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

Happy Canada Day to my fellow citizens and those who drop by to visit!


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




MAKE A SPLASH IN YOUR KITCHFN

The backing behind your sink, stove or counters doesn't just protect your walls from splashes. STORY SARA MARTIN



Glass, stone and metal tiles come in a multitude of styles, shapes and colours.



Beadboard barnboard or even driftwood can add texture and create interest.



The problem with older homes is the lack of respect shown so many of them.

Because their existence has spanned through the decades of various trends and styles, as well as homeowners, each with their own taste and requirements for their residence, century homes are sometimes modified beyond recognition. A shell of their former selves, you might say.

Often, these renovations don't necessarily enhance what's left behind. Depending on the homeowner's (and builder's) taste, requirements and budget, they may suit the intention while actually doing nothing to enhance the structure. It takes a discerning eye, a respect for tradition and a certain skill to update a classic, without changing the character of the home or eradicating whatever qualities made it special to begin with.

Various updates and renovations have been made to the three-level house in Rockcliffe Park that Angela Murphy and Michael Schwartz call home. But with the completion of each upgrade or update, the home has become a better version of itself, while still retaining its character.

Clark Cada, principal of Cada Construction Inc., has been overseeing the projects carried out in the house over the past decade. He describes the changes as a great evolution, not a revolution. Continued on page 24

After extensive work was done to the facade of this Rockcliffe Park home, the owners then turned their gaze inward. As work progressed, the interior design and decorating firm 2H Interior Design Ltd. was engaged. Long established in Ottawa, 2H's expertise created a warm ambience previously lacking in the house

ingredients in this welcoming entrance hallway. "The house is still a reflection of its time," Clark says. "The look and character has been maintained, it wasn't made over into something that it isn't. What it is, is a traditional house in the sense that it's timeless."

Built around 1919, the house stayed in the original family for a long time before the next owners took possession. Angela says her family was surprised last year with a visit to their home by a granddaughter of the original owners, now elderly, who dropped by and shared her memories of playing on the property.

Because they're only the fourth or fifth owners of the house, much of the original character has been maintained. On the downside, that meant much of the work included expensive upgrades to the infrastructure, such as updating the electrical and heating.

Clark says the layout of the home hasn't been changed much and structural work was all done within the basic framework of the existing structure. "It was a cold house before, physically it was cold and the layout was cold," Clark says. "It was functional, but by updating and upgrading everything, the warmth is now enhanced. There's a welcoming feeling to the home now that was lacking before."



After purchasing the property in 2007, their first order of business was to replace the concrete porch. Spanning the width of the house, its surfaces were cracked, the steel beams had rusted and the construction was starting to fail. Instead of replacing it with another heavy addition, a canopy was installed instead, giving the facade of the house a lighter appearance. Painting the white stucco a cream colour and adding brown trim further

were renovated, the basement updated, a kitchenette removed from the third floor and carpeting on the second level replaced



with hardwood. But the most extensive job, one that proved even more complex than anticipated, involved removing a massive fireplace from the back of the house.

Constructed of concrete, as are all the walls in the house, the enormous fireplace intersected the kitchen and the family room. While not quite a wall, since passage was possible on either side of it, the chimney was the elephant in the room.

"It was humongous," says Clark. "The firebox itself wasn't all that big but a lot of concrete went into creating it. Plus, it wasn't attractive at all." Clark believes the chimney was part of the heating system at some point.

Or perhaps it was to augment the heating, since previously there were two other fireplaces on the main floor as well as three on the second level.

However, because the family at that time was planning to relocate, Angela says they decided to leave the fate of the fireplace in the hands of future homeowners. The house was put on the market for a while, and Angela stayed behind in Ottawa to allow their youngest to finish his schooling in the city, while Michael lived and worked in the United States. When he was then transferred back to Ottawa, they faced the challenge of what to do with the fireplace. Continued on page 28

It turned out to be a large-scale project. As a result of structural issues, the third floor, as well as part of the second floor, had to be blocked off and over the course of the four-month project, floors and walls had to be rebuilt.

But with its removal, useable space was created, which also made a difference in how the space was utilized. In addition to creating better flow at the back of the main level between the kitchen and the family room, the lack of impediment between the two areas allows for conversation between those in the kitchen and those in the family room.

"The work that's been done has honoured the age of the house," says Angela. "We've always kept in mind that there's a functionality to it, which is that this is very much a family home. All three children went to school in the neighbourhood and up until a couple of years ago, they all lived here. Now, it's a place to come home to." **OH**

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
















ARUGULA ORZO SALAD

RECIPE AND PHOTOGRAPHY JENELLE MCCULLOCH

This is a perfect make-ahead summer salad with fresh arugula, artichokes and orzo. Simple, yet full of flavour and seasonal produce.





INGREDIENTS (Serves 4)

SALAD

1 cup orzo, uncooked

5-6 artichoke hearts, packed in water

5-6 sundried tomatoes, drained and thinly sliced

1 cup canned white beans, drained and washed

arugula

¼ cup parmesan cheese, shaved

LEMON DRESSING

¼ cup lemon juice

1/4 cup olive oil

1 tsp Dijon mustard

½ tsp pepper

½ tsp salt

pinch of dried oregano

DIRECTIONS

- Bring large pot of water to a boil and cook the orzo for 5 to 7 minutes, as per package directions. Strain and rinse
- Combine and whisk ingredients for dressing in a large mixing bowl. Set aside.
- Drain artichokes and slice in half. In large bowl, add orzo, artichokes, sundried tomatoes and white beans. Mix together. Right before serving add dressing, and mix. Toss with a few handfuls of arugula and top with parmesan cheese. OH

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A TRUE NORTH ROSE

There's a red and white party about to unfold across the country this year, and for homeowners, one surprise quest is a proud Canadian rose.

Known as Canadian Shield, this stunner is a made-in-Canada repeat bloomer, and a more fitting plant could not have been selected to help Canadians celebrate the 150th anniversary of Confederation.

Few flowers are as rich in lore and history as the rose, and few are as highly prized. As natives of the cooler parts of the northern hemisphere, wild or species roses were blooming on this continent long before Columbus was born. In fact, they are thought to have evolved as long ago as 60 million years in Central Asia before making their way to North America, Europe and China.

The Canadian Shield rose is Canadian-flag red in colour and like the country itself, it has a majestic beauty and yet it is deceptively hardy, welcoming freezing temperatures as well

as searing heat. Developed by the Vineland Research and Innovation Centre in partnership with the Canadian Nursery Landscape Association, the Canadian Shield rose is the first of Vineland's 49th Parallel Collection to be released. If you plant in May it will be ready for the big day this summer.

Even if you are not partial to roses, because of its lowmaintenance, versatility, repeat-blooming characteristic, disease-resistant hardiness and over one-metre spread with full, red flowers and glossy green foliage, the Canadian Shield rose is a natural for Canadian homes, landscapes and gardens.

GROWING ROSES

PLANTING

Roses require a minimum of six to eight hours of direct sunlight every day, so choose a sunny spot, preferably one with slight shade in afternoons.

Although hardy to -40° C, as do all roses, the Canadian Shield rose will benefit if protected from cold winds by a hedge. Because they require circulating air, do not plant roses under trees or near walls.

Dig a hole twice the size of the container and to a depth that is about twice the length of the plant from growth node (the swelling from which the stems grow) to the end of the roots.

Add enough moist compost, manure, or peat moss to the hole so that when planted, the growth node is 2.5 cm below the surface.

Remove the plant from the pot and spread the roots over the new material in the hole. Add soil back around the plant, making sure that the plant is upright and the hole is completely filled. Lightly tamp the soil around the stems.

Empty a bucket of water around the base of the plant.

MAINTENANCE

Mulch roses (do not let mulch touch the stems) to help hold moisture, add some nutrients, and prevent the growth of weeds.

In early spring, cut out thin, damaged or weak shoots then prune all stems by about half of their length.

Add fertilizer to the soil around roses in the spring and water thoroughly after adding. One more feeding of fertilizer may be added around mid-summer.

Water around the base of roses regularly during summer. Snip dead flowers from rose bushes. OH





Indian, East- or South-Asian-inspired prints and fabrics make for an easy splash of colour, in as big or small a dose as you desire. Bravely add rich jewel tones to even the most neutral of colour schemes - they're surprisingly easy to work with. The best part? If you eventually get tired of a saturated hue, you can always switch out the cases for a while, and bring them back in when you're craving that sizzling flavour again.

ARTISTIC ACCENTS A curated home avoids clutter, but don't be scared of adding a few sculptural objéts, even on your minimalist

surfaces. Cultivate items with true beauty and meaning: fewer items of a higher quality will amount to a worldly collection over time, so bring one great piece back when you travel, rather than several tourist-trap knicknacks.

FURNITURE Adding accessories doesn't feel like enough of a shake up? Opt out of using just the typical cleanlined furniture and mix in something a bit more bold. Try drum coffee tables, East-Asian-influenced cabinets or Moroccan-inspired side tables. The flair a piece of exotic furniture brings to a space is worth braving a little commitment. Pair evocative pieces (like a studded wing chair) with demure classics like a plush leather sofa to create a subtle, sophisticated story.

PRINTS & PATTERNS Fabric can be used to cover up or to attract attention. For beautiful draperies that make as much of a statement as the view outside, why not try a wild motif, such as this feather print from



Maxwell Fabrics (Fantail fabric in #338 Prism). Try a similarly colourful print to upholster

a side chair or bench, or spice up a headboard – or use a printed wallpaper to add rich hues to your dining room, foyer or powder room.

RUGS Bold prints aren't only for vertical surfaces. A vivid exotic rua brings some drama to the fifth wall - the floor - which has several advantages. In some spaces, using a bold accent wall can leave the space feeling lopsided, but an accent rug stays grounded. Plus, you can always use a petite carpet (like a three-by-fivefoot) in a small nook for a little splash of interest, rather than filling a whole room. Try pairing a rug in a rich palette with a piece of art that echoes some of the same colours to add a sense of continuity throughout the space.

TILES In the kitchen and bath, and even beyond, tiles in exotic designs are a beautifully bold choice. Try a statement tile for a small area, such as a powder-room floor (or even the full walls), a kitchenette or butler's pantry, a shower-stall floor or accent wall, or a short but impactful backsplash. Look




to cosmopolitan suppliers like Cercan Tile for traditional cultural patterns or even bold tropical motifs, to speak volumes with just a few tiles.

WILDLIFE So maybe you can't have an exotic pet - you can still bring home some wildlife in the way of a stunning live plant. Not all tropical varietals can survive a Canadian climate, but you can bring lots of exotic essence with indoor trees, such as the impressive fiddle leaf fig. Look for a plant with large leaves or fronds to bring the air of a dreamy vacation destination to your home year-round. on

TOOLS & MATERIALS

Untreated hardwood board (approximate size eight-inches wide, 24-inches long, one-inch thick)

Electric jig saw
Disposable gloves


Lint-free rags Sanding block Electric palm sander

Chalk

Watco Butcher Block Oil & Finish

HOW-TO:

Using a piece of chalk, sketch a puzzle pattern near both ends of the plank and in the centre to create two connecting serving boards.



With a jig saw, cut along the chalk lines.



Sand all wood surfaces thoroughly, rounding edges with palm sander, and then wipe down both boards with a damp, lint-free rag to remove all sanding particles.



Wearing gloves and using a lint-free rag, apply an even coat of Watco Butcher Block Oil & Finish to seal and protect boards.
