
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
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


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
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


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
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
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editor's note

Interior Designer **Dolores Pian** shares her ideas.



Our summers may be short, but from March through July and on to November, cooking outdoors allows us to share our food experiences with family and friends while we extend our outdoor play time. More and more people are choosing to invest in their homes and backyards rather than vacation elsewhere.

Before planning and spending on an outdoor kitchen, ask yourself some simple questions:

- How much time do I want to devote to maintenance? Knowing this will save you a lot of grief and disappointment.
- What's critical-to-have, must-have and nice-to-have?

Critical to Know

• Safety first. Make sure you meet your region's building and fire codes. There's a difference between a code for building a house and a code for preventing open

flames in and near a building. They are two different things.

Protect combustible materials.

Choosing Cabinets and Materials

Cabinets and counters need to be corrosion and weather resistant. low maintenance and made with stable materials. All materials expand and contract with temperature change and moisture. Sun fades colours, and natural materials break down over time. There are three types of cabinetry-based kitchens for outdoor use: HDPE/Polymer, wood and stainless steel.

Polymer: Waterproof, sun safe, available in a variety of solid colours, lower maintenance, plastic, variable durability.

Wood: Flexible design, requires some maintenance, most affordable, not fire

Stainless Steel: Heat and fire resistant. non-corrosive, easy to clean, available in powder-coated colours.

Things to Consider

Appearance: What do I want to see when I look at my outdoor kitchen? Choose your landscaping and furniture for that perfect outdoor style.

Clean-Up: Install a sink with water. You may not want to use your indoor kitchen to clean greasy, sooty stuff. Plan ahead for plumbing.

Heating and Electrical: Layer your heat sources. Consider heat lamps, fire pits or a built-in infrared heater. Make sure you put in multiple electrical outlets that meet code. Plan ahead for electrical.

Shade: Create shade from the sun and protection from the rain with pergolas, retractable patio covers or tents.

Stay Cool: Cool yourself off with fans, misters or rugs to shield you from the hot floor and use light-coloured furniture.

Layout and Seating: Transition your rooms with removable screens, doors and walls. Offer a variety of seating – low Muskoka chairs, chaise loungers, stools and benches.

Storage Space: The ultimate amenity. Think of what else may need to be stored – equipment, furniture, sports and hobbies. You don't want to run back and forth from the house or garage, to the outdoor living area.

Small Spaces – Condo Balconies and Terraces

Electric grills make outdoor eating possible despite strict fire and safety codes. Brown Jordan has fully assembled kitchens for terraces, to be lifted by a crane, or custom units transported by a service elevator.

Nice to Have and Trending

- Specialty right-sized appliances replacing mammoth barbecue grills. These can include: Argentinian grills, smokers, side burners, pizza ovens, fridges, dishwashers, beer on tap, espresso machines, ice makers and Kamado-
- Lighting schemes, televisions and sound systems. Treat this space like another room of the house.

Value to Your Home

Outdoor kitchens seem to be replacing the pool as an add-on feature. It increases your competitive edge when selling because people will imagine themselves having great times in their new backyard.

Good design blurs the lines between the indoors and the outdoors. In what creative ways have you designed your very own private outdoor oasis? on





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




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INGREDIENTS

4 egg whites

Pinch of salt

1/4 cup cold water

1-¼ cups sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp vinegar

1 Tbsp + 1 tsp cornstarch

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 300°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Draw a six-inch circle in the centre on the side of the parchment that will face down. This will be your guide when you shape the pavlova.

Combine egg whites and salt in a stand mixer and beat on medium-high until stiff peaks are formed. Be careful not to over-whip the egg whites at this stage. The egg whites will be thick and foamy and a peak will form when the beater is lifted out of the egg. Turn the mixer to low and slowly add the water and then the sugar. Turn the mixer back up to medium-high and beat until stiff peaks are again formed. The eggs will be thick and glossy. Remove bowl from mixer and fold in vanilla, vinegar and cornstarch.

Pile the meringue onto the circle on the baking sheet. With a spatula, smooth edges and top of the pavlova so it almost forms a dome. If preferred, create ridges in the side of the pavlova by swiping the sides in an upward motion.

Bake the pavlova for 30 minutes. Do not open oven! Turn oven down to 275°F and bake for another 45 minutes. Let cool completely in the oven for an hour or overnight. It is normal for the pavlova to crack and the centre to sink in.

Remove from oven when cool.

Citrus Curd

INGREDIENTS

4 egg yolks

 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup citrus juice of choice (lemon, blood orange, etc.)

1 tsp citrus zest

⅓ cup sugar

3 Tbsp unsalted butter

DIRECTIONS

Combine all ingredients in a double boiler and heat on medium-high, stirring continuously until mixture thickens and coats the back of a spoon. Strain curd through a fine mesh sieve into a bowl. Cover the top of the curd with plastic wrap directly on the curd and chill until cooled.

GARNISHES

Fresh whipped cream Berries Mint Powdered sugar

ASSEMBLE PAVLOVA

Assemble shortly before serving. Fill the centre of the pavlova with curd, whipped cream and berries. Garnish with mint and powdered sugar. **OH**

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

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Since Liane and Gary were already locals, they knew the property was "the one" as soon as they saw it. They turned to **CMA Custom Homes**Group to help with the build. "We have a great relationship with our builder," says Liane. "For a year he was like a second husband!"

The French chateau-style home built for Liane, Gary and their three daughters is also home to Georgie and Seager, two well-loved Portuguese Water Dogs. Pictures of the family are proudly displayed throughout, and when the girls return from school, they are embraced with the comforts of home. But it's Georgie and Seager who enjoy the space while the kids are away. "We love our pups, they are a part of our lives, and we thought of them when designing our home," says Liane.

The great room opens to the kitchen, and boasts a gas fireplace with stone surround. A sparkling chandelier, aptly named The Comet, sits in the centre of the coffered ceiling. "Lighting is the jewelry of the home," says Liane. The home throughout is adorned with pieces from Lando Lighting.

A sunroom just off the great room with floor-to-ceiling windows from **Stone River Windows & Doors** offers a panoramic view of the backyard oasis. It's the family's favourite place to relax; even the dogs lounge in the sunshine.

In the kitchen, white shaker cabinetry from **Marana** and **Cambria** countertops create a clean aesthetic. "We chose the countertops first," says Liane. "They were the focal point of the kitchen, and everything else came after." The kitchen also includes appliances from **Caplan's Appliances**, a coffee station, wine fridge and a walk-in pantry to help the family stay organized. *Continued on page 32*

The spacious main floor includes a dining room, a living room dubbed *Muskoka in the City*, an office, laundry room and mudroom. The lower level is beautifully finished with heated floors and a built-in wash station for the pups.

The use of colour and texture helps set the tone of a space. Liane worked with **Jane Lockhart**, interior designer and owner of the award-winning firm **Jane Lockhart Interior Design** to select the right colour palettes, wallpaper and window treatments throughout.

In the upper level, the east wing master suite is separated by a hallway with a unique coffered ceiling and two skylights. The master incudes a balcony for relaxing on easy summer mornings. Liane's closet is fit for a queen. Sliding barn doors open to custom cabinetry, Cambria countertops and crystal chandeliers. "I have to admit," says Liane, "this closet is one of my favourite features. It's my happy place."

As with any major build, there were obstacles to consider. "This property is unique," says home designer **David Small** of **David Small Designs**. "It's a curved corner lot tucked between a major road and a

winding side street, and as a result, we needed to position the home to block street noise and provide privacy while focusing on the view and access to two side yards with mature trees." The shape of the home played a crucial role, angling to reflect the natural curve of the property, and great care was taken to ensure the home's size didn't dominate the land. Large gables and a steeply pitched roof were included to conceal the second floor. "I am very proud of this house," says David. "Not only are the elements full of character, but when you look at the front, you have no idea there is a second floor and a resort at the side."

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


There were also lessons learned. "In hindsight," says Gary, the homeowner, "we should have had the landscaping designed at the same time as the house, so both worked together in regards to permits and such. It would have saved time." The landscape, designed and executed by ProScape Land **Design Inc**, features lush groupings of plants, imported sandstone and limestone hardscapes, hammered copper fire bowls flanking the pool's stone wall and a custom timber pergola. The outdoor living space also includes a large covered porch with a wood-burning fireplace and glass railing.

The pool was done by Gib-San Pools. "The pergola structure with custom metal hardware is definitely a statement," says Tom Henderson, president of ProScape Land Design Inc. "And everything – the water features, fire features, lighting, irrigation, outdoor speakers - can be controlled with the homeowners' cell phones." It's a handy addition when entertaining or playing with the pups in the yard, two of Liane and Gary's favourite pastimes. "We love having the second side yard for the dogs," says Liane. "It's artificial turf, so they can go nuts playing and not make a mess when they come inside."

If Georgie and Seager could speak, they'd probably agree. Oh, the pawsibilities. OH





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

Clipped and formal hedgerows have charmed society for centuries. Used to create living privacy walls, boundaries and attractive garden borders, hedges have many practical uses and also add value to any property.





Leage YOUR INVESTMENT

The use of hedges dates back to 4000 BC in ancient Egypt where the first boxwoods were clipped for ornamental purposes. Amazingly, this style has some serious staying power as they are still being used present day. As mentioned, hedges can serve multiple purposes: they can conceal unsightly views, create privacy from nosy neighbours and significantly cut down on noise pollution. Hedging can make a patio space warm and cosy by acting as a windbreak and it can cut down on snow accumulation by acting as a snow fence. It can delineate property lines and formalize gardens that contain more unruly plant life by creating a tidy edge.

Hedges can be planted in a range of types and sizes depending on the required result. Select the plant that meets your needs.

THYME: One of the shortest hedge plants available and sometimes called edges instead of hedges, these borders look especially smart in formal herb gardens when acting as dividing lines between other, wilder looking herb species.

BOXWOOD: The "little black dress" of the garden world (meaning everyone should have one), boxwood is the perfect small to medium size hedge. Its pretty evergreen leaves take very well to pruning. Korean Littleleaf Boxwood (Buxus microphylla var koreana) is one of the heartiest, just be sure to plant it in an area that isn't exposed to high winds or road salt.

YEW: Yews make gorgeous hedges but range wildly in height from two-and-ahalf-feet to over 50 feet so read the plant

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labels carefully. As with most evergreens, it can be susceptible to wind burn and needs to be protected from strong winter winds.

CEDAR: Probably the hedging you are most familiar with, cedar is an ideal choice where a tall, slim, year-round privacy screen is needed. White cedar, black cedar, even emerald cedar will work well. Rest assured, cedar trees don't specifically attract mosquitoes though any moist and shady spot will! Prune annually in mid-July for best results.

HEMLOCK: Although Canadian hemlock grow as large trees in the wild, they are sometimes sold in shrub form for use as hedges. Prune hemlock hedging twice per year, from late June to late August, for the first three years to encourage dense growth. After three years, prune once in late June, just don't cut the leader until it's at the desired height.

NORTHERN PRIVET: A lovely fast-growing deciduous hedge of about six feet in height. It has small bright green leaves and enjoys getting trims.

ALPINE CURRENT: A very hearty mid-sized deciduous shrub with interesting leaf shape. It also tolerates high winds, cold and road salt well.

PYRAMIDAL ENGLISH OAK, HORNBEAM,

DAWYCK BEECH: Perhaps not the typical scenario that most people think of for hedging, but really, any narrow deciduous tree can be planted tightly in a row to style a tall hedge. These work well where a tall screen is needed but spacing is tight. They can look very stately.

LILAC, DOGWOOD, ROSE OF SHARON. SPIREA. BURNING BUSH. HYDRANGEA.

WEIGELA: Many garden variety deciduous shrubs can be trained as hedges, just be sure to prune yearly to achieve the desired height and width. It's also imperative that if you'd like your hedge to flower, prune at the correct time of year so that you aren't removing the flower buds prematurely. A good rule of thumb is prune late-flowering shrubs in early spring and spring-flowering shrubs after flowering.

The amount of space you have and how dense you'd like your screen will determine the number of rows you plant. For large spaces, consider planting a double row to make a hedge fill in twice as fast. Spacing between rows is based on crown width, but at a minimum try to avoid root crowding by setting at least

12- to 24-inches apart, measuring from the centre of the plant. Spacing will depend on the type of shrub or tree chosen, how close you'd like them at maturity, and your patience level. Keep in mind, when planting in rows close together, trees and shrubs will not spread out as wide as if they were a single species in a landscape.

Start training your hedge after it is established and growing vigorously. Generally this takes one to two years after planting. To train, trim top and sides as required for the species, removing about one-half the length of new shoots. Ideal hedge shapes are wider at the base than the top to allow sunlight to reach the lower leaves.

It can take a few years after planting for a new hedge to take shape and start looking great. Be patient, they are worth the investment! OH





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

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

Look up. Is a popcorn ceiling staring back at you? If so, it might be time for a change. Here's some inspiration for that overlooked "fifth wall" in every room.



Reclaimed barn boards add rustic, textured character and provide an interesting colour palette to draw from. Plywood is another choice and when sealed with a gloss varnish, adds warmth and simplicity to a space.





BEADBOARD

No longer just for the cottage, use it on any ceiling. In a peaked ceiling, try running the boards vertically towards the peak, it will draw the eye upwards. A real time saver if placed right over a popcorn ceiling.




You need ceiling height to get the full effect of this style of finish, as the elements can overwhelm a nine-foot ceiling. This design adds formality and looks best in a living or dining room.

METAL

Metal ceiling tiles were introduced in the 1800s as an affordable alternative to detailed plasterwork. Today, reproductions are plastic and come in a variety of patterns. Of course, if you can find the antique tiles, their patina and dented appearance will add incredible character.



LIGHTING

LED lights come in many options these days. Pot lights are smaller and directional and bulbs come in cool and warm light. LED strips or tape come in several lengths and colours and are waterproof.



PAINT-

In some ways, paint is one of the easiest ways to finish a ceiling, but try to move away from white. Stencils, stripes, faux finishes and glazes will add that extra touch or just use a high-gloss paint in a rich dark colour.






If beams are existing and need an update they can be re-clad. You can paint or stain existing beams. Faux wood beams can also be added. OH

In the fast fashion world we live in today, it's hard to imagine anyone putting their heart and soul into any one thing, but that's exactly what Mississauga builder Peter Giampuzzi of Ornella Homes has done with his Port Credit project.

"Ornella Homes is a family business, with roots in the construction industry since the early 1950s. My grandparents were very industrious – true craftspeople: stone masons, woodworkers, plumbers. They were very proud of their work," says Peter, who started in the masonry business doing renovations and got into building 12 years ago. "Ornella Homes celebrates great craftsmanship through excellence in design and construction,

which we share with our very happy clients, every day."

The home boasts a great address just a couple of blocks from the lake. "It's a highly pedestrian neighbourhood," says project home designer **David Small** of **David Small Designs**. "You can leave your car at home and walk to restaurants or to the waterfront park. Also, 75-foot lots are very rare in this area; most are 50-foot. This particular property is

built on a double lot, so it's unique for this neighbourhood."

The size was something David was cognisant of when designing the layout. "The way we deal with that architecturally is that we portray a bungalow architecture," he says. "Nowhere are you seeing a full-height, two-storey wall in order to be respectful of the neighbourhood. It's done in a way so as not to be too overpowering. We're keeping the house

low to fit in with the neighbourhood."

The home was designed for a senior executive and his family who desired an elegant living and entertainment space. "We used a blend of local and import products to deliver a style which was uniquely Canadian," says Peter. "The stone was ordered direct from a local quarry in Owen Sound. The exterior mouldings are laser cut and installed using injection foam so there's no

warping or cracking over time." The roof is a blend of limestone, grey cedar shakes and lead-coated copper.

"The exterior facade blends Indiana limestone and grey field stone, and cedar shakes from Quebec," adds Peter. "We carried some of that masonry work through to the interior to create a very natural look. We wanted to break the boundary between the interior and exterior of the home."

With the volume of stonework, the right materials and tradespeople were essential. **Quartex Surfaces** supplied all the countertops, and Peter recruited Pasquale, a 74-year-old stonemason, and his two friends Joe and Tony. "They did all the masonry work on the home the old-fashioned way, with hammers and chisels," says Peter. "Pasquale has been a mason since he started with his father at 12-years-old in Calabria, Italy."

From the front door, visitors can see straight through to the massive double-sided stone fireplace in the great room. "The space is designed with perfect symmetry throughout," says Peter of the 24-foot vaulted ceiling that leads from the front door to the back. "It has a cathedral effect, and lines up with the double-sided fireplace at the back, creating a light tunnel though the house."

The great room fireplace mantel is made from 2,000 pounds of graphite marble, which is also used for a coffee and side table. A sparkling chandelier from Restoration Hardware is a showstopper. "It's 600 pounds of polished nickel with 18 candles; we had to reinforce the roof to support the load," says Peter.

The open-concept kitchen features double-framed shaker-style cabinetry in painted poplar, and a white oak bar and accents. "We tied the white oak rafters into the kitchen drawers and canopy. We had the carpenters finish the same wood for the columns, coffee tables and kitchen tables. It's just beautiful," says Peter.

The striking white oak is seamlessly paired with a complementary quartz island, backsplash and countertop. It's not surprising that the kitchen won the Architectural Woodwork Manufacturers Association of Canada (AWMAC) Award of Excellence for Best Residential Project of 2019. "All the millwork was completed in the house by Filipe Silva of Allwood Carpentry. He's a third-generation millwork craftsman and an incredibly talented artisan. Each part of the kitchen was handmade according to spec to be grand without being overly audacious. He is a truly one-of-a-kind artist," says Peter.

In the upper level, a bridge from the stairs leads to four bedrooms, each with its own en suite. "It looks like the stairs are floating off the great room," says Peter, who explains that they had to use cantilevered steel on the stairs to avoid columns that might obstruct the impressive view below.

The master bedroom boasts an upholstered headboard with a walnut frame. In the master bath, large porcelain floor tiles from **Rivalda** carry through to the shower. "You have to install them with suction cups because they're so big. It takes time, but it's worth it," says Peter.

Meanwhile, the lower level boasts a 2,000-bottle wine room and home theatre system, as well as a large bar area, sauna, exercise room and a nanny/in-law suite.

Leading downstairs, a veneer limestone feature wall is lit with flood lights, lending the space a museum quality. It's unexpected and yet just right for this showstopper home.

"Peter really did a great job; he spared no expense," says David. "He put a lot of heart and soul into this."

"We built it according to our style," says Peter. "We have a lot of good suppliers and really good trades, and it makes a good team. My masons have been doing masonry for over 50 years and the carpenters as well. They work because they love the craft."

"We build a lasting product both in design and durability, which we feel will continue to impress 10, 20 and 50 years down the road," says Peter. "A beautiful home should look as nice today as it will a century from now." он









SUMMER has finally arrived with longer days and irresistible pool decks, but it can also bring the sting of pricey air conditioning. The experts at Sustainable Buildings Canada (SBC) have come up with 10 tips for avoiding a sunburned wallet this year.

SBC is a Canadian non-profit advancing "the environmental and energy performance of the built environment." Its executive director Michael Singleton and board director Larry Brydon suggest homeowners balance old-school wisdom and eco-friendly practices to optimize savings.

AVOID THE DEEP FREEZE

Set the thermostat a little higher than the standard 22°C. Michael suggests 26°-27°C instead. "You know how you go into a mall in the summer and it's freezing? There's no need for that."

PAY ONLY TO PLAY

"Turn off the air conditioner when you're not home." It may seem obvious, but Michael says many people forget. Programmable thermostats can automate the change for regular outings, like going to work.

CALL ON MOTHER NATURE

Open the windows at night when it's cooler outside, and close them by lunchtime when it's cooler inside. Taking advantage of crossventilation by opening two or more windows in a room or house can be particularly effective. "That's free cooling," adds Michael.

CREATE A WIND CHILL

Overhead fans generate a cooling breeze and use the same amount of electricity as a 75-watt light bulb, according to Michael. "Put them on counter clockwise and get the air moving." Again, he reminds homeowners to turn all fans off when not at home.

LANDSCAPE STRATEGICALLY

"It's most effective to shade from the exterior," Larry says. On the west side of a house, where the sunshine is most intense, he advises planting a maple tree. Not only will it help in summer, but in winter it'll drop its leaves and let the sun shine through for additional heat.

CONSUMER

BE AN INFORMED

Air conditioners are ranked based upon their Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio (SEER) between 13 (the current minimum) and 21. "A 16 to 18 is fine," Larry advises. "Or purchase an Energy Star if you don't want to bother with SEER."

KEEP A SUMMER CHECKLIST

Larry's list starts with checking and replacing filters. An annual cleaning and inspection will extend an air conditioner's lifespan by ensuring all parts work and air flow is uncompromised.

PUT THE FIRE OUT

Check gas fireplaces and turn off any standing pilot lights. This task also made Larry's checklist. Although these pilot lights were more common 10 years ago, many are still in operation and give off the equivalent heat of a big candle, he warns.

TURN DOWN THE **HUMIDISTAT**

Adding moisture to dry winter air can keep wooden floors from buckling and cabinets from warping, says Larry, but it's unnecessary in summer. If the humidifier continues to run all summer, cooling appliances have to work harder.

REPLACE INCANDESCENT U LIGHT BULBS

Cool compact fluorescent lamps or lights (CFLs) and light-emitting diode bulbs (LEDs) save money in two ways, Larry reminds. First, they draw less electricity than their incandescent cousins, which has an immediate impact. Second, they don't produce heat that air conditioners have to remove.

When it's lovely outside, that's a good place to be. Outdoor cooking and living can lower the heat generated inside and the need for expensive cooling options. A final option: when it gets too hot, you can always grab a jacket and head to the mall. OH



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
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
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
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This Old House

How can a home built before the days of automation and heated floors meet modern-day needs? Jordan Hart and John Black of Black-Hart Construction Inc. seamlessly blended modern function with an older aesthetic to strike the right balance with this home renovation.







Homeowners Roslyn MacLean and Kevin September considered selling their Oakville abode, but found it difficult to replicate the charm of an older home in an ideal neighbourhood, so they called on Black-Hart to renovate.

"We get involved very early on with projects so that when we move to construction, things move quickly," says Jordan. "It's a lot of preplanning and coordination with the client from the start."

On the exterior, the team added a walkway with old-world, brickstyle pavers to blend seamlessly with the charming landscape. Simple plantings tie the home to its surroundings and create a warm welcome.

Once inside, a cosy vestibule buffers the interior from seasonal elements, and provides a place to shed coats and shoes. Here, updated trim work and antiqued closet doors with hardware from Restoration

Hardware provide purpose and vintage flair. A charming Dutch door separates the entry from the kitchen to keep the family dogs at bay when guests come calling.

A renovation of an older home often uncovers surprises, like a newspaper from 1911 inside the bathroom wall, and unexpected flooring work. The flooring throughout the main level was never framed properly, and additions and changes over the years created slopes and steps in various areas.

In the kitchen, the floor was reframed and brought up to level, doors heightened and in-floor heating added. "We didn't feel confident that the existing floor could handle the new system," says John. "So we brought in a structural engineer. We didn't want to reattach the new structure to the existing stone foundation." Continued on page 73


Skylights flood the area with light. The original L-shaped layout of the kitchen remains, with the goal of the reno to create function and addional storage space.

"Because it's not a large space, everything had to be high function and have its purpose," says Jordan. "This project was all about details. Every little tiny space mattered."

Roslyn started with a French bistro aesthetic in mind, but the soapstone countertops by **Greensville Soapstone Company**, preferred by Kevin, inspired a new direction. Grey cabinetry by **Circle A Cabinetry** beautifully complements the variegated soapstone and provides continuity with Farrow & Ball's Pavilion Grey in the dining room.

A hexagonal backsplash tile from **Marble Trend**, a design inspiration Roslyn took from a magazine, mirrors the shape of the brass drawer knobs and pulls.

Soapstone shelves along the kitchen wall are an eye-catching feature that add a little farmhouse whimsy. Sometimes with the simplest elements, there's more than meets the eye. "The tile itself is textured, so it's not flat, so the brackets have to fit perfectly. There's a lot going on behind the scenes to ensure they are functioning properly," says Jordan.

Bronzed hardware in a timeless profile adds a touch of modern. Updated windows and a new door system from Kolbe Windows & Doors open the kitchen to the backyard. "The original door was smaller, and a more traditional style, so this is a bit more modern/ transitional," says John. Continued on page 74

In the dining room, the original exposed ceiling joists were freshened with paint.
Though the hallway closet juts into the dining area, the team added panelling to break up the empty wall and create visual interest.

The tiny powder room was given a makeover to include a shower. "The reasoning to put in the shower is that eventually when they do a second floor reno, they'll need one. We wanted it to look nice, but not necessarily like someone's en suite," says Jordan. To achieve the right balance, a graphic tile floor is paired with a soapstone sink from Greensville Soapstone Company and a marble shower niche and jambs.


Cast iron vintage-style vent covers were sourced by Black-Hart to match the heritage

style of the home. Crystal door knobs add sparkle. "I remember them from my family's old home in Toronto," says Roslyn. "As a child, I was at eye level with the cut facets, and I loved their glamour."

The home is a beautiful pairing of classic choices with modern function, from trim selections to colours and finishes. "We tried to make things look like they fit the home and the space," says John.

"Jordan had good design advice," says
Roslyn. "I have specific ideas about what I like,
but the trim I picked was wider, and with the
scale of the house, he suggested something
with a slimmer profile. Things like that were
very helpful to hear. I could always count on
his taste to enhance what I wanted."

Tackling an update the right way with a knowledgeable team is important. It's not just peace of mind. It helps create balance when incorporating modern taste with a nod to a home's historical character. When done right, the end result will last for years to come. **OH**

WHAT **HOMEBUYERS**



A recent survey of Canadians who purchased a newly built home shows walk-in closets topped their list of must-have features.

Suprising? Not really says Tim Bailey, division president of Avid Ratings Canada Ltd., a customer satisfaction company that works with Canadian homebuilders to determine what buyers want in a new build.

"The 2018 Canadian Homebuyer Preference Study revealed three themes," Tim says, storage solutions, energy efficiency and kitchen design.

New home buyers across the country are asked to answer 190 questions based on a recent new home purchase. It's the largest survey of its kind in Canada. The result is a comprehensive report by region, buyer type and demographics that Canadian homebuilders can use to plan new housing projects based on consumer wants and needs.

Avid Ratings is currently compiling results for 2019 but Tim doesn't anticipate dramatic changes. There's only been moderate changes in the four years Avid Ratings has been conducting the survey.

Consumers clearly want energy efficiency, Tim says. "But they also want granite and quartz and all the fine features so it's really about trying to strike a balance between what buyers can afford to spend. Energy efficiency is a hot button for consumers, especially with the carbon tax and rising utility costs. Buying a home is one thing but then carrying the cost of that home is another thing."

Homebuyers also want storage, lots of it. "We're a four-season country," Tim explains using his family as an example. "We're a Brady Bunch family with four kids and storage is critical. We have off-season gear, four seasons of clothing and four seasons of sporting goods."

People also want open-concept kitchens with an island. "Quartz countertops and smart home technology score high on the survey as well," Tim says. Other wants include a single-detached home, double-car garages, brick exteriors, tankless water heaters, LED lighting and a main-floor master suite.

What's surprising is the renaissance of the formal dining room. According to the survey, formal dining rooms have increased in importance since year one of the study.

What isn't a priority for new home buyers is outdoor spaces. Tim figures it's because landscaping isn't an immediate concern, it's not part of the purchase and new home buyers have to save and budget for outside projects that happen a couple of years down

The 2018 study found the largest cohort of today's Canadian homebuyer is the growing family with kids followed by single couples with no kids. Millennials have edged out Gen Xers as the largest group of homebuyers.

How does the survey translate for resale homes? Tim believes new homes inspire renovations to older homes and stimulate the resale market. OH


