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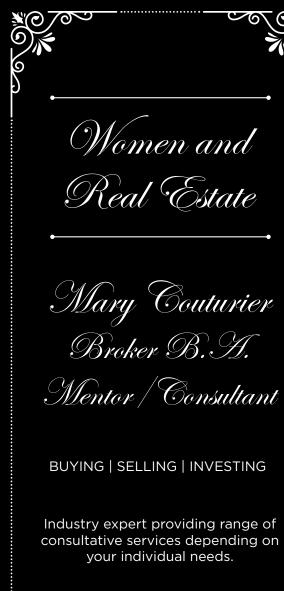


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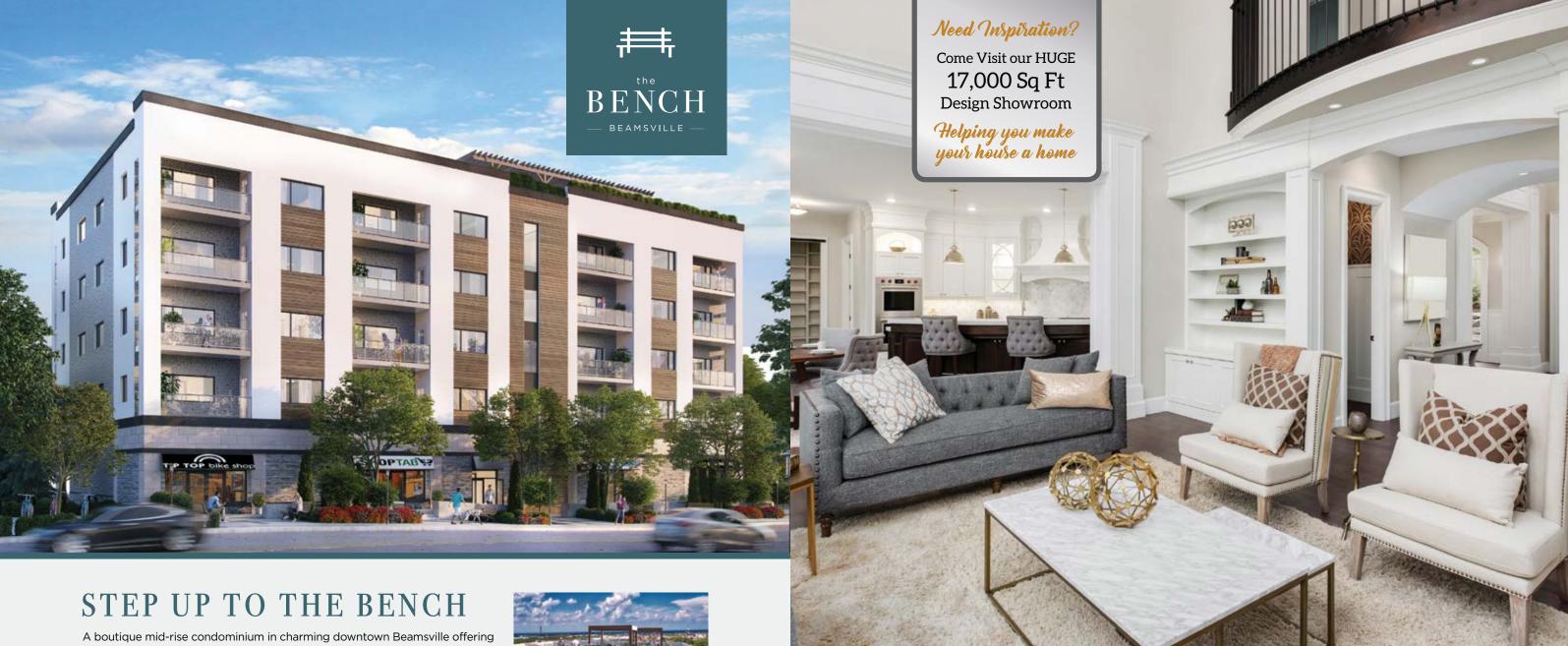


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#### editor's note

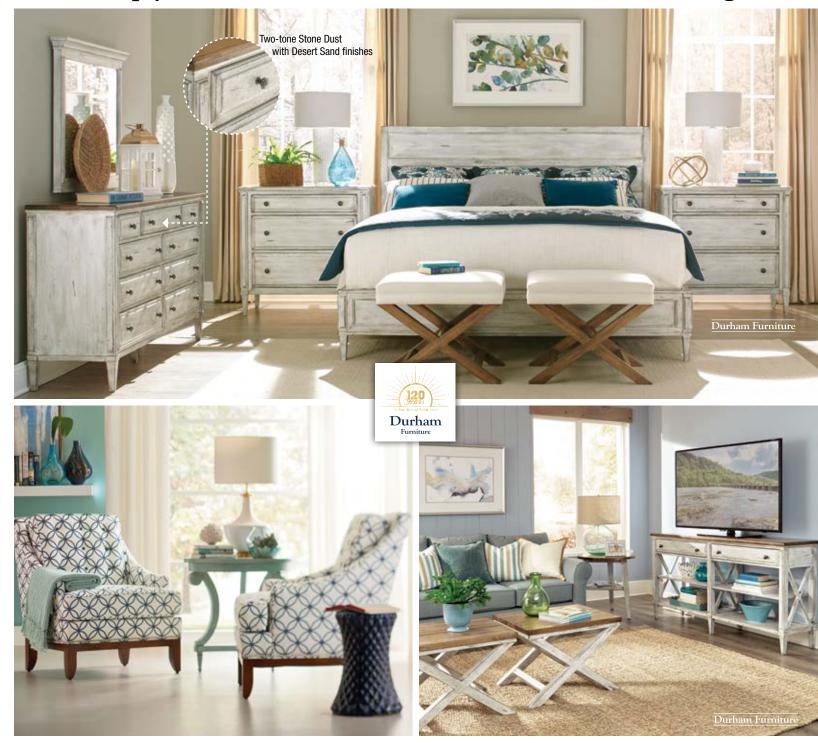

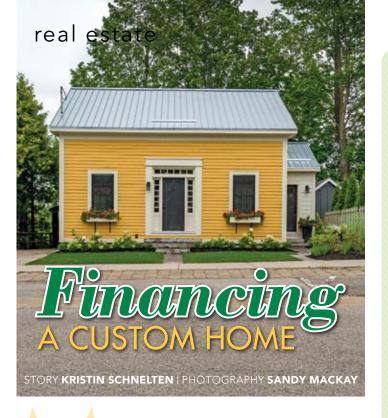






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My husband and I spent years making rough sketches of our dream home, bookmarking photos, discussing features we admired in other houses, visiting building lots. We had a fairly specific idea of our wants and needs, but the reality of building a custom home seemed out of reach.

When a cottage we purchased as an investment proved structurally unsound, our plans changed and we found ourselves digging through our stack of magazine clippings and feverishly researching details. The cottage had to come down. In its place we'd build the custom home we always wanted.

While the ins and outs of design decisions and project management would come easily to us, financing a home build was utterly perplexing. With the mortgage we had in place for the cottage, and modest savings, how could we fund the needed construction? Would a lender approve us, a couple with no prior homebuilding experience, to be the general contractor of our own construction?

We were fortunate enough to enlist the help of Treena French, mortgage specialist with RBC, our everyday bank, who answered our questions, quelled our fears and walked us through each step (and there are many).

Yes, we could act as general contractors, as we had gathered and presented detailed cost estimates and drawings. Yes, our financials were sufficient for approval of our small home build. But just how would our construction mortgage operate?

Ours was the most common type, a construction draw mortgage. The first draw was enough to replace our original mortgage and gave us sufficient funds to begin the building process. Then, as work progressed on the house, we made three further draws against our final mortgage amount. Each time we reached a milestone in construction, we contacted Treena, who set the process in motion for the next draw.

That draw process was straightforward. An independent appraiser stopped by to evaluate the percentage of completion, and his report indicated that number to the bank, who released the next set of funds.

Those funds could take anywhere from days to weeks to arrive, during which time contractors required payment. In addition, each draw had its own holdback – a percentage of the funds that are held

## CONSTRUCTION MORTGAGES AT-A-GLANCE

#### COMPLETION

A completion mortgage is one in which the builder receives all funds only after the home is complete – therefore all costs for the build are shouldered by the builder during the construction process. These types of mortgages are more common for homes with fewer customizations, as most lenders require construction to be complete within 120 days in order to lock in your interest rate.

With a completion mortgage, your application is approved before building commences. But, as the mortgage will not be registered in your name until completion, your financial position must remain unchanged during this period. A change in employment, a new car purchase, additional loan, etc., could jeopardize the mortgage of your home.

#### DRAW

With a draw mortgage, your mortgage is registered before the building process begins. Your builder receives payment throughout the build, via periodic draws on the final mortgage amount. The interest rate is locked in from the initial draw of funds, and you hold the title.

Each time a draw is initiated, an appraiser assesses the progress of the build, and funds are released through a lawyer. As a result of these steps, additional fees can be associated with a draw mortgage. In some cases, a larger down payment may be required up front to purchase land for the project, as well.

Your mortgage specialist will walk you through the details of both options, and help you choose the right plan to suit your needs.

by lawyers until project completion. For these circumstances, we were able to utilize our existing line of credit, which was required for the construction mortgage's approval.

If our line of credit had not been sufficient, or if we were otherwise not a good fit with our bank, where could we have turned for our mortgage? I contacted Gerard Buckley of Mortgage Wellness to gain some insight.

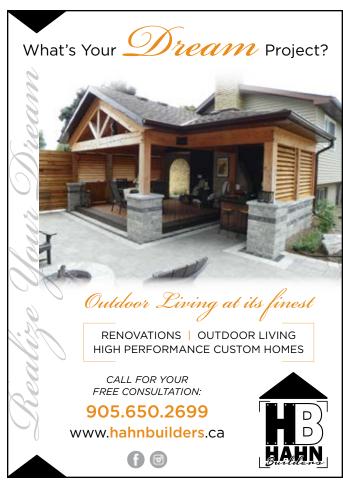
As an independent mortgage agent, Gerard works to match the objectives of his clients with the strengths of his various lenders. In the case of an insufficient line of credit, the right fit might be a lender who offers far more than three or four draws throughout the construction process – perhaps on the order of 25 or 30. Buckley describes these draws as buckets, noting, "Thirty buckets is less precise and gives more flexibility to the homebuilder."

In our case, four buckets was exactly what we required. We hit no snags on the way, only asked a handful of needless questions of our lender, and somehow finished on budget.

I often mention, and speak highly, of the team who built our custom home – the tradespeople who spent weeks and months drilling, sawing and painting. But, although she was never on site, one of the most important players was Treena, our lender. Having an accessible, supportive mortgage specialist was crucial to the success of our build, and we found that finding someone we could trust and with whom we had a comfortable rapport was just as important as choosing tradespeople. **OH**

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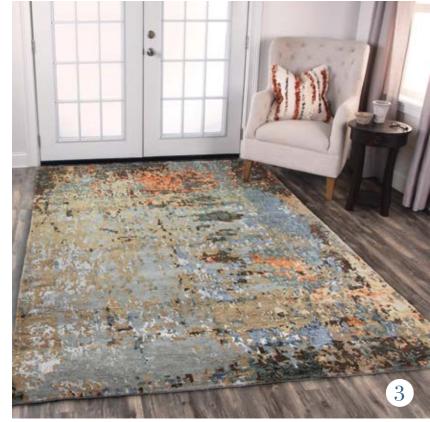

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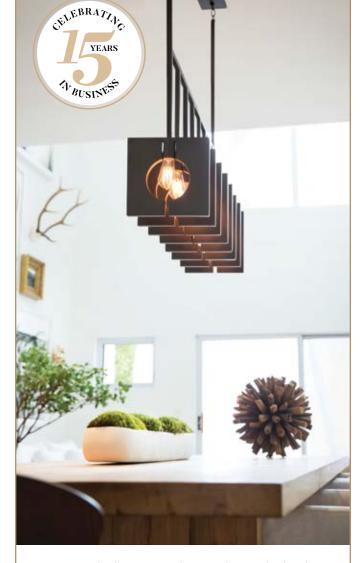
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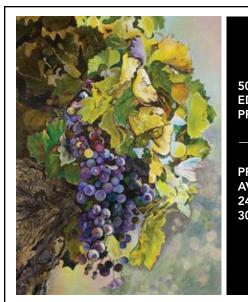
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# The Ultimate OUTDOOR KITCHEN

Interior Designer Dolores Pian shares her ideas.



Our summers may be short, but from March through July and on to November, cooking outdoors allows us to share our food experiences with family and friends while we extend our outdoor play time. More and more people are choosing to invest in their homes and backyards rather than vacation elsewhere.

# Before planning and spending on an outdoor kitchen, ask yourself some simple questions:

- How much time do I want to devote to maintenance? Knowing this will save you a lot of grief and disappointment.
- What's critical-to-have, must-have and nice-to-have?

#### **Critical to Know**

 Safety first. Make sure you meet your region's building and fire codes. There's a difference between a code for building a house and a code for preventing open

flames in and near a building. They are two different things.

Protect combustible materials.

#### **Choosing Cabinets and Materials**

Cabinets and counters need to be corrosion and weather resistant, low maintenance and made with stable materials. All materials expand and contract with temperature change and moisture. Sun fades colours, and natural materials break down over time. There are three types of cabinetry-based kitchens for outdoor use: HDPE/Polymer, wood and stainless steel.

**Polymer:** Waterproof, sun safe, available in a variety of solid colours, lower maintenance, plastic, variable durability.

**Wood:** Flexible design, requires some maintenance, most affordable, not fire resistant

**Stainless Steel:** Heat and fire resistant, non-corrosive, easy to clean, available in powder-coated colours.

#### Things to Consider

**Appearance:** What do I want to see when I look at my outdoor kitchen? Choose your landscaping and furniture for that perfect outdoor style.

**Clean-Up:** Install a sink with water. You may not want to use your indoor kitchen to clean greasy, sooty stuff. Plan ahead for plumbing.

**Heating and Electrical:** Layer your heat sources. Consider heat lamps, fire pits or a built-in infrared heater. Make sure you put in multiple electrical outlets that meet code. Plan ahead for electrical.

**Shade:** Create shade from the sun and protection from the rain with pergolas, retractable patio covers or tents.

**Stay Cool:** Cool yourself off with fans, misters or rugs to shield you from the hot floor and use light-coloured furniture.

**Layout and Seating:** Transition your rooms with removable screens, doors and walls. Offer a variety of seating – low Muskoka chairs, chaise loungers, stools and benches.

**Storage Space:** The ultimate amenity. Think of what else may need to be stored – equipment, furniture, sports and hobbies. You don't want to run back and forth from the house or garage, to the outdoor living area.

## Small Spaces – Condo Balconies and Terraces

Electric grills make outdoor eating possible despite strict fire and safety codes. Brown Jordan has fully assembled kitchens for terraces, to be lifted by a crane, or custom units transported by a service elevator.

#### **Nice to Have and Trending**

- Specialty right-sized appliances replacing mammoth barbecue grills. These can include: Argentinian grills, smokers, side burners, pizza ovens, fridges, dishwashers, beer on tap, espresso machines, ice makers and Kamadostyle grills.
- Lighting schemes, televisions and sound systems. Treat this space like another room of the house.

#### Value to Your Home

Outdoor kitchens seem to be replacing the pool as an add-on feature. It increases your competitive edge when selling because people will imagine themselves having great times in their new backyard.

Good design blurs the lines between the indoors and the outdoors. In what creative ways have you designed your very own private outdoor oasis? **OH**

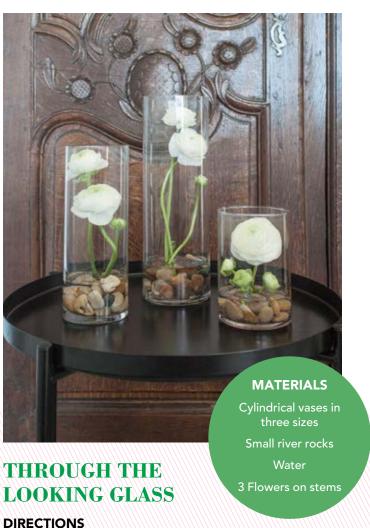

REMNANTS OF THE 18TH CENTURY

saw and grist mills dot the valley along with landforms from an old dam, millpond, and spillway that once powered the mills. Several heritage buildings and homes of workers from a generating station built in 1898 by the Cataract Power Company of Hamilton – earning the area its Power Glen moniker – also remain. Surrounded by trees and nature, and cut by Twelve Mile Creek, Power Glen is a hiker's dream. With friendly residents who are proud of the area's heritage, it's a great location

for those who crave quiet country living close to city amenities.

"It's a village in the city, a community that honours its natural and historic setting," says **Danielle Rinaldi** of **Rinaldi Homes**.

"This was at the forefront of every decision we made when planning, designing, and building Mill Creek."

Mill Creek is a community of 28 newly built bungalow townhomes by Rinaldi Homes within the heart of Power Glen. Intermingled with heritage homes and custom crafted newer builds, Mill Creek was created using traditional materials, including stucco, steel and copper. Masonry materials with a quarried stone profile were sourced at **Burnstein Brick and St. Catharines Building Supplies**, which provided the three-colour blend interlocking brick used in the driveways. To keep in tune with the traditional architectural features of the homes and properties in the area, Rinaldi Homes, this year's winner of the Niagara **Home Builders' Association** Builder of the Year Award, added copper roof accents, hand-troweled stucco, and mahogany Richards-Wilcox's Landmark Rockwood garage doors that channel carriage house charm from Yarnell Overhead Door Ltd. "All of the townhomes in Mill Creek have covered front and rear porches – features seen on many of the heritage homes in the area," Danielle says. "In this neighbourhood, people really appreciate the beauty surrounding them so we really wanted to take advantage of that in the design." Continued on page 29



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To bring the community together, Rinaldi Homes oriented the townhomes to face inward, towards a central parkette with a large gazebo. Built by **Timber Frame Solutions Inc.** with Douglas fir timbers, it's a great gathering place for residents to meet and converse with their neighbours. "Rinaldi Homes prides itself on building beautiful communities, not just beautiful homes," Danielle says. "That's why so much care went into landscaping (by **Dekorte's Landscaping**), exterior elements and a gathering place for residents."

The townhomes are built with high quality materials to minimize homeowner maintenance and increase energy efficiency. For example, the Dashwood windows, supplied by **Crowland Sash & Frame Ltd.**, are triple glazed. This contributes to longevity and energy efficiency, and also provides an added layer of soundproofing. Tankless water heaters are also standard, cutting down on usage and providing a steady flow of hot water.

Like any new build, there were obstacles. Due to limited site space, each block of townhomes had to be built one after the other, starting at one end of the community. This allowed for excavation and backfilling to be completed in sequential fashion. Also, there were existing trees on the property. Trees can create challenges during the building and services stage, but Rinaldi Homes made every effort to preserve the natural environment. "Materials and attention to detail create character and charm, but a home should blend into the surrounding landscape," Danielle says. "Mill Creek does just that."

As a testament to the quality of Rinaldi Homes, Margaret Desanti and her husband were one of the first to purchase and move into their Mill Creek townhome. Margaret has worked for Rinaldi Homes for over 15 years.

"When it was time to downsize, there was no doubt Mill Creek was the place for us," Margaret says. "The area is beautiful. There are a lot of trees and my husband loves to walk the many trails. Most of all, the bungalow style simplifies our lives. We were tired of stairs."

There are several unit types to choose from, all of which inspire bungalow living with main-floor bedrooms and open-concept kitchen (Artcraft Kitchens), dining, and living areas. Even laundry rooms and studies are on the main level. The kitchens in all the open-concept designs were made with family gatherings in mind, centering around substantial islands and modern lighting from <code>Don's Light House Ltd.</code> There's plenty of custom cabinetry for storage, so everything has a place, keeping counters uncluttered. Some units also feature walk-in pantries.

Large windows and transoms in the models, adorned by **The Drapery Workroom**, allow for a ton of natural light and an unobstructed view. Flooring and backsplashes meant to withstand years of use were provided by **Aristocrat Floors of the World**. Continued on page 32

The master bedrooms are retreats with upgraded spa-like en suite bathrooms and walk-in closets. Upscale fixtures from The **Ensuite** were installed by **Plumbtech** Services Ltd., including floating tubs, glass shower enclosures, double oversize sinks, and rain showers can be seen in various units. And if main floor living isn't enough, every townhome offers finished living space on the lower level. In one model, a gas fireplace from The One Stop Fireplace Shop, built-in cabinetry, and a wet bar to please the most discerning wine connoisseur finish the space.

Mill Creek townhomes are for buyers drawn to a flexible lifestyle that allows them to come and go as they please. One of the biggest benefits to homeowners wanting to do so is the year-round grounds maintenance. Although, considering Power Glen's historical elements and the area's sheer beauty, you might never want to leave. Continued on page 34















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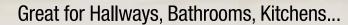

# Nautical LIGHT POSTS

Light up the summer night with easy-to-make solar light posts. Storebought solar lights, commonly used on pathways or flower beds, become task lights in a cluster. Use on the deck, around the pool or at the lake.

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- Cut post into three lengths measuring 38, 32 and 26 inches each. Your lumber yard can make cuts for a small charge.
- Using a drill paddle, drill a hole 2-inches deep in the top centre of each post for the solar light stem.





#### **MATERIALS TOOLS** 1 6x6-inch post, 8-foot length Saw 3 Solar lights with stems Drill 4 L brackets Drill paddle (of the same diameter size 2 Flat brackets as the light stem) 24 1-1/2-inch woodscrews Screwdriver 15 feet of rope (pick your Finishing nails desired thickness) Hammer 1-1/4-inch finishing nails Paintbrush or roller Paint or whitewash

- Paint posts and let dry thoroughly.
- Arrange and attach posts together with brackets and screws – L brackets for inside corners, flat brackets on the back side.
- Attach rope around the middle of the post bundle. Tuck ends in behind wrapped rope and nail end in place. Using finishing nails, tack rope into post in random areas to hold in place.
- Cut solar light stems to 2 inches or desired length. Insert 🚺 light stems in posts, attach solar lights to stems. Enjoy. он

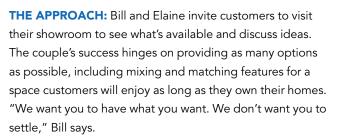

A recent survey of
Canadians who purchased
a newly built home shows
walk-in closets topped
their list of must-have
features. Surprising? Not
really says Tim Bailey,
division president of Avid
Ratings Canada Ltd., a
customer satisfaction
company that works with
Canadian homebuilders
to determine what buyers
want in a new build.

"The 2018 Canadian Homebuyer Preference Study revealed three themes," Tim says, storage solutions, energy efficiency and kitchen design.

New home buyers across the country are asked to answer 190 questions based on a recent new home purchase. It's the largest survey of its kind in Canada. The result is a comprehensive report by region, buyer type and demographics that Canadian homebuilders can use to plan new housing projects based on consumer wants and needs.









Avid Ratings is currently compiling results for 2019 but Tim doesn't anticipate dramatic changes. There's only been moderate changes in the four years Avid Ratings has been conducting the survey.

Consumers clearly want energy efficiency, Tim says. "But they also want granite and quartz and all the fine features so it's really about trying to strike a balance between what buyers can afford to spend. Energy efficiency is a hot button for consumers, especially with the carbon tax and rising utility costs. Buying a home is one thing but then carrying the cost of that home is another thing."

Homebuyers also want storage, lots of it. "We're a four-season country," Tim explains using his family as an example. "We're a *Brady Bunch* family with four kids and storage is critical. We have off-season gear, four seasons of clothing and four seasons of sporting goods."

People also want open-concept kitchens with an island. "Quartz countertops and smart home technology score high on the survey as well," Tim says. Other wants include a single-detached home, double-car garages, brick exteriors, tankless water heaters, LED lighting and a main-floor master suite.

What's surprising is the renaissance of the formal dining room. According to the survey, formal dining rooms have increased in importance since year one of the study.

What isn't a priority for new home buyers is outdoor spaces. Tim figures it's because landscaping isn't an immediate concern, it's not part of the purchase and new home buyers have to save and budget for outside projects that happen a couple of years down the road.

The 2018 study found the largest cohort of today's Canadian homebuyer is the growing family with kids followed by single couples with no kids. Millennials have edged out Gen Xers as the largest group of homebuyers.

How does the survey translate for resale homes? Tim believes new homes inspire renovations to older homes and stimulate the resale market. **OH**

Chefs **Tania Ganassini** and **John Vetere** were set to become big city condo owners when Niagara beckoned.

It was late 2014 and the young couple had made a deposit on a unit stacked in a highrise on Toronto's bustling Richmond Street. They were eager to leave behind their days as renters of a 600 sq. ft. space, equipped with a roommate, for a place not much bigger, but that they could call their own.

Enter Niagara. Well, actually, Tania's father Marco, a home inspector fresh off a job in Niagara-on-the-Lake's Garrison Village development. The neighbourhood featured new builds with a heritage air, including a cluster of bungalow and bungaloft townhomes by **Brookfield Homes**, tucked off Niagara Stone Road. Continued on page 47

Marco was so impressed by the quality of the homes – and their prices – that he suggested his daughter and son-in-law take a drive to wine country.

So they did. It wasn't long afterward they pulled the plug on that Toronto condo, and their careers in the city. Instead, they chose 1,600 square feet with a small patch of grass, and a world of opportunity in Niagara to prioritize their health, relationship and a slower lifestyle.

"It was spacious, there was a walk-in closet. There were two (bathroom) sinks," Tania says with a laugh.

It might not have happened had they hesitated a moment on the move. The Niagara real estate market was poised to explode as more Torontonians clued into everything on offer across Lake Ontario. Tania's parents eventually bought here as well, and her sister, Dani, is renting in St. Catharines as she considers where to settle in the region.

"If we waited even a year, we couldn't have afforded it," she says. "We honestly didn't spend that much more to buy this house (instead of the condo)."

Neither wanted anything big or ostentatious. But being chefs, the kitchen had to be the focal point of their open-concept bungaloft. The space is bright and airy thanks to soaring ceilings and generous skylights ushering in the day's glow, which plays off walls in Twig by **Benjamin Moore**. It's where they spend most of their time when they're not at work – John helming **Brushfire Smoke**, his barbecue operation at nearby **Niagara Oast House Brewers**, and Tania running **Staff Meal Niagara**, a joint venture with business partner **Amanda Ali** that focuses on plant-based meals and workshops.

Clean and functional were essential traits for their home galley by **Barzotti Woodworking Ltd.** They had three feet of counter space in Toronto, so an entire quartz-capped island in addition to several feet of counter meant a kitchen in which they could really cook. They also required something else they wouldn't have had in Toronto: a BlueStar professional-grade, six-burner gas range.

"That was non-negotiable," Tania says. "We had to have a good-sized island and a big sink. Storage space was a bonus. Compared to what we had, we were grateful to have more than two cupboards."

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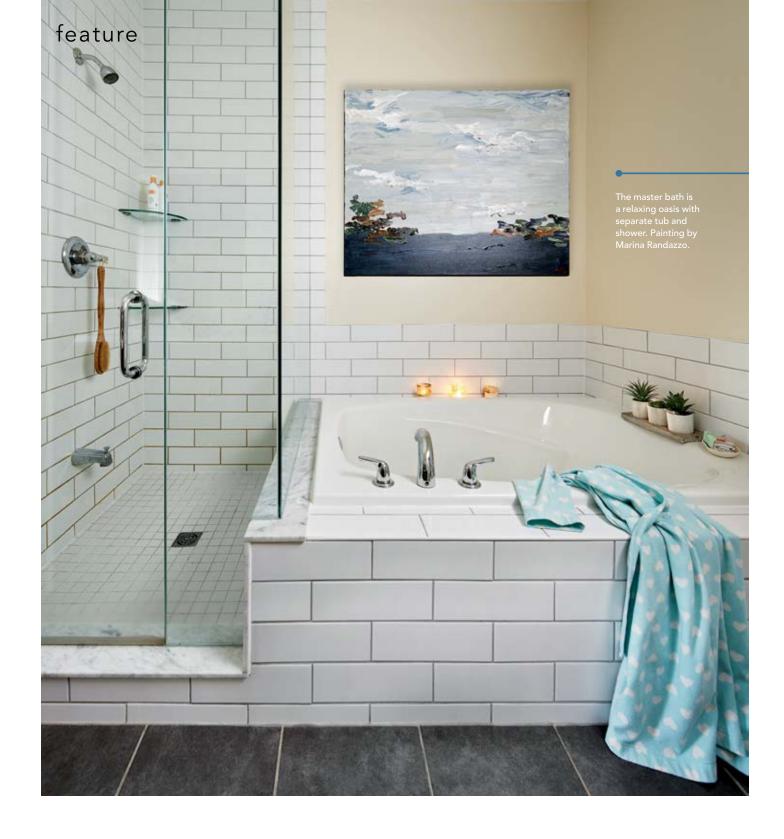

For the first while after moving here, the couple entertained weekly in their new home, cooking for family and friends. By themselves, they make dinner to the crooning of 60s soul legends Otis Redding and Sam Cooke on the sound system. "Our life is food, so we're in this area all the time," she says. "Even when we're entertaining, we don't leave the area. This is all we need."

As it turns out, so is Niagara. Both Tania and John worked in some of Canada's top kitchens before pulling up stakes in Toronto. Tania, who had been drawn to cooking as a child watching her mom prepare the Romanian and Israeli foods of her heritage, logged time at Canoe, Café Boulud at the Four Seasons, and the Michelin-starred Arco Antico in Savona, Italy. John also cut his teeth overseas at Locanda Della Tamerici, a Michelin-starred restaurant in Liguria, Italy. In Toronto, he helped open Scarpetta, The Chef's House, A-OK Foods and Yours Truly named Best New Restaurant by Toronto Life magazine in 2012.







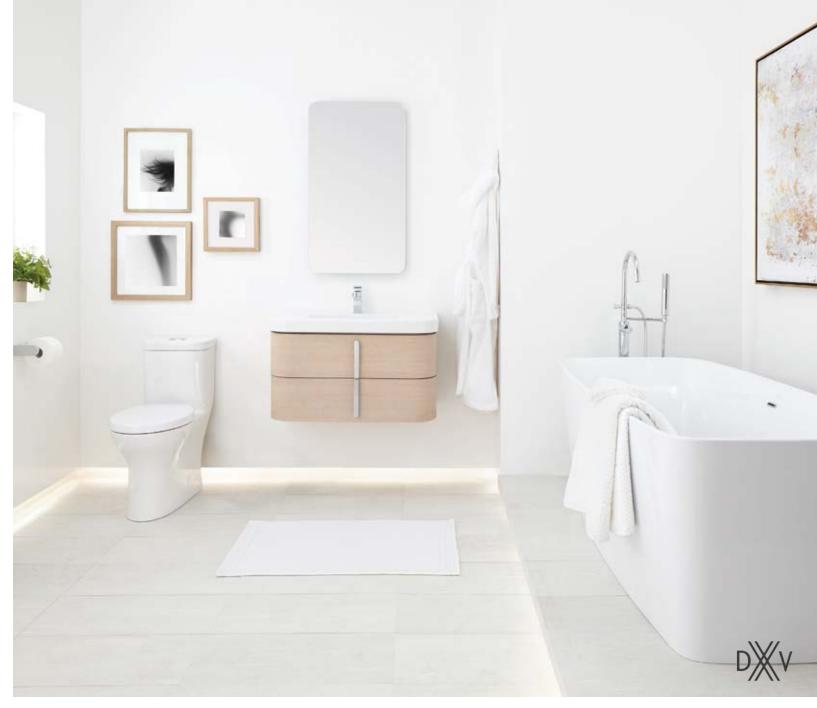
A tribute to their time in Europe hangs in the great room on a collage wall dedicated to their relationship. John's train tickets from Liguria to Savona to visit Tania are framed amongst Tyler Knott Gregson poetry read at their wedding, and other keepsakes collected as a couple.

They arrived in Niagara at a sleepy time of year though, long after the throngs of tourists

headed back to reality down the QEW. Tania recalls how they "walked in blind" to their job prospects here. They had no connections, no friends, and not much money. Restaurants were bracing for the grind of winter, shrinking their kitchens rather than expanding them, so the duo started The Norton Underground, a supper club that offered exclusive dining experiences once a month. "It enabled us to

make connections very quickly," Tania recalls. "I don't think that would have happened if we holed up somewhere."

Soon John was hired to work as chef de cuisine at Ravine Vineyard Estate Winery, and Tania, noticing a dearth of healthy eating options, set to work on Staff Meal after meeting Amanda while working at Oast House. Continued on page 52

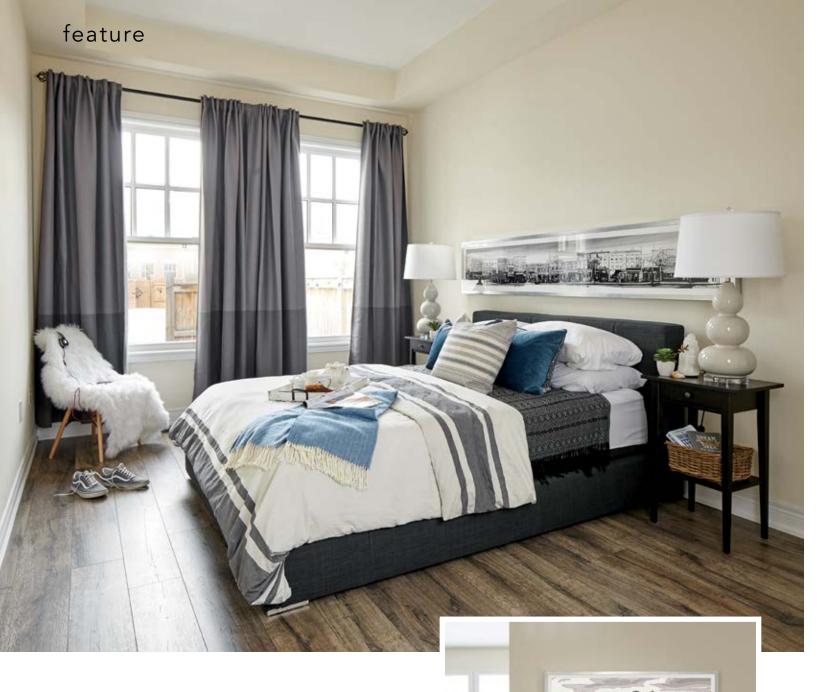

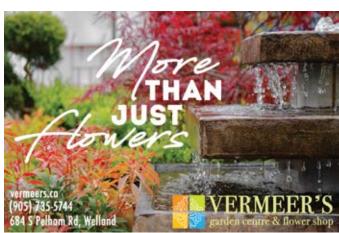
Attesting to her love for collaboration, she's working with local chef Justin Pepe on a shared space set to open later this year.

Moving here with no professional contacts or job prospects went against conventional wisdom, Tania notes.

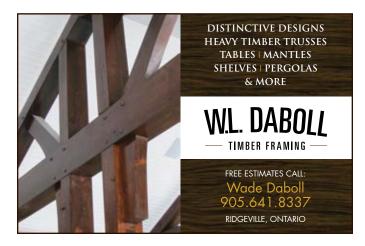
"But it was also the best (decision)," she says. "I consider myself from here now."  $\mathbf{OH}$

Look up. Is a popcorn ceiling staring back at you? If so, it might be time for a change. Here's some inspiration for that overlooked "fifth wall" in every room.



Reclaimed barn boards add rustic, textured character and provide an interesting colour palette to draw from. Plywood is another choice and when sealed with a gloss varnish, adds warmth and simplicity to a space.





#### BEADBOARD

No longer just for the cottage, use it on any ceiling. In a peaked ceiling, try running the boards vertically towards the peak, it will draw the eye upwards. A real time saver if placed right over a popcorn ceiling.



You need ceiling height to get the full effect of this style of finish, as the elements can overwhelm a nine-foot ceiling. This design adds formality and looks best in a living or dining room.

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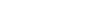
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# PAVLOVA with citrus curd

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JENELLE MCCULLOCH



#### INGREDIENTS

Pavlova

4 egg whites

Pinch of salt

¼ cup cold water

1-1/4 cups sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp vinegar

1 Tbsp + 1 tsp cornstarch

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Preheat oven to 300°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Draw a six-inch circle in the centre on the side of the parchment that will face down. This will be your guide when you shape the pavlova.

Combine egg whites and salt in a stand mixer and beat on medium-high until stiff peaks are formed. Be careful not to over-whip the egg whites at this stage. The egg whites will be thick and foamy and a peak will form when the beater is lifted out of the egg. Turn the mixer to low and slowly add the water and then the sugar. Turn the mixer back up to medium-high and beat until stiff peaks are again formed. The eggs will be thick and glossy. Remove bowl from mixer and fold in vanilla, vinegar and cornstarch.

Pile the meringue onto the circle on the baking sheet. With a spatula, smooth edges and top of the pavlova so it almost forms a dome. If preferred, create ridges in the side of the pavlova by swiping the sides in an upward motion.

Bake the pavlova for 30 minutes. Do not open oven! Turn oven down to 275°F and bake for another 45 minutes. Let cool completely in the oven for an hour or overnight. It is normal for the pavlova to crack and the centre to sink in.

Remove from oven when cool.

## Citrus Curd

#### **INGREDIENTS**

4 egg yolks

¼ cup citrus juice of choice (lemon, blood orange, etc.)

1 tsp citrus zest

⅓ cup sugar

3 Tbsp unsalted butter

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Combine all ingredients in a double boiler and heat on medium-high, stirring continuously until mixture thickens and coats the back of a spoon. Strain curd through a fine mesh sieve into a bowl. Cover the top of the curd with plastic wrap directly on the curd and chill until cooled.

#### **GARNISHES**

Fresh whipped cream Berries Mint Powdered sugar

#### **ASSEMBLE PAVLOVA**

Assemble shortly before serving. Fill the centre of the pavlova with curd, whipped cream and berries. Garnish with mint and powdered sugar. **OH**

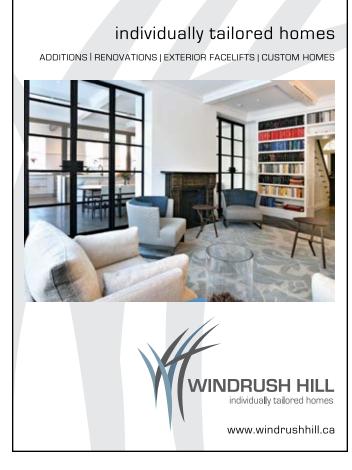
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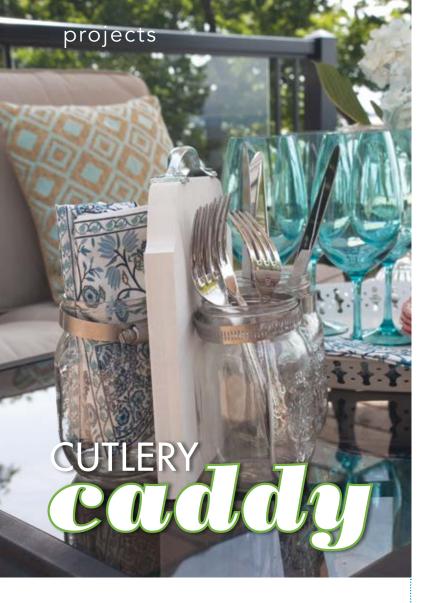

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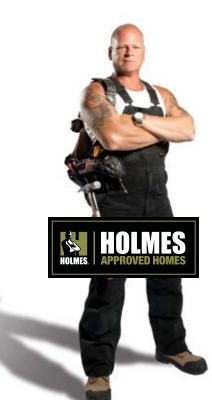

## TREAT YOUR





Painted drywall is the traditional interior wall finish in new home builds and renovations. However, there are countless alternative materials and finishes for walls that can create a significant visual impact while also defining your style. Here are seven wall treatments and the areas of your home you might want to splurge on for the best investment.





## 1. WALLPAPERS OR WALLCOVERINGS

Material: Rolls or sheets of grasscloth, paper, cellulose or vinyl. Whether foil, flocked, embossed, block printed or textured paper, there is an endless selection of patterns and colours.

Installation: It is generally recommended to hire a professional, but if you're up for a challenge, do-it-yourself types often hang their own paper. Ensure you do the proper prep work – plot out the install, level everything, smooth the surface, have all the tools required and know whether you have a pre-pasted wallpaper or if you require an adhesive. Always check the pattern repeat, as it will affect the coverage provided per roll.

**Pros:** Natural fibres breathe and add an element of Mother Nature to the space, while vinyl is highly durable, stain and moisture resistant, colourfast and scrubbable. You can completely change the overall look and feel of a space with a wallcovering.

Cons: Natural fibres are more delicate, less scrubbable and more susceptible to sun fading. Vinyl cannot breathe. If selling is in your immediate future, perhaps give wallpaper a pass as some potential buyers can be hesitant.

**Application:** An entire room or a simple accent wall. Powder rooms are a great place to try out a bold print.

## **2. TILE**

**Material:** Porcelain, ceramic, slate, limestone, glass, mosaics, cement encaustic or marble.

**Installation:** Professional installation is generally recommended. Labour cost will vary depending upon size and style of tile and design of pattern and layout.

**Pros:** Easy to wipe up and clean, durable finish, waterproof when installed correctly.

Cons: Cleaning grout lines. Natural stones require a sealant to be applied a couple of times per year, or more frequently depending upon use and exposure.

**Application:** Great for bathrooms, powder rooms, kitchen backsplashes or fireplaces.

### 3. BARN BOARD

Material: Weathered boards, generally but not exclusively sourced from a barn.

**Installation:** Can be a DIY project with the proper tools.

Pros: Texture, visual interest, improved durability of walls in high-traffic areas. Provides a natural, rustic aesthetic. Commonly planks are installed horizontally but can be used to create various patterns such as herringbone.

Cons: Can collect dust.

**Application:** Great for accent walls, mudrooms or laundry rooms.

#### 4. SHIPLAP

Material: Typically either long planks of MDF or a paint-grade poplar, installed horizontally. Traditional shiplap has a special rabbet or notch cut on the long edges of the boards to aid in spacing.

**Installation:** Can be a DIY project with the proper tools.

**Pros:** Texture, visual interest, improved durability of walls in high traffic areas. Typically white, but shiplap can be painted any colour you desire. Gives a farmhouse or coastal vibe.

Cons: Can collect dust.

**Application:** Great for accent walls, mudrooms or laundry rooms.





## 5. WAINSCOTTING OR APPLIED TRIM

Material: Tongue-and-groove wainscotting, bead board, board-and-batten and traditional applied-panel details are available in wood or MDF.

**Installation:** A trim carpenter is generally recommended however, depending upon the complexity of the installation, an avid DIYer can attempt with the proper tools.

**Pros:** Instant character and charm to a room, adds an element of elegance, great texture for visual interest and is more durable than drywall.

**Cons:** Can collect dust, can be costly depending upon species of wood selected and installation method for desired aesthetic.

**Application:** Dining rooms, dens, bedrooms or hallways.

Natural or manufactured stone can provide a good return on investment

## 6. STONE OR BRICK VENEER

**Material:** Natural or manufactured stone and brick, generally sold in pieces by square foot or in sheets.

Installation: For masonry work, hiring a stonemason is recommended. Labour cost will vary depending upon the stone and method of installation. Sheet veneers can generally be managed by the average DIYer.

**Pros:** Strong visual impact. Can provide good return on investment. Noncombustible and available in a wide variety of styles and colours.

Cons: Can collect dust. Manufactured stone veneer products are formed and often a repeating pattern will emerge. With a natural material every piece comes from the earth and has its own uniqueness but requires cutting and fitting.

**Application:** Focal walls or fireplaces.





### 7. PLASTER

Material: Clay, lime, Venetian, gypsum or tadelakt plaster each has its own pros and cons.

Installation: Professional trowel installation recommended. Pre-planning is required to ensure proper backing is installed as some plasters require wire mesh or blue board, while clay plaster requires a primer with added sand for adhesion.

Pros: Beautiful, timeworn aesthetic adds a depth and luminosity to walls that is impossible to achieve with paint and drywall. Plasters are generally more durable than drywall. Generally sanding is not required and therefore dust is limited at time of install. All-natural materials and low VOCs.

Cons: Costly and time-consuming to install.

Application: A splurge for rooms you'd really like to highlight. For tadelakt, use it in areas that require waterproofing (showers or perhaps a kitchen or bath backsplash). OH

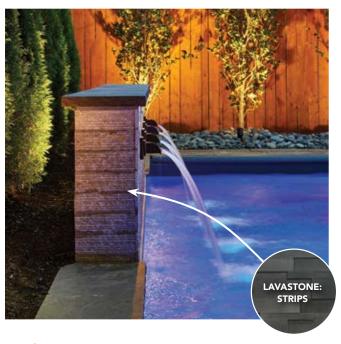


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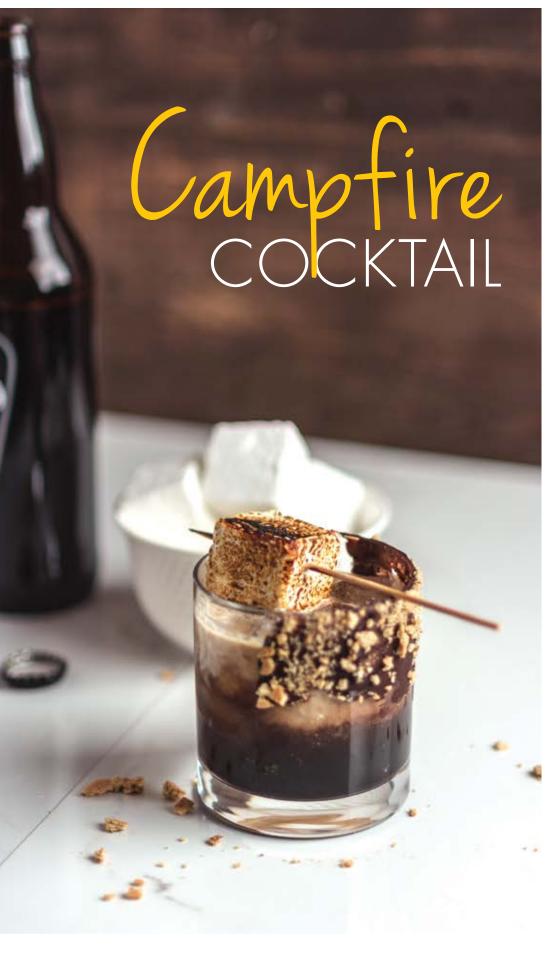

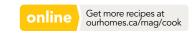
