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


Already thinking of summer? This issue we explore pool design in our Gardening column, while Cooking At Home reveals secrets for sublime Strawberry Pie.

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
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

HARDWARF

It is so easy to take life's essential items for granted. When a job is done well, we don't ask questions. In design however, it is crucial to constantly assess how something could function better and look better.

Take hardware for example. We don't question a functioning cabinet or room door. The hardware simply becomes obsolete. Clearly this is a good thing in one sense because it's doing its job. It's functioning. Its look or form however, may be another story.

Hardware is like jewelry, or the finishing touch. Whether you want to be Armani or Kelly Wearstler, the look changes entirely based on the approach. Here are a few options - from minimalist to decorative - that will finish your doors in style and also function beautifully.

FULLY INTEGRATED

This approach requires no hardware leaving your cabinetry clean + simple. A cabinetmaker uses the door itself to create the hardware. Here are two approaches:

One method is to carve a finger pull into the backside of the door (1) leaving the front of the door undisturbed. Bulthaup, a high-end cabinetmaker out of Germany, has mastered this minimalist aesthetic. If done properly, this look will highlight the lines of the cabinetry without drawing attention to any unnecessary extras.

Alternatively, (2) cut out part of the door face, enough to put your fingers through to pull the door open. This provides a design detail, remains functional; yet maintains an uncomplicated aesthetic. This approach creates a low-key look with a bit more detail.



PARTIALLY INTEGRATED

Partially integrated means that in order to accommodate the hardware, the door must be notched out. This hardware needs to be applied by a professional. Take this piece (3) by architect Tom Kundig as an example. It is beautifully crafted and adds a hint of interest. On a simple wooden pocket door, this pull adds the perfect amount of detail.

On cabinetry, try a finger pull with a sleek, stainless steel finish (4). The door or drawer

is routered out at the back so the hardware can sit flush with the cabinet frame. To achieve this look on a budget, you can source a similar style that can be mounted to the side of the door or drawer without the need to carve into the cabinetry. However, ensure you have enough clearance so the hardware doesn't rub against the next door over

or the underside of the countertop.

APPLIED

The options are endless (5) but there are two approaches: functional versus decorative. You can keep it simple or make a statement. Leather, glass, lucite, wood, brass... you name it, it's out there. The key is to choose something that is the correct scale, functions well, and that you won't tire of. Good quality hardware can add up, so purchase a sample and bring it home to look at.



THE BORING BITS

It's worth mentioning that some of the most important pieces are often working behind the scenes. Take your interior house doors. If you are trying to achieve a more minimal look, then a typical swing door may not be your style.

For a more contemporary approach, look at using a pivot hinge (6). These anchor to the floor and ceiling leaving the sides free of any unsightly hinges. With this

look, your door can also be ceiling height, giving your room a sense of scale. Another option is a barn slider (7). These hang on a rail system and

slide on wheels or a rail at the base to prevent any side-to-side swing. The hardware is available in a multitude of styles, visible or hidden. Have a look at the Warehouse style from Rustica

Hardware for an industrial look. You won't get a tight fit so best to use this style on a mudroom or a hallway separation.

Hardware is often the last thing we think of - the afterthought that we run out and purchase at the last minute

when doors or cabinetry are complete. Next time you're planning a project, look at the hardware first. It will open your mind to a whole other world of design options! **OH**

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
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

how to MAXIMIZE SPACE IN A SMALL LAUNDRY ROOM

Our homes are a reflection of ourselves,

and many of us work hard to keep them beautiful. Through colour, materials and proper planning, we strive to create a stylish and pleasing environment in which to live. Much of our attention is focused on our living spaces and it's time we start thinking about the more utilitarian spaces like the laundry room. Given the amount of time they are used, they seldom receive the attention they deserve and they often become separated from the life of a home. If your laundry room is small, you may find that it does not function the way you would like. It may feel cramped and unorganized, attracting an embarrassing mess. But with a little time and creativity, you can design a stylish and functional laundry room that will help make laundry day your favourite day of the week!

If you find that your laundry room lacks the square footage you dream of, take a look at the space you have and see it for all of its possibilities. By choosing a front loading washer and dryer, you will be able to utilize an extra surface that every laundry room dreams of. The smooth flat tops they provide are useful for laundry basket storage or as a place to fold and organize. Step it up a notch and install a durable water-resistant countertop over the machines. An inexpensive laminate will provide a smooth and easy-to-clean surface for your laundry needs. If your space is limited, a stacked washer and dryer set will leave room for other necessities. A customized slide-out shelf installed between the machines will provide that extra surface you otherwise would not have.

Chances are the washer and dryer will take up most of your floor space, so, when thinking about storage and organization, think vertical. By maximizing vertical space, you can amplify a small laundry room's storage capacity. As demonstrated in the drawing above, shelves and cubbies stylishly contain laundry supplies while built-in cabinets keep

seldom-used items and less-than-attractive necessities (such as cleaning supplies) out of sight. To brighten up the room, install under-cabinet strip lighting. If built-ins are not in your budget, you can create ample storage space by investing in adjustable wire shelving (ensure that your most utilized items are made available on the lower shelves). Incorporate pull out wire baskets for clever storage of odds and ends, including those pesky socks whose matches have yet to be found! And don't ignore the back of a door. It makes a perfect spot to hang baskets and holders.

A great feature to have in any laundry room is a place to air-dry delicates or to hang shirts fresh from the dryer. Use a tension bar installed between built-ins (or walls), or even a bath towel bar mounted on the underside of a shelf. Remember to position the rod far enough from the wall to leave adequate space for the hangers. If space is limited, pull-down and accordion-style drying racks are made to pull out from the wall and then be pushed neatly away.

Laundry rooms tend to be the place to keep a bulky ironing board. The problem is where to put it. Hanging it on the wall is a simple solution. Another is to purchase a built-in board that drops down from the wall. It saves space and makes ironing easier. Just flip out the board and plug in the iron. Better yet, there are fold-out ironing boards that can be built into cabinetry and pulled out with an expanding frame, concealing them completely.

Finally, incorporate decorative elements to liven up the space. If the room makes you happy, laundry will become less of a chore. Add a splash of colour with paint, or with patterns and colourful fabrics on your storage containers. Add style with bead board or with a fun backsplash in a shiny or iridescent tile. Why not hang up a piece of art? Prints, photos or wall decals will add whimsy and character. Now, with your laundry room feeling so refreshed and organized, you will wish that laundry day was every day! OH





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Sunlight floods through the windows opposite the front door of John and Tina Saundercook's open-concept abode by Mason Homes, welcoming and inviting you to enjoy the view of Lake Ontario, just a short walk away.

Newly retired, John and Tina moved to Port Hope this fall to be closer to their children and grandchildren. Natural tile with beach buff grout floors in the foyer accentuate the beautiful espresso hardwood flooring throughout the rest of the home, by Irving Carpet One in Barrie.

John's man cave is just left of the front entrance, where he can relax in style, reading or watching his virtually wire-free Smart TV and Sonos Sound System from **Showtime TV & Stereo** in Cobourg.



The brick and siding were sourced locally, and the garage doors are from **The Overhead Door Company of Peterborough**.

It's easy to see why the kitchen is Tina's favourite part of the house. It has plenty of sun, a view of the lake, a walkout to an expansive deck, and it's fully decked out with a sleek stainless steel gas stove, refrigerator with lower level freezer, overhead microwave and dishwasher. Shaker Maple Fume kitchen cabinets that match the floors are accented by Colonial Gold flecked counters.

The kitchen appliances and washer and dryer are from Sears, and the water softener from **Culligan Water Conditioning** of Peterborough.

"I love my gas stove," says Tina, perched on a stool from Port Hope's **The New Oak Tree**. A computer desk nestled in the corner affords easy access to recipes, while staying plugged in to whatever is going on in the kitchen and living room.

The best part is, it's just steps away from a generous deck with plexiglass railings, permitting a full view of the lake. Here, John points out the trains in the distance he enjoys watching, which remind him of his father and grandfather, who worked for the railway.

Tina and John both make good use of the living room, where even on

the coldest days, the gas fireplace creates a warm, cosy atmosphere. LOCAL SOURCE GUIDE

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
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It's well known among Crystal Lake residents that when Barry and Marian Abelson fly the martini flag on their Tiki Hut, it's an open invitation to tie your boat to the dock and come for cocktails. To paraphrase Stevie Ray Vaughan's hit song, "When the tiki hut's a rockin, don't bother knockin, c'mon in."

"We've had so much fun entertaining on it," Barry Abelson says of the large floating dock made by **R & J Machine** in Lakefield, complete with a refrigerator from **Bert's Appliance** of Fenelon Falls. "We are on the best lake in the Kawarthas."

Crystal Lake is a fisherman's dream; spring-fed, with no other lakes flowing into it, it has low levels of phosphorus, no zebra mussels or algae, and lots of small and large mouth bass, lake trout, pickerel, whitefish and perch. Because it's so deep there are no noisy ducks or geese, just the hauntingly beautiful call of the loons. Deep, clean and quiet, the lake is equally ideal for swimming and boating – an exquisite setting for an exquisite home, situated perfectly to take advantage of the fabulous views and sunsets.

Built by **Stuart Charity Construction Ltd.** of Bobcaygeon, this two-storey 4,300 sq. ft. open-concept four-season home is truly unique. As Barry says, "We had an unlimited budget and exceeded it!"



It was built to last for generations with minimal maintenance inside and out. Its name, "Dunrunin," reflects the owners' playful nature. Towering mature trees provide plenty of privacy on this property, excavated by Larry Kimble Construction of Bobcaygeon.

Double doors open into the foyer where dazzling panoramic lake views capture attention through the great room's three-storey, self-cleaning windows and eight-foot patio doors. This is Barry's favourite area, which overlooks the dining room, kitchen and sunroom and features wood ceiling beams, dark maple hardwood floors and distinctive eight-inch baseboards. Aside from the breathtaking view, its most striking feature is the wood burning, floor-to-ceiling cultured stone fireplace created with stone from Kinmount's **Timber Mart** and installed by **Earl Given Masonry** in Bobcaygeon, who also completed the exterior stonework. *Continued on page 38*

The formal dining room faces the lake and affords amazing views through 16-foot patio doors. Designed for entertaining ease, the room features a colourful hand-blown Italian Murano glass chandelier. The dining room overlooks a three-season sunroom, which offers a stunning vista of the lake. The sunroom is equipped with track lighting, speakers and a 12-foot telescopic door that makes it an extension of the house.

Marian says her favourite rooms include "the dream kitchen and butler's pantry, which any woman would kill for."

The custom kitchen features a curved maple wet bar with five Murano glass lights that match the dining room's chandelier. The cabinets, crown mouldings and computer desk are dark maple hardwood by **Chervin Kitchen & Bath Inc.** of Parry Sound and Waterloo, with Italian black granite countertops. A four-inch thick butcher block stands in the centre on a multi-coloured slate floor, which matches the foyer.

This gourmet kitchen is fully decked out with a stainless steel gas stove, stacked microwave oven and electric wall oven, double oversize refrigerator and freezer, dishwasher, compactor, two wine coolers and an icemaker. And if that weren't enough, there's a pantry/laundry room just around the corner with a beverage refrigerator, tons of storage, sink and a stacked washer and dryer. The pantry is adjacent to an oversize two-car garage with 10-foot-wide doors by Deer Bay Overhead Doors Ltd. in Selwyn. Continued on page 40





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A plaque over the entrance to the main-floor master bedroom proclaims, "And they lived happily ever after." The master wing has cathedral ceilings and wonderful views of the lake and trees through 16-foot patio doors, which access a private deck area. "You can see the stars from the bed through the high windows above the doors," says Barry. And if you ever tire of that, a 53-inch flat screen TV is suspended on the wall over a gas fireplace.

The six-piece en suite bathroom has heated multi-coloured slate floors and nine-foot ceilings, a large soaking tub with white bead-board and tile surround, a walk-in shower, urinal, and custom designed vanity with marble countertops and his-and-her sinks. The spacious walk-in closet also has nine-foot ceilings.

The main floor guest bathroom is stunning in white and black. **Highland Glass** of Haliburton completed all mirror and shower glass.

Continuing up the maple staircase you'll find a smart-wired entertainment loft with a cathedral ceiling and wood beams. There are two bedrooms upstairs and a five-piece bath.

Sharp Electric in Haliburton completed all the electrical work and the smoke alarms and alarm system are from McKee Security & Telephone Systems, also of Haliburton. The stamped cement patio was done by Fenelon Stampcrete.



Not too big, not too small... just right! Simple enough, but when it comes to what size of home to buy, how do you know what's just right for you? It's easy to be influenced by the "norm," but the norm may not be your Goldilocks home. There are several factors to consider, not the least of which is history.

Last year, the *Globe and Mail* reported that the average size of a house in Canada in 1975 was 1,050 sq. ft., and that new homes being built in 2010 almost doubled to an average of 1,950 sq. ft. It was also noted that the average number of people living in a household dropped a whole person from 3.5 in 1971 to 2.5 by 2006. So, we're building bigger homes for fewer people.

According to the Canadian Home Builders' Association, the average new single-detached family house size in Canada is now 2,000 sq. ft., ranking us third internationally, behind Australia and the U.S., and well ahead of the U.K. where a mere 818 sq. ft. is average.

None of this is to say that a big house isn't for you, just that the norm is not necessarily reflective of needs and that one size does not fit all.

Think about your current home. How do you use it? Perhaps you're like me and spend an enormous amount of time in the kitchen, meaning a big, functional kitchen would be a huge asset for you. Or, maybe you're like many moms who spend too much time in the laundry room, so a big, bright space on the main floor would be a major upgrade from the dank basement.

If you think about how you use each room in your home, calculate the square footage of what you actually use and estimate the amount you'd like more of in certain rooms, you'll come up with a pretty good idea of what square footage will work best for you and your family.

If you're not exactly sure of how you will use and grow into your home, here are the general pros and cons of buying big and small with some personal considerations to follow.

PERSONAL FACTORS TO CONSIDER:

Family Size: How many bedrooms do you need? Can your kids share a room?

Career: Do you work from home and need a separate room for an office?

Finances: What percentage of your income do you want to spend on your home monthly? Will you be able to save, put away for emergencies and still have the lifestyle you want? If your budget is tight, would you rather spend money on quality or quantity in terms of finishes and furnishings?

Lifestyle: How often and how many people do you entertain? Is it important to you to have a guest room? Could it double as an office, den or living space? Do you travel a lot or want to? 
Layout: The right layout can make a smaller space seem much bigger. Is it more important to you to have an open space than a large space, or four small bedrooms rather than three big ones?

DESIGNING YOUR POOLSCAPE

Congratulations! You've decided to take the plunge and embark on the journey of transforming your ho-hum backyard into a lush oasis housing an all-important pool. Due to its absolute permanency, pool choice and placement can be a daunting task. But take heart, follow these steps and you'll be on the right path.

Use of Living Space

Begin your planning by considering how you live and play. Do you love to soak up the sun, or lounge in the shade? Areas for sun bathing need to face south or west whereas eating and casual seating areas are generally located in the shaded area, either through a pergola, gazebo or shade from the house. Do you love to entertain guests and host large dinner parties? You will likely need an outdoor kitchen and table for eight-to-10, plus you'll need to be sure there is enough room for circulating visitors. Do you require a spa or cabana, and where will the pool equipment go? For your pool's proper placement and the related patio space you will have to consider these questions carefully and consult your municipality's bylaws for related info.

Contemporary, Curvaceous or Classic?

Your home and décor will give you cues to decide which style best suits you, but lifestyle also plays a role.

Do you appreciate straight lines, clean textures and bold contrast? This would be considered modern pool taste. These contemporary pools have large, wide steps with deep treads for sitting or lounging and a monochromatic planting scheme. Active people may appreciate this style and choose a long, narrow rectangular sport pool of a single depth.

Do you prefer pond-like pools with natural looking waterfalls and lush plantings? This curvaceous style is more causal and mimics waterscapes found in nature. Families that have children of a variety of ages may choose a large, curvy pool with a deep end and water slide to keep the whole brood entertained.

Maybe classic elegance is more your taste? Similar to the contemporary setting, classic pool design is usually rectangular or Roman-ended, also with straight lines but with little contrast. The gardens are often highly manicured, with sculpted hedgings and lawn.

Stairs, Entryways & Gates

It is amazing how much patio area gets eaten up in the access points. Careful contemplation must be put towards the size and placement of steps inside and outside of the pool. Consider how the pool area will be accessed, how it will be fenced and where the gates will be. For properties with large-grade changes, terracing the patio and gardens may be a nicer option than a long flight of stairs, but keep in mind railings will likely be required.

The View

Do you have a stunning panorama view to highlight, or an unsightly neighbour's shed to mask? Perhaps a lovely infinity edge pool would bring the vista to focus, while a grouping of large emerald cedars could take care of that ugly storage house. Also ponder the views from within your house. Privacy issues also need to be addressed, especially in areas meant for sun bathing, seating/dining and around the hot tub.

Budget

Though this step may not be so enjoyable, it's important to establish a budget range. Once you get the proper footprint of what you need for pool and living space, it will come down to material choices that can make or break the bank. There are also situations that by spending more initially you'll save in the long run, say, by installing an insulated pool bottom to save on heating costs. Knowing your options is vital.

The Options & Accessories

There are many exciting possibilities in today's marketplace to truly customize your backyard setting. Considering that pools are often used in the evening equally to sunlit hours makes landscape and pool lighting almost an essential component. Water or fire features can really give your piece of heaven the focal point it needs. Do you desire an automated maintenance system, a diving rock or perchance a high-velocity jet for laps or wake boarding? Perhaps you are ecologically-conscious and would prefer the natural filtration of a swim pond instead of saltwater. All of these possibilities need to be explored.

Having a scaled 2D landscape design is a pertinent part of any large landscape project. It helps you make the majority of your decisions before the construction process begins and is a crucial communication tool. A 3D drawing can also be particularly helpful to illustrate in a real time perspective. Professional help is available and many pool builders include their landscape design service by an "in-house" designer or you can choose to hire an independent. Any way you decide, having a proper design will help keep the creation of your personal paradise on track and on budget. **OH**

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

CRUST:

1\(\frac{1}{4}\) cups graham wafer crumbs

⅓ cup butter, melted

ORANGE VANILLA CUSTARD:

½ cup whipping cream

⅓ cup sugar

2 tbsp cornstarch

4 large egg yolks, and 2 large eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

11/4 cups 2% milk

1 tsp orange zest

4 cups hulled halved strawberries

1 tbsp sugar

1 tsp white or regular balsamic vinegar

Strawberry CUSTARD PIE

What better way to usher in spring

than with this decadent berry-topped pie? An orange vanilla-scented custard is the perfect vehicle for a mound of pure strawberry love. It's the perfect pie to end an early summer meal on the deck.

You'll want to use the easy no-bake crust and custard base again and again throughout the summer. Simply substitute the strawberries with other fresh, seasonal berries - blueberries, raspberries and blackberries will all work beautifully.

For the smoothest, creamiest, shiniest custard every time, be sure to cook the mixture over medium heat, whisking constantly, just until it begins to thicken (don't worry if it looks a little runny or loose, it will set completely in the fridge as it cools) and strain it through the finest mesh sieve you've got. You can make the crust and custard base up to 24 hours before topping with the strawberries if you're planning to make this for a stress-free special occasion. Keep it covered and refrigerated and top with the berries just before serving.

TO PREPARE:

Crust:

- · Stir together graham crumbs and melted butter until combined.
- Press into bottom and up side of 9-inch pie plate.
- Refrigerate until firm, about 30 minutes.

Orange Vanilla Custard:

- In large bowl, whisk together cream, sugar, cornstarch, egg yolks, eggs and vanilla until smooth.
- In medium saucepan over medium heat, heat milk just until steaming and tiny bubbles form at the surface.
- Slowly pour the heated milk into cream mixture in a steady stream and whisking constantly to prevent cooking the eggs.
- Return mixture to saucepan. Cook over medium heat, whisking constantly, just until it begins to thicken, about 2 minutes.
- · Strain through fine mesh sieve into clean bowl; stir in orange zest. Let cool for 5 minutes.
- Whisk smooth and pour into prepared crust; smoothing top.
- Cover and refrigerate until set, at least 3 hours.

Strawberry Topping:

- Just before serving, toss strawberries with sugar and vinegar.
- Let stand for 10 minutes.
- Mound berries onto centre of pie. OH
