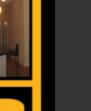

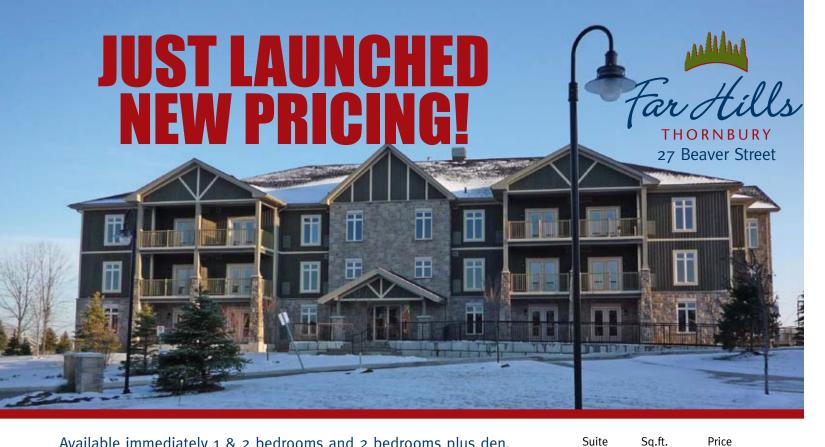

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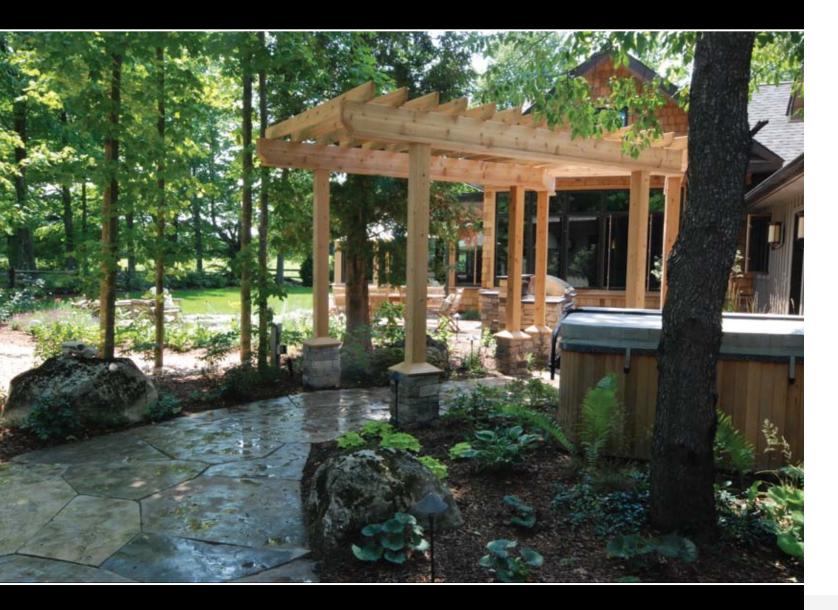
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Two reasons why people are tempted to smolder wood fires:

First, they are reluctant to burn the appliance hot enough because they are worried about overheating nearby combustibles. Our response is that you can't burn clean if you fear for your safety because the installation doesn't conform to code requirements. So the first step is to get it inspected and brought into code compliance.

And second, they think that all the heat that goes up the chimney is wasted heat so they concentrate on keeping the flue gas temperature

down. We say that about 20% of the heat released by the burning fuel must be given to the chimney to keep it clean and working properly. It is more efficient to burn the smoke and give plenty of heat to the chimney, than to waste the energy in the smoke by smoldering.

Two reasons why people often burn wet wood:

Procrastination and wishful thinking, and most of us have been guilty of both at one time or other. Firewood dries very slowly, and the harder the wood, the slower it dries. The wetter the climate the slower wood dries. The more shaded the location, the slower wood dries. It has become clear that the super hardwoods like oak and maple will not dry sufficiently in just the summer months. These are difficult lessons to learn.



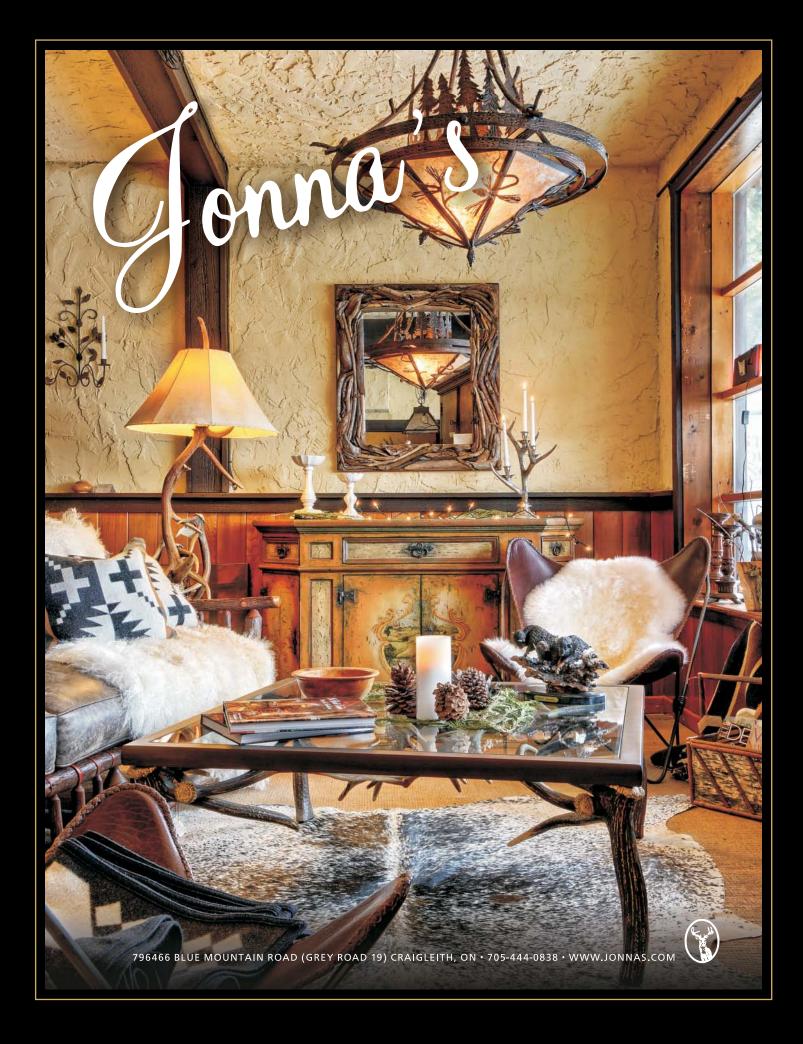
Five ways to tell if firewood is dry enough:

1 It darkens with age and sun exposure 2 Cracks or checks form in the end grain 3 Two pieces of seasoned wood sound hollow when knocked together 4 A freshly split surface feels warm and dry 5 It does not hiss or bubble from the end grain when burned

Match the size of the fire to the heating needs of the home. When the weather is mild, avoid filling the firebox to capacity; rather, build a small compact fire and load the appliance more often. Use dry wood. The moisture content of the wood has a large effect on the ability of your appliance to make heat. Never let the fire smolder. Think of wood smoke as wasted energy and operate the stove in such a way as to use it before it enters the flue pipe.

RAISING THE BAR

Bill Mullen has high hopes! The Ontario-based home inspector is also the director of external relations for a new organization, the National Home Inspector Certification Council (NHICC).

The NHICC is pushing for nation-wide licensing of home inspectors, but at this time Ontario, the Atlantic Provinces and Saskatchewan are just looking at this possibility.

Alberta and British Columbia already license home and property inspectors. B.C. led the way, endorsing inspectors since April 1, 2009, while Alberta came onside September 1, 2011. Neither of these came about without a lot of pushing from interest groups within those provinces, and Mullen doesn't expect it to be much different in Ontario, though he hopes that the timeframe to have licensing passed into law could be shortened because of the groundwork done by those first two provinces.

According to Peter Link, manager of house and property inspection registration for the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians of B.C. (ASTTBC), his organization lobbied for two decades to make this happen.

Helene Barton, Executive Director of the B.C. branch of the Canadian Association of Home and Property & Inspectors, (CAHPI), agrees. "We lobbied the government for eight years to have our industry regulated because prior to that anyone who bought a ladder and had a business card could say they were a home inspector. Many were charlatans."

Though there are training courses and college programs in all provinces, in most provinces there is no onus on someone who calls him/ herself a home inspector to take such education. In the two provinces that currently license, the several certifying organizations that exist require some or all of the following to become licensed: specialized education (number of hours varies from organization to organization), a practical (or field) test, written exam, a peer inspection process, and, finally, an application to the provincial licensing body. In the case of B.C., that's Consumer Protection B.C. For Alberta, it's Service Alberta. The outcome of the application process is not ideal, according to Darcy McGregor, secretary and founding member of CAHPI Alberta. "We thought they (the government) would raise everyone to the highest level, like our members follow, but they said that wouldn't be fair."

While the expectations aren't as high as he'd like, McGregor says, "Licensing at least gives homeowners a bit more assurance that the person they are dealing with has some education and the ability to look after them as a home inspector."

Link echoes this sentiment: "We pushed for one certifying organization and one standard of practice, but there are four in B.C." So buyer beware is still in force, and homeowners must research any home inspector they are thinking of hiring. "The onus is still on the homeowner. (They should ask) where did they get their education; do they have experience in the field to have the ability to recognize problems."

Barton, though, feels that the process has been overall positive. "It got rid of a lot of people who are unqualified. We are still trying to get the consumer to ask about the licence before hiring a home inspector. It gives them peace of mind knowing that they (inspectors) are qualified."

Though there is mixed reaction to the outcomes in B.C. and Alberta, there's one point that McGregor, Link and Barton all agree on – home inspectors in those provinces are now required to carry errors and omissions insurance. They must be insured up to \$1 million, so if they miss something during an inspection and this results in a costly repair, the homeowner may have financial recourse.

One piece of the puzzle that is still missing, according to Nigel Trevethan, of Harper Grey LLP and legal counsel for CAHPI B.C., is a "cooling off period, like many other large purchases." He thinks it's regrettable that the "government hasn't mandated that every real estate transaction must involve a home inspection. This is especially important in an overheated housing market, like Vancouver." He feels that this is key to consumer protection.

So, though Mullen's hopes for the future of licensing in Ontario – and throughout the country – are high, experience tells us that the outcome may be less than stellar but better than the status quo. **OH**



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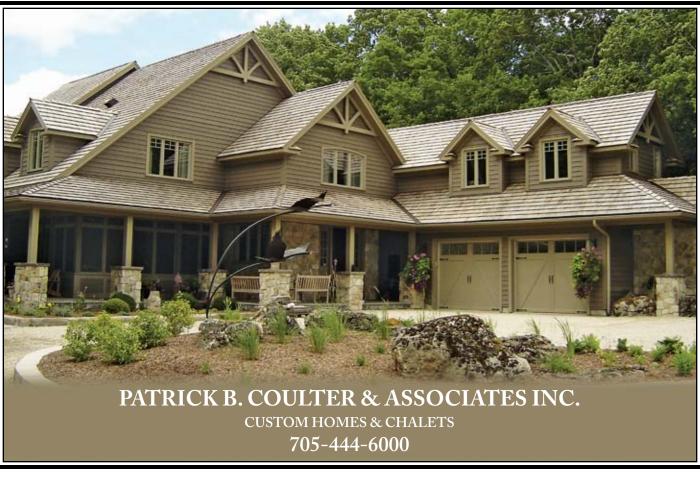


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PRACTICAL, FUNCTIONAL, BEAUTIFUL

There's no shortage of passion in the Farrow home. After 20 years of marriage, it's obvious that Blake and Marina are still nuts about each other.

They're passionate about life, their kids, Kyle, Jake and Olivia, their family and about gathering with friends to break bread, share succulent food, exquisitely prepared by chef Marina, and savour fine wine around the dining room table, which morphs in size depending on who drops by on any given evening.

That zest for life is also evident in the couple's professional lives. Toronto native Blake has been in the construction business for years (**Blake Farrow Project Management Inc.**). Marina, originally from Milan, Italy, runs a successful interior design company and retail store in Collingwood (**F.A.D. – Farrow Arcaro Design**) with her business partner of 10 years, **Katherine Arcaro**. 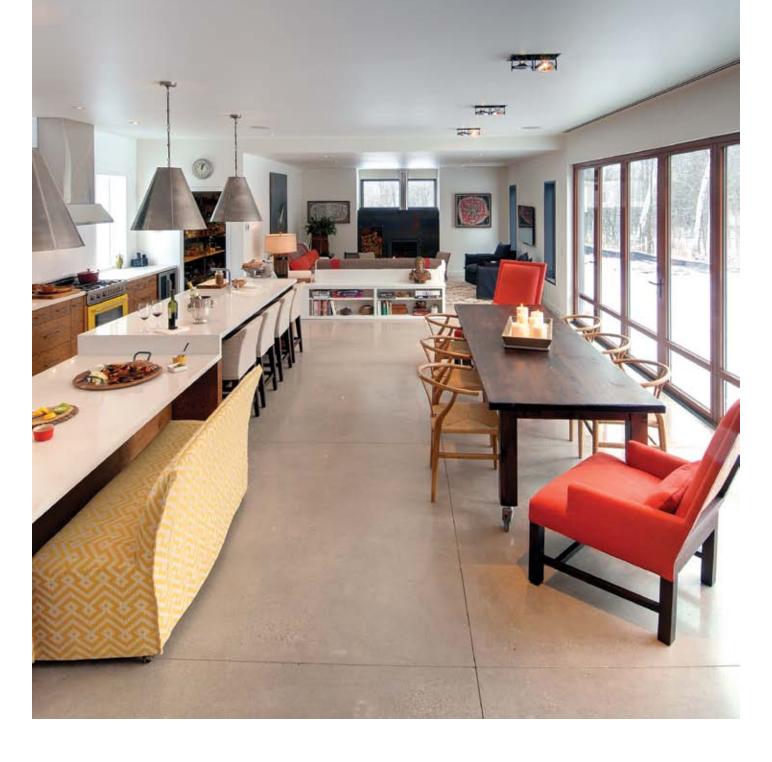












The Farrow home-adventure began with the purchase of a three-acre property on the edge of town, featuring a meandering creek and an early '70s-style bungalow/barn, "...complete with shag carpet and rumpus room panelling," says Blake.

Delighted with the location, they sold their home in Collingwood and started designing an energy-efficient LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) home. "It's one of the first LEED projects in the area," says Blake. "LEED provides a framework for comprehensive green building, design and material life cycle."

Plans were to demolish the existing house, but Blake was swamped with work and Marina was antsy about finding a winter nest, so they did a quick gut and reno. "It was cosy and cramped, but the delay gave us an opportunity to re-visit the design and re-live the '70s. In fact, we changed the plans several times," Blake says.

Rather than downsizing, like most families do when kids leave home,

they decided to recycle and incorporate the old house into the new design. "We want our kids to come and visit and be part of the family," explains Blake. "The way we designed it, there's a completely separate spot for them and we have our own space."

"We don't know how long the kids will be here," adds Marina. "The whole idea is flexibility, so we can close it off if we don't need it." Smart.

So what happens when an experienced builder and his wife, who studied interior design and architecture, pool their remarkable talents to design and build a home that reflects their lifestyle and character? Sheer magic.

The original house is now a separate, but joined 1,300 sq. ft., three-bedroom space for their two sons, while the couple and their daughter share the 3,000 sq. ft., two-bedroom main building.

There's no pretence, fuss, or by-the-book design here. Just Italian-inspired living... where simplicity rules! Continued on page 48

Marina designed the rift sawn oak stairs that lead to the second level and an awe-inspiring view, which she often enjoys from the landing at the top.



All the walls are white; window trim is simple. The main floor, featuring a no-maintenance, radiant-heated polished concrete floor, is a bright, wide-open "life" room, encompassing a spacious kitchen, dining and living area. Air quality is key – no carpets or curtains in this home.

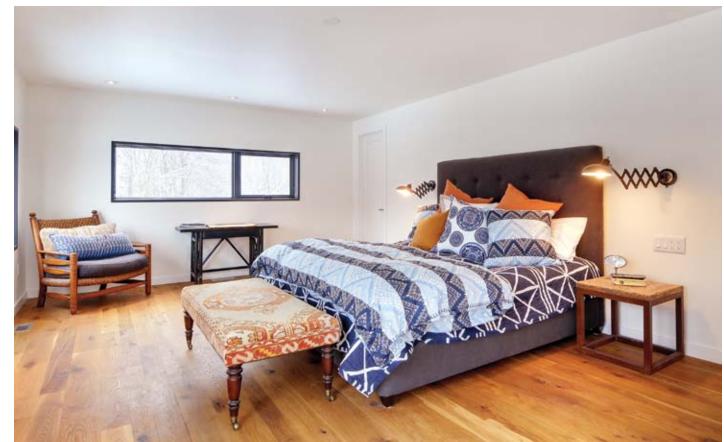
Two air handlers and boilers provide domestic hot water and hydronic heating, which allows the climate to be easily controlled or dialled back when the kids' area is unoccupied. "Air Star Mechanical contractors get it," says Blake. "They design and build user-friendly systems."

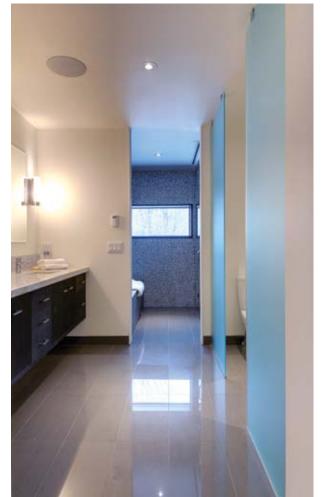
"It was primary that the form of our house has great function," explains Blake. "If it's not practical, it's useless." Adds Marina, "Tables are on wheels and everything is easily moved or flexible enough to adapt to our changing needs."

They have a casual, spontaneous lifestyle, where practicality and flexibility reign supreme. "The idea of the house is that we want it to be low maintenance and durable," says Marina.

Flat kitchen cabinet doors by **Heritage Cabinetry** are made of sturdy oak (reducing dirt build-up, limiting maintenance). A custom, two-level (scratch and stain resistant) Caesarstone countertop from **Granite Works** and commercial pizza oven accommodate Marina's pizza-making fervour. A practical pantry, loaded with pasta and sauces, features jars of Marina's canned goods. The star of the kitchen? A bright yellow, Italian-engineered Bertazzoni gas stove.

F.A.D. furnished the home with an eclectic array of European antiques, functional fixtures and pieces sourced from their store. Rich walnut wine cellar doors came from Marina's Milan apartment and a fabulous bull sign from England (shipped to Milan, Vancouver, and then back to Collingwood), graces the wall in the modest mudroom, where practical and durable checker-plate lines the dog-feeding area. There's even a sensible commercial foot grill in the front foyer. Continued on page 50

"One thing that LEED is very strong about is the durability of a home," explains Blake. "Durability refers to not needing repairs and having a lifespan that far exceeds most others."

Low-flow Grohe plumbing fixtures and valves, and Toto toilets were installed, reducing water consumption, while the extensive use of LED lighting helps conserve electricity. An elaborate water purification system, complete with reverse osmosis filtration, is housed in the basement.

The Farrows chose commercial, steel-frame interior doors for durability and simplicity. They ingeniously recycled a piece of rusty metal for the wood-burning fireplace.

A moveable 26-foot glass NanaWall opens the dining room to the great outdoors, providing more daylight and natural ventilation. This stunning German-engineered product is both energy-efficient and weather resistant.

The couple partnered with Roxul insulation, a Canadian producer of stone wool, spun from bath salt and recycled slag. "The walls and the envelope far exceed OBC (Ontario Building Code) standards in terms of R-value," says Blake. Continued on page 52

DOVETAILING

The anticipation that builds after seeing your home's log walls stacked one upon the next and the ends dovetailed neatly together in the yard at **Legendary Logcrafters Ltd.** is a little like picking up your ski pass before the snow flies: you know what's around the corner and you can hardly wait.

The owners of a 3,600 sq. ft., handcrafted log home at the base of the mountain at Craigleith Ski Club felt just that in 2010 while their home was being constructed. Taking less than a year from start to finish, the log structure popped up on their lot in a single day, once the handcrafting process had finalized the precise placement of each log. The main floor was quickly topped off with a Hybrid Building System second storey and roof, finished with Synergy insulated panels – both prefabricated in the Legendary Logcrafters' workshop. Installation of the entire structure took less than a week.

"We've been skiing up here for close to 20 years and when we were ready to build a chalet, we were drawn to the style of a log home," say the homeowners, a professional couple from Toronto. "We had had some initial contact with Legendary 10 years ago when we first started thinking about building. We were impressed with how hands-on the owner, Milan Smeh was and how involved in the process he was, start to finish. So when we were finally ready to go about building, the decision was easy – we knew that they were local and built with quality."

The homeowners opted to build with Legendary's premier dovetail log profile that uses sustainably forested, eastern white pine logs that are 10 inches thick and up to 40 feet long. Dovetail log homes are very traditional with logs flattened on two sides – an aesthetic that appealed to the homeowners. The edges of each log are shaped by hand with a drawknife. The logs are then stacked and fitted together at the corners with a secure dovetail joint. The space between each log course is filled with a long-lasting, contemporary latex-based chinking that expands and contracts as the logs settle – giving the log home its traditional look.

"The exterior of the log walls are adzed by hand, as are some interior details such as the fireplace mantel, leaving a textured surface," says **Sandra Smart**, office manager at Legendary Logcrafters. Throughout its homes, Legendary also offers a choice of handcrafted timber accents, such as king post trusses to enhance a cathedral ceiling or exterior roof

peak, porch or deck. Insulated roof panels are prefabricated with factory finished tongue-and-groove pine on the interior surface. They work with Legendary's heavy timber roof system. "Once they are installed, you have a finished interior cathedral ceiling."

"We have three grown children, and we wanted three separate spaces in the house so we could eventually host several different families here and offer them privacy," says the homeowner. In consultation with Legendary, the owners drew their own floor plan and had drawings drafted by <code>Jasper Design</code>. In addition to the main three-bedroom house, which includes the great room and kitchen, they designed a one-bedroom private suite over the garage and three bedrooms in the basement that can be accessed by the basement door. "It's nice for guests to have a fridge and the ability to make their own coffee and tea in the morning. Then you can get together when you want."

The owners hired general contractor **Ralph Spadafora**, recommended by Legendary, to finish the home. For balance, a combination of stone and iron was used with the wood. "We used black window frames and banisters in metal and wood," says the owner. Stone tiles line the foyer and side entries. The deck entry features stone leading from the door to around the fireplace in the great room (Masonal Stone, installed by **Rossco Stone Design**).

The kitchen offers a striking contrast to the rest of the main living area. The homeowners knew the cabinet style they wanted and matched the warm grey chinking colour to the cabinets, tying the open space together. The massive island is topped with a single piece of granite, approximately 15 by 10 feet, with a corresponding slab on the counters around the perimeter of the room.

"We found a great sectional sofa for the recreation room at **Terase** in Thornbury," says the homeowner. "I told the saleswoman that I was looking for a metal bed for our master bedroom and she said we really needed to see **Skot Lawrence** of **Desiron Custom Metal** in Clarksburg. We met him at his workshop and, as it turned out, we commissioned him to create not only our bed but a huge coffee table and dining room table and chairs. He works very collaboratively with people – he's an artist and good with proportions and suggestions. We're now working with him on a design for an entertainment cabinet for the great room." The master bedroom suite features a walkout to the yard and a gas fireplace (Chantico Fireplace Gallery). The en suite offers an invigorating walk-in steam shower and a double vanity. Opposite the en suite is a large closet with built-in cedar shelving by McMillan Millwork & Joinery.

On the upper level, the plank flooring in the hall and bedrooms doubles as the ceiling of the kitchen below. The main house includes two lovely bedrooms, a small TV room and a large bathroom with beautiful graphic mosaic tile floors and a glass shower. A crossover leads to a suite with a kitchenette above the garage, offering a private space for family and guests.

On the lower level, a separate entrance allows guests to filter downstairs to three bedrooms, two of which feature double sets of log bunk beds. A recreation room with a bar and wine cellar provides opportunities to entertain and relax. Down the wide hall is an exercise room complete with ski training machine and SaunaRay sauna. 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cooking at home

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Whether for a cosy lunch on a blustery day,

a DIY after-school snack for bottomless teens, or a lastminute dinner for busy nights, grilled cheese is the ultimate go-to food. And, there's the comforting nostalgia factor – who didn't grow up eating these simple, yet perfectly satisfying sandwiches?

These days, grilled cheese is enjoying its day in the limelight. Restaurants are springing up across the

country, dedicated solely to serving gourmet versions of these humble sandwiches. High-end bistros everywhere are guaranteed to have a cheesy sammie on their menu. Even cookbooks featuring only grilled cheese are published.

What lends the grilled cheese sandwich to these gourmet adaptations is its versatility. While processed cheese slices and white bread work in a pinch – or for everyday enjoyment – playing with the variety of cheese, artisanal breads and the addition of meats and veggies takes a plain old grilled cheese to grand heights.

To help you liven up your grilled cheese, here's an epicurean delight, sure to please, and some tips for making the perfect grilled cheese, no matter the filling.

AGED GOUDA GRILLED CHEESE WITH CARAMELIZED ONIONS AND BACON (Makes 2 sandwiches)

4 slices thick-sliced bacon

1 tbsp softened butter

4 slices sourdough bread

2 tsp Dijon mustard

½ cup each grated aged Gouda cheese and grated mozzarella cheese

CARAMELIZED ONIONS:

1 tbsp butter

1 onion, thinly sliced

Pinch each salt, pepper and sugar

- CARAMELIZED ONIONS: Melt butter in small saucepan over medium heat. Add onion, salt, pepper and sugar. Reduce heat to medium-low and cook, stirring occasionally, until tender and golden, about 15 minutes. Set aside.
- Meanwhile, in large skillet, cook bacon over medium heat, turning once, until crisp and golden, 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer to paper towel-lined plate and set aside.
- Butter one side of each slice of bread. Spread mustard on the other side of each slice of bread. Arrange the cheese, onions and bacon on two slices of bread (on the mustard side)
 sandwich with remaining bread.
- In large non-stick skillet, cook sandwiches over medium heat, turning once, until bread is crisp and golden and cheese is melted, 6 to 8 minutes.
- Slice in half to serve.

7 TIPS FOR THE BEST GRILLED CHEESE EVER

- 1. Choose your cheese wisely. The best grilled cheese sandwiches combine at least two different types of cheese one for its flavour profile, the other for its melting properties. For flavour, consider aged cheeses, smoked cheeses, parmesan or blue cheese. Best melting cheeses include mozzarella, fontina, cheddar or provolone.
- **2.** Grate instead of slice. Grated cheese allows you to cover the surface of the bread more evenly. And the cheese melts quicker, so the bread doesn't scorch while you wait for gooey cheese.
- **3.** Consider the bread to cheese ratio. There is nothing more disappointing than biting into a grilled cheese sandwich and having to literally search for the cheese. To avoid this, slice your bread no thicker than 1/2-inch thick and pack in the cheese!
- **4.** Use a non-stick pan. This ensures that not only does the bread not stick to the pan making the flip easy but those bits of crunchy melted cheese also don't stick. And I think we can all agree that those crispy bits are one of the best parts of the grilled cheese sandwich experience!
- **5.** Medium heat is the way to cook your grilled cheese. Too high, and the bread burns before the cheese melts too low, and you'll wait forever for the sandwich.
- **6.** Use a lid. Cover the skillet while the grilled cheese cooks. This gives the cheese a chance to get ooey-gooey before the bread chars.
- 7. Don't shy away from condiments. Of course, there is always ketchup. But pickles (bread & butter or dill), mustard, mayonnaise, sauerkraut, olives, cranberry chutney and roasted vegetables are just a handful of other condiments that will feel right at home alongside your sandwich. oh
