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How to buy the right wood stove

When you begin shopping for a wood stove, consider first what you need it to accomplish. Keep these questions in mind:

How much space must be heated? How often will the wood stove be used? How much can I afford to spend? Will very young children be present when the stove is in operation – a possible safety



hazard? Are there any other significant problems to consider, such as the ability of other family members to operate the stove when needed? What safety equipment do you need - how much does that cost? Will a wood stove be economical when compared to other types of heating systems?

The size of the area to be heated will determine the size of the wood stove you purchase. Remember that a stove that is too small will not heat the area adequately. One that is too large may release too much heat, causing you to reduce the air supply into the stove – a practice that reduces the stove's efficiency, wastes fuel dollars, and can cause safety and air pollution problems.


With many types of wood stoves and hundreds of models to choose from, the buying process can be frustrating. One way to simplify the processistorely on the help of a knowledgeable and reliable wood stove dealer.

Keep these questions in mind when you choose both a dealer and a stove manufacturer:

Does the dealer carry lines from several different manufacturers, so I can compare the features? How realistic are any claims made by a dealer about a particular product? Can the dealer help me choose the right size stove and help me place it in the optimum location in my house? Can the dealer deliver and install the product? Can the dealer repair each model sold? Are replaceable parts, service manuals and warranties available?

MUDROOM

We have decided to build an addition onto our home in order to accommodate a mudroom and more storage space. Do you have any tips or hints to help us make our new room work for our family? We have no idea where to even begin. – Carol





QUICK TIP: An easy way to add softness to your mudroom (and necessary storage) is by using baskets. When selecting your baskets, make sure they are just deep enough to fold a scarf or store a bulky pair of gloves. Things get lost at the bottom of deeper baskets and become disorganized too quickly.



Designer Stephanie Redmond answers your questions.

As much as I would appreciate my home always looking as though it's in the middle of a photo shoot, it is simply impossible. We have boots, mittens, scarves, strollers, keys, mail, grocery bags, backpacks, spare change and all things made to produce clutter. Unless we dedicate a space for each item, it seems to all end up at the bottom of a basket, on the floor and just plain lost. The mudroom, however, is my saving grace.

Some would argue that a mudroom is the busiest room in the house. They endure the ebb and flow of a household on a daily basis. Let's face it, it's constant abuse! If you're going to invest in an addition for your home, make sure you spend time planning. It will make that extra space go from functional to fabulous.

DESIGNING YOUR MUDROOM

A well-designed mudroom is a well-planned mudroom. Look in closets and the garage and itemize what you will keep in your mudroom. Take into account the height of boots and number of shoes, the length of jackets, the size of purses and helmets. Instead of promising to take that trip to Goodwill, plan for what you've got.

Consider the following:

- **Seating** to put on and take off shoes
- Hooks a lower level is handy for children
- Counter for mail and car keys
- **Broom closet** for regular sweeping
- Coat closet for longer items
- Baskets, cubbies or drawers for mittens, scarves, etc.
- **Pet station** for leashes, food and bags
- **Grocery bin storage** for easy access on the way out

BUILDING YOUR MUDROOM

Material selection is critical. Ensure that surfaces are hard-wearing to prevent scratches or water damage. Leave enough room in your budget for quality materials that will withstand the test of time and keep your room looking unsullied.

Consider the following:

- Radiant heat this will dry the floor and your wet shoes
- Drawers with soft closers to prevent slamming
- Central vac install in the baseboard so you can sweep directly into it
- **Good lighting** brighter is better
- Slatted shelves for airflow so wet items can dry easily
- Stone or slate floors thinner tiles could crack
- **Wood cabinetry** a painted finish will eventually scratch or chip (but can be repainted)
- Electrical outlets for charging phones

As utilitarian as this space may be, don't forget to make it chic. Just because it's where you keep your shoes doesn't mean it needs to look like a boring old closet. Have fun with it! $\mathbf{o}\mathbf{H}$



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












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ENSURING YOUR INSURANCE

Catastrophes across the world have put the insurance industry under a spotlight over the past few years, with typhoons in Thailand, hurricanes along the U.S. Gulf Coast and earthquakes in Chile, just to name a few.

Homeowners may feel a sense of panic when empathizing with families in these unfortunate locales, but what level of insurance is reasonable when dealing with the kinds of weather-related emergencies that we experience in Ontario? Typhoons and hurricanes don't affect us, but landslides, floods, blizzards or tornados can and do happen regularly.

How much home insurance is enough?

"You need enough insurance to rebuild from the ground up, including debris removal," says Kevin Hodgins, secretary-treasurer, Southwestern Ontario Chapter, Insurance Institute of Ontario. This could be more than the price of your home because of the economies of scale: contractors get good deals on labour and material when building many homes at the same time, but rebuilding one home can cost much more.

Or it could cost less, according to Brian Maltman, executive director at General Insurance OmbudService. "You get overheated markets like Toronto, where homes in some parts of the city are selling for many times (more than) what it would take to rebuild them."

How much is too much?

No one wants to be "insurance poor," but being seriously over-insured is almost guaranteed not to happen, according to Maltman, because of the way insurance companies calculate the replacement value of your house.

What kinds of insurance do I need?

A package or comprehensive policy ensures that the building itself is insured, as well as the contents and the mortgage are all covered. Other types of coverage are also part of a comprehensive policy, like riders on special items or items of greater value. This type of policy also usually includes liability insurance.

Contents insurance is limited, according to Maltman, so it's a good idea to have expensive jewelry appraised (or other items that fall outside the normal range of value for your type of house) and covered with a rider.

"Be aware that there are limitations on things like jewelry, furs, computer software, collector items – and sometimes even bicycles and silverware. Go over the limitations with your agent or broker," urges Hodgins.

Mortgage insurance ensures that the lender is covered in the case of injury or death of one or more of the owners. It can also ensure that the house is paid off through insurance, so as not to be a burden to the surviving spouse.

One million dollars is the usual amount for liability within most comprehensive policies. This protects the homeowner in case someone is injured on their property. Some policies include \$2 million liability coverage. What's not covered?

"Floods," says Maltman. "Because they are predictable (in some areas) and because they usually involve many houses."

He says, however, a flood due to a sewer back-up is usually covered by comprehensive policies.

What about deductibles?

A higher deductible means a lower premium and vice versa. This is because most claims are on the lower end, says Maltman. "Ask yourself,

'Could I afford to pay that first \$1,000 (if that's your deductible amount)?' That's the first question," he adds. If the answer is no, a \$1,000 payout would be tough, go with a lower deductible and higher premium.

What questions should I ask?

When buying a new home: "Question the seller about any water-related losses. If they have occurred, ask what steps were taken to ensure it wouldn't happen again," says Hodgins.

When renewing insurance annually: "Ask yourself if there's anything you should talk over with your broker or agent," cautions Maltman. Have you done extensive renovations that would affect the replacement cost of your home; have you purchased expensive art or jewelry; has anything changed in your home in the past year?

What should I be aware of?

There are discounts allowed if you have fire or burglary protection systems, being mortgage free and often for insuring your house and car with the same insurer, according to Hodgins.

Bottom line

"There are discounts for being and remaining claims free, so consider your insurance as protecting against disasters rather than a home maintenance policy," says Hodgins. $\mathbf{o}\mathbf{H}$

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

There's a spectacular work of art perched atop the Beaver Valley, replete with a tranquil man-made pond, and a stellar view of paradise. It's one of master craftsman Frank Wyssen's latest creations. And what a beauty it is.

The story starts with a Toronto couple who dreamed of living in a converted old barn. Referred to a man known as "the honest builder," they immediately knew Wyssen was the man for the job. There was just something about Frank.

Wyssen, owner of **Creek Valley Inc.**, is no less than passionate about what he does. He's been building for 14 years, crediting local developers

> Converting a barn into a home was a first for Frank. For a year, Wyssen drove all over the countryside looking for a suitable structure. Then, friends in Duncan mentioned their barn was falling down.

Bill and Jane Lewis for his start.

Bingo. It was the ideal barn for the project. "I inspected it, and sure enough, this was the best barn I had seen in the whole year I looked for barns," says Wyssen. Continued on page 45















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The foundation was crumbling, but the 100-year-old structure was beautifully preserved. All the posts, timber, purlins and braces were intact.

"Nothing was missing," says Frank. "Nobody had ever cut into it or changed anything." So he and his crew of five full-time Mennonite workers from Mount Forest (Orlin, Ray, Alvin, Mark, and Elmer) and Roy Genoe disassembled and moved the barn to its present location.

"We brought on a few extra Mennonites for the tear-down," explains Wyssen, "and to erect the barn on this site. Once it was stripped, we took it down in one day, and after we reassembled it on the ground, we had the entire structure up in a day."

A daunting undertaking to say the least, but from the look in his eyes, it's clear that Wyssen is a man who embraces challenge. Like pouring concrete 30 feet in the air, building a unique sub-floor, crafting a handmade shower

drain, or creating a three-inch space between the concrete and the timber frame to house the electrical, plumbing and drains.

For Frank, reassembling and designing the layout of the new structure was like fitting pieces of Lego together. "Everything's about the sequence of events," he states, "and about what has to go first, second, and third." His vision was to make the home resemble three buildings: a carriage house and an old stone milk house that connect to the barn structure.


The original footprint of the barn was 60-by-40 feet, or 2,400 sq. ft. on three floors. Add a breezeway and garage, and the result is a bright and airy 10,000 sq. ft. living space that highlights the splendour of the original framework. "The only thing we added was the black stair railing," states Wyssen, "but everything else, the way the floor is built on top of the frame, and the way it's all connected, you would think that's exactly how I found the barn." 

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An ICF structure encases the timber frame, including the walls around the perimeter of the building, and the upper gable ends and dormers. Steel brackets secure the posts and rafters into the concrete, mechanically connecting the concrete structure to the timber frame.

Every aspect of this lofty undertaking was cleverly conceived: from the geothermal buried in the pond, to the waterfall (sketched by Wyssen on a napkin) that recycles pond water, to the contemporary L-shaped, 6,000 lb. floating staircase, (a Wyssen design), that ingeniously complements the framework.

This particular timber structure is what is known as a four-bent barn. (A bent is the unit of barn timbers running from front to back). Says Wyssen, "the most incredible bent is the one with the 40-foot swing beam. For nine days, we chiselled, drilled and fitted to create this one-of-a-kind bent." Continued on page 48

Normally, when a barn is being converted, it has some type of subfloor. This barn had no second floor. To create the second floor, Frank used three swing beams, plus the timber he sourced from different suppliers. He resourcefully constructed a solid, four-inch "sandwich" of layers, including the ceiling, plywood, an inch and a half of concrete, another layer of plywood, and then the finished floor. It's totally unique.

Wyssen designed a wide-open living area to showcase the beauty of the original timber frame. Four awe-inspiring 60-foot beams that run from end-to-end are fully exposed. "They're only lost for a brief moment when they travel through the wall and exit on the other side," says Wyssen. "Nowhere did I bury anything in this barn." Continued on page 50

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A massive four-by-four foot airtight, two-sided woodburning fireplace, constructed from the original barn foundation, is the heart of the home. Soaring 33 feet to the rafters, Frank built a hot air chamber inside this 100-ton solid stone mass to radiate heat for hours, even tapering its sides to resemble a wine bottle.

Wyssen salvaged enough original barn board for the ceilings, and tastefully whitewashed antique pine floorboards of varying sizes to mimic the aged barn board. A combination of rope and up lighting dramatically illuminates the wooden beams.

It's evident that Wyssen cares about the people he works for, and about the work he does. And he has a "riot" doing it. Frank says there's no way he can do what he does without the support of his wife Angi and his children Isaac, Rachel and Sarah. Every job has been a referral from satisfied clients. And each was secured with a handshake, not a contract. His clients soon become his friends. "I always wish it was Monday morning, 8 o'clock," he says. That's how much Frank Wyssen loves his craft. **OH**

Q & A WITH THE HOMEOWNERS...

Where did you come up with the idea to convert a barn into a home? Why a barn?

We were starting from scratch and wanted to try to blend rustic and contemporary in a way that would fit with the spectacular setting and be practical for us as a second home for our young family. While a barn conversion isn't a novel concept, we thought it might fit our needs. We brought it up with Frank and within five minutes we were standing in his barn and he was showing us his vision for how it could work.

How did you find Frank?

We have friends who have had a family home in the area for many years. Frank had built one of their family member's homes and they said we had to talk to him as they had never met anyone like him. We went on the "Frank tour," saw the amazing houses he built and met the people he's worked with. The final step was meeting his family - he was interviewing us as much as we were interviewing him and we liked that.

What was it like working with Frank and his crew?

Frank has a natural gift for architecture and design and was incredibly enthusiastic about bringing this very complex project to life.

What's your favourite part of the home/property?

There are so many incredible details that it's impossible to pick one. If forced to, it would be the staircase. But we'll give you a different answer tomorrow. OH

The hypnotic monochromatic watercolour in the apartment living room depicts Second World War Spitfires arcing, dipping and falling like grey ghosts in an illusive dream. The painting captures the dual passions that ignite the imagination of the apartment's owner, Renée Desrochers – her love of history mingled with a modern sensibility that reveals the story behind everything she sees.

Renée, owner of **Pamper & Soothe** in Thornbury, lives in a small, elegant flat above her shop in a turn-of-the-century Victorian brick house. Pamper & Soothe, like her living quarters, reflects those things that excite and impassion Renée.

She explains the source of her inspiration for business and life. "I have a European background. I grew up in an original fieldstone house, around which my uncle built our renovated home. So I've always been surrounded by historic elements from barnboard walls to a stone fireplace. My mom decorated with eclectic pieces that were in keeping with the overall style of the house where we lived... I guess I've picked up on that."


Provenance clearly influences Renée's style. "I have a definite passion for older things," she says. "When my business partner and I travel to Paris

to attend the trade show Maison&Objet to buy for our two shops, I love spending hours perusing the antique markets."

She also reflects her love of the festive season ahead. "Christmas is a tradition in my family," she says. "In my shop I sell real advent calendars and behind each door is a historic holiday scene. I love that traditional sense of being with family and the feeling of 'Peace on Earth.' Because it's the high point of the year, I like to see it reflected in my home décor."

True to her word, Renée's entire apartment is punctuated with handmade candles from Europe and accessories that suggest the tradition and class of European culture. 

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





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BAY HOUSE

Thornbury's Bay House is a resounding success. The design, attention to detail, quality of materials and workmanship in this beautiful home make every square foot count. This approach offers pluses for both the environment and the homeowner, including fewer resources used, a smaller footprint, and lower energy and tax expenses.

It all started with a lot near Georgian Bay on a quiet Thornbury side street. The lot was narrow but deep and well-treed. "To find a lot in town that still looked like it was sitting out in the forest was pretty unique," says co-owner Lori Bennett. "It was the location that sold us."

"The Bennetts wanted the house to fit into the streetscape but still be very original," says **Black Tusk**'s Bill Brown, who created the architectural plan. The end result makes a virtue of its small yard. It was always in the plan to keep the cedar tree cover, which offers privacy and year-round colour. **Tavis Yeats** and **Michael Chapman** of **Oasis North Landscapes** worked with Black Tusk on the landscaping plan and built the driveway, walkway, outdoor barbecue kitchen, elevated hot tub, patio living space and other features. Complementing the existing landscape is a key theme for the Bay House. The two chimneys, built by mason **David Campbell**, are a dominant feature of both exterior and interior. The stone colour and texture echo the native boulders in the yard. The Pennsylvania Weatherledge Dutch Quality – placed by an expert hand such as Campbell's – can fool the untrained eye into believing it is quarried stone.

Small but crucial design details distinguish the exterior from other post-and-beam builds. Take for instance the curved "eyebrow" on the front of the house, built by carpenter **Hugh Grafton** of **Sibbett Contracting**. "Fancy is what I do best," says Grafton. For the front barrel-vaulted covered porch, Grafton and Bill Brown

employed the same curve motif. **Adam Burk** of **Due North Custom Carpentry** and **Sean Wood** of **Woodcraft Custom Carpentry**, framed the home, completed additional carpentry and built the outdoor barbecue kitchen.

For the interior, Lori Bennett mentioned to Black Tusk early on that she wanted to "bring the outside, in." A key component is the millwork by **Jason Holman** of Clarksburg's **JTI Custom Cabinets & Furniture**. Holman's choice of kiln-roasted maple gives the interior a refined burnish. Along with apprentice **A.J. Carter**, Holman built the doors, panels, trim, cabinets, vanities and other interior detail of roasted maple. Apart from its beauty, this wood's key feature is it needs only a clear-coat finish.



Holman added a custom touch using a different kind of wood for the island that separates the kitchen from the living room. For the live-edge top, Holman fashioned a board from an old ash tree that had been struck by lightning.


Above the island hang two dramatic clusters of pendant lighting at various heights provided by **Helen Labelle** of the **Georgian Design Centre**. This feature is three things at once: lighting, a room divider, and an art object.

Creative thought is evident in every room. The master bedroom on the main floor has transom-effect windows for light and privacy, a linear flame gas fireplace and a spectacular master bathroom with eye-catching tile work. The "wave wall" of gypsum formed tiles by Modular Arts, installed

by **John Lister** and purchased at **Desert Tile**, is another salute to the surroundings of the Bay House. Black Tusk's Barbara Patton explains: "I was looking for a texture reminiscent of Georgian Bay waves. There are two commercial installations in Toronto but this is the first residential installation in Canada that we know of."

Sarah Osburn of Georgian Design Centre provided plumbing fixtures throughout the house as well as the master bathroom's freestanding tub. "It's made of a rare volcanic limestone mixed with resin," says Sarah, "making it a lightweight, highly insulated alternative to cast iron. The bathtub is not only a truly unique piece, but extremely comfortable as well – we made Barbara sit in it in our showroom to prove it – which isn't always the case with luxury tubs." *Continued on page* 102


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
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

























The laundry room and kitchen feature appliances provided by **Tom Macdonald** and **Don Stevens** of **Macdonald's Countrywide Furniture & Appliances** in Meaford. 
As the project undergoes final touches, Barbara Patton reflects: "We

Here are some helpful ingredients to have on hand, and simple ideas on how to use them to make your holidays stress-free and fun.

FROM THE PANTRY

For last minute entertaining

- **Nuts** For last minute entertaining, simply put a few types of nuts in a bowl for snacking while sipping. When you have a bit more time, try different types of roasted and spiced or sweetened nuts, very impressive and very addictive!

- **Dried Fruit** Dried apricots, pears, prunes and figs not only look great on a cheese tray, they also complement the rich saltiness of aged cheeses.

For stress-free meals

- Pasta Pasta is the perfect option for dinner when time is at a premium. While the pasta is cooking, sauté any vegetables you have on hand in olive oil for an easy sauce.
- Rice Fried rice, risotto, one-pot chicken and rice, the options are endless, and speedy, for an easy weeknight meal.
- Canned Beans Keep a variety of canned beans in your pantry for a quick chili, burrito filling, or to serve on toast or with rice.

- Canned Tuna or Other Fish Tuna (or other canned fish) melts make satisfying and simple weeknight dinners. Or try it tossed in pasta.
- Canned Tomatoes A tomato sauce is only 15 minutes away when you have a can of tomatoes on hand. Keep a few in the pantry for easy sauces, soups and stews all through the week.

FROM THE FRIDGE

- Cooked Shrimp Thawed cooked shrimp set in a bowl with cocktail sauce is a stress-free crowd-pleaser. Or toss thawed cooked shrimp in cooked pasta for a quick dinner.
- Puff Pastry Sprinkle frozen puff pastry with herbs and cheese, fold in half, cut into strips and bake for instant and addictive cheese sticks. Your guests will think you're a genius.
- Mini Tart Shells Mini tart shells are great for appetizer-size quiches or easy sweets. OH

EASY NIBBLES for the holidays

SMOKEY PAPRIKA ALMONDS

These delicious smokey almonds evoke Spanish tapas bars and are perfect for spontaneous gatherings or get-togethers. But the best thing is that they are super quick to prepare. If you like things more spicy, adjust the cayenne pepper to taste.

2 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil

1 tbsp smoked paprika

1½ tsp sea salt

Pinch cayenne pepper

4 cups almonds, with skin on

In large bowl, stir together oil, paprika, salt and cayenne pepper. Add almonds, stirring until coated.

Arrange on baking sheet. Bake in 325°F oven, stirring once, until almonds are slightly darker and some of the skins are beginning to crack. Let cool for 10 minutes to enjoy warm, or serve at room temperature.

FIVE-SPICE MIXED NUTS

Five-spice powder is a mixture of spices commonly used in Chinese cooking. The most common combination of spices is star anise, cloves, cinnamon, Sichuan pepper and ground fennel seeds. Look for jars of this fragrant spice blend in the spice aisle of most grocery stores.

2 egg whites

4 tsp five-spice powder

1 tbsp icing sugar

2 tsp soy sauce

4 cups mixed unsalted nuts

In large bowl, beat together egg whites, five-spice powder, icing sugar and soy sauce. Add nuts, stirring until coated.

Arrange on parchment-paper-lined, or greased, baking sheet. Bake in 300°F oven until nuts are light golden, about 20

Let cool enough to handle, then break up any clumps.

SWEET & SPICY PECANS

The combination of caramelized brown sugar and chili powder is fantastic on roasted pecans. For an easy variation, substitute the pecans with unsalted walnut halves.

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

2 tbsp butter

1 tbsp water

1 tbsp chili powder


½ tsp cayenne pepper

½ tsp cinnamon

4 cups unsalted pecan halves

In saucepan, melt brown sugar, butter and water together over medium heat, stirring until sugar dissolves, about 2 minutes. Boil, stirring constantly, for 1 minute. Stir in chili powder, cayenne pepper and cinnamon until combined. Add pecans, stirring until coated. Arrange on parchment-paper-lined, or greased, baking sheet. Bake in 350°F oven for 15 minutes. Let cool enough to handle, then break up any clumps. OH









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
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
