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
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
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A MODERN SPIN ON OLD-WORLD eleganoce

From the moment the dramatic, wrought iron gates widen to welcome you onto the property, there's no doubt you've arrived somewhere special.

Its first impression suggests a stately European country house passed down through generations with stone façades, classically symmetrical proportions and elegant gardens. Upon closer inspection, the home reveals its true character. Despite its old-world aesthetic, the recently built beauty is a functional and modern family home.

At 13,000 sq. ft., this luxury home was conceived with enough space to accommodate everything the imaginative homeowner desired. The one-of-a-kind abode boasts extras such as an opulent two-storey foyer, gracious guest suites, a butler's pantry, home gym and massive stone terrace on the rear façade. The lower level is an entertainer's delight, complete with a recreation room, pub and – the pièce de résistance – an indoor 45-foot pool and hot tub.

A well-travelled aficionado of European style, the discriminating homeowner had a particular vision of what his home should feel like. He credits custom home designer **David Small** of **David Small Designs** with parlaying his traditional tastes and eclectic wish list into an actual plan. "David listened well and the resulting design reflects that."

David stressed that the spectacular outcome was due to a team approach, one that involved not only his own contributions and the client's input, but also the skills of fourth-generation builder Jay Robinson of Jay Robinson Custom Homes Inc. Steven Nechacov of Showcase Interiors Inc. is acknowledged for his significant role in the design and development of many of the key spaces of the home.







One of those key spaces is definitely the foyer, which David accurately refers to as "jaw-dropping" and the owner names a favourite feature. "This is one of those homes," remarks David, "where you drive up, you see the formality, you see the grandeur, you open the front door and you're not let down"

A glance upward reveals a soaring 18-foot ceiling punctuated by a grand chandelier. A glance downward reveals polished Crema Marfil flooring accented by a marble mosaic inlay border. A spiraling dual staircase boasts handcrafted wrought-iron railings custom-made by Maks Iron Works. The design motif repeats on the exterior gates. An imported stair runner, composed of a silk tapestry border on a background of the finest English wool, leads the eye up to the mezzanine. All the details – original artwork, carefully-sourced materials, toasty heated floors – announce "welcome to an extraordinary place."

As expected, nothing is overlooked in the gourmet kitchen, designed by Showcase Interiors. The focal point is a 19-foot-long island. Handcarved, glass-fronted cabinetry separates it from the breakfast area and family room, allowing light to filter through while creating a necessary barrier. The dining room is adorned with intricate plaster mouldings – including a huge baroque medallion on the ceiling.

When conceptualizing his dream home, it was important to the homeowner that there was a formality to everything and, most importantly, continuity. Not a fan of homes with "dual-personalities" (like traditional exteriors with modern interiors), he challenged David to create something with "formal, stately architecture that was to go top-to-bottom, and inside out."

Ironically, although they did achieve style continuity, the house nonetheless has a dual personality. Discreetly tucked behind wall panels, above coved ceilings, and beneath stone floors are cameras, speakers, wiring for lighting and climate control, and a myriad of other technological marvels that allow this seemingly traditional home to function in the most modern of ways. Burlington's **Clinton Howell** of **H2 Systems Inc.** installed over 20,000 ft. of cable to power the state-of-theart home theatre, automation and integration systems.

The luxurious master suite is an ideal example of high-tech-meets-neoclassical-style. French doors overlook manicured gardens, an exquisite barreled ceiling is embellished with moulding, and millwork decorates a two-sided fireplace that also warms the adjoining en suite. At the same time, the room boasts surround-sound, a lighting system, touchscreen security and heated floors. The icing on the cake is the wardrobe suite outfitted in solid wood cabinetry. It features a vestibule, his-and-hers areas and a tiny but well-equipped kitchenette.

On the lower level of the home, David is especially proud of the pool enclosure. "That whole wing at the back of the house is something that you wouldn't be expecting to see." It's also a favourite of the man of the house who enjoys sneaking down for a swim before the sun or the family

is up. "It's great when all the other lights are turned off and only the pool is lit. The effect is so cool. I feel I am in a bit of an oasis."

If you're thinking there's no new detail this discerning gentleman can dream up for his home, you'd be wrong. He recently commissioned **Mary Ellen Farrow** of **Abbozzo Gallery** to create a one-of-a-kind garden sculpture. He's also refurnishing the dining room. Is he tiring of all the design decisions? "No! This process was not at all stressful. I'd love to do it again. I don't plan to move... don't get me wrong! But I would be happy to do a project like this again."

Despite the success here, David Small Designs has focused lately on homes with contemporary lines. When asked if he is over designing traditional homes, David emphatically disagrees. "I love that this house is different. Diversity and creativity are the things we celebrate, and I want our portfolio to show the full gamut of what we can do." After touring this Burlington Bluffs marvel, it's clear that whether modern, traditional, or a mix of both, David can breathe life to anyone's idea of a dream home. **OH**

Dear OH. I'm building a new home and giving a lot of thought to my kitchen. Can you help me with some current ideas for new appliances and generally modernizing my space? - Donna



THE MODERN KITCHEN

A kitchen has a lot of moving parts and when discussing technology we tend to focus on appliances. However, there are a few other ways to make your kitchen look modern and benefit from progress or changes in design.

Here is my Top 10 List of Kitchen Advances (including appliances) that will help you cook and entertain with ease:

- 1. Refrigeration. One new development is to make our fridges "smart" so to speak. LCD screens on the outside are compatible with apps for note taking, scheduling and viewing recipes. Say goodbye to sticky notes and magnets, and hello to a built-in information station. Some of the more mainstream brands are also including higher end options like LED lights, which really jazz up the interior.
- 2. In oven technology, one of the biggest changes is the rise in popularity of steam ovens. Injecting moisture into cooking will certainly keep meats moist, but these ovens also claim to reduce cooking time significantly. One drawback is the lack of browning you get with a traditional oven. However with that added time you can pop your chicken into your traditional oven for a quick broil.
- 3. With virtually no waiting time and absolute control, induction technology has changed the world of electric cooktops. The energy savings alone make up for the minor inconvenience of a glass surface (which is not resistant to scratching) and the need for magnetic pots. This is a small price to pay. Imagine, when your pasta starts to boil over you don't have to pick up that heavy pot to avoid a nasty mess, you simply turn the heat down and it instantly reacts.
- 4. A popular item that has become more affordable is the microwave drawer. With an open kitchen design, you tend to sacrifice upper cabinets. Instead, items are placed lower down, like in an island. With a microwave, this always posed a challenge. Using a drawer makes it easier as you access your food from above. This idea is brilliant.
- 5. Using a sensor (like in a public washroom), a touchless faucet is just that - you don't have to touch it. They are sanitary and convenient for little ones. This is ideal for hand washing (because they mix hot and cold water) but as your main kitchen faucet, you still have to adjust the temperature the old fashioned way.
- 6. A really luxe cabinetry option is the electronic drawer slide. You lightly touch the face of your drawer and it will electronically push itself out. To close, simply touch the face again and in it will



go. No more slamming and no more half closed drawers, but beware of the cost!

- 7. LED lighting technology has developed in leaps and bounds. If you were hesitant due to the inability to dim your lights and the cold stark tone, those problems have been solved. Warm light and dimmable bulbs make LED lighting the next generation in all things lit. The bulbs are pricey, but you will save big in the long run - they last for years and are energy efficient... and fully recyclable too!
- Stainless steel and glass are not exactly new to the world, but their use in a modern setting can be remarkable. A glass or stainless backsplash is sleek and seamless (depending on size) making it a clean option compared to porous grout lines. Stainless toe kicks (the base of the cabinet) create a nice modern detail and glass walls make an otherwise dull space reflective and bright.
- One of my favourite uses for an iPad is as a never-ending recipe book, however to use it properly you need a great stand. Try the P2 by Elago for a simple and affordable solution. Next time you have a question about cooking a roast, the answer will be right in front of you.
- 10. Whether cooking for yourself or a group, music is definitely important. So for the kitchen, try the Sonos wireless music system. This can be loaded onto your iPad

(or maybe your fridge!) and connect you with any music, radio show or station you can access online. Limitless listening. I consider this a must-have (it's easy to use too).

The key to modernizing your space is to make it work for you. Think about how you live in your kitchen and what tools are important to you. For myself, it had to be sparse, clean, quick and easy. Translation: My appliances have glass fronts for easy cleaning; I installed big, long stainless pulls on my drawers for easy access; and the iPad became a permanent kitchen fixture. The only trouble is keeping it on the counter, and not in the hands of the kids! OH


hand-pick and custom-order items for a truly unique look.



TREASURE HUNTING

Nothing quite compares to the adrenaline rush you get while shopping for antiques – imagining where a piece came from, who it belonged to, and what it was used for is exciting.

The best part is that feeling you get when you have to have it, and you better grab it right away or someone else will. Remember: you snooze you lose!

Going through museum-like shops is an adventure and if you're a serious shopper looking for authentic antiques, then it's very important that you go well equipped. Here are some tips and guidelines to encourage a smart purchase and to avoid disappointment.

1. Do Your Homework

Taking a few hours and getting online or digging into a couple of books is well worth it so that you're well educated when it comes to buying the right item for you. You will want to learn about how to tell if an item is authentic or a reproduction, and what traits and characteristics to look for in determining the value. Just because something has a high price tag doesn't mean that it's real. The main goal is to make a confident buy and feel good about what you are taking home at the end of the day.


There is a vast array of books on this subject – my top picks include:

- Miller's Antiques Handbook and Price Guide 2012-2013
- Unitt's Book of Marks on Antiques & Collectibles
- Antiques 101: A Crash Course in Everything Antique

2. Restoration

Just because a piece looks "old" doesn't mean it's the perfect antique. It may actually be in very poor condition and in need of some TLC. Always fully inspect the item before deciding to buy it:

- Open its drawers or doors
- Examine the bottom of it
- Check that its legs or arms are steady
- Pick up the piece to see if anything falls off
- Smell the item odd odours could mean rot or decay
- Look for any cracked glass



Incorporating accessories into your workspace can be simple: colourful spools of thread, a wrought-iron judy, and framed prints of vintage sewing patterns tell of this homeowner's love of fashion.

Similarly-themed items make a charming vignette in even the smallest spaces. .



- Run your hand against the surface (if an antique is chipped, torn or damaged in any way, it may decrease its value drastically)
- If the piece is in need of some work, then it's a good idea to ask the seller if they know how and if it can be reconditioned. It's always wise to know what to expect ahead of time, so that way you know what you're in for once it's yours.

If you're a good "do-it-yourselfer," then you may be able to tackle some of the restoration on your own. However, if you're not 100 per cent confident in your DIY abilities then you may want to have a professional take care of it. There are many small shops that specialize in the refurbishment business.

3. Look Outside The Antique Shop

Antiques and unique collectibles are around us everywhere. Check out flea markets or garage sales; sometimes even local malls hold antique bazaars. I actually found an amazing elaborate gilt side table for my place curb-side! Browse often and compare – the more you search the more you'll know, which will help in finding the perfect items for you and your home.

4. Shopping in the UK

The United Kingdom is very well known for its authentic antiques, so if you're really interested in this field, I would highly suggest taking the trip. The UK has a prominent history in trade and invention, and many of the pieces from these times still remain in the region.

You might want to consider planning your trip around an antique fair. England's biggest is held at Newark in Nottinghamshire, which has 4,000 stalls of vendors! Following close behind with 3,000 stalls is the Arthur Swallow fair at the Lincolnshire Showground, which takes place six times a year. London's Portobello Market is also a wonderful place to browse for the perfect treasure.

There are also many antique centres that take place all year around. Two renowned dealers you may want to check out would be Woburn Abbey Antiques Centre in Bedfordshire and Edenbridge Galleries in Kent House where there are many individual shops selling furniture, clocks and ceramics.

My favourite antique market of all time is Le Marché aux Puces de Saint-Ouen in Paris. $\mathbf{o}\mathbf{H}$

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SPRINGTIME EGGS EN CO CO tte

I love eggs. Eggs always have my back. I count on them at least once a week for a quick and easy dinner. Breakfast never seems quite complete without them. And when I feel the need to impress there's baked eggs – oeufs en cocotte if I'm really out to make an impression!

I consider eggs en cocotte to be the "little black dress" of egg dishes. You can dress them up for any occasion. They are so lovely in their individual ramekins and have a perfect balance of delicacy and richness. Like little pots of heaven!

And they're dead easy. Just take care to not overcook them or the egg will become rubbery and certainly lose its appeal. Remember that the ramekin retains heat and the egg will continue cooking once out of the oven.

For this recipe, the eggs are enhanced with asparagus and mushrooms to celebrate spring. But you can play with other ingredients in the dish. Consider sautéed spinach and crumbled feta cheese, or chopped tomatoes and shredded cheddar cheese, or crispy bacon bits and parsley. The options are endless! And if you're cooking for a crowd the recipe easily doubles, or even triples.

EGGS EN COCOTTE

Serves 2

2 tsp olive oil

4 mushrooms, thinly sliced

4 spears asparagus, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces

2 tbsp whipping cream

2 eggs

1 tbsp finely grated Parmesan cheese

Pinch each salt and cracked pepper

1 tbsp chopped fresh chives

- In small skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat, fry mushrooms until golden brown, about 6 minutes. Transfer to plate. In same skillet, fry asparagus until bright green and tender, about 3 minutes. Transfer to plate with mushrooms.
- Divide mushrooms and asparagus between two buttered 1-cup ovenproof ramekins. Into each add half of the cream, one of the eggs and sprinkle with half of the Parmesan.
- Place ramekins in baking dish. Pour boiling water into the dish until it reaches halfway up the sides of the ramekins.
- Bake in 375°F oven until egg whites are set on the edge, but the centre is still slightly jiggly and the yolks remain soft, about 8 minutes. Sprinkle each with salt and pepper and half of the chives. Let stand for 2 to 3 minutes before serving with toast points. **OH**










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
