Designer Stephanie Redmond answers your questions.

Dear Stephanie

We will be moving into a new home with a recessed fireplace, small mantel and nine-foot ceilings. We want to hang a picture over the mantel. How do you determine what picture fits best? Is there a formula for this task? The room is open concept with a full fireplace wall, one additional wall and two half walls. Should the wall with the fireplace be a different colour to accent this space?

Any help would be most appreciated.

Stephanie Redmond replies:

Given that your ceilings are not high, you want to accent ceiling height but not overpower your mantel. The most fail-proof way to test a piece is to hold existing pieces above the mantel to see how they feel to you. Some frames will be too heavy, some will not accent the mantel, some may appear too small. This becomes your guide.

One rule of thumb (and something that many mantels suffer from) is to hang your art about six to eight inches above your mantel. Start low. The art should come from the mantel, not float in the space above it.

Always keep in mind the style of your mantel. You can't fight with something that is ornate, but you can complement it with a simpler piece. They need to cohabitate without fighting with one another.

Regarding wall colour, it's difficult to pick a point at which to change tones in an open-concept area and an accent wall is a simple way to do this. If you're craving change, then go for it!

Dear Stephanie

– Tara C.

I have huge south-facing windows in my living room. I love the view but I am concerned about privacy. What can I cover my windows with that will give me a view from the inside but privacy from the outside?

Stephanie Redmond replies:

There are many options when it comes to window coverings. Here are a few ideas that will create privacy and not entirely ruin the view:

- 1. Unlined voile curtains A curtain on a pole with minimal "fullness" (not too much fabric) will soften the window area and give you a more traditional solution. You can see through finer weaves with minimal obstruction but you can only see shadows and shapes from the outside.
- 2. Mesh roller blinds These are used a lot in condos and seem like they may feel too commercial, but they don't. When rolled up into a pocket above the window they literally disappear. (If you are building a new

house, you can build out the crown moulding to create a pocket for the blinds to recess into.) They come in a variety of weaves for light reduction, but you can see through the more open ones. The benefit of these? If you have a lot of windows, you can have them automated.

3. California shades with sheer covering – I have to admit this is not my favourite look, but they are popular and would solve your problem (which I suspect is a common one and attests to their success). These can be fully closed, semi-open with the sheer still giving you privacy or fully retracted which will clear your window except for the stack at the top.

I would suggest visiting a store that specializes in window coverings to see some of your options before making your decision. You say the windows are "huge," which makes me think these window coverings will play a major role in your living room décor.

Dear Stephanie

Upcycling seems to be the latest trend in home décor. How do I determine if a piece of furniture is worth either refinishing or reupholstering? I have an old sofa and some dining room chairs that I'd love to upcycle, but I don't want to invest in pieces that won't last.

Stephanie Redmond replies:

You have to assess upcycling two ways: cost and emotion.

If you like something enough to want to reinvent it (like your dining set), then yes, it can be worth it. However be aware that the cost of repainting, staining, reupholstering and purchasing new fabric may be the same as new chairs. Upcycling is not necessarily the most cost-effective

An old wood chair of quality can generally be re-glued if it has a wobble and re-painted to give it some spark. If done correctly, it should last beautifully. So yes, this is worth it.

Generally older sofas have sturdy frames with webbing and coil springs that can be fixed and re-strung if necessary. The seat cushions often need to be replaced and new fabric purchased, which can add up to more than a new sofa. But if you like the style of your existing sofa, then maybe it's worth it. That assessment can be done by an upholsterer who will tell you if the frame is worth saving.

Upcycling was a trend long before the magazines gave it a catchy name. Not only does it have a positive impact on the environment, it can be easier on the pocketbook. Sometimes we just can't part with that old dilapidated piece of furniture for whatever sentimental reason we may have. And sometimes that's good enough. OH




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NIGHTMARE ON MAIN: THE RISE OF PSYCHIC HOME INSPECTION

If any house is haunted, ours should be. The building is well over 150 years old and has served as a livery stable, a hotel, a photographer's studio, an auto repair shop, a furniture stripping company and an antique store. It's not far from a pioneer cemetery where the original settlers are laid to rest – or so we hope – and our village has enough spooky tales of violence and anguish to fill a house twice the size with tormented spirits.

Before we put in an offer, I asked Patricia – my more sensitive half – if she thought there were "ghosts" in

the building. I was partly joking, but I also knew that if she said, "yes," we'd walk away from it. She said, "Definitely not!"

Fourteen years later, we've had our fair share of problems: loud banging noises at night, scurryings in the attic, slamming doors, objects that mysteriously vanish and just as mysteriously turn up somewhere else. But they can all be explained, pretty much: the house is a drafty, wooden structure that creaks and cracks with extremes of temperature; we have bats and who knows what else under the eaves; and as for the missing objects – well, let's just say I'm a lot more forgetful than I used to be.

But Patricia was essentially right: in all that time, we've never seen or sensed anything scarier than our own shadows, or anything more alarming than our aging faces and sagging waistlines in the mirror.

Not so for Barry Lebow and Catherine Fogarty. They have never met, but they share an interest in haunted houses. Each started out as a skeptic, yet each has had a personal experience of "haunting" that inspired them to modify their skepticism in positive, but very different directions.

Lebow, a real estate professional with 42 years' experience (www. lebow.ca), teaches agents how to handle what he calls "stigmatized" property, property that's been "tainted" or devalued in buyers' minds by, say, its proximity to a toxic waste site or a cemetery, or by violent deaths associated with it. He's been described in the *Toronto Star* as "something of a maven on Toronto's haunted houses" and he acts as an expert witness when issues of non-disclosure become the subject of litigation.

Lebow's interest in properties with weird problems began in his 20s, when he bought a house in a Toronto neighbourhood for a song, only to discover later that it had been the scene of a dramatic suicide several years earlier. Lebow renovated the house, then sold it to someone who wasn't bothered by the building's tragic past. A decade later, a grisly triple murder occurred in a house on his street. He thought the house would remain empty forever, but it was snapped up almost immediately.

These experiences bolstered his fascination with what makes or breaks a real estate deal, and he eventually developed a course, which he still teaches under the auspices of different real estate boards, called "Selling the Haunted House: The Impact of Stigma on Market Values."

The "Haunted House" designation draws students in, but the real substance of Lebow's course isn't ghosts – which, in his experience, are very rare – but properties haunted by more tangible curses that can make values plummet, such as the presence of urea-formaldehyde insulation or a former marijuana grow-op. By law, the vendor and the agent must disclose any such information to the buyer. But that still leaves a large grey area: should knowledge that a house is "haunted" by unexplained phenomena also require disclosure?

Catherine Fogarty runs a Toronto-based film company, Big Coat Productions (www.bigcoatproductions.com) which is currently shooting a new cable TV reality show that could help clarify that grey area.


She happened on the subject more or less by accident – or was it cosmic design? In any case, four years ago, shortly after she and her young twin boys moved into an old home she'd bought in Toronto, scary things began happening. Doors would open or lock spontaneously; she heard strange sounds at night in her bedroom; she woke up to find both taps on her bathtub running full blast. One day, an aquarium in her kitchen shattered, scattering glass and water across the countertop.

Coincidentally, Fogarty was talking with the HGTV cable channel about developing a new series that might tap into the growing popularity of paranormal subject matter. The mysterious occurrences at her home were her eureka moment. With the cameras running, she brought in two psychics, who both confirmed that there were powerful "presences" in the house. Still somewhat skeptical, she engaged a conventional home inspector. He found natural causes for some, but not all, of the events.

That experience became the pilot episode of a 13-part series called *Paranormal Home Inspection*. What makes it different from other spooky home shows, like VIVA's *Rescue Mediums*, is its down-to-earth, "multiplatform" approach. Each home – most in Ontario – will be examined by a regular building inspector before bringing in the psychic investigators. If the pilot episode is any indication, *PHI* will be something like *Holmes Inspection* meets *The Blair Witch Project* meets *Ghostbusters*. There'll be something in it for skeptics and believers alike. (The series begins airing early next year on the HGTV and Mystery TV networks.)

Both Lebow and Fogarty have been changed by their experiences. Lebow, though still a skeptic, doesn't dismiss psychic phenomenon out of hand. "Perception is reality," he says. "If the public believes it, it's a problem, be it ghosts, or urea formaldehyde poisoning." There may be no absolute proof for either, but they will still affect property values, and that's real enough for him. And he has a digital-age caveat for his clients: never buy a house you haven't Googled.

Fogarty hasn't banished the spirits from her home, but she's come to believe they're harmless, and has resigned herself to their existence, just as I have resigned myself to the haunting presence in our home of mice in the basement, bats in the eaves and the ghostly "to do" lists that hover reproachfully in the air, disturbing our sleep. **OH**



THE HEAT IS ON

Spending a chilly evening in that big comfy chair with a hot drink and a fascinating read is only as inviting as the heat that fills the space. Home heating has evolved from a basic means of keeping warm to a more complex, thought-out process of heating your home at a low cost while leaving as little an ecological footprint as possible.

According to Statistics Canada, in 1947, 83 per cent of households burned solid fuel: coal and wood. By 1965, oil peaked as the dominant source of heat in 60 per cent of homes. "Sales have really skyrocketed for ground-source heat pumps," says Czajko, adding that price and property are still limiting factors. "It's not for everyone."

When choosing how to heat your home, the choices can be overwhelming. After all, your heating system accounts for 60 per cent of your home's energy consumption. Taking note of the pros and cons of each option can help you prioritize your needs and find the solution that will vibe best with your lifestyle.

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RONA stores across the province will accept leftover paint for free recycling, part of a new initiative to keep as much as 33,000 tonnes of hazardous household waste from being buried.

The RONA Inc. initiative, which copies a decade-old program operated in Quebec, is one of several efforts being mounted under the new Municipal Hazardous or Special Waste program.

RONA will take the paint it collects and ship it to a Quebec-based company where it will be "reconditioned" and sold under the brand name Boomerang in RONA stores. Leftover latex and alkyd paint, stain and varnish are all accepted.

"Boomerang will be on shelves as soon as we have sufficient quantity," said Michael Rushton, RONA'S vice-president of big-box stores in Ontario. "This is all part of our new initiative to oe more sustainable and eco-friendly.











What was once an outdated, cold and cramped three-storey house is now a bright, spacious 3,650 sq. ft. dwelling showcasing the beauty of the original design.

An Eco-Energy audit was done to identify areas of air leakage and energy efficiency improvements to be made. Remarkably, the original wood-framed, double-hung windows were found to be airtight. Only one window required replacing. The old windows and trim, were, however, rebuilt, rehung, and counterweights restrung to replace broken cords – a labour-intensive undertaking. The audit was useful, and was found to be an economical tool to use. Substantial basement and attic insulation upgrades were done to improve energy efficiency, as was the upgraded boiler unit and fireplace inserts. Continued on page 58




All three fireplaces were in rough shape. **B&R Hearth & Geothermal** installed an airtight, super high efficiency Jotul wood stove insert in the living room and a gas insert in what was once the parlour. A wood-burning fireplace in the master bedroom was rebuilt.

Val replaced timeworn and outdated lighting fixtures with restored antique hanging chandeliers and wall sconces. The dining room showcased a sparkling Maria Theresa chandelier and sconces to match. Furniture is a collection of old pieces with new – some of which have been across the country and back – while others came from local vendors, city shops, antique markets and family. Window coverings and bench seat upholstery in the dining room and kitchen come from **Ashton's** in Thornbury.

Craftsman-style pocket doors lead from the front entrance to the living room, which features maple hardwood flooring, gorgeous stained glass windows, and soaring nine-and-a-half foot ceilings adorned with an original coffered ceiling. A bold painting of a buffalo sits atop a handcrafted mantel by **McKee Kitchens**.


You never know what you will find in a house that dates back to 1903. Craig discovered multiple layers of flooring, from parquet and linoleum, to carpeting and quarter-sawn oak. In one area, the subflooring was an inch higher than elsewhere; it was removed and dropped an inch. "The house underwent about five or six renovations since it was built, making it difficult to know what was done when," says Craig.

Thanks to Craig's carpentry know-how, the couple preserved the original oak floor in the entryway, laid a herring-boned maple floor in the dining area to match the living room flooring, and created a seamless join with help from Benjamin Moore's Sherwood stain colour. Craig also re-built the crumbling colonnade pillars and wood bases leading into the parlour. Walls were treated using eco-friendly low-VOC paints from Benjamin Moore and C2 with thanks to local painter **Patrick Mahon** and his crew. Stair railings and baseboards were meticulously milled and reproduced by **Bill Brown Building Supplies** and were installed and built by Craig himself.

Back in Whistler-Pemberton, Macpherson Fine Homes specialized in building custom high-end log and timber frame homes. A hands-on carpenter by trade, Craig still spends about 50 per cent of his time wearing a tool belt. Overseeing renovation and custom home projects from start to finish keeps him very busy the rest of his time.

Says Val, "We have a reputation for building green, hiring locally and using local products wherever possible. We offer high quality workmanship and put energy efficiency first."

At the top of their list was the installation of a quiet, environmentally friendly heating system (B&R Hearth & Geothermal), which allows four zones to be set at different temperatures throughout the home. Says Craig, "The gas boiler system has no bulkheads, no ductwork to hide or box in, and it provides clean, even heat. We kept all the old cast iron rads, but replumbed and reconditioned them all down into this new boiling system."

Adds Val: "This system also does our hot water. There's no hot water tank. It's amazing technology. It's clean, it's high-tech, it's efficient. We looked into geothermal, but it wasn't cost effective."

The "green" focus extends to the home's three bathrooms, fitted with low flush toilets and low water usage showerheads and faucets by **Grohe** (Georgian Design Centre).

A small, dark kitchen is now an open-concept kitchen-dining room, divided by an island featuring a Caesarstone countertop, a manmade product that requires no sealing (Di Pietra Design), and a functional, built-in window seat. "Craig and I designed the kitchen, pantry and built-ins with the input from our cabinet maker Jason McKee of McKee Kitchens. McKee then constructed and installed the finished product," Val says. The LG appliances were purchased at Macdonald's Countrywide Furniture and Appliances. A deep, stainless farmhouse sink was sourced in London, Ontario.

The kitchen leads to the practical pantry-laundry room with plenty of storage space, and raised countertops, keeping that elusive candy jar

This enterprising couple is quite the dynamic duo. Not only is Val a fulltime mother of three, she also juggles interior design work, and sources materials and products for Craig's projects, as well as a full-time job overseeing contractors and trades at **The Shipyards**.

Now that Val the visionary and Craig the hands-on builder have lovingly and impeccably restored their stately, four-bedroom century home to its original splendour, chances are that Macpherson Fine Homes will be in great demand for years to come. OH

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


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

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




CELEBRATING "NEXT DOOR" PHOTOGRAPHY BY BONNIE FOX

It was a glorious evening and night of celebration at the grand opening of Next Door Transitional Support Program for Women – an eight-bed shelter for women who are victims of domestic violence in Simcoe County. Next Door will provide a safe place in Collingwood for women who wish to establish a life free from abuse in the community. It is the next step for women who seek shelter at My Friend's House – Collingwood Crisis Centre.




















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For nearly 20 years, **My Friend's House** in Collingwood has helped abused women and their children throughout the Georgian Triangle. Thousands of women have found refuge there, been counseled there and have been given the tools to survive.

What the organization has struggled to provide though, is time to heal - until now.

Welcome to **Next Door**. This unbelievable home with nearly 4,000 sq. ft. of living space was anonymously donated to My Friend's House so supporters could do just that; establish a program that gives abused women the time, support and environment needed to turn their lives around.

When Alison FitzGerald, Executive Director at My Friend's House, received the call from the donor asking if they could use the property, she couldn't believe it. When she saw how wonderful the home was – fully restored and renovated - she really couldn't believe it.

As thrilled as she was, she wasn't sure if the organization could afford to support the new program, even with the donation of the house.

Then, Status of Women Canada came through with a grant of more than \$200,000 over three years, and the program came to life.


"There is a group of women who truly don't believe that a better life is possible because of the abuse and trauma in their lives," said FitzGerald in her speech at the open house. "We believed this gift was an opportunity for My Friend's House to create a space where women could truly be given time to heal."

When asked the reasons for donating the home, the donor says, "I just thought it would be good for the community and I've been pretty lucky so I wanted to give back."

The donor has always supported My Friend's House, originally donating money for sheltered women to buy Christmas gifts for

"I hope it [the property] helps some of the women who suffer long term from abuse," he says. "It would be great if some of those women could be rehabilitated." Continued on page 70




Nobody has higher hopes than **Jennifer Ivans** though. She is not only the first woman selected to benefit from the new program and move into the home, but she is much of the inspiration behind the program as well.


Ivans spent most of her childhood in foster homes after being removed from her abusive father's care. Since then, she has encountered physical, sexual and emotional abuse in relationships with both foster families and men. She first went to My Friend's House in 2008 and then again a year later after struggling through another abusive relationship.

For Ivans, this is a once in a lifetime chance to change her life for the better. "My hope is to heal," she says. "To learn how to go on with my life the way it's meant to be, to get out on my own, to take responsibility for myself and love myself."


Like all women who participate in the Next Door program, Ivans can stay in the home for three months up to a full year. She is counting on the weekly therapy sessions and lessons on living with others to help her work through her past so she can create a better future for herself; perhaps as a support worker for women like herself one day. 


















From the moment she stepped through the door of her new home, Ivans knew it was right. "It feels like when you're a kid," she says. "Like coming in from playing in the snow all day and putting on flannel pyjamas and a warm blanket."

Though the home was donated in immaculate shape, a few things needed to be done to bring it up to code, which was made possible with funding from Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation and **Rick Fuhre** of **Fuhre Construction**. Rick worked with Doug Plummer at **Service One** to get rid of some mould in both the home and the coach house, and Robert Steller at **Breathing Easy** to improve overall air quality. **CS Energy & Mechanical** did the HVAC work and **Lorne Bunn Electric** completed the electrical.

Rick and his team divided the upper floor into two bedrooms and worked with **C.C. Tatham & Associates** and **Blue Mountain Welding**


& Machine Shop to design and install a fire escape. He also put a new roof on the coach house and coordinated the alarm system (**Huronia Alarms**).

Between the two buildings, Next Door is able to house and support up to eight women at once with eight bedrooms, two full kitchens, a handful of living spaces and washrooms, and a spacious yard gorgeously landscaped with a large pond, courtyard and plenty of privacy.

FitzGerald couldn't be happier with Fuhre Construction's work and their generosity with their time.


"I wanted to help out here," says Rick "I always like to help community efforts and this is a good cause."





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






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
BUILDING breathtaking views

The homeowners, Kim and Jim, familiar from their youth with the variety of outdoor activities offered in the region, purchased a two-acre parcel severed from a local farm as the site of their permanent dream home.


Both agreed they wanted their new home to employ green innovations and be as maintenance-free as possible. With lots of active family, friends and dogs visiting, another major priority was functionality.



There's hardly a major interior design magazine today that hasn't featured some sort of recent article on the art of decorating "small spaces" - a logical reflection of our current socio-economic demands for "affordably efficient" living accommodation. The impact of record numbers of retiring baby-boomers looking for a break from burdensome home maintenance and soaring upkeep costs, combined with expensive land and development costs, has certainly spearheaded the trend to multi-unit dwellings and

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

are "resizing" or simply starting from scratch, there are numerous ways to capitalize on time-tested strategies for living comfortably when space is at a premium. Naturally, personal style and budget will impact choice, but here are some concepts beyond the obvious need to make do with less, that have remained solid over the years.

Lighting - essential to comfort and well-being, good overhead and ambient lighting is a priority; brightness influences the feeling of spaciousness. Bedside wall mounts conserve side table space. Avoiding chandeliers in open concept areas allows easier multi-functional use and table expansion. Get a qualified expert to help you get this right!

Reclaim storage space from: (a) attics - by adding flooring support to hold seasonal items with access either by portable or drop down ladder. (b) under staircases with closets or cabinetry. (c) false bulkheads with ceiling height cabinets.



Rework inefficient clothes closets by eliminating doors and adding ceiling height built-ins to meet wardrobe requirements. Eliminate inefficient overhead shelves and double rack clothes.

Consider pocket doors to avoid losing space for the door turning radius on interior doors.

Use architectural detail with millwork - crown and wall mouldings etc., to define space and add interest without bulk.

Use built-ins to capitalize on drywall build-outs that create odd corners. By keeping tops narrower than the bottom portion, you provide depth perception and countertop "landing" space can double as a server. Avoid room-blocking squared sides by adding finished corner sections on cabinetry.



The good news is that whatever stage of life you are at, whether you Passthroughs and open spaces between dining tables and kitchens create depth perception; while allowing counterspace for serving.

> "Steal" space for inset cabinetry – desks or display niches from the back of closets in adjoining rooms.



Consider hiding a space-saving "Murphy bed" in a wall unit for guest accommodation in a dual functioning room. It will take up less depth than any other solution and can be "made up" in its stored position.

Multi-functional furniture such as "gate legged" tables, which fold down to side tables; coffee tables with built-in storage (blanket boxes) and secretary-style desks with drop-down writing tables, used in days gone by, are commonly replicated in modern styles for those who prefer new



A round table will seat more people and soften the impact of a dining room table.


Dining chairs upholstered in different fabrics can add interest and be used for additional seating in living rooms.

Age does make a difference... storage solutions should be easy to access; beds made too high or

too low to accommodate storage don't work for seniors, nor do TVs placed too high on walls or too low or microwaves too high to remove hot dishes safely.


Remember the art of illusion – mirrors reflect light and expand space but be aware of what you are reflecting. Glass front doors and tabletops also reflect light and add to depth perception. OH





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


BAR CART:




BEDSIDE TABLE:

ALMOND CRESCENT COOKES

I don't consider myself a sweet tooth. I'm more of a salty snack kind of girl. But when the holidays roll around, everything changes! Starting in November, I scour through holiday magazines, search my favourite food websites and flip through cookbooks to come up with this year's baking list. The list gets written and re-written. Shopping lists are created and re-created. Finally, cuts are made and decisions are final. By early December, the baking has begun.

For this year's baking, I have been looking at old traditions and thinking about creating new ones. That's why almond crescent cookies are at the top of my baking list this year. These simple, yet elegant, melt-in-your mouth cookies have roots in Eastern European history and were a staple on my Hungarian grandmother's table during the holidays. Even more than shortbread or gingerbread, these are the cookies of the

So as you start to consider your own baking list for this year, consider family traditions, especially the ones dearest to your heart. And add some new ones, like almond crescents!

ALMOND CRESCENT COOKIES

Makes about 36

1 cup unsalted butter, softened

1/4 cup icing sugar

1/4 tsp almond extract


Pinch salt

1 cup ground almonds

1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour

Extra icing sugar for dusting

- · Beat butter with icing sugar, almond extract and salt. Stir in ground almonds until well combined. Stir in flour until well combined. Cover and refrigerate for 1 hour.
- · Shape, by scant 1 tablespoonful, into about 2½-inch logs, tapering ends. Shape logs into crescents and place on parchment paper-lined baking sheet.
- Bake in 325°F oven until bottoms and edges are golden, 18 to 20 minutes. Let cool on pan for 10 minutes. Sprinkle with icing sugar.
- Transfer to rack and let cool. Sprinkle with additional icing sugar before serving. on

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BATH FI77IFS

TOOLS:

Small spray bottle, plastic droppers (pipettes), silicone icecube trays, sifter, metal spoon and mixing bowl.

INGREDIENTS:

(makes about 24 cubes)

Eucalyptus Lemon

7 drops of eucalyptus essential oil 7 drops of lemon essential oil About 10 drops of green food colouring (more if desired) 1 tsp matcha tea powder (optional) ½ cup citric acid 1 cup baking soda 3/4 cup cornstarch 1/4 cup organic cane sugar

Vanilla Orange

10 drops vanilla essential oil 5 drops orange fragrance oil About 10 drops of red and vellow food colouring (more if desired) ½ cup citric acid 1 cup baking soda 3/4 cup cornstarch 1/4 cup organic cane sugar

DIRECTIONS:

- · Sift together citric acid, baking soda, cornstarch and matcha tea powder (optional for eucalyptus fizzies) into a mixing bowl. Stir in cane sugar.
- Using pipette, add oil, one drop at a time, until desired scent strength is reached.
- Fill spray bottle with water and add food colouring. Spray mixture lightly, stirring constantly, until mixture becomes damp enough to pack with your hand and colour is even throughout. Do not over spray or mixture will start to fizz.
- · Spoon mixture into ice-cube trays and press down firmly.
- Allow to dry in trays, at room temperature, for 24 hours.
- · Carefully pop individual cubes out of tray by pushing up from bottom.
- Allow cubes to dry exposed for another 24 hours before transferring to containers.

TIP: Use matcha tea with scents that are strong enough to mask the scent of the tea and when the green colour of the tea is beneficial to the final colour you would ike to achieve.



















BATH BOMBS

TOOLS:

Plastic pipettes, large or small round moulds (we've used plastic ornament balls), metal spoon and mixing bowl.

INGREDIENTS:

(makes 2 large or 4 small)

Candy Apple

6 drops apple fragrance oil 1 drop orange fragrance oil 3 drops vanilla essential oil About 5 drops red and 3 drops vellow food colouring 2 ½ cups epsom salts 2 tbsp water

Orange Marmalade

5 drops orange fragrance oil 2 drops lemon essential oil 3 drops vanilla essential oil About 5 drops yellow and 2 drops red food colouring 2 ½ cups epsom salts 2 tbsp water

DIRECTIONS:

- Stir together epsom salts and water in mixing bowl.
- · Using pipette, add oil, 1 drop at a time, until desired scent strength is reached.
- · Spoon mixture into both halves of moulds and pack firmly. Press both halves together until they connect. Carefully remove top half of mould.
- · Let ball stand, mould side down, for 24 hours.
- Once exposed side is completely dry hold the ball in your hand, exposed side down, and very carefully remove mould. Set ball on dry side and allow to completely dry out, approximately 3-4 days before transferring to containers.

TIPS: Set balls on upside-down bottle caps while drying to stop them from rolling. Allow larger balls to dry a little longer before transferring to containers, to avoid crumbling.

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


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
