
Two years after building her family home on Old Mail Road, high on the Escarpment in Grey County, **Helen Thomson** was ready to landscape.

Designer and owner of **HT Designs**, Thomson's spectacular 35-acre property is tucked away from busy roads at the end of a long driveway amidst rolling hills and cycling trails. Noticing signs around the area, she contacted landscape designer **Tyler Speirs**, principal of **TS Design Build**. They met to chat and the creative energy grew.

The landscape would be designed around her home, a 5,000 sq. ft. modernist twist on a country barn. With stunning architectural work by **Rockside Campbell Design**, the house was built by **Creek Valley Homes** in 2010. "It was a great build," says Thomson.

There was much to consider before drawing up a landscape plan. Speirs is an award-winning landscape designer with a hands-on approach to his work. "Tyler is wonderful to work with," offers Thomson. "He gives off good energy, really listens to his clients, follows through and puts his heart and soul into the project."

When Speirs first approached the property, he was drawn to its unique qualities. "I saw fields of corn flanking a contemporary home on the Escarpment," he recalls. "There were great vistas with a forest-like setting behind, and it was quite secluded." Thomson and Speirs had the same vision: To create an outdoor living space that would blend and flow well with Thomson's design taste and style, and create a balance between the modern elements of the house and the natural outdoor setting.

But Thomson had a longer wish list, which evolved over the three-month project: A pool with a patio area, a spa/hot tub with decking extending over the pool, a pergola to shelter the dining area, a barbecue and bar area, a fire pit with a seating area and plants. With the plan in place, Speirs and his team of four got to work. Says Speirs, "No landscape is complete without fire, water, art and personality," and this project has it all.

Thomson envisioned the hardscaping as solid, clean lines and the softscaping as low maintenance with large swaths of soothing colour in mass-planted garden beds. A broad assortment of perennials, including salvia, Russian sage, lavender, creeping thyme, maiden grass, iris, euonymus and fountain grass offer a cool palette of blues and purples in late summer. A single white paper birch tree further defines the space. Irrigation managed by The Sprinkler Guys.

There were privacy considerations. Fencing was needed for the pool, but also to deter visiting wildlife, including deer, foxes, coyotes and wild turkeys. With the forest offering some privacy, the homeowners wanted an enclosure that felt open and did not obstruct views. Speirs designed a unique fence using galvanized steel mesh, framed by cedar posts stained black. A horizontal wood fence blocks the nearby circular driveway from the patio area.

Speirs created custom concrete pool decking, poured and made smooth but with texture to prevent slipping. The hot tub surround is heat-treated ash, a popular maintenance-free option, and LED lighting glows from beneath the spa steps. A waterfall feature flowing gently into the pool was later added to the hot tub wall.

The custom pergola is constructed of fir posts and beams, with a canvas shade overhead. A floating concrete countertop designed by Speirs completes the barbecue and bar area. Board-formed concrete, consistent with design details in the home's interior, was used for the barbecue area, pool retaining wall and fire pit. Muskoka chairs and a custom bench by Speirs cluster around the fire pit, on a bed of pea-stone gravel.


Entering the house, visitors are struck by the bold and innovative design details, enhanced by the interaction of light, glass, concrete and wood. The south-facing main floor is bathed in natural light through floorto-ceiling windows and doors (Cedarport Window and Door Centre Inc.), and a partial glass floor acts as a skylight to the lower level.

Board-formed concrete, antique pine and reclaimed-wood accent walls seamlessly blend with outside landscaping. There are some surprises, such as the use of hot pink as an accent colour. "My daughter and I love pink," says Thomson. "And as a designer, I know interior colour choices are often influenced by what colours actually look good on my clients." Continued on page 62















A porcelain stone floor in the front entrance butts up with grey, elm flooring in the open-concept main level, adding to the illusion of more space. A dramatic fireplace by Chantico Fireplace Gallery creates a focal point for the family living area. All interior painting was done by **Student Works Painting**, a company owned by Thomson.


"You can't always buy what you need," adds Thomson, pointing to the dining room table and side table she herself designed. Two dramatic chandeliers, some of the few man-made light sources in the home and sourced by HT Designs, define the dining area. The sleek custom kitchen cabinets and built-ins were provided by Riverside Custom Cabinets Ltd.





Floating stairs of pine and glass, with custom metal railings (Thornbury Steel Fabricators) link the three floors. "From the upper level in winter, you can see the bay and Georgian Peaks," says Thomson. The couple's grown children enjoy their private spaces, each with a view, when they are home.
