. The home features signature designs synonymous with the builder's brand: a covered deck, high ceilings and a maintenance free, man-made stone exterior. The grey tones of the stone are complemented by the charcoal roof and punctuated by black windows (Georgian Bay Window & Door).

Although open-concept is on-trend and the "most popular way to go," says Bryan, he opted for a semi-open-concept design by choice. The vaulted ceilings provide an expansive, open feeling while interior columns simultaneously provide structure and definition to the space. "I wanted to highlight different things in this house. Being a builder, you always have people wanting to see your home, so you want to display certain features."

A 12-foot ceiling with a 16-foot peak in the living room deserves a second glance, as the window wall overlooking a forest out back demands



all attention. "I wanted to capture the light from the southern exposure in the winter as the sun comes through," he says. "And the leaves on the trees that surround the property help keep it cooler in the summer." Deer, rabbits and even a bear have been spotted near the cul-de-sac, where he has designed and built five homes for his neighbours. The community

showcases high cabinets (Kreller Kitchens Ltd.) that are accented with lighting from top to bottom. Bryan says he wanted his kitchen "pushed back a bit." The granite counters on the kitchen table and island were carefully selected to match the custom stain of the hardwood flooring that flows throughout the home (South Bruce **Flooring**). A timeless off-white painted cabinet was selected to complement the darker stain, creating a popular two-tone kitchen. Bryan explains that although under-cabinet lighting is now a standard request in his homes, the accent lighting at the top of the cabinets is an




Doors off the kitchen conveniently open to the covered deck that features a sound system, pot lights and ceiling fan. Aluminum railings lead down steps to a hot tub (Water & Wellness), which overlooks the backyard landscape and fire pit (Backyard Boys Landscape Construction Inc.). Bryan says the number-one benefit of having a covered deck is that you're protected from the elements, as is your outdoor furniture. "If you want to be in the shade you can be in the shade," he says. "If you want some sun, you can extend your deck out past the covered roof." The yard is pristinely finished with plants and trees supplied by Everest Nurseries. The Backyard Boys installed sod and armour stone.

A coffered ceiling is the focal point in the dining room, which is situated near the front entrance of the home. Although the entrance faces the street, it feels secluded behind frosted chinchilla glass and the mature trees that surround the property can produce dancing shadows and provide a calming effect.


Moving to the west side of the home, where the principal bedroom and en suite are situated, a soak in the tub offers a grand view of the forest. The executive glass-tiled shower with granite accents adds yet another level of detail.

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


From formal dining to a low-key patio party, Bryan's home was built to entertain - and the lower level is no exception. Much more than a "man cave," the walk-out basement is highlighted by large windows and a subtle green hue that was carefully selected to match the felt top of the pool table (**Double D Company**), which is a definite focal point. Bryan calls it "a first class living space" that he always wanted and adds that "with the large windows, you feel like you're upstairs." He designed the lower level with TJI floor joists to span larger distances so that beams, posts, and ductwork were kept out of the main room, allowing for a more open feeling. The modern space is considered "smart" as his entertainment and security features (Balaklava Audio and Saugeen **Security Inc.**) are connected to a wallmounted control panel. The basement also includes an office, bedroom, washroom, utility space and a room for a home theatre.

Pot lights lead the way to a granite bar that includes a sink, dishwasher and microwave and is accented by stools from **Smitty's Fine Furniture** that were purchased raw and stained to match the bar. "I went to great extents to try and keep things in the same colour family," Bryan says. He does admit that











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




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

the sun changes the hue of the room, and jokes that the pool table colour inspiration is nearly impossible to recreate in different lighting conditions. Bryan recently had a large coffee table custom-made out of hardwood to match the cabinetry and furniture throughout the lower level. The tile flooring in the basement includes in-floor heating by **Sprung Heating Sheet Metal & Pump Service**. The large sofa provides a comfortable retreat to watch TV or cosy up by the fireplace (**Matt's Masonry** and **Carson Supply**), which features the same stone as the home's exterior.

Although there are no window coverings in the basement, the forest that hugs the half-acre lot offers warm comfort. In the summer months, it also provides a secluded environment for the toss of a horseshoe or relaxing by the outdoor fire pit. For Bryan Snyder, his home offers the best of both worlds: the perfect place to escape and all the amenities of a small town.

When asked what he's learned from his 29 years of building experience, Bryan says "it's most important to stand by the quality of your product and have people happy with their homes." OH



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

HOME ON THE ROAD

Small is beautiful. Put a couple of wheels under it and small becomes cute and mobile.

It's a successful formula manufacturers are blending to serve a growing market for tiny camping trailers. As empty-nest baby boomers downsize their homes and trade their minivans for smaller, more fuel-efficient rides, they're also exploring how to unleash their inner nomad without breaking the bank or spreading their carbon footprint.

Andy Demerling identified this niche market during more than 10 years of renting, servicing and repairing recreational vehicles and




campers in Muskoka. "We found the market wasn't being serviced," says Demerling, a heavy duty mechanic who owns A&A RV in Muskoka. "There are a lot of people who really enjoy camping, but they're getting older and tents are not what they want. They want a camper," he says. Many baby boomers and retirees want an inexpensive way to travel. They

own small cars that can't tow a big trailer. With today's high cost of fuel, Demerling supplies small campers that are less expensive to haul.

He began importing tiny American-made camping trailers, large enough to comfortably sleep two adults, but sufficiently compact and light to be towed with cars as small as a Honda Fit, Volkswagen Beetle or Mini Cooper. "These can be towed economically behind a four-cylinder car," says Demerling. The response from customers was so encouraging he began manufacturing his own line of little camping trailers, named WeeGo, in a former automotive parts plant in Bracebridge. Continued on page 86

Demerling furnishes his trailers with queen-size mattresses, a galley with counter storage, sink and propane stove, as well as plenty of cupboard space. The campers come equipped with locking, screened, side entry doors, screened windows and a roof fan. Interiors and cabinetry are finished in maple. Safety equipment includes a fire extinguisher, smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector. "We can customize them to order," he says. "We do a basic layout. If people want changes we can do them. We have a couple right now we're pricing out with different colours - one with bigger tires, air conditioning."

He builds the trailer frames and sidewalls in Bracebridge. Sidewalls are three-quarter-inch plywood, sheathed in aluminum. Axle suspensions are sourced in Whitby and mattresses are made in Ontario Windows and some power converter centres are imported from the United States. "We deal with as many local Canadian companies as we can," says the maker.

His customers have wheeled his little rigs as far as California, Alaska and Newfoundland. "We've had them all over," says Demerling. He estimates it may take an extra litre or two of fuel per 100 kilometres to tow the compact trailers he sells and rents. Some customers, he says, don't even notice a difference in mileage.

The little rigs carry an air of nostalgia. They grew popular after the Second World War when hobbyists built their own, using surplus military equipment and materials, such as wheels from old army Jeeps and metal from the wings of decommissioned bombers. Their popularity revived about 15 years ago, when rising fuel prices began



making the RV lifestyle more costly. Campers started staying closer to home. According to the Recreational Vehicle Industry Association, RV owners were spending more time in campgrounds and less on the road in order to save fuel. "The high gas prices and the fact that our camper trailer can be towed by nearly any vehicle with a hitch actually helps us sell trailers," general manager Joe Kicos said in describing the success of Little Guy Worldwide. The company began building its Teardrop Camper Trailers in Elkhart, Indiana in 2002. Within two years it was making three or four a day and now has thousands of Little Guys on the road in 17 different models.

While the American campers are popular in Canada, the drop in the value of the Canadian dollar has made them more expensive. Over the past five years, the Canadian dollar has dropped by more than 30 cents against the U.S. currency. That prompted Demerling to look at building his own line of campers. His wife, Adrienne, encouraged him.



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


"We felt that it's time for manufacturing to get going again

in Canada," he says. "If we can build it into a larger company, we will. If we can start employing people here - that's what it's about. He's trademarking his company name

and working to obtain a vehicle identification number (VIN), a code that identifies a product's country of origin, manufacturer, model year and serial number. Often called a vehicle's fingerprint, the VIN, can make financing a camper purchase easier. "It's been a rough start, but it's been interesting. It's been fun," he says. on





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



Step 1: Apply a light coat of primer to the wood surfaces and allow to dry.

Step \mathcal{V} : Apply 2 coats of Painter's Touch in Gloss Ocean Mist and allow to dry thoroughly as per directions on can.

Step 3: To add a touch of sparkle, use a hole punch to cut out dots from a sheet of glitter adhesive paper and apply them randomly to the top of the hanger.


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
