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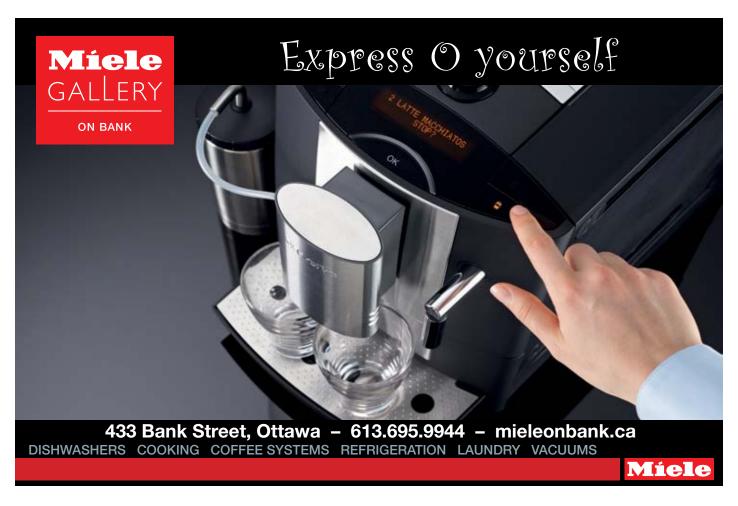


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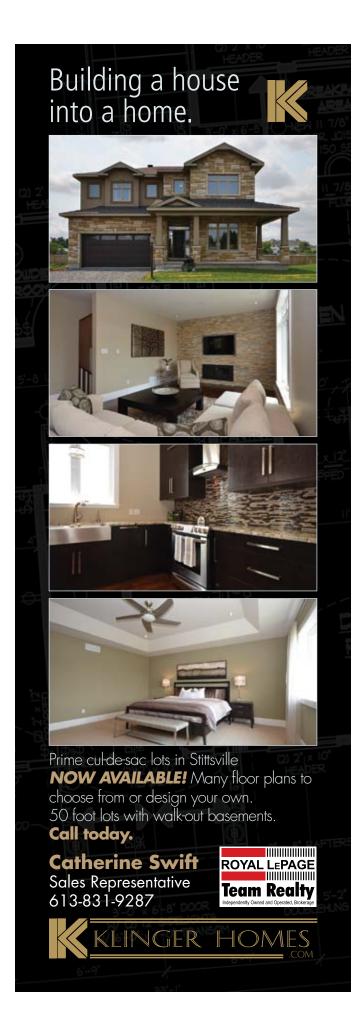
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editor's note

I remember believing the drive to Manotick from our home in Carlsbad Springs felt like we were travelling hundreds of miles and seemed to take forever. Truth be told, it was only a half-hour drive. With five kids crammed into the car, the drive probably felt a lot longer for my parents.

I couldn't have appreciated then that the reason hundreds of Kellys made the trek to Manotick was all thanks to one man, who travelled a lot further than any of us. William Kelly, my great-great grandfather, was a stonemason from County Kilkenny, Ireland. As a new Canadian, he, along with thousands of other Irish immigrants and French Canadians, helped build the architectural marvel, known as the Rideau Canal. The waterway, declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2007, is 202 kilometres long and connects the City of Ottawa with the City of Kingston. It's a legacy that our family is very proud of. William Kelly settled in Manotick on River Road in the early years of the 1800s, and perhaps unimaginable to him at the time, Kelly's Landing became a settlement of sorts for future generations of my family.

Winter, as the quote above beautifully reminds, is a time for home. I hope you'll curl up by the fire with this issue and be inspired by the architecture, design and decorative treasures waiting to be discovered within these pages; in particular, our Style Picks from Manotick Village. With watermelons and popsicles a distant memory, it's time to forecast the upcoming trends for 2013. Ironically, when I look at the number "2013," I think of space travel and futuristic design. Maybe we're not quite there, but we are definitely heavy on industrial style – metals, glass and a whole lot of technology and innovation.

Have designers been drawing inspiration from manufacturing plants? Not sure. But we will certainly be able to decorate our homes to look like one.

METALS

Hot rolled, cold rolled, powder coated, you name it; steel is an unbreakable trend. Tables, chairs, tiles; the industrial trend is becoming more refined than factory, but the presence of steel will be huge.



Another metal that will continue to make its comeback is brushed brass. Not the shiny kind. That disappeared after the financial crisis in the 80s. Brass evokes quality and timelessness. Cabinet hardware, faucets, lighting; brushed nickel hasn't gone by the wayside, but we now have a serious contender.

WOOD

Completely contradicting what we'll be seeing in paints, woods are appearing softer, muted and greywashed. We'll see a lot of smooth looking oak in the market, wide planks, very Belgian in feel. From flooring to furniture, this natural aesthetic will make the jump from high-end to mainstream.

CONCRETE

Concrete flooring, faux wallpaper and products (yes, there are concrete lights out there!) are just some of what we'll be seeing.

The wallpaper is fascinating because the optical illusion that it's concrete or another material is so realistic you literally have to go and touch the paper to see if it's the real deal.

WALL COVERINGS

Poor old paint may just not be enough anymore. Glass, leather, metals and wallpaper are just some of the wall cladding we'll see in the upcoming year. Using back-painted glass panels in a shower creates a completely seamless wall leaving you with a translucent feel and no grout lines. Leather tiles will also become more popular as a wall material (and floor, actually) adding richness and texture to an otherwise drab piece of drywall. It's becoming available in several patterns and colours taking the place of wallpaper for a slightly more luxurious effect.

COLOUR

For the colour enthusiasts out there, it's definitely your year! With this natural base of wood, glass and metal, colour will be hot and anything goes. It may just be a pop of colour, but the pop is definitely more dramatic – more of a go big or go home approach. Admittedly, after so many beige years, it's uplifting.



TECHNOLOGY

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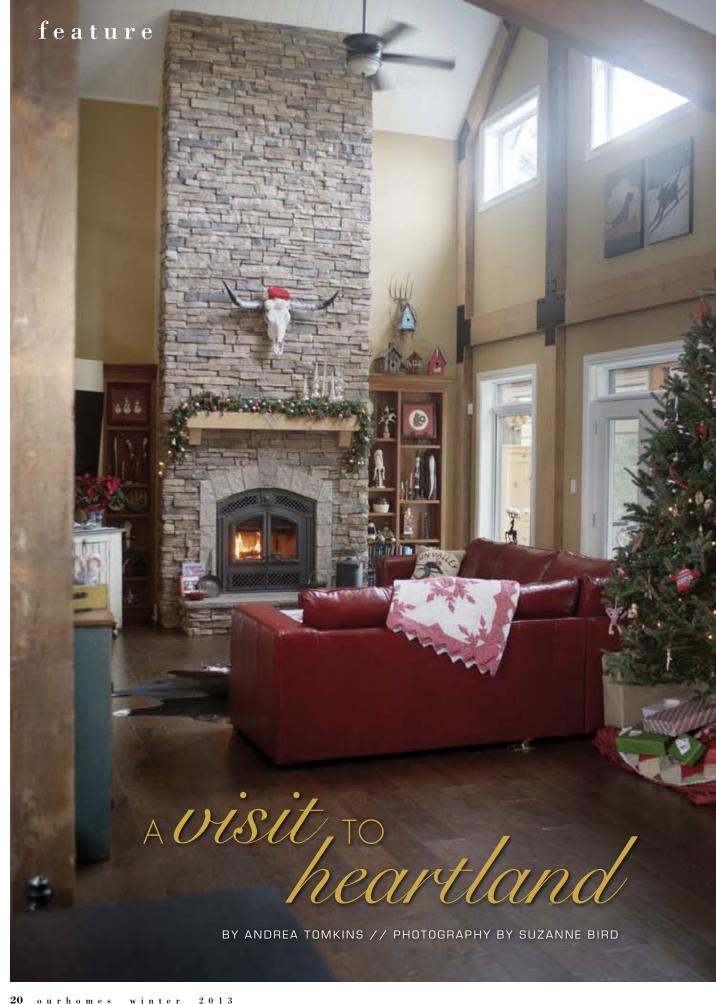
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There aren't a lot of cowboys in Ottawa anymore, but if you look hard enough, you can find a place where even the roughest, toughest wranglers can put up their boots and find comfort.

Deirdre and her husband John aren't exactly cowboys. They're city slickers just like most of us, but there's something about that cowboy style that has always tugged at their heartstrings. In fact, Deirdre had been designing their custom Dunrobin home, filled with rustic details for nearly a decade before they even started to build. "I love the country mountain house and I love cowboys," says Deirdre. "It's been a burning desire to build this casual, lived in, wonderful space. We call this place, Heartland, because it speaks so much to us."

The connection was made the moment they saw the land; nearly seven acres of woody brush. It was well situated on a slope with a creek behind it. It was only the second property they looked at. "It was one of those 'oh my God' moments," explains Deirdre. "For years we talked about building a cabin on a lake. We always talked about building a cottage, but this seemed to be a good combination of casual, and comfy." Continued on page 22

The couple were their own project managers, and in terms of design, Deirdre was a lady on a mission. "I knew I wanted a stretch of cabinets; I knew I wanted shaker style, in a rich brown and I wanted a huge island and I wanted it to be black. I just knew," she says.

You can call it cowboy chic or modern ranch, but there isn't a scrap of frilly gingham to be seen. From wooden roosters, to old licence plates, and a rusty Coca-Cola sign that had been used for BB gun target practice in a former lifetime; the space is filled with many creative and personal touches. "All these things have their own little histories," she says. "Everything you'd ever want to know about me, you can tell, just by looking at this house."

It's not unlike the kind of cabin you'd find at the end of the trail deep in the Rockies; big, heavy and full of light, but with rough dark accents. Take for example, the stairs. "These are rebar," she says, pointing to the balusters used. "I didn't want something typical. It's a big heavy house, I wanted big heavy railings." She drew it out for the fellows at **Fred Welding & Machine Shop**.

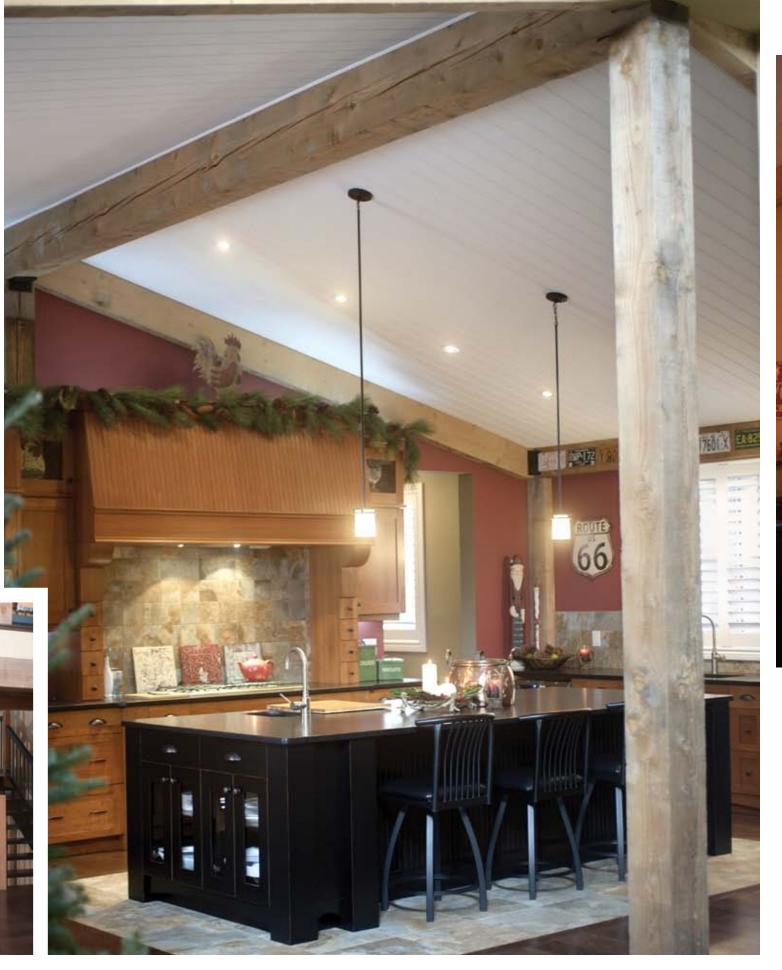
She got some weird looks along the way, but she was so confident in her choices that it didn't shake her. "I always knew we were going to live somewhere country-type with peaked ceilings, a big fireplace and big windows, I knew that."

Large beams made out of B.C. fir proved to be a big conversation point with Conception Duboisé and **Kott Lumber**. Some of the beams were to be used as part of the structure but most had a decorative purpose and were considered cosmetic timber. "When it came on site there was a huge response with people saying 'Oh my, look at this!", she laughs."

In this kind of home, where the structural elements are so dark and heavy, lighting (all from **Multi Luminaire**) becomes extra important. "Good lighting brings out feature walls and adds character where there isn't any," says Deirdre.

Most of the living area is on one level and the kitchen is the main artery. The space is perfect for entertaining. "Forty people in here is not crowded, and everyone wants to be in the kitchen anyway," says Deirdre. Continued on page 24







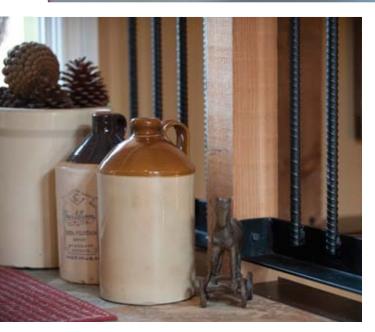

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Like in many traditional country kitchens, a wooden harvest table

figures prominently. **After Harvest** added a permanent leaf in the middle of their existing table so it could accommodate more people.

A wall of cabinets that spans the kitchen and dining area (by **Potvin Kitchen and Trim**) holds some special surprises. Deirdre had a cabinet designed just for tablecloths. Rods span the width of the cabinet, and the tablecloths are hung right after they're washed and ironed.

The bank of cabinets was a must as there are no uppers for dishes. These are stored in reinforced drawers instead, right next to the dining table.

An unconventional open pantry suits that lived-in country kitchen feel. "It kind of looks like a country store," she says. "When my kids bring friends home I often find them in here at three o'clock in the morning!"

The floor design (**Embrun Floor Covering**) around the kitchen island came as a result of experience. The couple had hardwood in their previous kitchen, but with young kids and dogs it was a constant challenge to keep it in good shape. Their solution: ring it with tile. It's a practical and attractive solution for the high traffic area. Continued on page 26

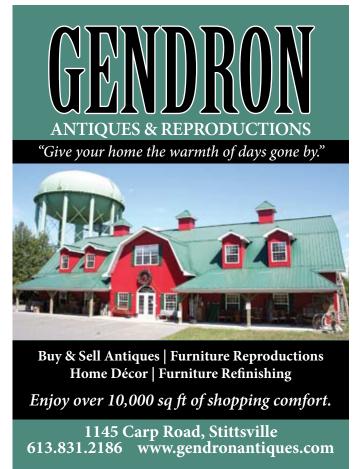

The piece that ties it all together, is the sunroom. Designed to resemble a veranda, it stretches the entire length of the home. "This is heaven, right here," says Deirdre. And how could it not be, with cement-heated floors, cushy seating and a million-dollar view of the woods. "It's all about relaxing," she says. "Coming home to this house is such a treat, and there is not a day that goes by that we don't pinch ourselves and say, 'oh my God, we live here." on









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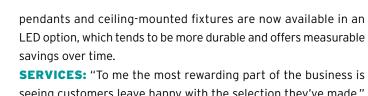

Whether you're from Canada or not, it's hard for anyone not to be inspired by the true North and its beautiful elements, which we are lucky

enough to find in our own backyard, the great outdoors.

Here are my three favourite ways to incorporate our heritage into our homes.

1. THE USE OF FABRIC: Add Canadian character and charm to your home with the simple use of textiles.

Plaid Upholstery: Whether it be gingham, tartan, or tattersall, this popular pattern consisting of several crossed horizontal and vertical lines (usually in two or more colours) speaks directly to the essence of Canadian settlers. My favourite way to incorporate it in décor is with upholstery. I personally prefer it in smaller doses, such as for sofa pillows or dining room seats, however a club chair completely covered looks amazing as well.

Cosy Throws: Curling up on the sofa on a cold winter's day wouldn't be the same without one of these. Here are my three favourite classics:

- Point Blanket: It wouldn't be right if I didn't start with this iconic blanket by The Bay this wool Point blanket dates back to the 18th century and used to be traded. It continues to be a number one seller and is sold exclusively by The Hudson's Bay Company.
- Faux Fur: Fox, mink or coyote these Canadian creature-mimicked furs can be the perfect Canuck-inspired addition to your space for added comfort and even luxuriousness.
- Matelassé: Meaning quilted, padded or cushioned, and normally referring to hand-quilted textiles. It is meant to mimic the style of hand-stitched Marseilles, a type of quilt made in Provence, France. Incorporating these fabrics into your décor can be the subtle hint of pattern and texture you're looking for.



2. THE USE OF WOOD: Nothing warms up a space quite like the use of natural wood.

Wolls: I particularly like walls sheltered in large, real-wood planks. Douglas fir or cedar – both known for their distinctive grain patterns and tight knots – are each suitable choices when it comes to selecting the type of wood to use.

Accessories: Dress up the inside or the surrounding area of your fireplace with logs of wood – even without the use of fire, this actually does create a feeling of warmth too.

3. THE ADDITION OF ANTIQUES: If the northern vibe is the look, an old piece of Canadian history is most definitely calling. Usually an item made of wood, such as an old sled, pair of skis or a rocking chair will feel the most rustic and true to the heritage.

My tips for antique hunting:

- Do your research before heading out know what you are looking for.
- Bring with you a magnifying glass to check for dates, signatures, imperfections.
- Touch, smell and handle the piece. Get familiar with what you're looking to buy before you buy it. If you have any doubts, don't be afraid to ask questions. OH

Sofia Gabor's sense of comfort is guided by a love of natural light, which is evident in every spot in her expansive, gloriously lit bungalow.

In fact, Sofia's entire house seems to be designed in support of natural light. South-facing walls with numerous sprawling windows, tube lights in the bathrooms and walk-in closets, and two wide, angular skylights in the hallways are all conduits to the outside, ushering the light inside.

Her consciousness of light extends to her warm, earthy colour palette throughout the home and to her light fixtures, and even to the Swarovski crystals that dot the walls in her master bathroom shower, which all have the common goal of softening, diffusing and distributing the light in the most pleasing fashion. "I wanted to introduce a lot of elements that would let the light in," Sofia says. "I wanted to make sure that my home had light always. Light always makes you feel better. It's about the energy that comes in." Continued on page 38

Before her current home, which she shares with her mother, Gizella, Sofia lived in a two-storey, four-bedroom house in Barrhaven that did not suit her needs. After searching extensively for a bungalow with no success, she took matters into her own hands.

Sofia purchased the lot five years ago, engaged **Klinger Homes Inc.**, and set down to designing the home herself. Her design process worked slightly backwards, beginning with what she didn't like and then whittling away to a design that suited her without extraneous space or details that didn't serve a function or support a fashion.

The end result is a masterfully crafted, four-bedroom (two upstairs, two downstairs), open-concept bungalow, wrapped in natural light, and tied end to end with common elements of design and detail. In addition to the bedrooms and two full bathrooms, the main floor has an open concept living/dining area that boasts maple hardwood from <code>Gaylord Hardwood Flooring</code>. The floor features a custom stain that accents the warmth infused throughout the main floor.

Downstairs is a fully finished, delightfully bright basement, where Sofia's frequent visitors from Europe stay, as well as her daughter when she is in town. The walls encase custom, built-in cabinetry and a funky fireplace with a custom-designed, red-glass surround by local artist **Delfina Falcão**.

Sofia says designing her home was a lengthy process: "It took me about two years," she explains. "I started with pieces of paper drawing down what I liked and there was a whole process that I went through, changing the rooms and changing the size."

In addition to visiting numerous open houses, and consulting magazines, Sofia drew on the two years she spent recently in Europe, mostly in Germany and Transylvania, for inspiration.

Her windows, from **Euro-Tech Windows**, are interesting, not just for their size, but for their European influence, and for how they support her desire to bring the outside in. "I think they are the biggest ones you are allowed," says Sofia. The windows are called "tilt and turn." They pull open on the inside, maximizing air circulation.

Sofia wears her affection for her kitchen on her sleeve. She describes "meeting" her kitchen with much the same language that someone describes the serendipitous meeting of one's true love. In a random act, a couple of months after they had broken the ground for her home, she walked into the **Acco Renovations Inc.** showroom, and saw her kitchen. "I knew it was the one," she gushes. "When I saw the kitchen, I really liked how it looked. I liked that it was clean, a little bit shiny and very pleasing to the eye." Clearly, it's her favourite room in the house.

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Of particular interest in the kitchen is the custom designed glass backsplash by Delfina Falcão. It is the perfect complement to the rest of the space, with geometric lines and spots of colour that add visual interest.

Falcão, in addition to designing the backsplash and the surround for the basement fireplace, designed two custom area rugs for Sofia. One sits in the middle of the living room and is a focal point to behold. She rounded the edges so as not to interfere with the nearby dining room furniture. The red rug is embedded with bits of rounded, soft glass. It captures much of the same geometric pattern that is expressed in the kitchen backsplash, tying the rooms together and reflecting the symbiotic relationship between the spaces in Sofia's home: separate but connected. This level of detail expresses Sofia's sense of design and desire for aesthetic unity.

Although most of the home is done in earth tones, Sofia favoured red to strategically spread colour through her home. "The colour red is not overwhelming in the house but I'm trying to carry it throughout," she says.

Beyond her kitchen, Sofia finds respite in her tree-lined backyard, which she landscaped with the help of Turf's Up Landscaping Inc. They included a small deck, the perfect place for her to enjoy her morning coffee. What she treasures most is the sense of connectedness she feels to the rest of the neighbourhood when sitting outside, surrounded by birdsong and the chatter and laughter of children in the family-friendly neighbourhood.

This sense of connection to her surroundings is what pushed Sofia through her design process and is the source of her happiness now. She wanted a home that was sublime, with crisp, clean lines and abundant natural light, but mostly she wanted a house whose purpose fit into hers and not the other way around. "Your home should be your home first and your house second," she says. OH



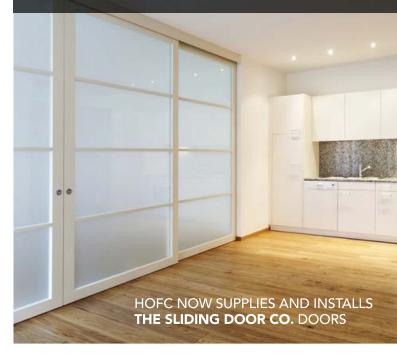








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RAISING THE BAR

Bill Mullen has high hopes! The Ontario-based home inspector is also the director of external relations for a new organization, the National Home Inspector Certification Council (NHICC).

The NHICC is pushing for nation-wide licensing of home inspectors, but at this time Ontario, the Atlantic Provinces and Saskatchewan are just looking at this possibility.

Alberta and British Columbia already license home and property inspectors. B.C. led the way, endorsing inspectors since April 1, 2009, while Alberta came onside September 1, 2011. Neither of these came about without a lot of pushing from interest groups within those provinces, and Mullen doesn't expect it to be much different in Ontario, though he hopes that the timeframe to have licensing passed into law could be shortened because of the groundwork done by those first two provinces.

According to Peter Link, manager of house and property inspection registration for the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians of B.C. (ASTTBC), his organization lobbied for two decades to make this happen.

Helene Barton, Executive Director of the B.C. branch of the Canadian Association of Home and Property & Inspectors, (CAHPI), agrees. "We lobbied the government for eight years to have our industry regulated because prior to that anyone who bought a ladder and had a business card could say they were a home inspector. Many were charlatans."

Though there are training courses and college programs in all provinces, in most provinces there is no onus on someone who calls him/herself a home inspector to take such education. In the two provinces that currently license, the several certifying organizations that exist require some or all of the following to become licensed: specialized education (number of hours varies from organization to organization), a practical (or field) test, written exam, a peer inspection process, and, finally, an application to the



provincial licensing body. In the case of B.C., that's Consumer Protection B.C. For Alberta, it's Service Alberta. The outcome of the application process is not ideal, according to Darcy McGregor, secretary and founding member of CAHPI Alberta. "We thought they (the government) would raise everyone to the highest level, like our members follow, but they said that wouldn't be fair."

While the expectations aren't as high as he'd like, McGregor says, "Licensing at least gives homeowners a bit more assurance that the person they are dealing with has some education and the ability to look after them as a home inspector."

Link echoes this sentiment: "We pushed for one certifying organization and one standard of practice, but there are four in B.C." So buyer beware is still in force, and homeowners must research any home inspector they are thinking of hiring. "The onus is still on the homeowner. (They should ask) where did they get their education; do they have experience in the field to have the ability to recognize problems."

Barton, though, feels that the process has been overall positive. "It got rid of a lot of people who are unqualified. We are still trying to get the consumer to ask about the licence before hiring a home inspector. It gives them peace of mind knowing that they (inspectors) are qualified."

Though there is mixed reaction to the outcomes in B.C. and Alberta, there's one point that McGregor, Link and Barton all agree on – home inspectors in those provinces are now required to carry errors and omissions insurance. They must be insured up to \$1 million, so if they miss something during an inspection and this results in a costly repair, the homeowner may have financial recourse.

One piece of the puzzle that is still missing, according to Nigel Trevethan, of Harper Grey LLP and legal counsel for CAHPI B.C., is a "cooling off period, like many other large purchases." He thinks it's regrettable that the "government hasn't mandated that every real estate transaction must involve a home inspection. This is especially important in an overheated housing market, like Vancouver." He feels that this is key to consumer protection.

So, though Mullen's hopes for the future of licensing in Ontario – and throughout the country – are high, experience tells us that the outcome may be less than stellar but better than the status quo. **OH**

The season of giving is upon us and for many of us, the list is long. What to give the boss? What to give the person who has everything? Is there something interesting to take to a holiday party other than the old standard of a bottle of cabernet sauvignon? Well, hopefully I can help in this department, as there's a world of fun gift-giving options out there. Of course there are all sorts of budgets, but I'll try to at least point you in the right direction for possibilities. Consider the following as a shopping list for all your gift-giving needs! (If you are unfamiliar with any of these wines or beers just ask for help while in your local liquor store, they should all be readily available).

HEADING TO A HOLIDAY PARTY?

Try taking a bottle of prosecco or cava, both are festive sparkling wines that won't break the bank.

A BOTTLE FOR THE BOSS?

A cabernet sauvignon from California, an Amarone from Italy or a burgundy from France are always solid choices. Or try a 10, 20 or 30 year-old tawny port, this will last longer than one bottle of wine and will remind your boss how great you are over and over again.

THE FATHER, BROTHER, FATHER-IN-LAW, AND SO ON ...?

Put together an interesting basket of beers, choose all different varieties to allow a real taste experience. Fill it with wheat beer, stout, Abbey-style ale, an India pale ale and anything else that seems interesting.

THE MOTHER, SISTER, MOTHER-IN-LAW, AND SO ON ...?

Why not try a bottle of something floral, sweet and pretty. Dessert wines such as icewine, Beaumes de Venise, moscato or late harvest wines are a real sweet treat and are the perfect way to finish off a meal or to sip chilled as an aperitif before dinner.

THE FOODIE IN YOUR LIFE?

Choose a region in the world such as Spain or Niagara and then fill a basket or wine crate with wines and food products from that area. You can add olive oil, cheese, mustards, preserves, etc.

If you have a little extra time on your hands you can always make some gifts that incorporate wines and spirits. Here are a couple of suggestions that are easy and delicious!

CLASSIC FRENCH CHICKEN LIVER PATÉ

Give this as a hostess gift with a nice baguette and a bottle of Chardonnay from France or Niagara.

2 tbsp unsalted butter

½ lb chicken livers, cleaned

½ cup white onion or shallots, finely chopped

2 tsp fresh thyme, finely chopped

½ cup dry white wine

Salt and pepper to taste

- Melt butter in a pan, add onions and thyme and cook until onions are translucent, about 10 minutes.
- Add wine and reduce for 1 minute.
- Add livers and cook through, 3-4 minutes. Place everything in a food processor, pureé to

smooth and season to taste with salt and pepper.

 Place mixture in a glass crock or decorative ramekin and keep refrigerated until ready to give. Spread paté on bread slices and serve with chilled white wine.

LIMONCELLO



Here is an easy recipe for the sunny liqueur from the Amalfi coast in Italy. The first year I lived in Rome I made this as a Christmas gift for everyone in my family. On returning to Canada for the holidays I was stopped at Customs with a suitcase filled with the yellow bottles. Fortunately for me

(and my family), the Customs agent was Italian and let me pass through with my clandestine stash!

5 large lemons, washed well

750 ml vodka, a mid-priced brand is sufficient

2 3/4 cups sugar

2 ¼ cups water

- Peel the zest from all the lemons, making sure to avoid the white pith. Place in a large glass jar along with the vodka. Cover and let stand for 2 weeks in a dark place.
- When ready, heat sugar and water in a small pot, stir until sugar has completely dissolved. Let cool to room temperature.
- Strain vodka into sugar mixture and divide into decorative bottles for gift giving. Make sure to serve Limoncello straight from the freezer in small sherry glasses or shooter glasses. Salute! **OH**

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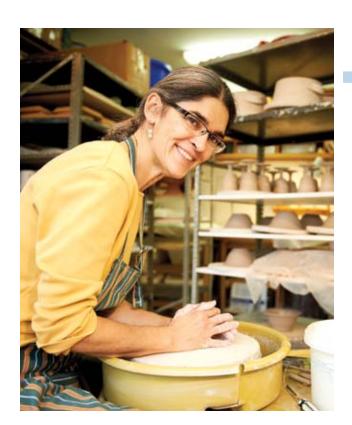
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BUDDHIST TEMPLES INSPIRE RICH colours designs

Tucked away in a picturesque backyard of the city's Island Park neighbourhood is a quaint pottery studio operated

by ceramics artist Jane Snider. It's a light-filled space built by her husband, Larry Nafziger, when they first bought the house 12 years ago. This is where she comes to create her distinct porcelain pieces; bowls, platters and goblets in stunning vibrant hues.

While based in Ottawa, Jane's inspiration comes from much further away. She and her husband spent many years working and travelling in Africa and Asia. "I think a lot of influences are stored in visual memories that I have of the places we've been," she says. "We worked with craftspeople when we were there; potters, as well as weavers, wood carvers and basket makers. You absorb that."

They worked overseas with a development organization called Mennonite Central Committee (MCC), representing Ten Thousand Villages (a program of MCC) in East Africa and spent time in Tanzania, Sudan, Ethiopia, Kenya and Uganda. Later, they travelled to Laos with the same organization to work with craftspeople.

"A lot of potters will sketch their work first," Jane says. "I do that sometimes and I realize that, when I do, I am drawing from those

experiences overseas. When I came back from Asia, the overwhelming images for me were the Buddhist temples, which is represented by the golden yellows and reds in my pieces."

Jane says she often thinks about the round offering bowls in which the monks collected their food in the morning. These images inspired the forms and colours in her work.

Her bowls, serving dishes, plates and mugs, in bright reds, blues, yellows and greens, are artistic yet practical and designed for everyday use. "It is all quite utilitarian and that really speaks to my practical nature,"

Her pottery collection ranges from baking dishes, large platters and vases to smaller items, such as votive candle holders and French butter dishes. She showcases her work at various craft shows, including the Originals Ottawa Christmas Craft Sale in December (11th-16th only). Her work is also featured locally at Hintonburg Pottery and as far away as Toronto and St. Jacobs, where she once worked as an apprentice after graduating from university.

Jane grew up in Waterloo and went to Goshen College in Indiana. There, she took some pottery classes and says she was hooked from that point on. "You can make anything out of clay," Jane explains. "It's this huge open window to creativity because you are making it an expression of who you are." She left Goshen to work for Phil Yordy, a potter in St. Jacobs. Jane credits him for giving her the confidence to go out on her own.

Her pottery is always evolving and she likes to spend most winters experimenting with new ideas. Lately, she has been working with a slip trailing technique, creating lines and shapes on her pottery as if she were decorating a cake. She is also developing pieces that feature overlapping colours that evoke landscapes.

For Jane, making pottery is both a relaxing and satisfying experience. "It is hard to put into words but a lot of the process of making things is very repetitive and there is something very soothing about just doing that repetitive work over and over," she says. While there is repetition in the process, there is always opportunity to explore and learn. "There are many different aspects involved in making pottery so I don't see myself as a glaze technician, for instance," she says. "Working out all the different glazes is a challenge, as is perfecting the firing of the kiln... there's always something to learn." **он**





















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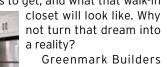
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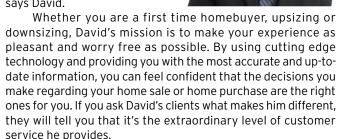

ALMOND GINGER CHOCOLATE BARK + lots of topping variations

Every year about this time, as the mercury drops and the days get shorter, my mind naturally turns to the fast-approaching holiday season. And one of my favourite holiday traditions is poring over cookbooks looking for inspiration for this year's homemade gifts from my kitchen. Nothing is sweeter than stirring, swirling and baking up tasty treats to wrap and deliver to friends, family, co-workers, teachers and other special folks in my life. While the cookies, candies and breads I bake may vary from year to year, a staple gift from my kitchen is chocolate bark. It's appealing because of its simplicity and opportunity for variations. Plus, it's chocolate – and who doesn't love the gift of chocolate?

There are few ingredients involved, so I like to splurge a little and choose the best chocolate I can find. Dark chocolate is my favourite base for bark – its rich, deep flavour complements the roasted nuts and sweet fruits that dot the surface. But milk chocolate and white chocolate (or perhaps all three!) work wonderfully as well. As for the nuts and fruit, anything goes. Peanuts, cashews, pecans, pistachios, hazelnuts, apricots, cranberries, raisins, cookie bits, candy pieces, pretzels, marshmallows – you get the point! Stick to three toppings at most so that each flavour gets a chance to shine without getting muddled in the mix.

For this year's bark, I'm going with the combination of dark chocolate, almonds and candied ginger – a little bit toasty, a little bit spicy and perfectly decadent. Happy holidays!

ALMOND GINGER CHOCOLATE BARK

(Makes: about 20 pieces)

1 lb (450 g) dark chocolate, chopped

3/4 cup toasted whole almonds, coarsely chopped

²/₃ cup candied ginger, thinly sliced

- Melt chocolate in a heatproof bowl set over a pot of gently simmering water, stirring often until smooth.
- Stir in about one third of each of the almonds and candied ginger. Pour mixture onto parchment paperlined baking sheet and gently spread with the back of a spoon until about an even scant ½-inch (1 cm) thickness.
- Sprinkle with remaining almonds and candied ginger.
- Refrigerate until solid, about 20 minutes. Break or cut into pieces.
- The bark will keep refrigerated in an airtight container for about 1 week.
- · For gift giving, package as desired.

VARIATION:

Pistachio Cranberry
Apricot Swirl Bark - Melt
separately 10 oz. (280 g) dark
chocolate and 6 oz. (170 g) white
chocolate. Stir one third of each: 3/4
cup roasted shelled pistachios, 1/4 cup
dried apricots, quartered and 1/4 cup dried
cranberries into the melted dark chocolate.
Spread onto baking sheet. Drizzle with
melted white chocolate. Use toothpick,
skewer, or back of knife to swirl the
chocolates together. Sprinkle with
remaining pistachios, apricots and
cranberries. Continue as
