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




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
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editor's note

NIGHT LIGHTS

Interior Designer **Dolores Pian** shares her ideas.

First impressions matter, whether it's a single family bungalow or a condominium building. Outdoor lighting can improve curb appeal, welcome you home and make you feel safe and secure.

Because lighting choices and applications are limitless, you need a well-thought-out plan to help beautify your outdoor living space.

LIGHTING STRATEGY

What is your outdoor personality? To determine that, you'll need to ask:

What do I love most about my yard, patio or balcony?

When and how will I be using my outdoor space?

When and where is security lighting most important?

Do I need help? Can a professional help me achieve my objectives?

Lighting up your yard, garden, deck or patio is a great way to extend the square footage of your living space. It adds ambience to your home, promotes enjoyment and maximizes your entertainment space, adding to your personal style, comfort and convenience.

Strategic placement of fixtures can enhance the architecture and the use of your space. Here are some options: **Up-lighting** – lights from below to create a focal point in the landscape

Wall washing – general illumination

Silhouetting – dramatizes an interesting shaped object

Step lighting – illuminates stairways and walkways

Path lighting – enhances landscaping elements such as flower beds, shrubbery and borders while safely illuminating pathways

Deck and patio lighting

– provides safety and
accent lighting



BEFORE YOU INVEST

What you need to know before purchasing and installing outdoor light fixtures:

Not all light fixtures can be used outdoors. Check the safety rating for damp or wet locations.

Hire a qualified electrician.

Outdoor lighting requires special attention and fixtures can be located in hard-to-reach places. You only want to do this once, safely and according to the Ontario Building Code.

Buy quality, long-lasting finishes.

Quality housing protects the light and is more resistant to the elements, so fixtures last longer with little to no maintenance.

FEISS: Hilo 12-Ligh

Colour temperature. Do you want cool or warm light? Selecting the correct lamp can dramatically change the look and feel of your outdoor space.

HOW MUCH IS TOO MUCH?

Be kind to the night sky and your neighbours by directing lights downward, use low glare fixtures and place motion sensors on essential outdoor lamps. Turn lights off when not in use.

NEW, NOTABLE & SOMETHING SPECIAL

Today's technology lets you have more fun outdoors both night and day, with clever and charming items such as:

Portable LED lanterns with wireless speakers. Great for condos and other areas where no electrical outlets are available. The Uma Sound Lantern by Design Within Reach (DWR) has a dimmable light with a speaker.

Chandeliers for that extra bit of panache. Feiss makes an explosive orb chandelier that adds elegance to any outdoor dining area.

Mobile lighting in the form of wireless globes, cube tables and other pieces of furniture. They are cordless and rechargeable with a colour rotation to suit your mood or occasion.

DWR makes a variety of globes that are waterproof and glow in a variety of colours.

String lights in a variety of shapes and sizes and price points set a festive mood for patios and balconies.

LED candles come pretty close to the real thing.

P.S. PREPARE FOR WINTER

I know it's summer, but don't forget to prepare for winter. Check bulbs and replace them with LED bulbs, clean fixtures and adjust timers. You can still enjoy the winter landscapes while cosy inside.

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

Fresh mint


DIRECTIONS

Core and cube a large watermelon. Place cubes on a baking sheet and freeze.

Meanwhile, combine sugar and water in a saucepan. Simmer until sugar is dissolved, creating a simple syrup.

Just before serving, add all ingredients to a blender, adding ½ cup of wine at a time. Pulse until smooth. Garnish with mint and serve.

If you're strapped for time, make frosé ahead of time and tore in the freezer until ready to



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Play Pieces

10 small flat stones Acrylic paint (in colours noted below) Fine paintbrush Mod Podge

Black marker **NATURAL**

Using white paint, mark five stones with an X and five with an O. When dry, coat with Mod Podge to seal.

BUGS


Paint five stones red and five yellow.

When dry, on red stones using black, paint each end, and a stripe down the middle and add spots.


On yellow stones using black, paint stripes around the stone and a wider stripe at one end for a head.

When dry, add two white dots for eyes on all stones.

Coat with Mod Podge to seal.

Drawstring Bag

Material, six-inches wide by 24-inches long (we used burlap ribbon and fabric) Ribbon, 2 lengths, 18-inches each Thread (we matched our material) Scissors

Safety pin or bobby pin

To stitch a channel for the drawstring, fold 3-inches in from each end of the material. Stitch two seams at each end, at 1-inch and 2-inches from the folds.

Fold material in half, right side in. Stitch each edge with a 1/4-inch seam, stop 2 inches from the top of the bag to leave the stitched channels open. Turn right side out.

Attach the first ribbon to a safety pin or bobby pin and thread it between the stitched channel on the front of the bag and out, then thread back through the channel on the back. Knot the ends of the ribbon together to make a loop. Repeat with second ribbon, starting from the opposite channel opening. You should be able to pull the knotted ribbons and draw in both sides of your bag.

Using a black marker, draw a grid on the drawstring bag with two vertical lines and two horizontal lines as your game board. OH STATE style

California has always been trending in the world of design, but the coveted west-coast style is having a moment.

The interior of a California home reflects a certain reverence for the vast and diverse landscapes found within the state, which include the redwood forests, cliffs along the Pacific Ocean, countless sandy beaches, Red Rock Canyon, Joshua Tree National Park in the Mojave Desert or Lake Tahoe – just to name a few. The connection to the outdoors is a central tenet in creating a space that aligns with the style of the Golden State.

With approximately 300 days of sunshine, Californians are well known for enjoying the out-of-doors and are recognized for being early adopters of sustainable initiatives and organic lifestyles. This connection to the landscape means that interior living environments often naturally extend to terraces and spaces that meld the worlds of indoor and outdoor living.

Inspired and influenced by the landscape, California style can be described as casual, relaxed and organic while also reflecting a deliberate less-ismore approach to obtain a look of curated minimalism. However, this simplistic approach is combined with the thoughtful layering of textures and a keen attention to natural and artificial lighting, which creates a warm and inviting space.

PALETTE

To create this look in your own home, begin with a soft, neutral backdrop in a muted palette of whites and ivories for walls and ceilings to make the space feel bright, fresh and airy. Try Benjamin Moore's Steam (AF-15), White Down (CC-50) or Deep In Thought (AF-30). A plaster finish would be a welcome, warm element that references the Spanish influence of the Adobe architectural style.







TEXTURE

Add in layers of natural textures such as heavy sisal and jute with softer elements such as a light cotton Turkish throw and breezy linen draperies. Natural, wire brushed and white-washed woods, worn leather, wrought iron and many handmade artisan elements such as woven baskets and imperfect pottery are also common design details.

Bohemian touches like patterned tiles and textiles such as vintage Moroccan rugs, Turkish kilims, Navajo weaving or African mud cloth can add a focal statement piece while anchoring the space with a splash of colour and another layer of visual interest.

Another common design statement is created by carefully selecting furniture that is practical in nature and beautifully simple in form. As a mecca of mid-century modern design, the influence of this movement is evident in the clean lines and modern forms that have become synonymous with Californian style (think Palm Springs, home to Modernism Week, which is devoted to celebrating and fostering an appreciation for mid-century design and architecture.)





WALL ART

Art that is simple in form and appropriately scaled in tones reminiscent of the sand, ocean and desert landscapes complete the look. Adorn the walls with simple line drawings, textural woven wall hangings or paintings of native plants and animals to create a design aesthetic consistent with California style. OH

A casual evening with pals turned into a dream come true for Sabah Ahmed when she enlisted the help of designer friend **Trisha Ross** of **Trisha Ross Interiors** to update her 2,800 sq. ft. home.

"It was early last year," recalls Sabah.
"Trish is a friend of mine, so I asked her to come in for a paint consult. She came in with samples one night and we talked about what we could do in terms of brightening things up. She had amazing ideas that got us all excited. Everything happened very quickly after that. She brought in her contractor, he gave us quotes, and here we are, a year later, enjoying this beautiful house."

Located in Burlington's prestigious Millcroft neighbourhood, Sabah and her family (husband Shaun Rath, daughters Safiya, 8, and Adeena, 7) have lived in their home for over five years. "There's a community feel to the neighbourhood. It's well established, with a good school, and the lot sizes are bigger," says Sabah.

While the family loved the neighbourhood and bigger footprint, they never liked the house's darker palette and features, and Sabah found the interior landscape dark and unappealing. "When we first moved in, I loved the layout, but everything was very dark – dark

Enter Trisha, who set to work brightening the space and increasing the flow of natural light. To start, she tackled the foyer. "Previously it had doors on it, so we opened it up to increase natural light in the entryway," Trisha says.

"I needed the house to be bright, and wanted it more modern and more contemporary," adds Sabah. "I wanted a nice happy feeling when you walked in. Trisha came up with the exact same vision I had in my mind. It's fabulous."

a hardwood floor that matched the rest of the house for a seamless look, while a plank-style tile from **Eden Tile-It** was installed in a chevron pattern in the entrance and laundry room.

The kitchen cabinetry was in good condition, so Trisha had it painted. Quartz counters were installed by **Aussie Stone**, and a new faucet, hardware, sink and backsplash were added. Curtains from Fabricland impart a fun pop of colour to the neutral space.

"What I love about Trisha is that she worked with what we have

and was able to change our home in such a dramatic fashion without changing things structurally," says Sabah. "She told us to keep our existing furniture and she got finishing touches – she changed out all the pillows and got new artwork for the living and dining room."

"Not everything has to be ripped out," says Trisha. "It's about bringing out the best in a home, as well as adding new things."

Likewise, Trisha kept the powder room vanity but had it sprayed "greige" by The Bradburn Group. "By changing the colour palette on the vanity, it toned down the yellowness coming through the counter," says Trisha, who also added a new faucet, lighting and floor tile.


Electrical work in the home was done by Dias & Sons Electric Inc. Lighting from Home Lighting and new furnishings were added throughout. The front living room lightens things up with colourful artwork from Celadon and mirrored coffee tables. In the family room, a bright red sofa is upstaged by an even more colourful ottoman from **UpCountry**. A gallery wall of family photos adds to the fun, playful feel of the room.

The laundry room also got an update. "It previously had a door and was closed off. We blew it open and repeated the chevron tile from the entrance, as well as building all new custom cabinetry. We brought in lockers for backpacks and added a bench with custom cubbies," says Trisha.

While Trisha used a light touch on the rest of the home, the master bathroom was "completely gutted," she says.

"The highlight for me is the master bath," says Sabah, "I wanted it to be calm, to have a serene feeling, and be a private little oasis, and



Trisha did exactly that. Before the reno, it was all shiny and black. The shower was like a coffin. It doesn't look like the same room at all."

In addition to a new vanity, mirrors, tub and large-format, marblestyle ceramic tile, Trisha increased the shower size. Wallpaper with a whimsical branch design from **Katie's Wallpaper** appears along one wall, while custom artwork was ordered from Celadon. "It's photography printed on acrylic, which is good for moist areas like bathrooms," says Trisha.

"What also made a huge difference was changing all the lighting throughout the house," says Sabah. "There's a flow now. The lighting is all similar, modern, with clean lines. It catches people's eyes when they walk in the house."

The result is nothing less than stunning, as the homeowners would agree. "When I walk in, it makes me feel happy," concludes Sabah. "All those little things have totally changed the look of the house. It's bright

We know some things we shop for will be a passing fancy – like a "millennial pink" pillow or a glitzy brass bauble. However, some pieces in your home should absolutely be approached as an investment, and if chosen well can become a true heirloom, weathering decades of use and shifts in style.



A ROOM-MAKING RUG

While too often rugs end up being an afterthought, if chosen properly they will and should anchor and elevate the look of an entire room. Rugs can also last for generations, if selected in a quality material, tight weave and a timeless style. Traditionally, patterned rugs can feel very hip and trendy when mixed with contrasting styles of furnishings, but you also know they'll stand the test of time, as these styles have already endured for centuries. Just expect to pay as much for a long-lasting rug as you would a good sofa, and in some cases, depending on size, even more.

LOOK FOR: Wool in a tight weave.

TIP: Bend the rug on a diagonal to make sure there isn't excess empty space between the rows of fibres for soil to gather.

A STATEMENT CHANDELIER

Individual pendant lights may not be worth moving from home to home, but a grand chandelier is forever. Plus, it can be enjoyed from all angles and makes a natural focal point, so it's worth investing a bit to get something that stands up to all the extra attention. For the best long-term investment, choose a handcrafted one-of-a-kind piece, or look for a style that has lasted for at least 15 years (such as a French mid-century period crystal chandelier), to avoid passing fads.

LOOK FOR: Honest finishes like smoked glass or bronze, rather than faux finishes like gold-plate.

TIP: Choose one with an adjustable cord or chain, so it can be rehung in a taller or lower space later. Continued on page 42




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A STRONG BUT SOFT LEATHER SOFA

A good sofa needs to do a lot: be comfortable, look good, survive spills and indulge naps. This is definitely not a place to cut corners in any home. A quality leather sofa in a natural, supple material, will only grow more beautiful with age as the material develops a patina over decades of use. The best thing about a comfortable sofa? It can start as the central feature of your first home, and eventually move to a den or study in a future space – but you'll always have that one place you love to lounge.

LOOK FOR: Timeless natural shades like tan or soft grey.

TIP: Choose a simple and understated style that's truly comfortable, and then customize with beautiful one-of-a-kind vintage pillows. Think Hermès scarves turned into pillows.







AN ORNATE MIRROR

Like Modern? New Traditionalist? Art Deco? No matter your preference, you can find a beautiful mirror that adds style to your walls, while also being functional and doubling the visual size of a room. Ultimately while the frame will add flair, it's a quality piece of glass that will make a true heirloom, so look for one without the subtle ripples and warps that you often find in flimsier mirrors.

LOOK FOR: Clear, flawless glass.

TIP: A traditional mirrored frame with bevels and facets will be the most timeless.

A PAIR OF CHAIRS

Whether you host massive family gatherings or intimate dinners, every home probably needs at least two great one-of-a-kind vintage chairs. While mixing and contrasting your furniture gives great creative results, having at least one matching pair gives lots of options: they can be part of a living room set, serve as end chairs anchoring a dining table, or be broken up to give differing rooms a sense of continuity.

LOOK FOR: Sturdy construction - good bones can be reupholstered later.

TIP: Seek out reputable manufacturers that have perfected just a few classic models over years, as these are proven to stand the test of time. OH







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STORY MELANIE REKOLA

The addition of a fabulous outdoor structure enhances a backyard garden by providing an architectural destination to enjoy with family and friends. Garden structures firmly underpin and contrast the relaxed shapes of plants, thus providing valuable focal points.



Not only do garden structures provide functional requirements such as shade, shelter and privacy, they also enhance the landscape by adding opportunity to express one's individual personality and style.

Garden structures have countless uses – anything from saunas and yoga rooms to complete outdoor kitchens with fireplaces, pizza ovens and home theatres. They also come in many different shapes, forms and combinations. Let's take a closer look.

cabana: A cabana (sometimes called a pool house) is basically a miniature house that usually shares architectural style with the existing home. They typically hold the pool equipment and have plumbing, electrical and fixtures just like any house, and can serve a multitude of functions in the backyard. Pool houses are the epitome of luxury and can even be equipped with glass walls and pocket doors that can open up fully for the summer months. They sometimes are designed with a pavilion or pergola attached to create a unique structure that maximizes outdoor living space.

Pergola: A pergola is an outdoor structure that consists of posts or columns and an open "roofing" grid of beams and rafters. Often rustic and made of wood (though sometimes modern and metal) these offer aesthetic value and a feeling of walls and ceiling. They provide some sun protection by way of light filtration but not any real protection from rain and other adverse weather. An option is to build it with a louvered cover system that can open and shut as needed, offering maximum versatility. They can be freestanding or attached to the home, depending on the structure and rooflines with pillars added to the posts if appropriate for the space.

Arbour: An arbour is similar to a pergola, but on a smaller scale. Both arbours and pergolas can provide support for climbing plants, adding a lovely lush effect.

Arbours can frame a view when placed alone or added in succession to provide a gorgeous tunnel effect.

with a solid roof. They generally don't have walls but are sometimes enclosed on one or two sides for privacy or wind shelter. A wonderful function of having a solid roof is that these spaces are protected from the elements so there's no need to store outdoor cushions or apply furniture coverings. These spaces are ideal as outdoor living rooms complete with plush sofas, toss pillows and, of course, a freestanding fireplace.

offering many of the same functional benefits, a gazebo has a solid roof and no walls but with one key difference – they are always octagonal in shape. These fit in well to country settings but in a modern application they often look awkward.

TIP: Sometimes prefabricated metal and cloth canopy structures (typically sold by big box stores) are also called gazebos. Though these are tempting because of their price point, they are a temporary solution and will require frequent replacement.



Areen Nowse: Perhaps these buildings are self-explanatory but couldn't you just imagine a gorgeous glass greenhouse in your backyard filled with lavish plants and a swanky little seating set ready for afternoon tea or an evening glass of vino? As these are prefabricated, there is no need for architectural design, though proper placement is crucial. Buyers beware – permits may also apply!

Though a landscape designer can provide concept plan and inspirational photos as the starting point for outdoor structure design, most will require a technical draftsman to blend detailing with local building code requirements. This can be accomplished

through some combination of a Landscape Architect/Engineer/Builder/Architectural Technologist. Designing an outdoor structure is a process and a specialty field – larger structures will require building permits and zoning permissions.

As the illustrious Benjamin Franklin once said, "The bitterness of poor quality remains long after the sweetness of low price is forgotten." The application of this phrase to outbuilding construction is no exception. Be forewarned – great tradespeople are in short supply and many good builders are already fully booked a whole year in advance. Take your time to find the construction company that's right for you and be prepared to wait for the perfect end result. OH

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PEACH & COCONUT caramet POPSICLES

This yummy frozen treat is full of sweet, fresh peaches and coconut. These home-made popsicles make a healthy and wholesome dessert.





PEACH MIXTURE

2 large or 3 medium peaches

1 Tbsp honey

1 tsp cinnamon

Dice peaches and add to saucepan with honey and cinnamon. Heat until soft, then set aside to cool.

COCONUT CARAMEL

1 can (14 oz) full fat coconut milk

½ cup coconut sugar

¼ cup honey

1 Tbsp coconut oil

1 tsp vanilla extract

Sea salt

Combine coconut milk, coconut sugar and honey in a saucepan and heat over medium.

Cook for 10-15 minutes or until thickened.

Remove from heat and add coconut oil, vanilla and a pinch of sea salt.

Set aside to cool.

COCONUT MILK MIXTURE

1 can (14 oz) coconut milk

1 Tbsp honey

Mix together coconut milk and 1 tablespoon of honey, set aside.

TO ASSEMBLE

Using popsicle moulds, spoon in peach mixture then coconut caramel until each mould is half full.

Top up each mould with coconut milk mixture.

Place popsicle sticks in the middle of each mould.

Release any air bubbles in the moulds by gently moving the popsicle sticks.

Freeze until firm. OH

AN OAKVILLE LAND/MARK



THE PLACE: Swiss Interiors opened in Oakville in 1953, the same year Ford Motor Company arrived in town. The original owners, Sam and Betty Muller, came from Switzerland, hence the name. However, most of the furniture is designed and manufactured in Canada. "This means materials and processes are of a higher quality," says Carol Vesters, Sam and Betty's daughter, who now owns the store with husband Rick.

THE STYLE: Swiss Interiors is an anomaly in an era of online shopping. "Online sales are not for us," says Carol. "We insist that furniture is something you need to see up close, feel and try." The store is still socially savvy, with a thriving Facebook and Instagram presence. See something you like? Check out the website for more

detailed specs. To help imagine how items will look in a home setting, the store is staged with four floors of intimate vignettes. Customers are pleasantly surprised by the selection of home décor on display.

what's on-trend: "Clean lines, neutral palettes, furniture groupings with splashes of bright colour supplied through artwork and accessories are on-trend," says Carol. At one time, everything was sold in sets – coffee tables with matching end tables, sofas with matching love seats and chairs, even bedroom suites. Today, design leans to the eclectic, mixing individual pieces and styles. "Interior spaces have become far more interesting," says Carol. "It's also more difficult to get it right – more reason to

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PLANNING A RENOVATION? YOU MIGHT QUALIFY FOR A REBATE OR GRANT FROM ONE OF THESE ONTARIO PROGRAMS.

GREEN ONTARIO FUND

The aim of this Ontario program is to reduce energy consumption and fight climate change. It offers all residents living in townhomes, detached or semi-detached homes renovation discounts of up to \$20,000. Money is available for renovations and improvements, including replacing air-source heat pumps, installing high-performance windows and adding insulation and a home geothermal system.

Ontario condo owners can use the rebate for installing smart thermostats or upgrading air conditioning systems and electric appliances.

Using the program website, applicants can find a participating contractor in their area, who will submit the application for the client, including all necessary documentation, and install energy efficient products in the house.

A rebate cheque will be sent to the client once the work has been completed and proof of purchase has been submitted.

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis, starting at the beginning of the year. More information is available at greenon.ca.

ONTARIO HOME ENERGY CONSERVATION INCENTIVE PROGRAM

Conserve energy and save some money. If you are planning a renovation, this program is for you. But don't start your renovation until you pre-qualify for the program, which includes a mandatory energy assessment.

Union Gas and Enbridge deliver this program for their customers in partnership with the Ontario government and Save On Energy. Homeowners can get up to \$5,000 back by installing two or more eligible

measures. Some of the energy assessment costs will be reimbursed.

Homeowners can use an online tool at ohecip.ca to find a participating energy advisor to help complete the application and project.

ONTARIO RENOVATES PROGRAM

This program offers seniors and others funding for urgent repairs, such as roofing, structural plumbing, septic systems and fire safety. Money is also available for accessibility modifications, such as ramps, handrails and chair and bath lifts for persons with disabilities and seniors to allow them to "age in place."

Counties and municipalities that participate in the Investment in Affordable Housing for Ontario program deliver the funding to its residents. Funding comes from the federal and provincial governments.

Check with your municipality for the status of the program in your area.

HOME AND VEHICLE MODIFICATION PROGRAM

Established by the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services and offered through the March of Dimes Canada, this program provides funding for basic home and/or vehicle modifications for Ontarians with impairment, enabling them to continue living in their homes, avoid job loss and participate in their communities.

Applicants must be permanent Ontario residents and have an impairment caused by bodily injury, birth defect or illness that is ongoing and/or recurring and is expected to last one year or more. Applicants must demonstrate that the impairment impedes mobility and results in substantial restriction in activities of daily living.

The program provides up to \$15,000 lifetime maximum for home modifications, and/or up to \$15,000 every 10 years for vehicle modifications.

Other eligibility criteria are available on March of Dimes' website at marchofdimes.ca.

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Aboriginal Peoples living on-reserve can apply to receive a loan of up to \$10,000, which can be forgiven if the occupant continues to live in the residence for six months after the modifications.

On-reserve seniors in northern or remote areas may receive an additional 25 per cent in funding. Eligibility states that on-reserve applicants must be 65 or older, be experiencing difficulty with daily activities due to aging, and have a total household income at or below a specified limit.

The loan money should be directed toward adaptations, such as handrails, easy-to-reach work and storage areas in the kitchen, and walk-in showers with grab bars.

MUNICIPAL PROGRAMS

Many municipalities offer grants and incentives for first-time homebuyers and for homeowners who are improving their secondary (granny) suites.

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

THE WALL Comes Tumbling Down

When Norma and Dan were transferred to Toronto from Calgary almost 20 years ago, they chose a stately, two-storey red brick beauty in Lorne Park to call home.

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Designer fackie Connolly of Parsons Interiors took the family's wish list and brought the renovation to life.

The couple had worked with **Jackie Connolly** of **Parsons Interiors** on a previous living room project, where she blended the old with the new, incorporating modern elements with vintage pieces that had been kept in the family for years. "We reupholstered a lot of pieces that are heritage pieces that are important to Norma," says Jackie.

A wingback chair with curved legs was given new life with contemporary striped fabric. "It's sentimental to me," says Norma. "It was my grandmother's. She was married in 1913, and it was given to her by her Sunday school class. It's the most comfortable chair in the world." New rugs and artwork were added to complement the more contemporary stylings. From there, the redesign continued into the dining room.

French doors that once enclosed the space were removed to create an open flow between the living and dining rooms. Where the typical dining suite and hutch once stood, Jackie designed beautiful built-ins. Glass doors with a simple mullion detail add elegance. A wood ledge that runs the length of the built-in was stained to match the new dining table, tying them together. Cream chairs and a luxe, glimmering chandelier that Jackie sourced from **Concept Lighting** completes the space.


When Norma got the green light to remove the wall between the kitchen and family room, she called on Jackie, who brought **Marquis Estates Ltd.** on board to handle the construction. 

The original floor plan included two sets of sliding patio doors, one in the kitchen and the other in the family room. The doors in the family room were removed and a window was added. The kitchen patio doors were swapped for larger, nine-foot sliders. The entryway between the kitchen and the family room was opened up, and the kitchen made larger. The powder room, once tucked in the centre of the home, was relocated to the front entry and made pretty with marble floors in a chevron pattern and a vanity with brushed nickel cup pulls.

In the kitchen, fresh white shaker-style cabinetry with a bevelled edge takes centre stage. A stacked stone backsplash adds dimension. Integrated appliances sourced by Jackie from **Appliance Canada** are beautiful and functional. Two islands allow for plenty of work space and multiple areas to spread out when the couple entertains. The dark finish on the second island helps to delineate the kitchen from the family room.

In the family room, the carpet, chosen at an earlier stage, was a starting point for the redesign. "This carpet was one of the original carpets, and it was customized for Norma," says Jackie. "We picked all the wool swatches and had it designed to coordinate with other things she had." The newer pillows and drapes were carefully selected, drawing on hints of the existing colour scheme to blend seamlessly.

A sectional was chosen for its simple, clean lines and treated to Crypton fabric, sure to withstand almost anything that's thrown at it. Norma's love of doors was incorporated in the artwork hanging above the seating area. Crushed red velvet chairs that were once in Norma's parent's home, were updated with silky fabric in a crosshatch design.

The front entry of the home was also given new life. A single door with sidelights was removed, and larger double doors with glass panels were added. The area is now flooded with light.

In the upper level, the renovation continues. The flooring was stained to match the newer flooring throughout the rest of the home.

In the second bathroom, an awkward pony wall that jutted into the space was removed. A freestanding tub and his-and-hers sinks were added.

The master en suite was also reconfigured. Separate Jack-and-Jill sinks on opposite sides of the room were removed. The standard corner tub was traded in favour of a soaker tub. A makeup vanity was added, and one of Norma's much loved chairs was reupholstered to match its new surroundings. The total effect is Zen and tranquil.

Norma says from start to finish, Jackie was a partner every step of the way. "Jackie and I did it together. The beauty of Jackie is that she can read a customer's taste instantly, but she never imposes her taste or what she thinks. If she thought I was straying too far off the beaten path, she'd kind of pull me back. She was a great guide." With Jackie's keen eye and attention to detail, she was able to create a space that the couple love to come home to. **OH**







Lay letter pattern on foam-core board, trace around pattern with pencil. Using a utility knife, cut out design.

Using Mod Podge, paint small areas on design surface and start laying down photos. Paint one coat of Mod Podge over the adhered photos as you go. Continue until entire letter is covered.

Trim away overhanging bits of photo. Finish with two coats of Mod Podge.

Attach a picture hanger on the back.

TIP: If using a store-bought letter, you may want to paint around the outside edges before attaching photos. on



"We'd been here 15 years and we liked the size of the house and the proximity to the trails and everything Oakville offers in terms of lifestyle," says Trish. And yet, in order to stay and be happy, they knew the home would need to undergo some major updates.

"We said, let's make a commitment to a renovation that won't date, that has the look we're looking for, with quality materials, and that will allow us to stay in the house for 20 more years," says Don.

With their three daughters grown and out of the house, the couple decided the timing was right to tackle a redesign. They brought in designer **Elizabeth Munro** of **Elizabeth Munro** Design, whom they had worked with after they first moved into the house in 2000.

"Trish and Don love their pool and backyard, which are off the kitchen and family room, and wanted to incorporate them into the design," says Elizabeth. "They were also frustrated with the flow of the rooms, which wasn't working for their lifestyle. It was important too that they had a place to relax on the weekends when entertaining family. They wanted a calming and timeless classic look they could live with for many years."

The kitchen and family room were tackled first. A partial wall between the kitchen and family room and an oversize fieldstone corner fireplace were removed to allow for a more open, welcoming space that showcases the view of the pool. Flooring was updated by **Speers Flooring**. A new gas fireplace from **CobbleStonembers** was installed on the back wall, and tiled floor-to-ceiling with tiles from Olympia Tile. "It's the perfect focal point for the open-concept design," says Elizabeth.

Walls were painted navy, bringing a nautical feel to this city escape. "There are large windows and lots of light, and the navy blue is the perfect accent to the backyard pool, and it gives some personality to the calm palette throughout the rest of the house," says Elizabeth.

Beautiful blue was used in the family room to echo the backyard pool. A floor-to-ceiling tiled fireplace surround provides dimension and a beautiful focal point.

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In the kitchen, new custom cabinets extend to the ceiling, providing much needed extra storage. Sleek new appliances from **Goemans Appliances** add function. Since Trish and Don do much of their summer entertaining in the backyard, Elizabeth also added a hidden cabinet on the peninsula near the patio doors to store all their outdoor kitchen items. "It would have been a wasted corner, but we installed a hidden push latch on the end panel, so although it looks like a solid piece, it actually provides a place to hold outdoor dishes and glasses," Elizabeth says.

She also removed a door to the dining room so the couple could have a double oven, and added a cookbook shelf. "We call it the Elizabeth shelf," laughs Don.

While the couple chose to keep the porcelain tile that runs from the foyer all the way to the kitchen, the kitchen gets a new life with a coordinating quartz countertop from Caesarstone Canada and a new backsplash. "It made the floor look like new," says Don.

Elizabeth steered them away, however, from adding a kitchen island. "It's the number one client request on most of my kitchen projects," Elizabeth says. "I love an island, but it has to make sense. In this case, it would have made the kitchen cramped and tight. Instead, we went with a peninsula with an oversize countertop, which provides an overhang for

stools. Once the project was installed and they saw what a difference it made, they were glad that I had pushed them in that direction."

Elsewhere, the front room got a dramatic makeover, with a serene soft grey-green colour scheme that is a world away from the dark, stuffy library that it used to be.

The master bath also underwent a big change, and now boasts a luxurious, freestanding bathtub that replaced the home's old boxed-in tub. Reducing the tub's footprint also allowed them to enlarge the shower.

"We used large tile on the floor and shower walls, and an assortment of small tiles for a custom border around the shower walls," says Elizabeth. "We also used two different mosaic tiles to skirt the tub. There was lots of texture, but all done in the same palette. It provides a peaceful retreat at the end of the day." New lighting from Universal Lighting completes the space.

From the unique, carpet-like tile inlay beneath the master tub, to the family room fireplace feature wall, the home is now all about great flow and gorgeous design vignettes.

"Each room flows into the next and you can feel a calm come over you when you are there," says Elizabeth. "The colour palette, the furnishing, the lighting, it all just comes together in perfect balance and harmony."

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

KEEP IT COLOURFUL

If you can't have fun with colour in a craft room, where can you have fun? In this case, we went with a beautiful teal called Sylvan Mist by Benjamin Moore. It's soft and inviting but definitely saturated enough to be whimsical and playful. I think it's also a really fun accent to the MDF tongue and groove we applied to the walls from Metrie.


I added a bit of colour with the cabinet hardware. I selected cast bronze knobs in bright bronze from Shayne Fox Hardware, adding a pop of contrast against the white cabinets. The bold stools are from Wayfair and I incorporated more colour in accessories – paper clips, pens and a feather-shaped pen holder – all from HomeSense.



KEEP IT PRACTICAL

Craft rooms get messy. For this reason, I wanted a really durable, but beautiful floor. I used ErthCovering's Tivoli natural stone plank, which has the texture of wood but the durability and liquid resistance of stone.

And because it is a craft room, including a sink makes so much sense. We used the Delta Cassidy faucet in the Champagne Bronze Finish. It has Touch20 technology. That means that when your hands are full of glitter, simply tap anywhere on the faucet when the handle is in the on position and the water flows. I also love the pull-down spout.



This room is in the basement adjacent to the backyard entrance and as a result, it is cold and drafty, especially in the winter. To keep it cosy, we put in the Celeste stove by Dimplex. My favourite thing about this electric fireplace is just how portable and easy to install it is. A pop of colour in this carpet from HomeSense completes this cosy vignette. And to help with that exterior draft, we replaced the window with an Energy Star rated, top quality vinyl window in white by Fieldstone Windows, and finished it off with Metrie's Very Square casing to keep the details contemporary.

KEEP IT PERSONAL
A craft room is where you can get really fun and personal. This homeowner loves the outdoors are

personal. This homeowner loves the outdoors and essential oils! So I worked with Posterjack to create all of the artwork in the room using personal photos to create unique pieces.

In a craft room, this means a combination of shallow drawers for small items like essential oils and paper, base cabinets for tall bottles and jars, and tall cabinets for rolls of wrapping paper and banners. OH

It's a simple yet powerful concept – an entire block whooping it up in the middle of the road. For a few hours, traffic and regular routines are swapped out for barbecue grills, coolers full of beverages, road hockey and glow-stick wielding kids. As the daylight fades, new friendships have already begun to form.

Street parties are deeply embedded in Canadian culture. In Toronto's Annex neighbourhood, for example, Walmer Road residents recently toasted their 30th annual party, complete with dancing and tug of war.

Similarly, in the east end, many streets, mine included, have long-standing party traditions. With side benefits like increased safety and community spirit, these parties also tend to be keenly envied by everyone else. I can't count how often I've heard, "Wow, I wish we had a street party!"

So does your street want in on the party action? It's actually surprisingly doable – and so worthwhile. We consulted several successful party organizers in Toronto's east end and got recommendations for would-be planners.

Define your goals

Are you aiming to build community and inclusivity, or make memories for the neighbourhood kids? A clear vision helps guide planning decisions and also adds a sense of purpose to your event. Katharine Harrison, who launched a hugely successful event on her street 20 years ago, says she sought to build a safe and caring community after her son, now 21, was born with a disability. Over the years, she says, "The street became so social and so safe."

A few streets over, Rob Torr, Steph Graham and Theresa Bailie dreamed of an alternative car-free Halloween celebration. Now in its 10th year, their spooky-safe street event draws 300-plus kids.

Do lots of consultation and communication

Will we have a small potluck or line cooks? Activities? Do we block off the street or gather in a backyard? What's the best date? When starting up, Harrison recommends consulting neighbours on key aspects: "If you want the most people and participation, that's what you need to do."

Then, keep everyone in the loop with a Save the Date. The week before, send specifics about food, parking, kids' activities, etc.



If you want to block off traffic, check in early with your municipality about permit fees, barricades or other requirements. For her street's October event, Bailie says, "I begin permit applications in January or February so that there is a placeholder date for Transportation Services each year... I also need to reach out to other city divisions for approval with the waste collection plan, safety plan, fire plan, sound amplification (if applicable). We also need to provide general liability insurance as part of the road closure permit application process."

With these extras, Torr warns, "It is not a cheap endeavour."

Covercosts

After designing your event, Harrison suggests agreeing on a per-household donation to cover agreed-upon items. And don't forget to check with your municipality – some have funding available. Burlington for example, waives street closure fees and offers funding up to \$300 for block events like hockey and movie nights.

Share the workload

Having a fearless leader is great, Harrison says, "But you also need people to recognize that not everything can be done by one person." She suggests a steering committee and planning meetings. Then, for the actual party, delegate. With her day-long extravaganza, Harrison says, "Every family had to participate" with tasks ranging from running kids' activities to clean-up crew.

Pass on knowledge

Harrison says she's now backed away from a leadership role. "My kid is 21. I might be there on the evening to eat but chances are I'm doing something else later," she says. But not before she wrote up a project plan. Ultimately, while events may ebb and flow, passing on your knowledge makes it much more likely that the event you started might just live on for decades. OH

The grilled cheese sandwich has been around since the inventions of processed cheese and sliced bread. For your next party or luncheon, here are three elevated takes on everyone's favourite sandwich. After all, it's what's inside that counts.

TO ASSEMBLE

1 baguette, sliced

Butter

Choice of filling

Slice baguette into an even number of pieces. Butter one side of each piece.

Place slices butter side down in a frying pan over medium heat.

Fill each sandwich with toppings outlined in the recipes to follow. Top with a second slice of baguette, butter-side up.

Cook until bottom slice is golden brown, flip and repeat.

GRILLED CHEESE MINIS



1. Peach & Candied Bacon Filling

Gouda cheese, sliced

1 or 2 fresh peaches, thinly sliced

Candied bacon (see below)

Dijon marmalade (see below)

Arugula

Fresh sage, lightly fried

CANDIED BACON

1/4 cup brown sugar

⅓ cup maple syrup

Black pepper

1 pound thick sliced bacon

Preheat oven to 400°F, line a baking sheet with aluminum foil and top with a wire rack.

In a small bowl combine brown sugar, maple syrup and pepper.

Lay bacon slices on wire rack, brush with sugar mixture, flip and brush other side.

Bake for 10-15 minutes, flip slices over and continue to bake until crisp and caramelized.

DIJON MARMALADE

1 Tbsp Dijon mustard

1 Tbsp marmalade

Black pepper

Combine Dijon mustard and marmalade. Season with black pepper.

2. Fig & Onion Filling

Brie cheese, sliced

Fig caramelized onions (see below)

Arugula

FIG CARAMELIZED ONIONS

1 Tbsp olive oil

 $\frac{1 \text{ cup white onion, thinly sliced}}{2 \text{ figs, diced}}$

Splash of balsamic vinegar

Salt & pepper

In a pan over medium heat, add olive oil and onions. Slowly cook onions until golden brown, about 20 minutes.

Once caramelized, add diced figs and a splash of balsamic vinegar. Allow the vinegar to deglaze the bottom of the pan and scrape up all of the bits on the pan.

Season with salt and pepper and set aside to cool.

3. Spinach Walnut Pesto Filling

Gorgonzola cheese, sliced
Spinach pesto (see below)

Dried cranberries

SPINACH PESTO

Heaping handful of fresh spinach

Handful of fresh basil

½ cup walnuts

¼ cup parmesan cheese, grated

2 cloves garlic

2 Tbsp olive oil

Salt and pepper

In a food processor, add spinach, basil, walnuts, parmesan and garlic.

Turn processor on and slowly add olive oil. Process until smooth

Season with salt and pepper to taste. $\mathbf{o}\mathbf{H}$





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
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
