Karen says one of the biggest issues was with the kitchen area. The couple loves to cook, but the home only had a tiny area for cooking and food preparation. While this would have been the norm for 1947, it was less than ideal for the active family.

"I knew I wanted a big island," says Karen. "It had to be a space to entertain and be comfortable for the family at the same time."

It was Marty's parents who first took matters into their own hands. They were staying over when Karen says she suddenly awoke to the house shaking. "Marty's father was tearing down walls, with no real plan in place," she says laughing. Perhaps it was a surprising way to greet the day, but there was no doubt in everyone's mind that parts of the main floor needed to be opened up.

They knew what they wanted but felt they needed professional guidance. That's when they called Suzanne Martin of **Reno by Design** and **Luxurious Living Studio**. Karen says Suzanne was instrumental in designing the kitchen as well as the lighting plan.

The Corstens then called upon general contractor **Mike Gorman** to set the plans in motion. "He really kept us on time and on budget," says Karen. "He was great to work with."

The Woodturner in Stittsville was called in for custom cabinetry and other carpentry work. The kitchen has minimal uppers, which makes the space seem larger than it really is. The majority of kitchen items are hidden away in easy-to-access drawers.

"Like many reno projects, we went over budget, so the decorating was done by me and on a tight budget," says Karen. She was keen for the seating around the island to match the cabinetry, so she purchased unfinished wood stools and asked Mike McKinley from The Woodturner to paint them to match. Stainless steel appliances from **Universal Appliances** add a modern touch to the traditional look and feel of the room.


An informal sitting area wings off the kitchen, although "sitting area" is almost too formal a term for this little corner. It's a cosy little nook that Karen and Marty preserved from the original layout. The wood panelling covering the walls is original to the home. Karen had the new kitchen cabinetry custom match the style. With cushy seating and a wood-burning fireplace, it's the perfect spot to gather on a brisk winter day.

The kitchen area is perfectly situated a few steps from the dining room, where the centrepiece is a round table under a sparkling chandelier from **Yardley's Antiques**. The table originally had a smaller tabletop, but Mike McKinley replaced it with a larger one in order to accommodate more people.

Mike also refinished a vintage dresser to serve as a sideboard and updated the hardware with vintage-style knobs from **Details Home Apparel** on Beechwood. A stylish grey patterned wallpaper from **Randall's** continues to set the sophisticated tone of this room without being fussy.
